

Double Taxation Still Unfair To Any Type Business

Dan Davis of the Plains Co-Op Oil Mill in Inbbock was a visitor in The Tribune's offices Saturday. He is a public relations man with that firm, and is out getting before the public what he considers to be the right side of the co-op taxation controversy.

Davis says, and rightly so, that there is a good deal of misunderstanding about the method in which cooperatives pay federal income tax. We still do feel, however, that a co-op business of a given size and type, when set alongside a corporation of the same given size and type, has an edge tax-wise over its corporate competition.

We believe in the principle of co-operatives, and we feel that they have a definite place in the American economy. The method of doing business that best serves the interest of the greatest number people, after all, should be the method that arrives. We say let competition decide which method is best: cooperatives or corporations.

And for these reasons we think that a co-op and a corporation ought to be treated exactly the same so far as federal income tax on profits is concerned.

We do not agree with the Public Information Committee of the Cotton Industries that claims that co-ops ought to be DOUBLY TAXED as are corporations at the present time.

We favor the doing away with double taxation for corporations. The method of taxing co-ops is perfectly logical. The inverse is true of corpora-

Best Get It Started Next Year, We Think

A lot more will be heard about the subject of integration next fall about the time public schools are ready to begin work, especially in Fexas, which is a "Jim Crow" state.

Regardless of what your individual opinion on the subject may happen to be, the fact must be recognized that segregation is unconstitutional, feature stories from all over the world. and sooner or later will be abolished entirely.

For that reason, we see no wisdom in the idea of postponing the problems of integration until some later date, hoping, perhaps, the situation will change.

In the older areas of the South and Southwest, especially in deep Eastern Texas, where the ratio of Negro-to-white is considerably greater than on the Plains, we understand that it may well nigh be impossible for such a great change to be made in the course of one year.

But, in this area where the racial problem is one of such minor proportions, we see absolutely no sense in dodging the issue. A law is a law, and it must be complied with. What's more, the problem

Modern Machinery in the Field

Not nearly the labor is required to harvest potatoes today as was in former years, thanks to modern machinery. This is a "combine-type" digger that digs the spuds and transfers them directly into a rolling truck in one operation. The workers on the digger are pulling vines, clods, and other foreign material from the machinery as it rumbles along.



From the Field to the Shed

Here is a potato truck unloading its produce into a water-filled trough which washes dirt from the spuds and feeds them into the shed. Water from a six-inch well is required for this operation.



Grab the Bad 'Uns

These Spanish-American women and girls have quick eyes and nimble hands. Their job is to cull and grade the potatoes that are coming in on a conveyer with special rollers that turn the spuds over and over. Lower grades are dropped on the conveyer belt in the center. No. 1's continue to flow through the machine into the sacks.
