In preparing for the Border Town Days activities, many people wore different hats and attended to several different jobs. This is always the case in a small community where a few people bear the brunt of the community activity.

So it is with our City Councilmen. They have other activities to attend to as well as their town council jobs, plus earning their daily living. Yet by being on the City Council their presence at the monthly meeting is quite important to the community.

We have mentioned before the fairly frequent problem of having a quorum present to transact city business. This week, only the mayor was present so the city business had to be postponed to a later date. This, we feel, is not a good situation for a growing community with necessary business to look after.

A partial solution to this problem would be to expand the city government from the present three-member system to at least five or seven members. This would increase the possibility of having enough members present at each meeting to always conduct the city's business when it should be conducted.

Also, as the city grows, it will be necessary to accommodate more and diverse viewpoints on the governing body. The city governing body should always evenly represent the interests of all the different areas of the city and the people therein. Additional members would help create a feeling of "oneness" within the community and insure more united action on the important problems of civic growth which are bound to arise as time and progress march on.

All of the present members of the City Council have expressed themselves, in some form, as favoring an expansion of their numbers beyond the present three. So we are not running counter to current thinking, but only trying to give the idea publicity in order to gather widespread local support when the time comes to implement a specific plan to be presented to the townsfolk.

Rainfall in the area since last Thursday has fallen in varied amounts from a trace to almost three inches.

Parmer County Agent Mack Heald reported one-half to three inches but said the rain was "pretty spotted throughout the county." Asa Smith at Lariat measured .2 inch of rain on July 25 and said the area received a "little sprinkle Monday, but it was not measurable."

Fred Chandler at Sherley-Anderson-Pitman in Farwell said he measured .2 inch of rain Monday afternoon in the

rain gauge and measured .7 July 25. Mrs. Elmer Langford, who lives north of Texico, said they had received .25 July 25 and the same amount Monday afternoon.

B.A. Rogers of Texico stated almost one inch fell the evening of July 25, the exact measurement being .9 "Monday we didn't get enough rain to record in the gauge," he commented, "just sprinkles." Mrs. Ted Magness, south of Farwell, said they measured one-half inch of rain Monday afternoon.

Texico - - Commission Has Meeting

Texico City Commissioners met for their regular meeting Tuesday, July 23 at 6:30 p.m. at City Hall.

Odis Huggins of Southwest Public Service Company appeared before Commissioners concerning the passage of Ordinance number 189, a 25-year franchise contract between the City of Texico and Southwest Public Service Company. Commissioners passed the ordinance.

A hearing on Ordinance number 185 will be held at the next City Commission meeting on Aug. 13 at 6:30 p.m. at City Hall. This ordinance restricts mobile homes to certain designated areas. Persons who want to protest or make their voices heard regarding this ordinance are urged to attend this public meeting.

Commissioners discussed requesting a resolution from the Clovis City Commission regarding extra territorial zoning. Clovis has the authority to zone a five mile radius from the city limits, which would place the city's zoning authority to Texico. The resolution desired would specify that Clovis City Commissioners won't object to Texico zoning three miles from its city limits.

In other action during the meeting, Commissioners approved bills for payment.

School Board Raises Valuation

The Lazbuddie School Board has raised the property valuation for school purposes 10 per cent and lowered the tax rate for debt from 45 cents per hundred to 40 cents.

This action was taken due to the rising costs of school operations and because the tax rate for maintenance purposes has been at the \$1.50 per hundred maximum.

The Board approved the addition of Industrial Arts to the curriculum for the 1974-75 school year and employed Vester Joiner as Industrial Arts teacher. He will also be an assistant coach.

Train-Truck Accident Results In Damages

A Santa Fe Railway Company train hit a TG&Y tractor-trailer truck at the Texico-Farwell train crossing at 12:58 p.m. MDT Wednesday, July 24, causing the truck to spin around and turn over severing the signal warning lights from the base.

The train hit the truck four feet from the rear of the trailer, according to Texico Marshal Mickey Fenn, investigating officer. The driver of the truck, Ollie Mabbrey Shackelford, who was coming from Lubbock, stated he did not see the flashing lights nor hear the warning bell. He was not injured.

The truck was loaded with hardware items for TG&Y and some of the goods suffered damage. Estimated damage to the cab and trailer was approximately \$8,000, with the trailer being a total loss. Other damage included \$110 to the train, as well as the signal lights.

Fenn stated it took three wreckers two and one-half hours to clear the wreckage from the highway, as the truck had to be upright before it could be moved. Fenn issued a citation to the driver of the TG&Y truck for failure to yield the right of way.

Conductor of the train was J.D. Hart and the engineer was C.L. Cooper. Neither were injured. Assisting Fenn with the investigation was Officer Taylor of the New Mexico State Police. Jim Bishop of the Texas Department of Public Safety assisted in directing traffic around the accident scene.

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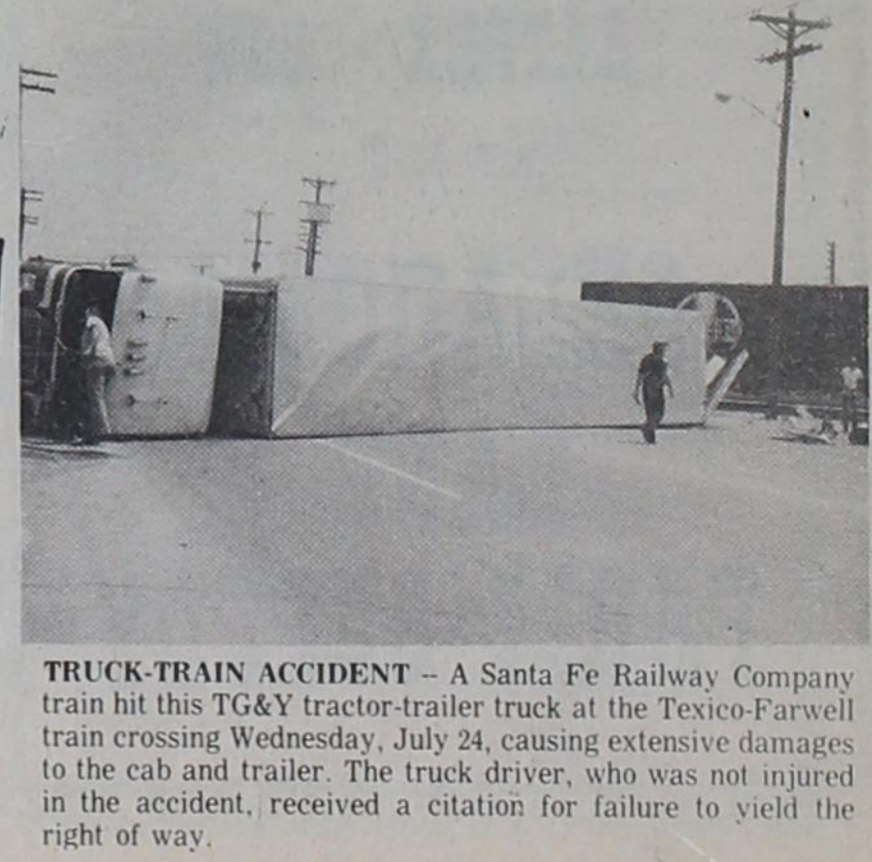

ORDINANCE. 189

AN ORDINANCE GRANTING TO SOUTHWESTERN PUBLIC SERVICE COMPANY, ITS SUCCESSORS AND ASSIGNS, A FRANCHISE TO CONSTRUCT, MAINTAIN, EQUIP AND OPERATE IN THE CITY OF TEXICO, NEW MEXICO, SYSTEMS TO USE, STORE, SELL, DISTRIBUTE AND SUPPLY ELECTRIC ENERGY FOR LIGHT, HEAT AND POWER AND OTHER PURPOSES TO SAID CITY, ITS INHABITANTS AND OTHERS, AND TO USE THE STREETS, AVENUES, ALLEYS, HIGHWAYS, SIDEWALKS, BRIDGES AND OTHER PUBLIC GROUNDS OF SAID CITY FOR SAID PURPOSES FOR A TERM OF

TWENTY FIVE (25) YEARS, LEVYING A STREET RENTAL, AND PRESCRIBING OTHER TERMS AND CONDITIONS THEREFOR. BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TEXICO, NEW MEXICO.

ARTICLE I

There is hereby granted to Southwestern Public Service Company, a corporation incorporated under the laws of the State of New Mexico, and to its successors and assigns, a franchise authorizing it to construct, equip, maintain and operate in the City of Texico, New Mexico, systems to use, store, sell, distribute and otherwise serve, supply and furnish said City and its inhabitants and others with electric energy for light, heat and power and other purposes and to use the streets, alleys, highways, bridges and other public grounds of said City, both above and below the surface of same, upon their terms and conditions of this ordinance.

ARTICLE II

The franchise rights and powers herein granted shall exist and be in force from and after the passage of this ordinance for a term of Twenty Five (25) years.

ARTICLE III

Southwestern Public Service

Company is hereby authorized, licensed and empowered to do any and all things necessary and proper to be done and performed in executing the powers and utilizing the privileges herein mentioned and granted by this franchise, provided that all work done in said streets, alleys, highways or other grounds of said City by said Company shall be done with the utmost diligence and least inconvenience to the public or individuals, that said Company shall, within a reasonable time, restore streets, alleys and public grounds excavated by it to their original condition as nearly as possible, and that said work shall be done subject to the approval of the City. The Company shall assume all liability or risk of damage to persons or property which may arise from the construction or operation of any or all of said system and shall save the City of Texico, New Mexico, its officers and agents, harmless from any and all liability that may arise or be incurred from the erection, construction or operation of the same.

ARTICLE IV

Southwestern Public Service Company, its successors and assigns, for and in consideration of the granting of this franchise and as rental for the occupation and use of the streets, alleys, highways, bridges and other public grounds of the City of Texico, shall pay the aggregate sum of 2% of the gross receipts, as hereinafter defined, of the Company, for electric energy used within the city limits of the City of Texico. "The 'gross receipts' upon which such rentals and charges are based is defined and shall be computed and determined as follows: From the total gross receipts from the sale of such electrical energy for lights, heat and power, within said city limits, for the particular quarter of year involved, there shall be deducted the receipts from sale to the Federal Government, Federal Government departments and agencies, the State of New Mexico, all departments and agencies of said state, the County of Curry, the City of Texico, the Texico Independent School District, and other public government authorities and sales to industries upon such utilities published Industrial Rates, and the balance paid after said deductions shall constitute the gross receipts upon which such rentals and charges shall be paid."

Such payments shall be payable for each quarter period of each year, said periods to begin on the first days of the Months of January, April, July and October of each year. The payments covering each prior period shall be made within a reasonable time immediately after each period. Such payments shall be in lieu of any and all other taxes or other exactions (except general ad valorem property taxes and special assessments for local improvements) upon the business, revenue or property of the Company or any part thereof in said City during the term of this franchise, and they shall continue only so long as said Company is not prohibited from making them by and lawful authority having jurisdiction in the premises and so long as the City does not charge, levy, or collect or attempt to charge, levy or collect other franchise, license, privilege, occupation, excise or revenue taxes or other exactions (except general ad valorem property taxes and special assessments for local improvement).

For the purpose of determining the amount of the gross receipts of the Company, as hereinabove defined, the books of the Company, shall, at all times, be subject to the inspection of the City of Texico.

ARTICLE V

Southwestern Public Service Company shall, within thirty days from the passage of this ordinance, file with the City Secretary of the City of Texico, New Mexico, its written acceptance of this ordinance upon the filing of such acceptance this ordinance shall constitute all of the terms of the franchise herein granted by the City of Texico, New Mexico, to Southwestern Public Service Company.

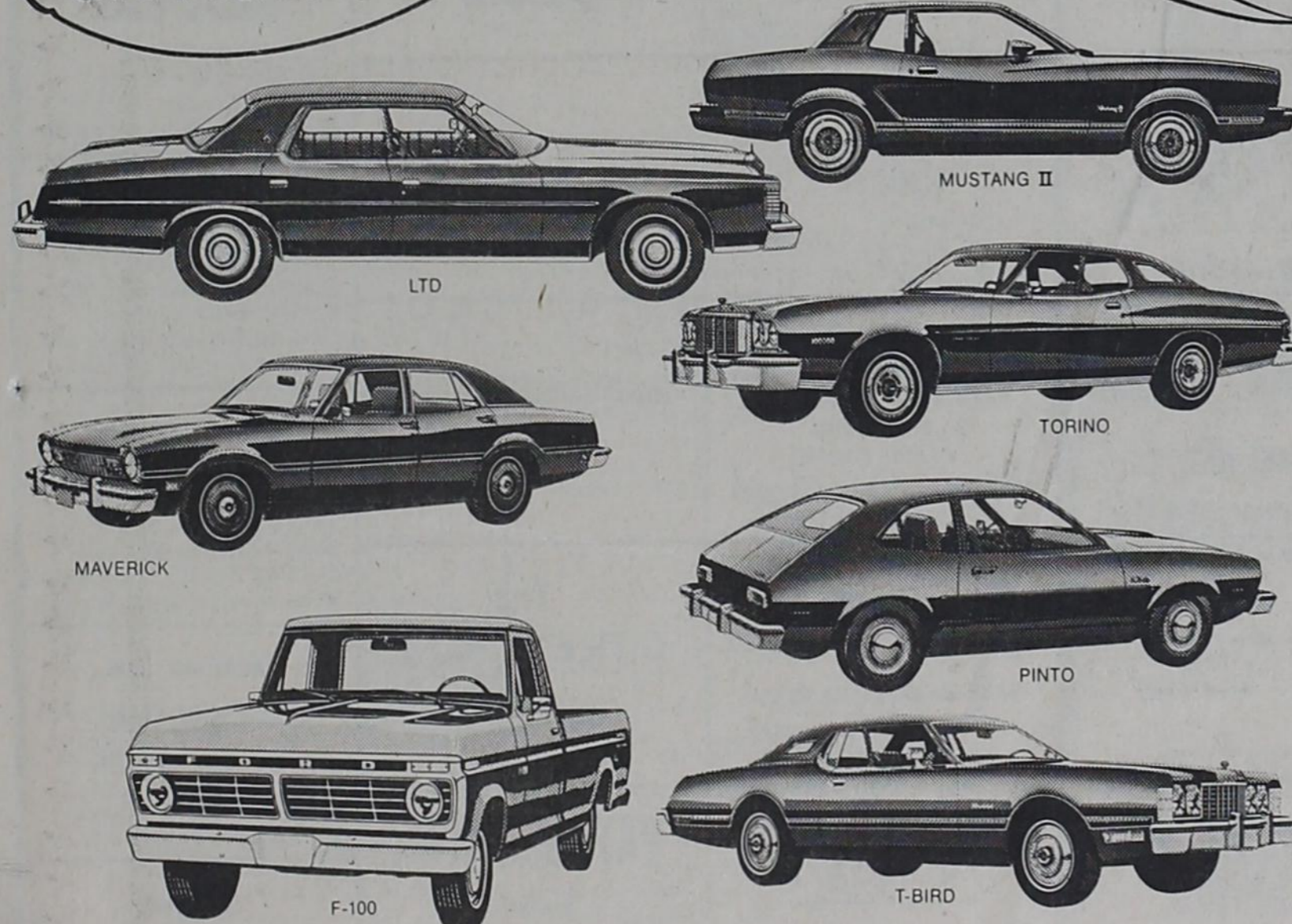

A true spiritual revival takes place in the blood-bought Church of God not in the wicked world about it. That which is dead cannot be revived but that which has life can and should be. We know of no Scripture that should deter us from praying for a true spiritual awakening among God's people. Indeed we must be careful lest we cease praying and toiling for a revival on the grounds that "times are getting worse and worse and there's not going to be a revival." It seems to us that one of the surest ways to grow spiritually indifferent ourselves is to conclude that God will not grant us a spiritual awakening no matter what we do. 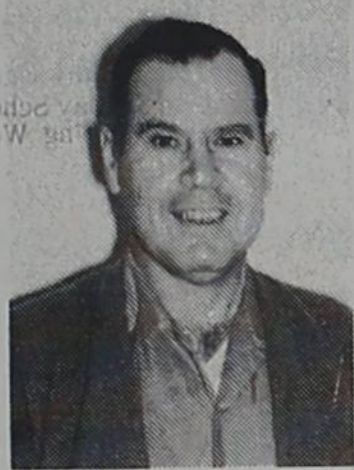
Mrs. Davis died in 1963 and is buried in Whitharral. Mr. Davis made his home with his son Jamie since the death of his wife.
