### **Canvassing Started** For Contributions **To CROP Shipment**


A small crowd failed to dampen the enthusiasm of workers handling the Parmer County Christian Rural Overseas Program, Monday night, when a county-wide meeting was held at the school auditorium in Friona.

Raymond Euler, who is working with the group reported on Tuesday that canvassing agents began work that day toward securing commitments which will total one carload of grain from Parmer County, to be shipped over-seas to stricken areas.

Thursday, November 15th, has been set as the date for loading and shipping Parmer County's contribution, with the car to be loaded from the Santa Fe Elevator in Friona. Previously, sponsors of the program had contacted elevator men in the county, all of whom agreed to receive contributions from individuals. A single loading will be made at the Friona elevator, with other receipts being reimbursed, Euler explained.

A dedication service, the program for which will be announced later. is planned to be held at the tracks as the car is loaded and sent on its way. Parmer County's contribution will go to Houston, from where a shipload of grain from over Texas is due to be sent overseas around December 1st, sponsors here have been advised.

Wilbur Charles, serving as chairman of the county drive, urged today that all residents respond to solications of the canvassers, who hope to wind up their work in short order.
