1. Support of grain sorghums at not less than 85 per cent of parity, as long as other basic commodities are under controls. (In effect now).

2. An investigation by the U.S. Justice Department of the basis breaking practice at the Lubbock Cotton Exchange; also that Lubbock be made a "cotton spot market" and that light spot and plus grade cotton be recognized in the

3. Permission for transfer of wheat and cotton acreage allotments not desired by individuals to someone desiring increased acreage (in the county). Also, that county committees be limited to 1 per cent cuts in allotments to avoid inequities favoring certain individuals.

4. FB election procedure relating to district directors.

# Young Wife Dies From Accidental **Gunshot Wound**

Residents of the rural community of Oklahoma Lane were stunned this week by the tragic news that Mrs. Lynn Carpenter, the former Bel Willard, died late Tuesday afternoon in a Carlsbad hospital following an accident with firearms in the Carpenter home Monday night.

Funeral services will be conducted this afternoon (Thursday) at 3 o'clock in the Oklahoma Lane Methodist church, Rev. S. M. Dunnam and Rev. U. S. Sherrill offici-

Burial will be in the Oklahoma Lane cemetery, under the direction of Wolf and Roberts funeral

Reports (unconfirmed by the family) were that the accident occured as the young couple, married only two months, were entertaining visiting friends, Jerry Ellison and Charles Verner, in their Carlsbad home.

The two visitors, residents of Bovina, were talking with the young husband in the living room. A .32 caliber pistol, supposedly unloaded, had been taken to Carlsbad by the Bovina boys for sport, and Carpenter had taken the gun in his hand.

It accidentally discharged just as Mrs. Carpenter had stepped to the door of the kitchen. She had been washing dishes.

The bullet struck the 17-year-old wife in the stomach and emerged from the left side of her back, missing her heart only slightly.

She was rushed to the hospital where a desperate effort was made to save her life. Several blood transfusions were administered. She died the next afternoon.

Survivors include her husband, Lynn, Carlsbad; her parents, Rev. and Mrs. Vernon Willard of Oklahoma Lane; two brothers, Vernon C. and James David, and one sister, Virginia, all of the home; her father-in-law and mother-in-law, Rev. and Mrs. Mayo Carpenter, Carlsbad, formerly residents of Oklahoma Lane, where he was pastor of the Baptist Church.

Bel Willard Carpenter was born Oct. 6, 1936. She attended Farwell High School and was active in school activity, both sports and academic work. She was Girls' State representative from Farwell last year.
