





# Two Farwell Girls Tell of Girls' State

This article was prepared by Miss Glenna Davis, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. C. G. Davis, and Elaine Magness, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Joe W. Magness, who were Farwell delegates to Bluebonnet Girls' State held in Austin at Texas School for the Blind from June 6 to June 14.

We would like to express our deepest thanks to everyone who helped make it possible for us to attend the 11th session of Bluebonnet Girls' State where we acted as the 49th state of the union. We participated in a mock government as near like the government of the state of Texas as possible. We learned by doing instead of just watching.

On June 5, Mr. and Mrs. Gilbert Watkins took us to Amarillo where we boarded the train along with other delegates from Amarillo, Pampa, Borger, Friona, Dimmitt, Tulia, Hereford, Stratford, Phillips, Mobeetie, Memphis, Nazareth and Briscoe.

About 22 girls climbed aboard the train at Amarillo and we all started trying to learn all their names. We added travelers to our group at Silvertown, Childress, Vernon and Bowie. In Dallas we changed trains and about 27 more girls

joined us. We arrived at Austin at noon Monday and were taken immediately to the School for the Blind. From 1 to 6 p. m. we had registration which included assignment to quarters, political party and house or senate; depositing of our money in Girls' State Bank; unpacking of clothes; and talent interviews.

At 6 p. m. we had dinner, at 6:45 we lowered the flag and at 7 we met for general assembly. The assembly included introduction of staff members and counselors; and speeches by Miss Doris Anderson, Stonewall Jackson, and Miss Mary Mead, governor of Bluebonnet Girls' State in 1954. Last, but not least was a talk and piano entertainment provided by Mr. Allen, superintendent of the School for the Blind.

We returned to our quarters at 9 p. m. to name our cities, counties, pay poll tax of one cent, elect newspaper reporters and mail clerks. Each night at 10:45 was devotional time and lights were supposed to be out at 11 p. m., but we were never in bed before 12.

At 7 a. m. Tuesday we were awakened and had flag raising ceremonies and calisthenics. We studied city government in our respective cities and then Truman O'Quin gave a talk on city government at a general assembly program. As each speaker on the assembly program made his way to the stage, the audience sang a lively welcome song. As he left the stage, they sang a jazzy thank you song.

Before each speaker started his talk, we had each city to sound off and we also staged political rallies between the Nationalist and Federalist parties.

Glenna was a citizen of the city "2-Pooped-2" in the County of Pop. Elaine's city was "We've Had

It" in the County of Man. We were both members of the Nationalist party and the House of Representatives.

Tuesday afternoon we organized our party and elected officers. That night we organized the House of Representatives and the Senate and started hearing bills and resolutions.

Wednesday we studied county government and then Judge Mace Thurman spoke on the subject of county government after which we were allowed to ask questions. Other speakers on this day were Mrs. Andre Breaux and Miss Helen Ferguson.

The next day we studied about state government. Speakers were Vernon McGee and Mrs. Max Brooks. Filing for county and state offices ended this day and primary elections were held.

Guest speakers for Friday were Mr. Riedel and Col. Homer Garrison. In the afternoon the House and Senate convened. Our assembly that afternoon was held so that we could hear speeches made by the candidates for offices. After hearing campaign speeches, we voted for the officers.

Seven of the state's offices were won by members of the Federalist party. The governor was Wanda Sumrall from the city of "2-Pooped-2" who made a very nice governor. Inauguration ceremonies were held that night in Gregory Gymnasium on the campus of Texas University.

At the inauguration ball we saw the first boys we had seen since our arrival at Girls' State and there were 500 of them there! We surely had fun.

Saturday morning our governor made her acceptance address and gave announcements of appointed officers.

Guest speaker for Friday was Dr. Fred Schwartz of Sydney, Australia, who spoke on communism. From 2 until 6:30 p. m. we had

a baseball tournament. We had a wonderful recreation program and plenty of entertainment. Our assembly that night was a surprise. Miss Goff, director of Girls' State, had provided a movie for us to see. We enjoyed this very much except for two things—no popcorn and no boys!

Sunday we had protestant church services in the auditorium. During the afternoon we had films on medical technology nursing, and civil defense. Our speakers were Mrs. Ruth Drummond, Miss Mary Smith and Ralph Husted.

The next morning we were awakened at 6:30 a. m. and boarded buses at 8:15 for a tour of the city. We toured the Texas Memorial Museum, the governor's mansion, and the vault in the capitol building.

Then the Girls' State senators and representatives convened where the Texas House and Senate meets. We enjoyed hearing several speakers while we held the joint session. Speakers included Governor Allan Shivers, Attorney General John Ben Sheppard, Speaker of the House, Jim Tinney, and Judge Walker, Chief Justice of Supreme Court.

We had our picture taken and then loaded the buses for the ride back to the School for the Blind. That night we enjoyed entertainment provided by citizens of Girls' State.

Tuesday, the next to the last day of the meeting, we had the wonderful feeling that we would soon be going home and yet there were pangs of sorrow and regret for we knew we would never see all the girls together again.

Our assembly for that day was a review of the main things we had learned at Girls' State. We ate dinner in a rush for we were going swimming after the meal. We arrived at the swimming site—Barton Springs—at 1:45 and stayed there until about 5 p. m.

We didn't have assembly that night. It had been set aside as "talent night." Elaine's "We've Had It," won first place and Glenna's city, "2-Pooped-2" won second place in the talent contest. First place winners received 10 gallons of punch and a large cake which was decorated with bluebonnets in the corners and was inscribed with "11th Session of Bluebonnet Girls' State."

Wednesday morning we slept until 8 o'clock. After breakfast we received our Girls' State pins and certificates. At our final assembly the six outstanding citizens were revealed and they received special pins. Delegates to Girls' Nation were also appointed. It seems that everyone must have had head colds as everyone was sniffing and their eyes and noses were red!

We started the journey home at 1:30 p. m. Wednesday and arrived in Amarillo at 8 a. m. Thursday. Mr. and Mrs. Kirt Crume were there to meet us and bring us home.

The two songs that will always be imprinted in the hearts of the citizens of Girls' State are "The Girls' State Song" and "This is My Country."

Going to Girls' State is like a dream—a dream that we will always remember and always be thankful that we, Glenna and Elaine, had the opportunity to play a part in.

Again we say "thank you" to those making it possible for us to attend.

# Everything's O. K. in Potato Business Except the Market!

Farmers around the Lariat-West Camp area who planted potatoes this year aren't very excited this week about prospects for making any money on this venture.

"The market is pretty sour," reports Buck Gregory, who not only has a large acreage of his own, but has invested \$40,000 in a shed with new equipment and new harvesting machinery to boot.

His shed at Lariat has been in operation on several occasions during the past week, and Wed-

nesday night 12 cars of unsold spuds were sitting on the siding. This encouraged an ending of digging operations which had gone on in several fields.

The potatoes are excellent in quality this year, producers report, and the yields seem to be better than average, too. The only thing that the potato grower lacks at the present time is a market, apparently.

Gregory, who this year is making his first venture out of the field into the processing end of the

potato business, said that "everything has sure gone smoothly." He was speaking of the operation of his new combine-type diggers, the trucks, and the operation of the shed equipment. The bad market, of course, bottled up all this smooth production.

Early this year, pre-season reports of potato production did not appear favorable for High Plains growers, and Gregory said, "I didn't encourage anybody to plant this year."

Some time later, along about

planting time, a severe freeze in the South indicated that the crop in that area might be seriously reduced, and hopes for local growers rose. The momentary optimism has about passed, however.

Digging in the Lariat area began last Thursday, with the potatoes coming from the field of Pershing Busbice southeast of Farwell. Harvesting was shut down until Tuesday in hopes that market conditions would improve, but such has not been the case.

Gregory, Wednesday, indicated that digging would continue on a limited scale simply to hold the crews together. He was not very optimistic about a break in marketing, but indicated he would try to stretch out his harvest hoping conditions might improve.

Ed Wilson, salesman for the Gregory deal, pointed out that late harvest in California and Arizona have been the principal reasons for trouble in selling from the High Plains.

Production from both states has been running about two weeks later than usual, he said. The high tonnage from these Far Western areas dwarfs local production.

The first of this week, California producers were moving out about 1000 cars a day, and "somebody has got to eat those spuds."

Wilson pointed out that growers such as those in California who have a long growing season and get much heavier production than here in Texas can afford to harvest their produce, and have it shipped in to local markets cheaper than local growers can do it themselves.

The High Plains production is geared to squeeze in between the Far West crops and those of warm Idaho valleys and Southern states. Things haven't worked out that way in 1955, however, and there is overlapping

of harvests.

What potatoes have been sold from the Gregory deal at Lariat have been at from \$2.15 to \$2.25 per sack (number 1's). Number 2's have been going at \$1.75.

Cull potatoes, which are poor in appearance only and have the same food value as the better grades, have been going to cattle feeders at \$8 a ton.

The yield in the Lariat area has been from 150 to 160 sacks per acre this year.

Salesman Wilson said he has hopes of a slightly improved market in another week or ten days, but has no idea how things will actually work out. He thinks that Arizona production is about ended and that California is tapering off.

Wilson said that a fair price would be from \$2.50 to \$2.75 a sack. The spuds that have been sold about 50 cents less than that are about the "break even" point for the producers, he said.

The potatoes that have been harvested and processed at Lariat can be kept in box cars on the siding for only a few days, even after being pre-cooled.

After that, they must be started on their way to markets, which at this time of year are in the East, even though they sometimes are unsold.

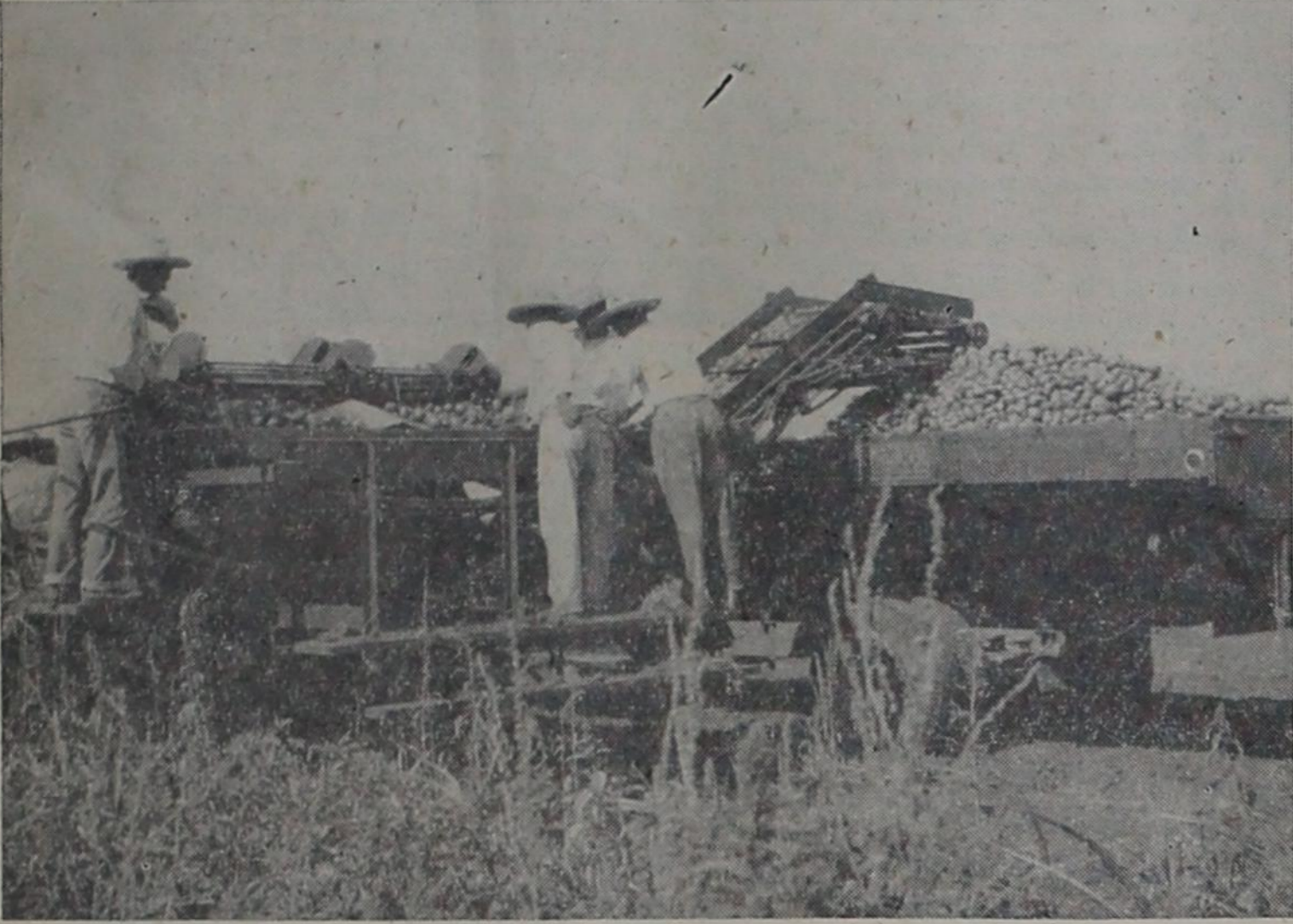
"We may have to send along some more potatoes to pay the freight," commented Gregory,

showing he could still joke about a rather serious situation.

High Plains producers have the freight edge over their competition from the West on these Eastern markets, but Western growers

more than make up for the difference with their tremendous volume.

The Gregory shed is interesting to watch in operation. It is located (Continued on Last Page)



### Modern Machinery in the Field

Not nearly the labor is required to harvest potatoes today as was in former years, thanks to modern machinery. This is a "combine-type" digger that digs the spuds and transfers them directly into a rolling truck in one operation. The workers on the digger are pulling vines, clods, and other foreign material from the machinery as it rumbles along.



### From the Field to the Shed

Here is a potato truck unloading its produce into a water-filled trough which washes dirt from the spuds and feeds them into the shed. Water from a six-inch well is required for this operation.



### Grab the Bad 'Uns

These Spanish-American women and girls have quick eyes and nimble hands. Their job is to cull and grade the potatoes that are coming in on a conveyor with special rollers that turn the spuds over and over. Lower grades are dropped on the conveyor belt in the center. No. 1's continue to flow through the machine into the sacks.

## Friona Harvest Waits For Better Markets

"The market is so sick, we're going to wait," Herman Neff, Friona potato producer and owner of the Neff Potato Shed there, told The Tribune Wednesday night.

How long he might have to wait before digging could begin was uncertain to Neff, but he believes that Idaho production will start July 20 and get rolling about five days later, and he doesn't see any immediate clearing of selling conditions.

Most potatoes in the Friona-Hereford area are still a little green, Neff reports, and plans of

producers in that area are to "keep 'em wet, and they'll keep."

The crop looks good around Friona, according to Neff, who believes that if growers will properly care for the spuds in their field that they will continue to gain tonnage while waiting for a better market.

The Neff potato shed, which has operated in Friona for the past two years, has encouraged considerable production in the northeastern part of the county, even though markets have been poor during the past two years.

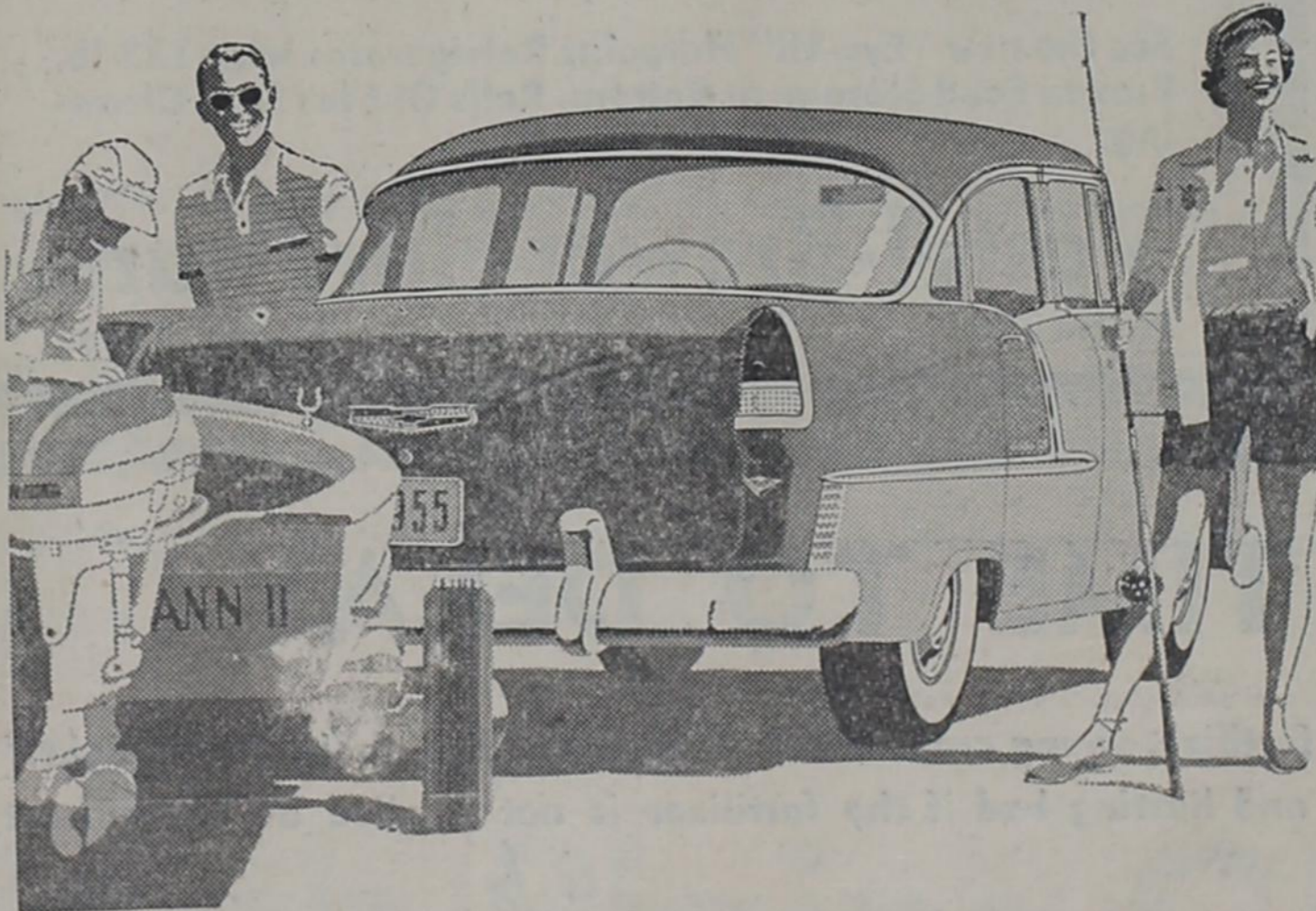


### SACK 'EM UP

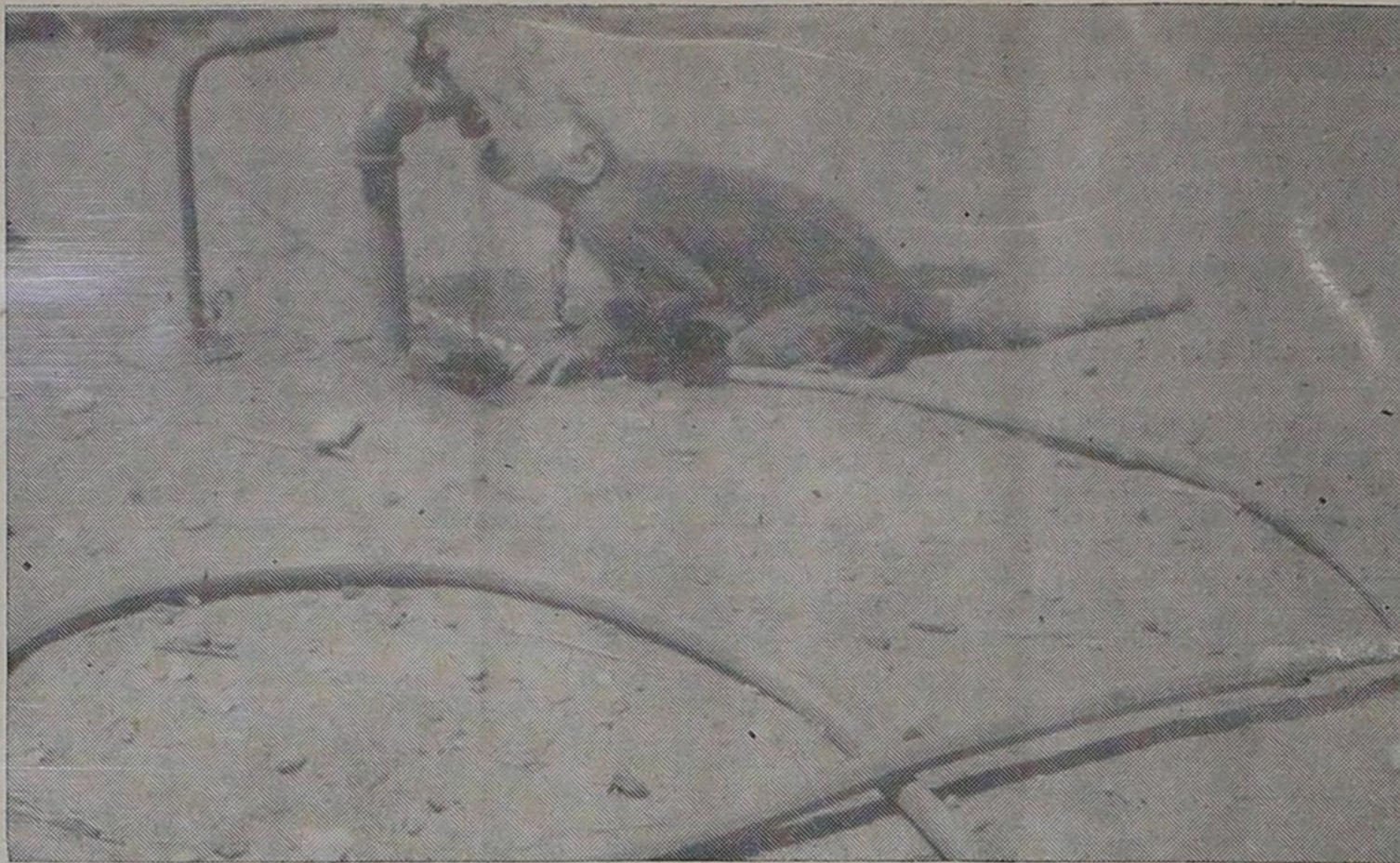
