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**Happy Proves Rating By Manhandling Steers, 51-0**

Proof that the rating experts know what they're talking about was offered by the Happy Cowboys here the past weekend, when the Cowhands, rated the top 1-B team in the district, lassoed the Farwell Steers, 51-0.

Leaping in the saddle for an early lead, the Cowboys held a 20-0 margin at the end of the first quarter; had run it on up to 32-0 by half-

time; went for another thirteen points in the third quarter; and wound up the final canto by one more tally.

Greenfield, Selvidge and Sims were the ball carriers for the visitors, with each crossing into the promised land during the game, while Selvidge also did the booting on conversion points.

There was just too much of Happy for the local squad, who tried desperately but were unable to hold a fast-moving attack staged by the visitors. The win leaves Happy at the top of the district race, with no conference losses thus far.

**First Quarter**

The game opened with Pipkin booting to Happy. B. Ingram returned to the 32, with an offside penalty against the Steers refused. Selvidge gained seven on two tries; Sims added 15; Selvidge hit for four, being downed by Pipkin; Sims went for 12 as he was nailed by Jordan. Greenfield was held for no gain but got 11 on his second try; Selvidge added three; Sims made 10, and scored on an eight-yard run. Selvidge booted the conversion and Happy led, 7-0.

Farwell received, with Coburn returning to the 31. A fumble was recovered for a minus four; Jordan gained three, Barber got a like number, and Cassady booted to the 20, the ball being returned to the 42.

An aerial was incomplete; Selvidge barreled downfield to the 15, then added five and finally scored.

His placement kick was blocked. Score, 13-0.

Happy kicked to Barber who came back to the 35. Raney lost one on a spinner; Jordan gained three; Raney added two, and again Cassady had to boot the Steers out. Selvidge returned to his own 45; then broke into the clear for a 55-yard run and counter, plus his extra-point kick to put the score at 20-0.

**Second Quarter**

Selvidge kicked to Coburn, whose return carried to his own 25; Norton gained five and Raney went for 10 and a first down. Barber gained two on a reverse, Jordan added two, Norton carried for five and then tried again for another first. Jordan got the ball for a 6-yard gain; Raney was dumped to lose one, Barber was nailed for a loss of four, and again Cassady kicked to the Happy 35.

Greenfield reached out for five, Sims was long gone to the 5-yard marker then scored from that point, with the kick no good.

Barber took the kickoff and came back to the 21; Raney gained three, Barber lost five; Coburn got through for six; and Cassady kicked to the 50.

Selvidge spanned 14 yards for a first; and a 36-yard run culminated in a touchdown by Greenfield. Again, the conversion try was awry, and Happy led, 32-0.

Barber returns the kick to his own 12; Raney got two; Norton added five; and Raney broke out to the 35 for a first. Jordan added another three, Norton fumbled but recovered to lose two; Jordan gained four, and the ball went over to Happy on downs.

Brewer was through for 15, then one more, and Sims went for 28 as the half ended.

**Third Quarter**

Selvidge's boot went into the end zone and was returned to the 20, where the Steers took over, sending Jordan for 9, then Raney plunged to the 31 for a first. Jordan was set back for six, Barber got nothing, Coburn made six but was injured on the play. Cassady's kick was blocked, Happy grabbed the ball and scored again, with Selvidge adding the conversion.

Norton returned the kickoff to the 25, Dollar was lost on injuries; Raney was nabbed to lose three; and then recovered a fumble to gain one yard. On his third try, Raney got 15 for a first down; a pitchout lost eight; Jordan got a 5-yard loss on another try, Raney got nowhere, and a bad pass fouled up an attempt by Cassady to kick.

Happy drew a 15-yard fine. Oller gained five, Brewer got nothing as Pipkin fouled up the play, a pass try was incomplete, and on the fourth try the ground drive failed to click, with the Steers taking over.

Raney made nothing, but Norton and Raney added up eight, and Cassady kicked out to the 46-yard line.

Greenfield made two successive first downs, Oller added another, Brewer toted for more gain, and Oller scored for Happy. Greenfield's kick was no good.

**Fourth Quarter**

Greenfield's boot to Norton was returned to the 27; a pass try to Norton failed to come off; Cassady got only two in two tries; and on fourth down a bad pass caught the Steers, with Happy taking over.

Greenfield took the ball and on two tries had scored, but his kick failed to come off, and Happy was ahead, 51-0.

Norton carried back upfield to the Steer 39; Barber was clipped for a loss of eight; Happy was penalized five; another pass was incomplete; and Cassady kicked to the Happy 35.

Happy took to the air, but Gully intercepted a pass and returned to the 35, from here Jordan gained two, Raney lost one; Norton went for four, then Norton plunged to the 18-yard marker and a first. Cassady and Norton put two tries together for that amount of yardage, but the drive halted when Sims intercepted a pass on his own 12.

A fine program of good music furnished by the girls chorus of the elementary and high school was presented.

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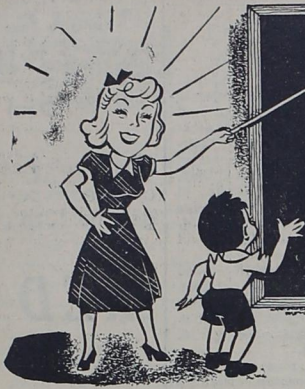
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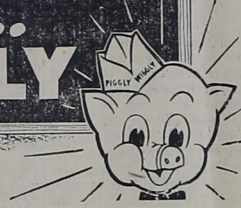

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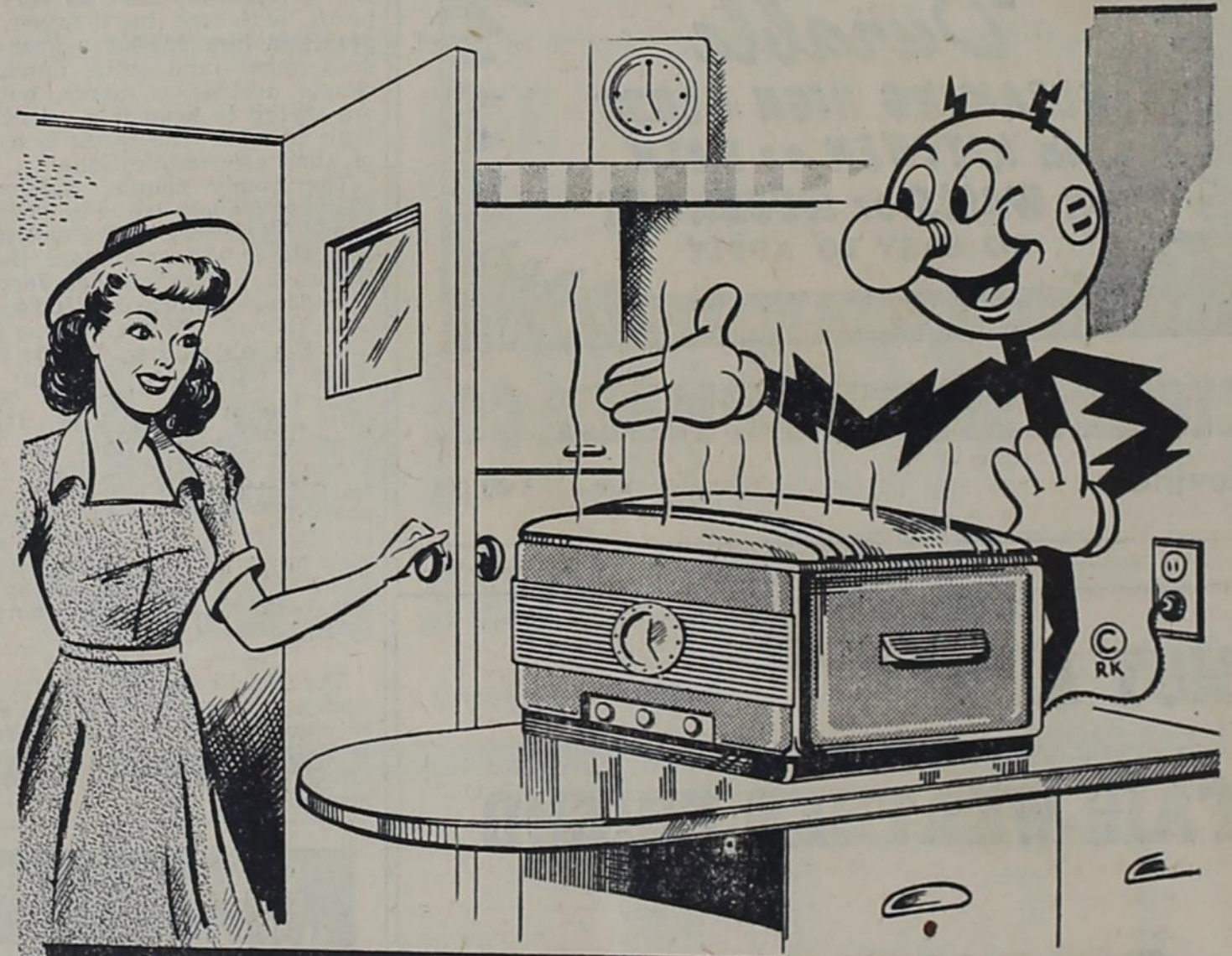

## Capacity Crowd Sees Whitefaces Take Chiefs, Friday

Tight defensive play throughout the game held the scoring down to a total of only 15 points, the past Friday night, when the Hereford Whitefaces tangled with the Friona Chieftains on the local field and won the match, 9-6.

A blocked conversion try and a miscue which resulted in a safety was the margin of difference as the Chiefs took their second loss of the season before a capacity crowd at the local stadium. Fans from Hereford were on hand in sufficient numbers to almost balance the noise offered by the Friona supporters, which was deafening at times.

Neither team could get going in the first quarter, although immediately after the kickoff Reed and Robbins cooperated on carrying for Friona to reach the midfield stripe, where stabs at the line got exactly nothing and the Chiefs had to kick out with the Whitefaces in possession on their own 35.

Dement got a first down, and Morton went on to the Chieftain 30 where he was banged to the ground by Fangman. With Dement and Kelly sharing honors, the visitors got on down to the 18, within scoring distance, but a mixup in the backfield sent two Hereford men together, the ball went free, and Friona recovered.

Friona was unable to go places and kicked to midfield, then in turn held the Whitefaces and Hereford booted into the end zone, with the ball being returned to the 20. Friona was nullified, and kicked again to midfield and the visitors had a first on the local's 40 as the quarter ran out.

The Whitefaces drove on downfield to the 28 where the Chiefs stood firm and took possession. Near tragedy came on the next play, when the visitors smeared the Chiefs back to their own 5. The locals kicked out to the 35, and just a few plays later Hereford had the first score of the game. Dement fired an aerial to Dickson and Robbins saved the Chiefs momentarily by downing the carrier on the 5, but Kelly pounded through for the tally, then made a perfect placement to put the visitors in a 7-0 lead.

The Chiefs were relieved of their first chance to score when a double offside penalty killed a play on which Robason had intercepted a Whiteface pass and bored to the 10. However, Hereford fumbled and Barnett recovered on the 30, only to have the ball change hands shortly after as the Chief pass to the end zone was snapped up by Kelly, who returned to the 25. Here the Whitefaces bogged down and Friona took over, marching on down to send Jay Cobb into the end zone for the counter. Haws placement hit one of the uprights and was no good.

The only other scoring of the game came late in the third quarter. Neither team had been able to advance and the ball had changed hands several times, with the Chiefs finally in possession on their own 25. Things went wrong and the ball carrier was swarmed down by the visitors in the end zone, adding another two points to the Hereford tally.

The fourth quarter was a repetition of the initial round, with both squads making short gains, then forced to kick out when the defensive wall held, and the game ended, 9-6, in favor of the visitors.

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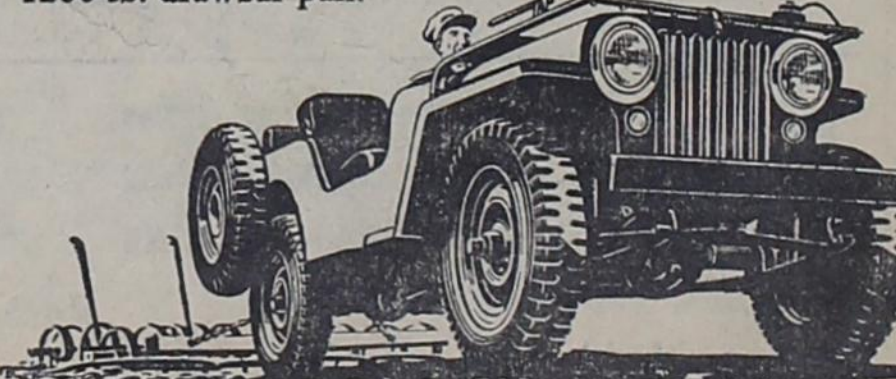
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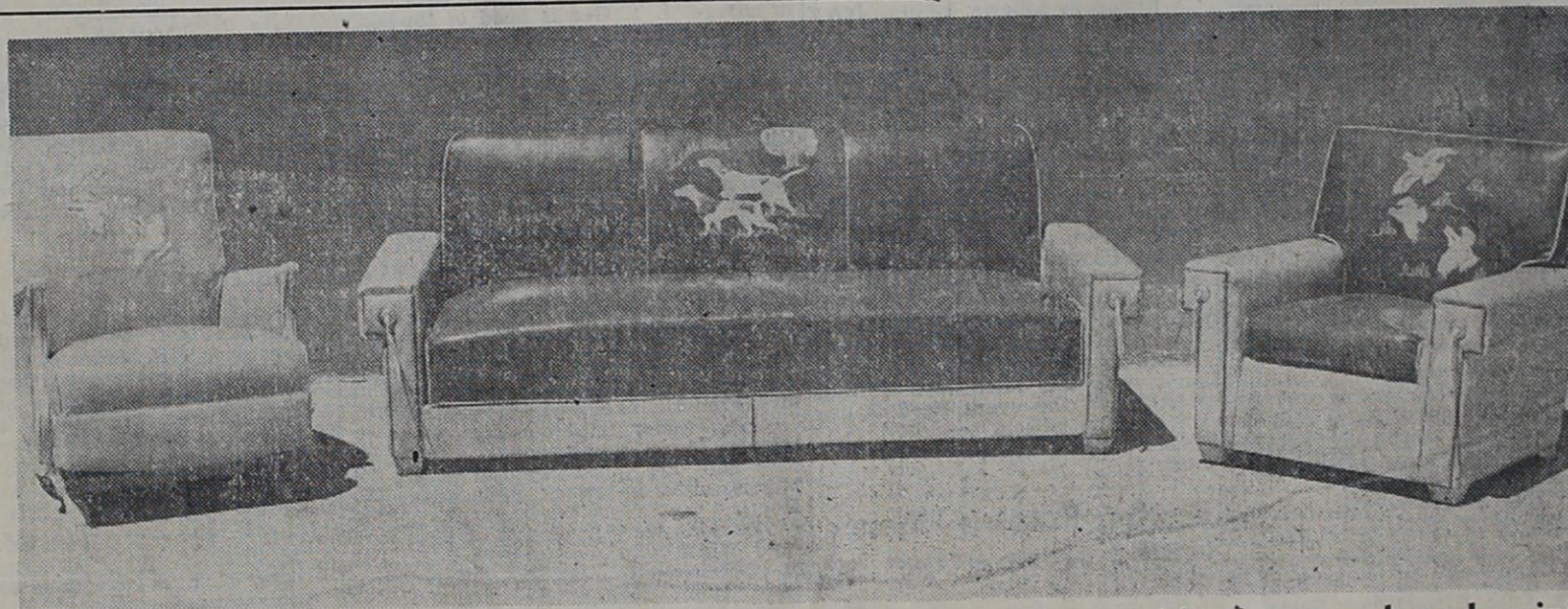
