Anderson recalls Buffalo Bill connection

Before G.D. Anderson came to Farwell, he did some traveling by train back in 1916. Times were very hard and work couldn't be found. He finally started to work for the bank in Deming.

After being there for awhile, he moved to Friona in 1923. The president of the Friona Bank was Mr. Hinckel. Anderson was one of the cashiers.

While there in 1925, the bank was robbed. The robbers tied them up and took \$3,500. The vault wasn't open as it was on a time lock. The robbers didn't know that.

Anderson said, "It was told in the newspaper about the vault not being opened. About a week or so later the robbers came back and had them open the vault and took all the money." The robbers were later caught and sent to jail.

Anderson moved to Farwell in 1927 and went to work at the bank. The directors were from Hereford.

Anderson said, "The farmers would come in to get a loan of \$300 to start their crops. This would last them for the whole year. Sometime it was hard to pay even that amount back. These were hard times."

The securities put up were cattle, horses, crops and hogs. Today it's farm equipment, cattle, crops and hogs. "Not too many horses anymore," he said.

People would sign notes that amounted to \$80,000 and today it's \$33 million, he said.

President Roosevelt called for all the banks to close for a week in 1933. The banks couldn't open again unless they heard from the U.S. Banking Department. They sent out letters and the bank of Farwell was okayed to reopen. At this time strict banking laws were being passed.

Out of it came the FDIC, and laws for paying interest on checking accounts.

Anderson met and married Belva Pearl Thompson in 1916 in Moore House, Mo. After they married they didn't see each other again for four months. "These were hard times and sometimes you had to leave your love ones."

Belva Pearl was also active in the banking business along with her husband. She was one of the directors of the bank in Farwell until the

last 5 years.

Anderson told the story of how Mrs. Anderson's father acquired Buffalo Bill's rifle. The Buffalo Bill show came through Missouri and her father and Buffalo Bill tried their hand at shooting. Thompson was considered a crack shot. The story goes that Buffalo Bill was impressed and they exchanged rifles.

Mr. and Mrs. Anderson have five children; Bob of Farwell, Penny of Bovina, Therese Tapp of Lubbock and Marilyn Edwards of Farwell. Meredith was killed in a car accident in 1925 while the family was enroute to Friona from Deming.

Anderson was the president of the water works. They gave the water works to the city in the 1950's. Also he helped build the Farwell Clinic.

The clinic and the old bank were given to the City in 1963. The old bank is where the City Hall is now. The new bank was completed in 1964.

Anderson remembers the Courthouse being moved to Farwell in 1927. The Courthouse was at Parmer-ton, between Bovina and Friona.

The businesses in Farwell at that time were two lumber yards, a service station and two produce houses. The main street was dirt-filled and the Amarillo and Lubbock highways were all dirt. There were about 400 people in Farwell. Also, Farwell didn't have any street lights or sewer.

The Andersons have eight grandchildren and 10 great-grandchildren.

Anderson was born Jan. 17, 1892. His wife was born April 11, 1895.

Public meeting scheduled for retirement apartments

The Farwell Hospital District Board Tuesday night agreed to have a town meeting at 2:30 p.m. April 14 to discuss plans for retirement apartments in Farwell.

The District began working on the project last year. The sketches of the proposed apartments were unveiled at the Tuesday board meeting.

The apartments would be located just south of the Farwell Convalescent Center. There is room for a maximum of 16 apartments. Residents would have access to the services of the Convalescent Center along with outside services.

Each apartment would have two bedrooms, a living room, dining and kitchen areas, bathrooms and a shared garage. The plans have been designed by architect Eldon Smith of Clovis.

A master agreement would be made between the apartment residents and the Hospital District. The district would be responsible for items such as heating and water, while residents would take care of their personal items, like televisions and toasters.

The apartments will only be built if community support is shown. They would be constructed only after residents sign their contracts. A meeting with community residents last year indicated enough support for the plans to be made.

A board committee, consisting of Frances Kube, Gwen Hughes and LaMoin Williams, was appointed to help publicize the April 14 town meeting.

In other business, the board approved the request of Convalescent Center Administrator Ron Fehner to buy 50 chairs for the dining room.

Fehner reported on the van the center is buying for its residents.

It was noted that the Hospital District board election is scheduled April 6, the same day as the Farwell city and school board elections.

Terms are for two years. Terms are ending for Doyle Johnson, LaMoin Williams, Don Williams, Jim Mace and Gwen Hughes.

The board also had a long discussion on the federal government tightening its guidelines on Medicaid. This already has become a problem for some center residents, including one lady who has lived in Farwell her entire life.

The board agreed to take an aggressive attitude toward bureaucratic decisions terminating Medicaid support for patients here.

Smith files for election

Another candidate has filed for the Farwell city election.

Curtis Smith, owner of the office supply firm in Farwell bearing his name, has filed for an aldermanic position.

Already filing have been Mayor Walter Kaltwasser, seeking re-election; and for the five aldermanic posts -- Martin Kube and

incumbents Fred Chandler and Jerry Monk.

The deadline for signing up to run is March 6.

Farwell voters decided in a special election in January to change the form of government from two councilmen and a mayor to five aldermen and a mayor.

Kelley, Hillock file

Randy Kelley and Steve Hillock have filed as candidates for the Farwell School Board election April 6.

Incumbents Maxine Williams and Wilbert Kalbas also are expected to file, reported Supt. W.M. Roberts. However, incumbent Floyd Coates doesn't plan to seek re-election.

A committee had been appointed by the School Board to make sure enough people would run. The committee, chaired by Joe Schilling, included Doyle Johnson, Lee Hutchins, Pete Fulcher, Gwen Corn, Carl Kirkland and Linda Foster.

This committee met Tuesday night. Besides noting that Mrs. Williams and Kalbas would run again, it said that three of its own members -- Schilling, Kirkland and Johnson -- would run for School Board, too.

Thus, it appears that at least seven candidates will run for the three seats on the ballot. The deadline for filing is March 6.

Hospital Board signs drug store contract

The Farwell Hospital District signed a contract with a New Mexico drug store owner to put a drug store in Farwell Tuesday night.

The contract, approved unanimously by the District board, calls for a rent-free period and renovation work to be paid by the district. The building to be used is the former Gateway Restaurant across from Capitol Foods and Dairy Queen. This building was donated by public-spirited area residents late last year to the Hospital District.

The new drug store is expected to open in mid-April. The paperwork for certifying the pharmacist, who currently lives and works in Arizona, is expected to take that long. Certification by the state of Texas is needed for a pharmacist to practice here.

The new pharmacist will be Steve Breckenridge, 28, of Tucson. He is a native of the Tombstone, Ariz., area. He plans to be married in November.

Breckenridge will be in partnership with Dennis and Pat Mitchell of Hatch, N.M. The Mitchells signed the contract Tuesday with the Hospital District board. The Mitchells own the drug store in Hatch, plus another in Arizona. They will stay in Hatch, where they have lived for six years.

Before coming to Hatch, the Mitchells owned the drug store in Tombstone for 10 years. Breckenridge worked for them at that time.

The renovation of the former

restaurant is expected to be done in March. The legal ad for bids is running in today's Tribune.

The Mitchells were in Farwell this week to also move the fixtures they purchased at the former Dean Merritt Pharmacy in Clovis to Farwell.

The Mitchells became interested in placing a drug store in Farwell after visiting friends here in early December. But at that time, the Hospital District already was negotiating with a pharmacist from Missouri. Those negotiations fell through in January so Tom Nichols, Hospital District Board president, contacted the Mitchells.

Kevin Owen of Farwell 4-H placed 25th with his lightweight cross.

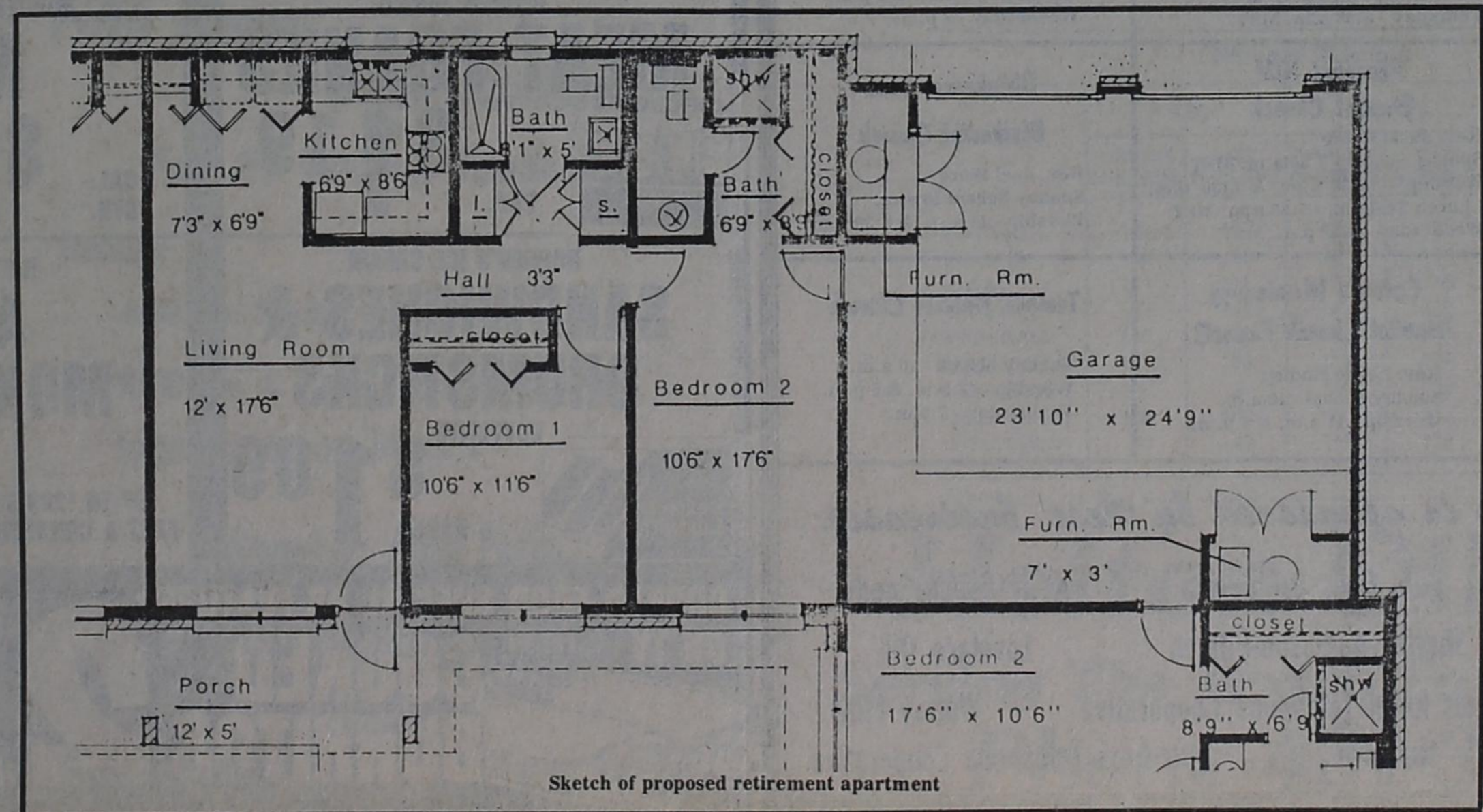
Susan Redwine of Lazbuddie 4-H placed 17th with her heavyweight

Sketch of proposed retirement apartment

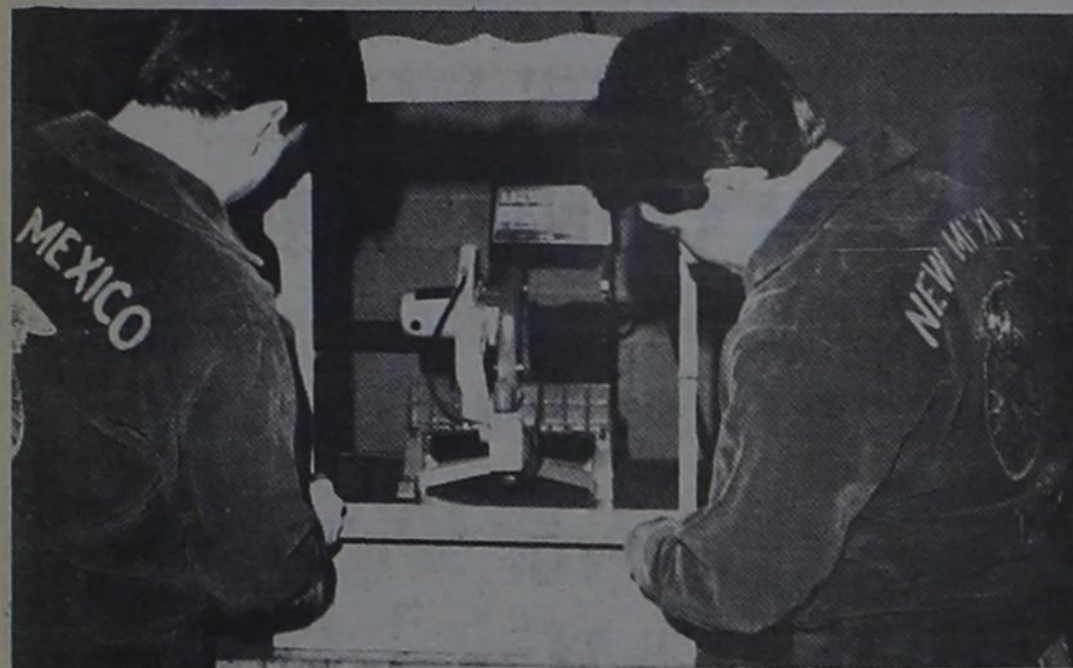
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The Texico vocational agriculture classes teach woodworking and electrical courses, as well as animal science and agriculture classes.

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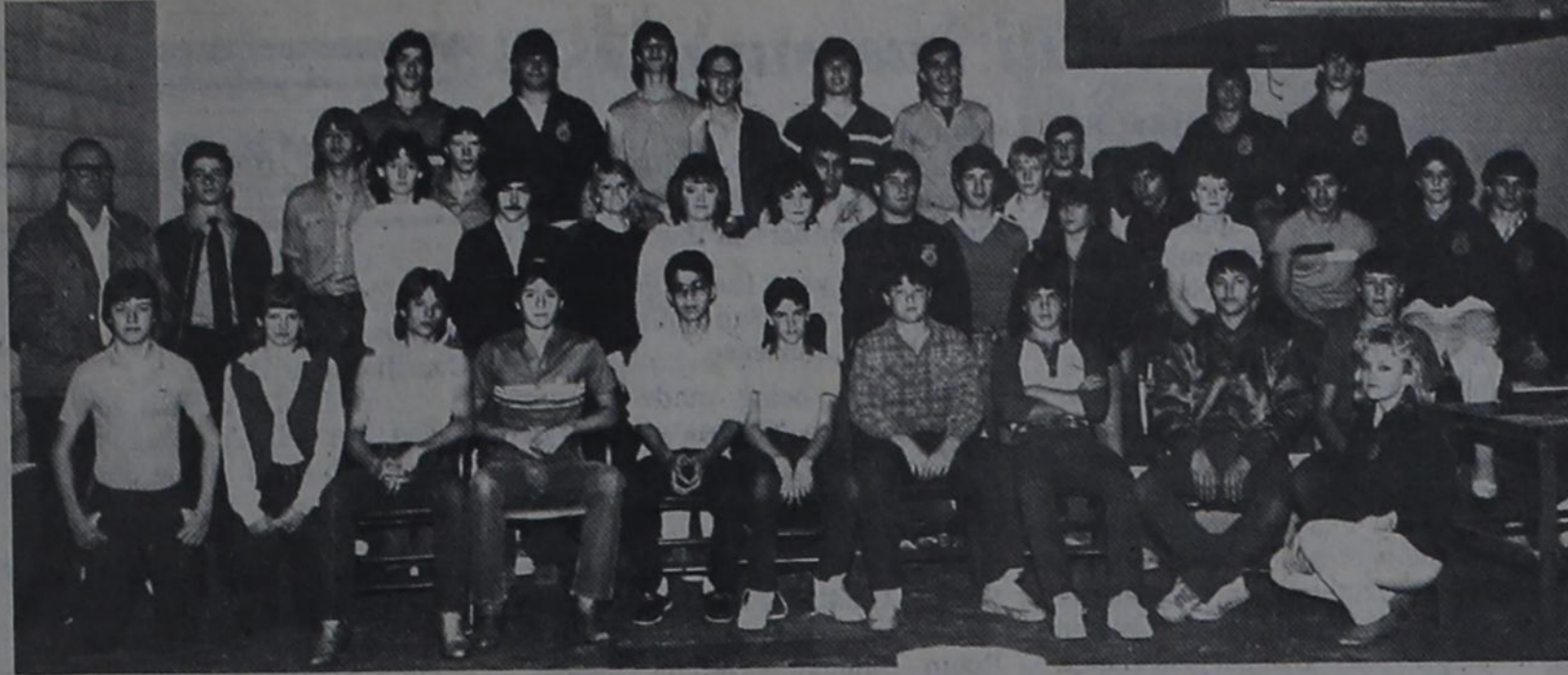

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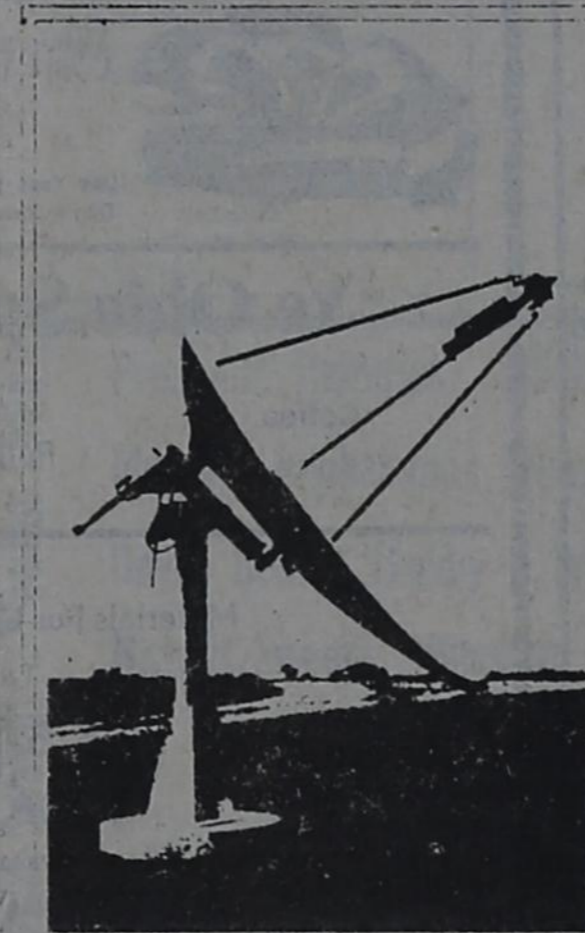

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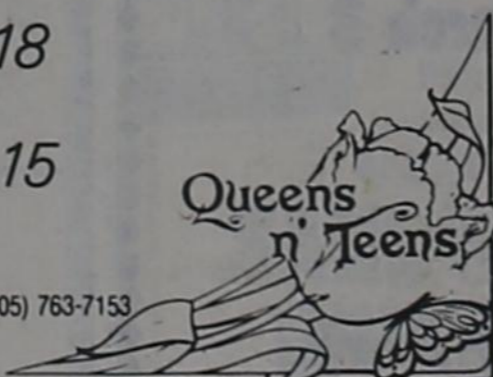
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Texico boys second

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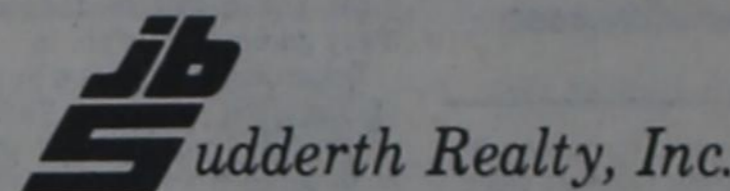

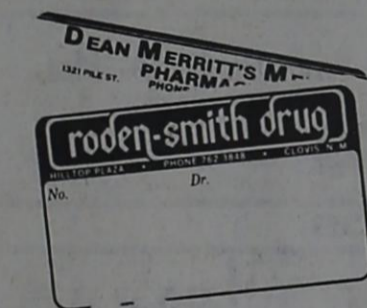
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Sheriff's Report
