Running Water Draw - -

Dam Construction Bids To Be Opened June 12

Fruition of efforts of numerous individuals in New Mexico and Texas for the past several years will be realized as construction work begins on a lake and flood protection and recreation reservoir at Running Water Draw.

Sponsors for this joint effort in intergovernmental cooperation are the City of Clovis, Central Curry Natural Resource Conservation District, Curry County Commission, Farmer County Soil and Water Conservation District and the Farmer County Commissioners Court.

Gene Green, Soil Conservation Service representative in Clovis, has worked with the sponsors to get the necessary agreements signed, and he reports "excellent local sponsorship on this project." He further stated that "it took many years to bring this project about and the benefits to

New Mexico and Texas will be great in this addition of the Ned Houk Lake facilities."

The opening of construction bids will be held at the City Hall in Clovis on Wednesday at 10:30 a.m. The awarding of contract should occur within 10 to 12 days following the opening and reading of the bids. It will be approximately 30 days after bids are opened and the contract is awarded before actual construction work is begun.

Ralph White of Stephenville, Tex., project engineer with the SCS, reported that the construction stipulated performance time is 410 days - this is from the time bids are awarded to completion. The planning and design surveying has been completed and the layout surveys for construction are now in progress.

According to White, who has the overall responsibility of construction of the dam, plans and specifications are: 697,000 cubic yards of earth fill, 396 cubic yards of concrete in the principal spillway and 416 feet of 48 inch concrete pressure pipe in the principal spillway. A permanent recreation lake at this site since the late 1930's. The Running Water Draw Watershed application was approved

by the New Mexico State Engineer in June of 1962 and authorized for planning in January 1965. Work plan for the project was completed in November 1968 and the job approved for installation in May 1970.

Application for the Running Water Draw watershed Project has included a history of flooding in the area, dollar damage and other water-related

problems that the local people needed assistance with. The application was then submitted under Public Law 566, Small Watersheds Program. The Soil Conservation Service will administer the 100 percent federally funded project.

After the structure is completed, responsibility of maintenance and operation of the dam will be vested in the various sponsors.

Laura Doshier To Compete For TSHSRA Rodeo Queen

Miss Laura Doshier, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Doshier of the Oklahoma Lane community, will be representing the Farwell Chapter of the Tri-State High School Rodeo Association during the organization's 1974 Queen Contest slated for Thursday, June 6. Queen competition and the rodeo will be conducted in Amarillo with rodeo performances scheduled Thursday, Friday and Saturday, June 6, 7 and 8.

Judging in the queen contest

is slated to get underway at 2 p.m. Thursday with all contestants appearing before the judges. Queen candidates will be judged on appearance, personality and riding ability. The queen is to be crowned at 7:50 p.m. Thursday just prior to the opening rodeo performance. Contestants must be a member of TSHSRA and must have qualified for the 1974 season Finals Rodeo. TSHSRA chapters from Texas, New Mexico and Oklahoma will be represented in the competition.

Laura, a 17-year-old Farwell High School senior, was an active member of the Rodeo Club, Chorus and Pep Club at the school during the 1973-74 school year. She also served as reporter for the Rodeo Club.

Since she was 10 years old, Laura has been competing in horse shows in 4-H both 4-H and AJRA rodeos and this year

she joined the TSHSRA. Laura qualified for the state 4-H rodeo three years and this year is eligible to compete in the TSHSRA Finals Rodeo. To be eligible for the Finals Rodeo, Laura has entered eight TSHSRA rodeos and has placed in three. She will be entering girls steer riding at the Amarillo competition. She also has competed in pole bending, goat tying and barrel racing. Laura was also the recipient of one of the first four Farwell Rodeo Club jackets to be presented at Farwell High School.

Laura's father takes care of wheat pasture cattle during the winter months and after school and during the summer you can find Laura out helping her father take care of the cattle.

Laura works and trains her own horses on the poles, barrels and in goat tying.

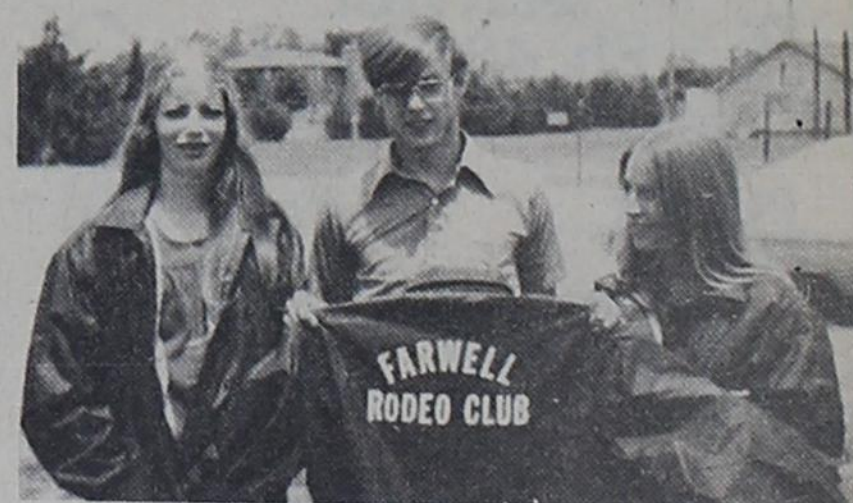
Laura Doshier qualified for the girls steer riding competition at the Finals Rodeo and has entered eight rodeos and placed in three.

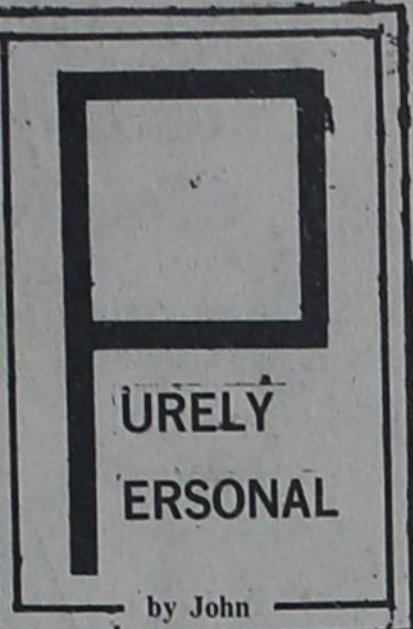

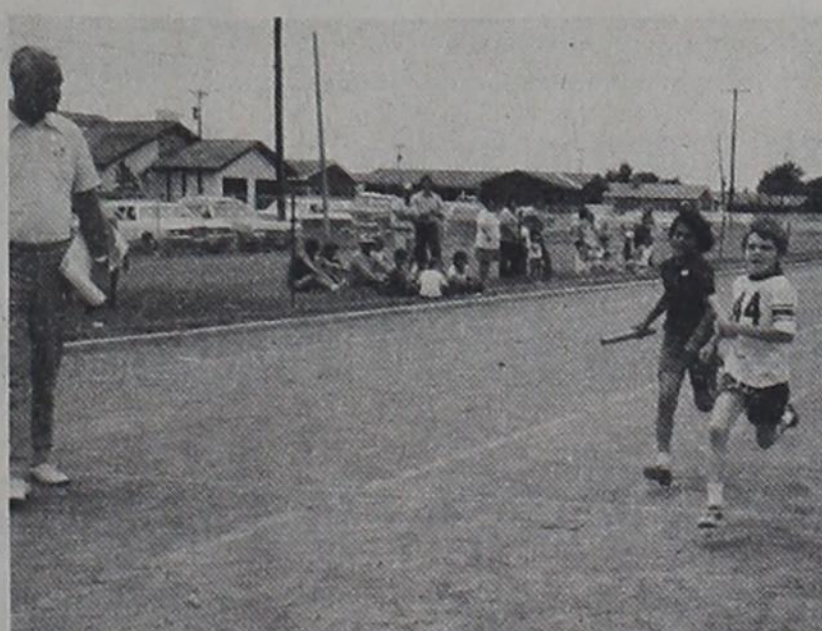

'Agri-Diplomacy' - Soviet Agricultural Experts Conducted On Texas Tour

Four Soviet agricultural experts visited grain sorghum and livestock production facilities in West Texas May 24-28 as part of an American Farm Industry tour.

Hosts to the group during their West Texas stay were the Texas Grain Sorghum Producers Board and Grain Sorghum Producers Association.

Darwin Stolte, president of the United States Feed Grains Council; John DeCoursey, foreign marketing specialist of the Dairy and Poultry Divisions Foreign Agricultural Service; and Laurie Law, interpreter, all of Washington, D.C., accompanied the Soviets to West Texas.

Executive Director Elbert Harp and staff members of GSPA and TGSPB guided the visitors on their tour of cow-calf operations, commercial feedlots, feed processing firms, packing plants and swine production facilities.

Members of the Soviet team were G.P. Rudenko, Deputy Director of the Agricultural Section, USSR State Planning Committee and leader of the group; A.S. Negru-vode, Deputy Academician Secretary of the Economics and Agricultural Production Organization Section of the V.I. Lenin All Union Academy of Agricultural Sciences; R.R. Kosynkin, Deputy Chief of the Main Economic Administration, Ministry of Agriculture; and V.E. Nazarenko, Deputy Director of the All Union Academy of Agricultural Sciences.

Rudenko, leader of the group, told directors and staff members of GSPA and TGSPB at a dinner honoring the Soviets May 27 that the Russian Ministry of Agriculture had told members of the team before their departure from Moscow that the purpose of their trip was to develop ways of cooperating with Americans.

The team leader said Secretary of Agriculture Earl Butz greeted them on their arrival in Washington with the statement that they were engaged in diplomacy by the bushel rather than by bullets.

Rudenko also thanked GSPA and TGSPB for the tour hosted by the grain organizations.

In their U.S. tour the Soviets visited Washington, D.C.; Charlotte, N.C.; Atlanta, Ga.; St. Louis, Mo.; Lubbock, Tex.; Hartford, Conn.; Philadelphia, Pa.; and New York City.

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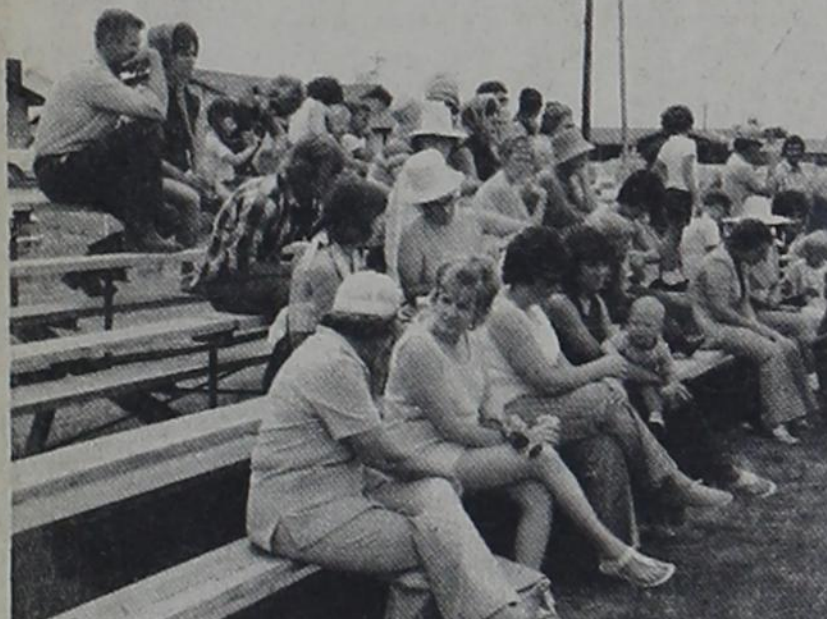

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Rickety Ladder Spells Trouble

The annual spring home fix-up campaign in most families will include some climbing. The Texas Safety Association warns that a ladder can develop dangerous faults in storage.

Check for age cracks, drying out, rotting and insect damage. Remember that paint can hide defects. Don't use a painted ladder without inspecting it closely. Better yet, avoid painting in the first place. Instead, use generous amounts of linseed oil or a coat or two of clear varnish to preserve wooden ladders.

Keeping your ladder in good repair is the most basic safety rule, but, TSA says, make sure you follow through safely in the use of the ladder too.

The footing of the ladder must be firm and even for

Spells Trouble

The top of the ladder should rest against a flat, firm surface. Make sure the feet rest a distance about one fourth the length of the ladder from the wall.

Always face the ladder and grasp with both hands when climbing or descending. Don't climb beyond the third rung from the top.

While metal ladders are much lighter and easier to handle than wooden ones of equivalent strength, the electrical hazard is much greater. Never use a metal ladder where it is possible for it or you to get within four feet of open electrical apparatus, wiring or other electrical equipment.

GOD FOR US

Many people, even religious people, suppose that God is against sinners. "Do what is right," they think, "and God will love and bless you, but do what is wrong and He will be angry with you and curse you."

Perhaps this view of God comes from the fact that many Scripture passages, especially in the Old Testament, reveal God as the Enemy of the workers of iniquity. But He is the Enemy of the workers of iniquity—as such—as individual persons.

In Ezek. 18:23 God asks: "Have I any pleasure at all that the wicked should die...?" And in II Pet. 3:9 we learn that when God might have judged this world for the crucifixion of Christ, He delayed the judgment because He is "longsuffering" and "not willing that any should perish, but that all should come to repentance."

The Apostle Paul, referring to the crucifixion, declares that "God was in Christ, reconciling the world unto Himself, NOT IMPUTING THEIR TRESPASSES UNTO THEM; and hath committed unto us the word of reconciliation" (II Cor. 5:19). How could He have shown sinners more conclusively

It is on this basis that the Apostle Paul goes on to plead: "Now then, we are ambassadors for Christ, as though God did beseech you by us: WE PRAY YOU IN CHRIST'S STEAD, BE YE RECONCILED TO GOD:"

"For He hath made Him to be sin for us, [Him] who knew no sin; that we might be made the righteousness of God in Him" (II Cor. 5:20, 21).

SCS Points Out Wise Use Of Water

Star Light, Star Bright - it has been so long since it rained that most people are just about ready to see if wishing on a star would send moisture, according to Herb Evans of the Soil Conservation Service. During drought everyone suffers, townpeople with lawns, dry-land farmers and even farmers who are fortunate enough to have irrigation water.

Careful use of irrigation water in this year of little effective rainfall and downward spiraling prices on farm products could mean the difference in getting by and financial disaster.

There are three things vital in planning a row watering system, reports Evans. They are soil permeability, slopes, and lengths of rows. Johnny Hamilton of Friona considered

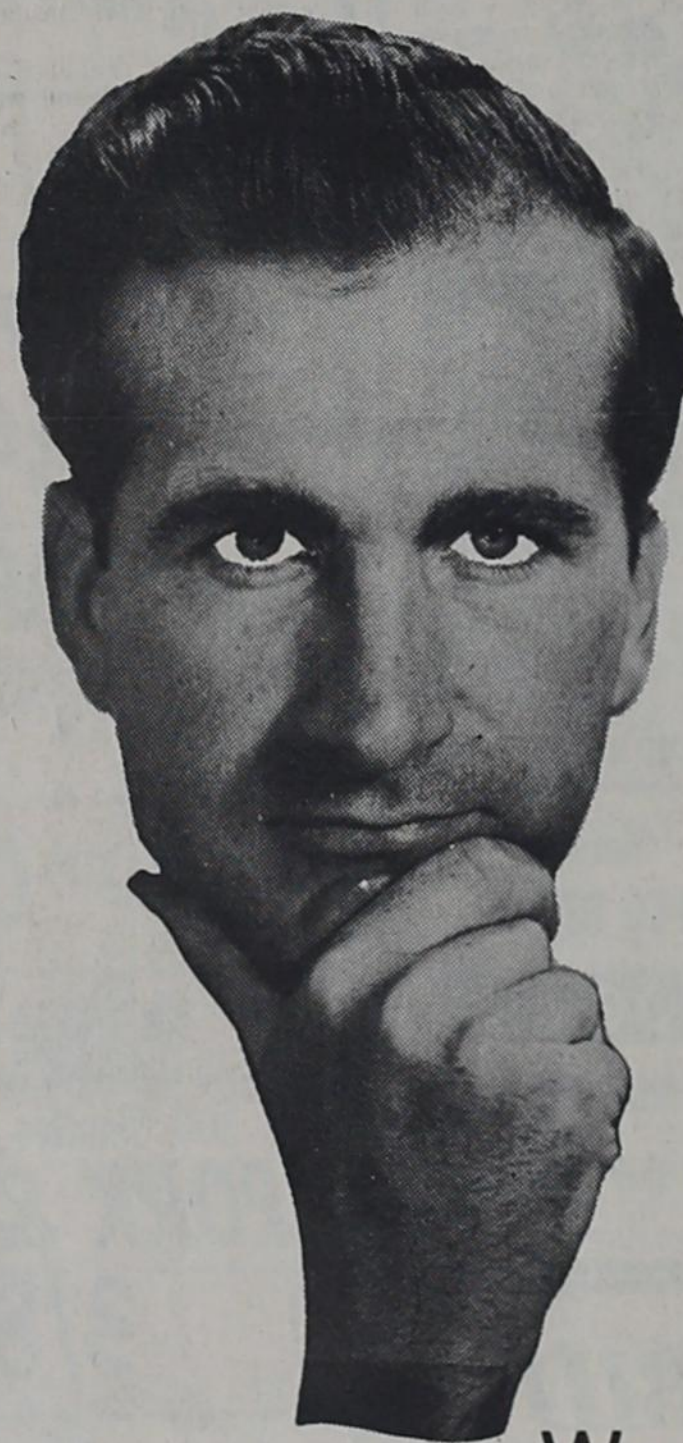
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**Class Plans

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Pioneer Days Rodeo To Kick Off Tonight

Rodeo contestants participating in the Clovis Pioneer Days Rodeo performances will be competing for a share of an estimated \$15,000 in total purse. Tonight's performance at 8 p.m. in the Curry County Mounted Patrol arena will kick-off a trilogy of performances designed to bring the best in rodeo entertainment to the area.

Other rodeo performances are scheduled for Saturday at 8 p.m. and Sunday at 2:30 p.m. Expected for this year's competitions are Joe Alexander, world champion bareback rider; Tom Ferguson, Miami, Okla., leading for the 1974 All Around Championship; John McBeth, Burden, Kan., leading for Saddle Bronc Division; and Marvin Paul Shoulders, the bull riding leader, plus 175 to 200 other pro cowboys.

Events scheduled include saddle bronc riding, bareback bronc riding, bull riding, calf roping, steer wrestling, team roping and steer roping. Cowgirls barrel racing will be an added event.

The Rodeo Cowboys Association sanctioned event will feature clowns Wiley McCray of Briscoe, Tex., and Tommy Sheffield of Rankin, Tex., plus announcer John Snow of Tucson, Ariz., a name well-known on the rodeo circuit. Speciality acts will include Earl Whorton's working sheep dogs from San Saba, Tex., and a special presentation by clown Sheffield.

Beutler Bros. and Cervi, headquartered in Sterling, Colo., will provide stock for the rodeo performances. The three rodeo performances are sponsored by the Curry County Mounted Patrol, a non-profit group formed in 1941 to assist law enforcement agencies and to promote western oriented activities as a community service.

The Fourth Annual Pioneer Days Rodeo will inaugurate a new and more accurate method of score keeping. A computerized scoreboard, called the Winston Scoreboard, will instantly flash the averages of ropers and riders after the timers' and judges' figures have been fed into the computer. The computerized scoreboards are now in use in all

larger rodeos, according to rodeo spokesmen, and only the top rodeos in the nation are selected to be aided by the use of the scoreboards.

Tickets to the rodeo are available at the Clovis Chamber of Commerce and are priced from \$2 for bleachers to \$3 and \$3.50 for reserved grandstand.

The annual Pioneer Days parade will begin at 10 a.m. Saturday at Hilltop Plaza and continue south to the opposite end of Main Street. Theme for this year's parade is "How the West Was Won."

Riding in the parade will be LeAnn Kelso Monroe, 1974 Curry County Fair Queen, who was voted Queen of the Pioneer Days Rodeo by members of the Curry County Mounted Patrol. Additional features of the parade will be a Wells Fargo stagecoach, the Senior Citizens
