Already the Farwell paving and water works expansion programs are making a significant difference in the looks of the community. It certainly adds to the appearance of the streets to have them delineated with curbs and gutters. This makes a street look like a street rather than a cow path.

However, this will again restrict some of the wide corners we have been used to while going about our community chores. We remember when, some years ago, the main street, Highway 70-84, was curbed and guttered. The curbs and gutters were run around the corner and a few feet up the north and south streets.

This effectively stopped the old practice of just cutting across a corner any old way and then on up the street. It sure took some getting used to when your corner was restricted to 34 feet in width instead of the 50 or 60 feet that the people had been using to make their turns with. Well, progress has again caught up with our driving habits and we must learn to make the corner where the street is rather than where we might absentmindedly go.

Remembering the first curbing and guttering also brings back the problem that arose with our first sewer system installation. (Then, as now, we were in the midst of a long dry spell and the sewer lines had been laid and the ditches filled with the loose and dry soil.) Some of it was watered in, but apparently not well enough, because after the first really big rain, most of the sewer line ditches sank from several inches to several feet. This caused many folks to be marooned within their block as the sewer lines cut across all the intersections and the cars could not get over the gulch created by the soil subsidence.

C. M. Henderson was mayor and he, along with Johnnie Williams, got some trucks together and hauled caliche to fill the ditches in enough so that local citizens could at least get their cars away from their blocks.

We note that the current water line contractor is doing a good job of watering down the fill where the lines are crossing streets, so hopefully, when and if, it rains again, we will not all be stranded without cars. Of course, by then the gas shortage may have forced us all to walk and we won't be as mispud now as we were 20 years ago.

A nice boost for the county was announced this week by the commissioner's court when they unveiled plans for a law enforcement center to be built adjacent to the courthouse. This will be done with the county's revenue sharing funds and not be a future tax liability on the county.

We think that this is the spirit of "revenue sharing", the building of additional and needed civic improvements that will be a "one time" thing. The object was to provide the local governing bodies with additional funds to be used for long term improvements that would be a local tax drag when "revenue sharing" is discontinued by the federal government.

The Parmer County Commissioners Court is to be commended on this wise use of the county's revenue sharing funds.

## Commissioners Discuss Highway Improvements

Meeting with members of the Parmer County Commissioners Court Monday during regular session with George Wall, district engineer for the Texas Highway Department, from Lubbock; C. W. Nall, also of the Lubbock THD office and Rhea Bradley, Littlefield THD office.

The highway department officials explained that limited funds would be available for improving or constructing additional farm to market roads within Parmer County, and asked each commissioner to outline needs in his precinct.

"We think we can reach four counties in our district each year," explained Wall. "We can construct new roads, correct hazardous roads, flatten dangerous curves, and possible even do more road work with funds as they become available."

He continued, "I would like to ask you right now if you are willing to have partial completion on new road programs, at least until more funds are available to complete the programs."

Unanimously, the commissioners agreed that with work needed in several areas in the county, they would be willing to settle for a partial completion of road improvements at this time, and outlined several roads using highway department road use maps.

The highway department men indicated they would start preliminary planning on additional road construction for the county, also reported that because of noise and air pollution changes, the proposed reconstruction of Highway 214 south of Friona had been temporarily suspended until problems were worked out.

In other action during the meeting, commissioners approved payment to Pioneer Natural Gas Co. for moving gas lines in the Highway 214 construction area and approved payment of \$6,200 for liability insurance on county roads. They also approved payment of \$3,727 to the Bookmobile as scheduled in the county budget and took action on the only bid received for a pickup for Commissioner Cecil Atchley. The only bid received was from Big Country

Ford of Clovis, and Judge Archie Tarter said the bid did meet advertised specifications.

Motions were approved to set salaries for 1974 on the same schedule as 1973 salaries and to leave the county tax rate the same as it is at the present time.

They turned down a proposal from CattleTown Inc. to assume liability of a road going to the business from Highway 60 in north Parmer County. It was reported that CattleTown was the only person who benefited from the road and that it was, in fact, a private road. They also vetoed a request from CattleTown for a subsidy to the Hereford Fire Department and commented that subsidizing the four fire departments within Parmer County was adequate as far as this county was concerned.

During the afternoon, commissioners studied and approved a proposed plan to construct a new law enforcement center in Parmer County, adjacent to the courthouse in Farwell. A separate story about the proposed construction is elsewhere in this issue of The State Line Tribune.

from Lubbock, expressed puzzlement as he explained to the Board of Trustees that he had received no bids on a proposed remodeling and improvement project for the city wastewater facilities. He said that in his years as an engineer, this was his first experience in not receiving one bid.

Douglas told trustees that he had called several places, and after consulting with acting City Attorney Buzzard, he requested permission to resubmit the proposal and attempt to get bids on the project which will cost in excess of \$22,000. The engineer said he would seek

permission from the Environmental Protection Agency to actively solicit bids on the proposed project and make telephone calls to contractors explaining the project in an attempt to secure bids for construction.

City Attorney Buzzard was asked to follow-up on the junk car ordinances and check into the possibility of getting stickers to place on abandoned vehicles in Texico in an attempt to rid the city of junked vehicles.

Water Superintendent Billy Hammit reported on the clean-up of lots around city hall which will be used for parking areas and he said that the lots have been cleaned as he had been instructed by Trustees. It was approved for Perry Winkles to purchase surplus city equipment for a total of \$425.

Attorney Buzzard was given the final approved zoning change map for the city and will present the final ordinance preceding a public hearing to inform Texico citizens of the changes. He will also rewrite present City Ordinance No. 127 to include new changes in the New Mexico Traffic Code.

Also discussed during the meeting was rat poison, the possibility of acquiring a sweeper for the city and insurance for the emergency unit which will cover patients and members of their family during transportation.

**Postage Increase Starts March 2**

Farwell Postmaster Jim Bob Smart has issued a reminder that postage will increase as of 12:01 a.m. on Saturday, March 2. He said that rates for an ordinary letter will increase from eight to 10 cents, airmail letters from 11 to 13 cents.

All post cards in regular mail will increase from six to eight cents and airmail cards from nine to 11 cents. He said the higher denomination stamps can be purchased at the Farwell post office, and added that sufficient two cent stamps are on hand to use with eight cent stamps already purchased by the postal patron.

## Commissioners Approve Law Enforcement Center

A progressive step was taken Monday by the Parmer County Commissioner's Court when they unanimously approved a proposed plan for a law enforcement complex to be constructed at the north side of the courthouse in Farwell, using federal revenue sharing funds for construction.

Meeting with Warren Pendleton, architect from Clovis, the commissioners checked the proposed plans and specifications for the new construction which will be attached to the courthouse and will enclose law enforcement facilities and the Parmer County jail, including a jailer's apartment.

The architect explained to commissioners that the new

building will compass 4,299 square feet and will cost an estimated \$225,000 to construct. Main construction of the one-story building will be concrete and steel, with a brick and tile face. Plans are for the building to tie into the present north entrance of the courthouse, and the present county judge's offices will become offices for the sheriff's office, while the judge will move to the present sheriff's office on completion of the new construction.

Planned for the building is a lobby, central reception, radio room and workroom; a conference room; a jailer's apartment, jail kitchen, and a total of 21 cells, excluding the drunk tank which is expected to have a capacity of four to six persons.

Enclosed in the jail area will be a men's dormitory, plus three individual cells; three

individual cells for women; three individual cells for boys; one individual cell for girls; one individual cell for first offenders; one isolation cell and one padded cell.

Pendleton explained that he had drawn up the blueprints

and plans in accordance with the Texas Minimum Requirements for Jails and in compliance with rulings by Federal Judge Sarah T. Hughes of Dallas, who has outlined several proposals for adequate jail facilities. He said the only thing not done according to proposals by Judge Hughes was an outside recreation area, which he likened to a penitentiary yard; however, said such facilities could be added at a later date if necessary.

Parmer County Attorney Hurshel Harding told commissioners that, as precaution, he had checked with federal authorities to see if federal revenue sharing funds could be used to construct a law enforcement center and said he has letters verifying that such an expenditure is valid. He also praised local county law enforcement officials, who, in his words, have done an outstanding job with limited facilities available to them.

Harding added that original plans had called for a two-story building, but in order to use only federal revenue sharing funds, and not have to vote a bond issue, or have any extra expense to county residents, a plan was drawn up to use existing federal revenue sharing funds for the construction. "We are building a basic

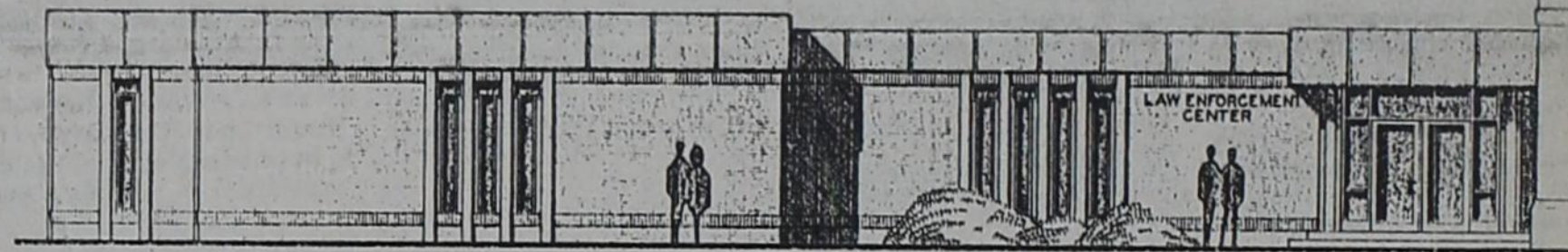
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### Coach Booth Resigns Post

structure," commented Harding. "It complies with state and federal requirements, and can be increased in size when and if necessary." He compared the proposed construction to the water project plan now underway along Running Water Draw, and stressed that the law enforcement center would be an asset for the entire county, not just a few people.

Sheriff Charles Lovelace who attended the session, put his stamp of approval on the plan and noted that the structure could be increased in size in later years if necessary.

Judge Archie Tarter said the county presently has just over \$200,000 available in federal revenue sharing funds, and by September 10, expects to have an additional \$50,000 in funds from the federal government. He said there is really no reason not to have enough available to complete the entire project without an increase in taxes or voting a bond issue.

Following discussion on final plans, contracts and specifications, Architect Pendleton was instructed to complete the plans, draw up contracts and prepare to advertise for bids for construction of the new facility.

Mr. Crump was born in Montague County on August 27, 1894, and moved to Texico from West Camp in 1954.

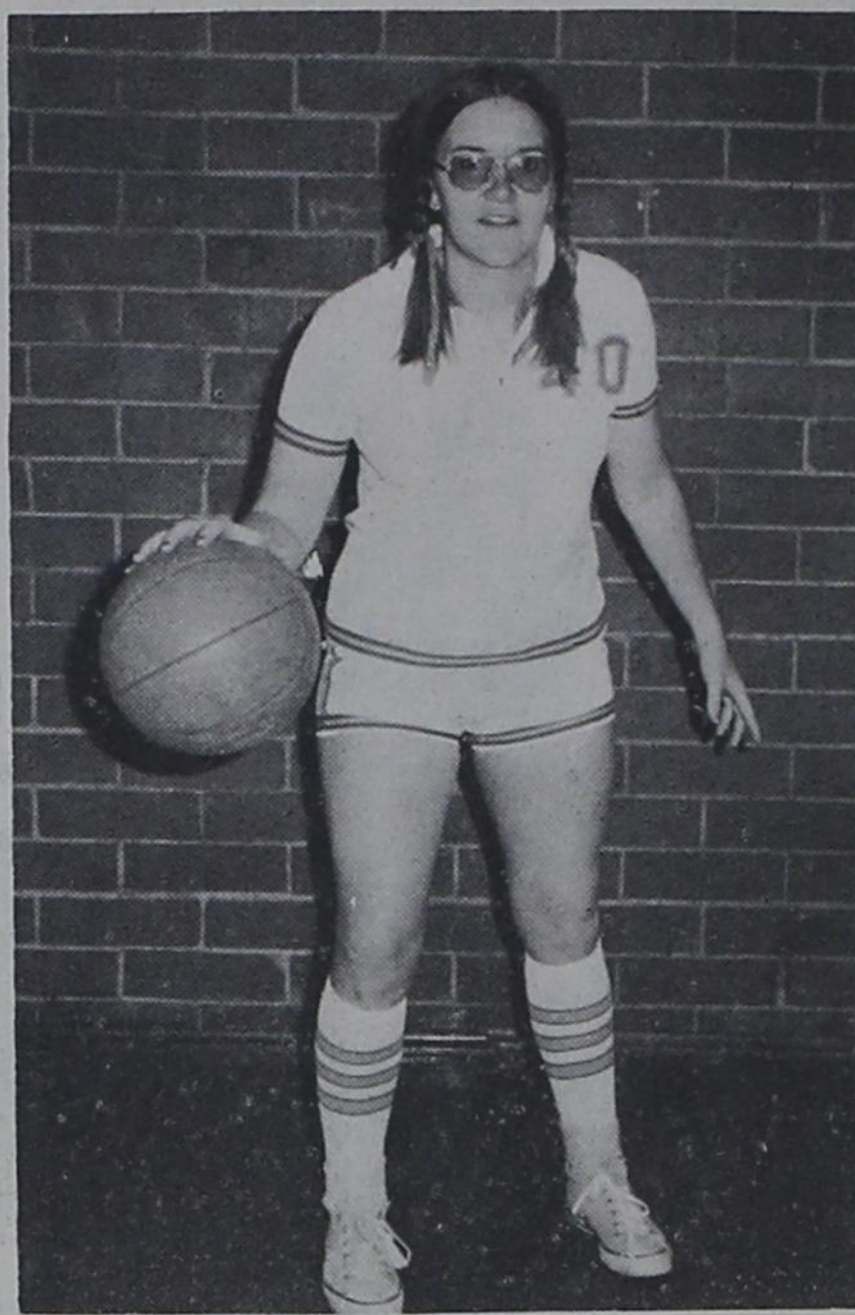

Deputy Medical Investigator John McNeil of Clovis pronounced Mr. Woodson dead where he was found in his automobile.

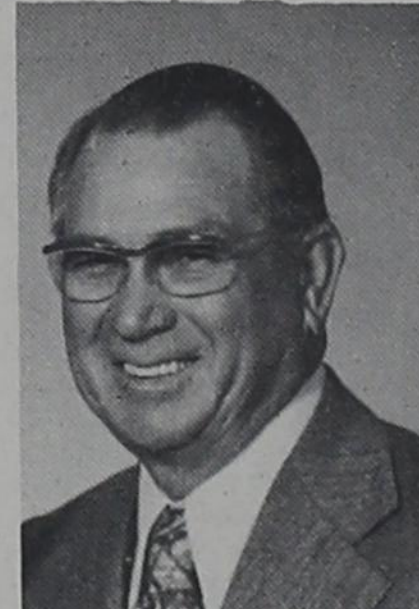

## Farwell City Fathers Get Progress Report

Optimism and early finish dates were predicted by both the contractor on the water expansion program and the engineer for the paving project underway in Farwell at this time.

Harry Sheets of Sheets and Sheets said he expected a completion time of 30-40 days if good weather continues as has been noted throughout the water project which includes new and larger water lines for Farwell.

He said that only minor problems had been encountered during the entire project and voiced optimism about the outcome of the project which initially was not expected to be completed until sometime in May.

Construction on a new pump-house is expected to begin in 2-3 weeks, he added, and he asked the city commission about alternate routes for one portion of the uncompleted line and inquired about two or three additional easements needed at this time to complete the project.

Reporting for his father, Bob Lydick, Chad Lydick also voiced the same optimism and predicted a much earlier completion date for the paving program that had initially been expected. Good working weather has added to progress and Lydick told commissioners the contractor had moved in additional crews and actual paving is expected to begin within the next two weeks.

Curbs and gutters are expected to be completed by mid-March and paving machines will begin work as soon as approximately 80 percent of the curb and gutter is ready.

"We are way ahead of schedule," he commented, "we seem to have a really good crew working on the paving."

He also told commissioners that the state had offered to assist with ramps on ninth street and suggested that commissioners allow the state to participate in the program to help save local money. The City Commissioners unanimously agreed to allow the state to assist in any way they could.

Two requests for mobile home permits were referred to the city zoning commission for final decision.

The device works from a barometer and would trip the siren when the barometer dropped below a certain level, giving area citizens adequate time to reach a shelter if necessary.

Reporting for the local water department Vic Venable and Dee Hammit reported to major problems with the installation of the new water system.

System Doug Landrum briefly discussed the continuing dog problem in the city and once again asked about the possibility of establishing a corporation and acquiring a city police officer to help enforce existing ordinances.

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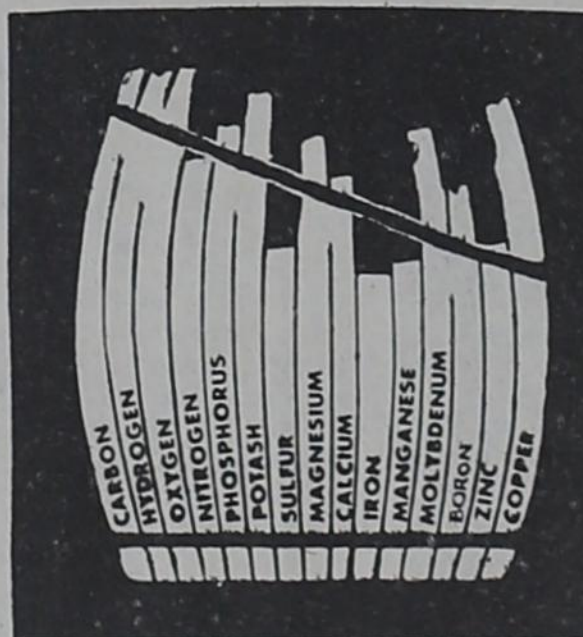

## Texico Double Accidents Leave Three With Injury

### Farmers Asked To Tell Fuel Supplier Of Need

"The essential thing a farmer must do to help assure himself adequate fuel for agricultural production is tell his distributor how much he needs. Unless a local distributor or dealer knows what his farm customer requires," said Robert F. Spreen, state executive director of Texas Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, "that distributor cannot take the necessary steps to get enough fuel for them."

Informing the distributor becomes even more important if a farmer intends to increase his acreage considerably, or if he wants to expand dairy, poultry or other farm operations, added Spreen. Local dealers will need this information to request additional fuel from their suppliers.

Spreen continued, "Agricultural producers who are all to receive priority allocations will be required to certify to an

ongoing fuel conservation program on their operations. USDA, in cooperation with the Federal Energy Office and the Environmental Protection Agency, has developed a conservation leaflet. This leaflet, scheduled to be available in early March, includes an energy management certification that there is an ongoing conservation program and the priority fuel will be used for agricultural production."

#### Tips On Economics

**TWO MINUTES WITH THE BIBLE**

**"WHAT IS A CHURCH"**

Do you know that most people, even the great majority of religious people, do not even know what a church is? Ask the average man on the street what a church is and he will probably reply: "A church? Well, anybody knows that! A church is a building where people go to worship!" But this is not correct. The word translated "church" in our Bibles, simply means assembly, so a church is not a building, but the assembly of people who meet in the building. And a church is not necessarily a gathering of worshippers. The riotous mob that had gathered at Ephesus in Paul's day is called a "church" (Gr. *ekklesia*) in Acts 19:32, and this passage states that this assembly, or church, was "confused, and most of them did not know wherefore they were come together." So a church is simply an assembly, not a building.

The church of which the Bible has most to say is "the Church of God, which He hath purchased with His own blood" (Acts 20:28). St. Paul calls this church, again and again, "the Body of Christ," or "the Church which is His Body."

We do not join this Church by water baptism or any other religious rite; we join it by faith in the Lord Jesus Christ. Referring to believers in Christ, Paul declares: "By one Spirit are we all baptized into one Body" (I Cor. 12:13), and in Rom. 12:5 he says "Ye being many are one Body in Christ."

Many sincere people have had their names on the rolls of religious organizations for years before learning this great truth, that the true Church, the Church of God, the Body of Christ, is not a building, but the company of those who have come to trust in Christ as their Savior.

We sincerely hope the reader belongs to this one true Bible Church - and also attends a local church, an assembly of believers in Christ who love and study the Word of God, so as to "grow in grace and in the knowledge of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ" (II Pet. 3:18).

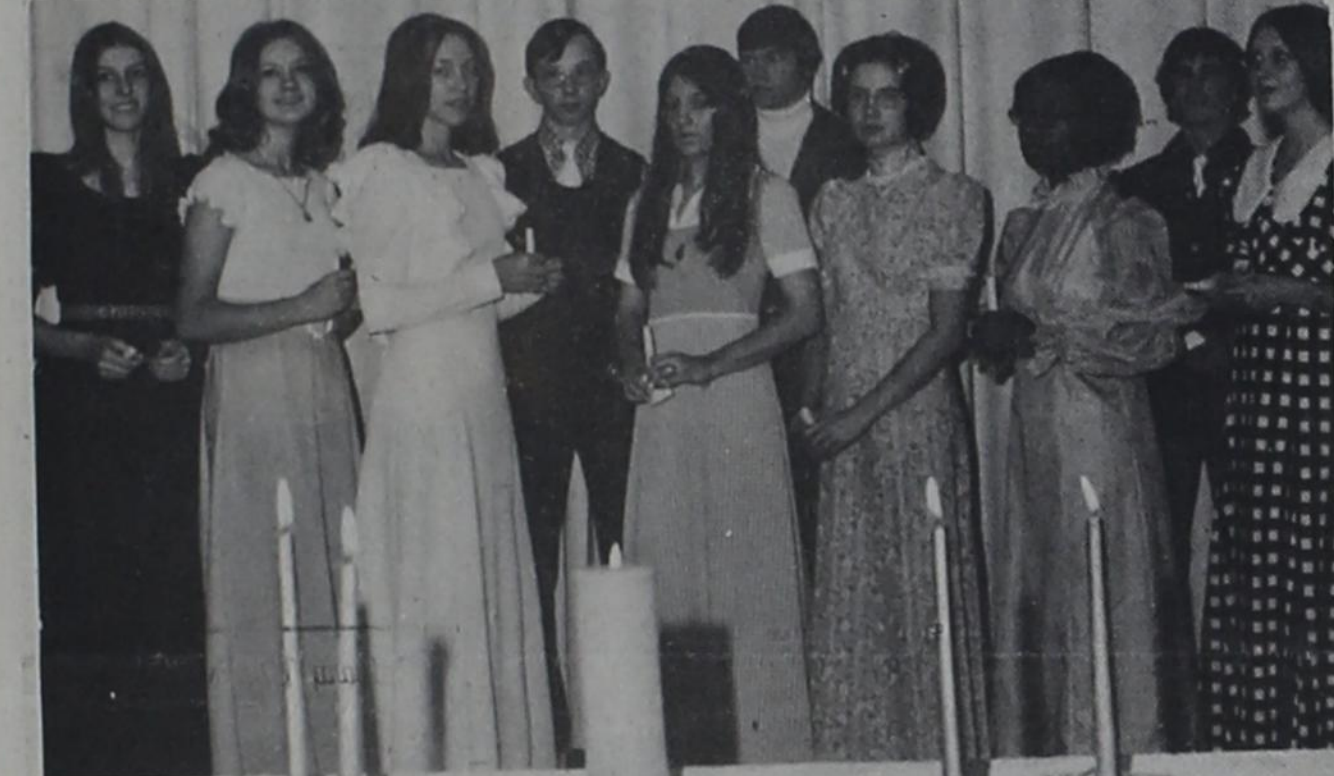

**HARVEY FLOYD ANNOUNCES CANDIDACY AS STATE REPRESENTATIVE**

As Democratic candidate for State Representative of the 74th District seeking your support, you are probably asking yourself, "Who is Harvey Floyd and how can he serve me?"

I am a businessman, a family man, and a 14-year resident of your district who is faced with the same type of situations you face and who understands your needs and concerns.

As you hear my proposal, I ask that you think of it as a joint proposal - yours and mine - and to think of this election in a personal way which will allow us to better conditions.

Primary among our problems is inflation, which affects us all. There is an existing need in Texas for additional revenue to meet the demands of inflated prices. I believe our proposal can sufficiently increase state revenue and at the same time avoid a state income tax and increased state property taxes on property, etc.

Crude oil produced in the United States is priced at approximately \$4.50 a barrel. Texas taxes crude oil on a basis of about \$3.71 per barrel. State tax on oil is 4.6 per cent at the well plus a 3-16c per barrel pipeline tax giving a total of under 20c per barrel state revenue from oil.

Texas collected approximately \$210 million from this source in the fiscal year ended August 31. Revision of the state's taxation program of crude oil would greatly increase this revenue source.

An even more urgent need is revision of the state program taxing natural gas. Texas collected \$125 million in taxes in the latest fiscal year on \$1.8 billion paid for natural gas produced in Texas. Much of this gas goes to other states where it serves as cheap fuel.

Natural gas in Texas is taxed at 7.4 per cent of its wellhead value. Many contracts were made, and are still in force, which sell gas at price ceilings imposed by the Federal Power Commission with a base tax on Texas-produced gas at 16c per thousand cubic feet. Current market value is 75c per thousand or more. A consumer buying gas at 16c per thousand pays state tax of 1.2c while the buyer of 75c gas pays 5.6c tax.

This present percentage system of taxation is unfair to the buyer paying high prices and favors those who pay the least for gas at the well. With action from the state and cooperation from the Federal Power Commission in changing from a percentage tax to a flat-rate of taxing natural gas, the taxing system would be equalized and would create an untapped source of state revenue.

The above proposal is but one I have to suggest. If elected, I pledge to serve you on the district level as your needs from the local level are communicated to me from you. By working together, I believe I can represent you well. I solicit your support and influence in the upcoming election.
