

# **Consolidation Wins In Special Vote**

Topping Of Main St. Started On Tuesday

After repeated delays, due to weather conditions, Avenue A in Farwell. generally referred to as main street, began receiving the final black-topping Tuesday morning with indications that the work would be completed in a short time.

Under the supervision of Special Foreman J. B. Sparks, a crew of the men with a fleet of road machinery, has been getting the seven blocks along main 'street in readiness for the surfacing, which will give the street a curb-to-curb finished job when completed.

Preliminary work was also begun this week on Third Street, which, when completed, will give this thoroughfare an 18-ft. slab of paving for a distance of six blocks, connecting at main street and running south.

The Texas Highway, Department is bearing the expense of the main street job, after curbing and gutter-Third Street is to be borne by property owners. All of the work on Third Street is to be born by property owners along the route and other interested citizens.



AUSTIN-Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, has issued a warning to parents that this is the season for an increase in dysentery, diarrhea and "summer complaint".

"The chief cause of these intestinal diseases are contaminated milk; water or food; allowing the child to get overheated or exhausted; excessive sugar in the babies formula; and improper amount of food," Dr. Cox said. "All foods should be fresh and clean, (and left-overs should be properly refrigerated to prevent spoilage."

Dr. Cox urged extreme care in the preparation of a feeding formulla for infants. He said it should be prescribed by a physician, and that cleanliness and refrigeration were absolute essentials. Babies should be fed at regular intervals and on upset if fed irregularly or whenever things in a hit-or-miss fashion. they are fretful or restless.

The State Health Officer declared that dysentery is transmitted by flies and said every home should be wellscreened and free of flies.

"If dysentery or diarrhea develop, consult your physician at once," Dr. Cox advised. "This so-called 'summer complaint' can be a very serious menace to your baby's health, if not an actual threat to his life."

Local STORY" \* \* The boy wonder of Help keep Texico-Farwell clean. veterans in all personal property sales and below government agencies in disposal of real property. In recent months this priority group has been active in securing camp buildngs and other real property from War Assets Administration for resale. But congress' new RFC act, passed May 25, 1948, repeals this agency's authority to function in the surplus property activities. However, War Assets Administration will continue to encourage the development of small business and will maintain the present priority accorded to dealers and businessmen who are World War II veterans.

South Texas will be the scene of considerable disposal activity during the latter part of June. Two sites at Orange. Texas, will be cleared of about \$75,000 worth of surplus June 21 to June 23. Mattresses, laundry equipment, hose tubing, motors and pipe located at the Orange Naval Air Station and the Orange FPHA project will go under the high bid hammer. Veterans, dealers and the public are invited to attend the informal bidding at the naval station beginning at 10 a.m. June 23. Another disposal on the heels of this will occur at Hitchcock, Texas, June 24 and 25. Two sites, also housing \$75,000 worth of surplus, galley equipment, hospital supplies, warehouse equipment and miscellany, are the Hitchcock Naval Air Station and Camp Wallace. Bids will be taken at the navy station June 25 at 1 p. m.

Two industrial plants were moved into the ranks of private industry by disposal action this week. The Sunray Carbon Black plant, which has been operated under lease since 1944 by the Continental Carbon Company of Amarillo, was sold to that company for \$1,100,000. The governmentowned toluene plant of Ponc City went to the Continental Oil Company of that Oklahoma City for \$175,000. This company plans to convert the facility to oil refining. First two months of the WAA's new donation program witnessed a total of \$137,669.98 worth of government surplus turned over to Texan and other state educational institutions without cost. Most unique donation was 52 South American flags given to the City of New Orleans. Other items included obsolete aircraft and radio parts, telepnone switchboards and about 13,000 volumes of textbooks, fiction and nonfifction books, many of which went to veteran hospitals and schools. The program is being administered by the priority claimant division of the Grand Prairie regional office.
