## Texico Board Of Education Hires High School Principal

The Texico Board of Education has hired James Harding of Roswell as the new principal of Texico High School. His appointment will be effective for the 1975-76 school year and the term of his contract is for one year.

## Farwell City Employees Given \$50 Month Raise

Out-going City Commissioner Jim Berry handed all Farwell city employees a bouquet of roses when he recommended a \$50 a month raise, during Wednesday's City Commission meeting. Berry put this in the form of a motion which was voted on and passed unanimously. After the action was taken, Commissioner Fred Chandler stated he felt this was a "good idea, as the city has some good employees."

Congratulations were offered Dee Hammit for having received the "A" certificate for water, following a school he attended recently (story appears elsewhere).

The city dads approved a Resolution to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department for matching funds for the new park application. The Resolution was entered into the minutes.

Discussion was held concerning delinquent taxes for the year 1974. According to Mrs. Janie Bowery, city secretary,

\$36,315.98 in taxes has been assessed with a total of \$33,703.86 collected; making a total of 92 percent collected.

Mrs. Bowery presented the mayor and commissioners with a tally of delinquent taxes over the past several years showing: delinquent taxes for the year 1974 totaling \$2,612.12; 1973 - \$1,330.23; 1972 - \$373.36; 1971 - \$135.06; 1970 - \$226.84; 1969 - \$147.57; 1968 - \$134.85; 1967 - \$224.40; 1966 - \$166.86 and from 1950 to 1965, total delinquent taxes totaled \$273.30. This makes a grand total of \$5,624.59.

The city secretary did point out however, that they would collect many of the delinquent bills when she sends out notices in the near future.

A report was given on her trip to Lubbock last Monday to attend a meeting with HUD officials concerning filling application forms for funds for the city of Farwell. She told the Commission that the Farwell pre-application ranked high in Safety and Health and that the city has been invited to fill out a formal application.

The Lubbock meeting was held for the purpose of learning how to fill out application forms. Funds are available for Housing, Sanitation and Streets. Farwell would not be

limited to funds listed in their pre-application, according to information Mrs. Bowery received during the Lubbock meeting. She said the city could get help in many areas and could receive up to \$150,000 for a city this size. This would be an out and out grant with no matching funds required.

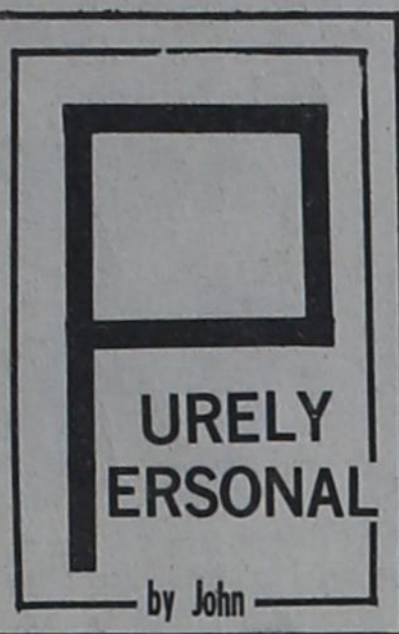

It didn't take long for us to get rid of our 1975 fruit crop on the High Plains. We strongly suspect the 17-degree low last week took care of that. While it was disagreeable for several days, it is not an unusual happening for the Panhandle. We usually have a late March or early April mini-blizzard. Somehow, Mother Nature forgets to warn her wayward fruit buds of this more or less annual event and her pretty blossoms wind up all frosted.

Sometimes, eager beavers who have started their air conditioners also have frozen lines. Neil Stewart advertised in last week's paper that he was ready to service air conditioners. Better he had advertised a sale on snow shovels. You can't win them all, especially out here.

Last Friday evening we attended a CPR workshop arranged for by interested local folks under the guidance of Dr. Jerry Gregory. It was the most interesting and rewarding experience that we have had for some time.

It is comforting to know that in an emergency a person could react with authoritative knowledge of what to do. In cases of coronary and/or pulmonary arrest, the first few minutes are vital to the victim. It could literally mean life or death for the person involved.

This is simple knowledge that anyone including children can easily learn. In fact, this procedure is being taught to youngsters with great success. Older folks are now beginning to learn these techniques of lifesaving lore for themselves and their loved ones.

Dr. Gregory said he would be happy to repeat the class in the near future for other interested groups. He ought to be deluged with requests for an encore. It is worth it.

Since the evening was inlement from the weather standpoint, it was surprising that the 18 or 19 turned out. No, in reality it was surprising that a hundred didn't come to the meeting.

Let's plan another meeting soon and set a goal of at least 50 participants. It should be done. It can be done.

Saturday, two local elections are scheduled that will involve positions on the school board as well as electing new city officials. These people will be charged with a rather large responsibility in regard to the public purse as well as setting policy that will effect the direction of both our school and city for years ahead.

These are important positions and should not be decided by a minority of the voting citizens. In recognition of the importance of these positions and as a token of respect to the persons running for these offices, we strongly feel that a large turnout of the voting public is a vital civic necessity.

If we could turn out 75 percent of our registered voters, Farwell would say to the world, "We care about our town and our school."

In the years ahead this recorded display of community awareness could be instrumental in causing some family or business to select Farwell as home. Strangers will not be interested in our town if we as a community are not interested in ourselves.

As the shadows lengthen, there are probably few who remember that on April 6, 1917, the United States entered World War I to end all wars and make the world safe for Democracy. Somehow, in spite of the most noble intentions of the United States, it hasn't worked out that way.

## Farwell Rodeo Draws 152 Contestants

The Second Annual Farwell Tri-State High School Rodeo Association Rodeo got underway at the Farwell Rodeo Arena Thursday, March 27, and concluded Saturday, March 29, with the boys team from Muleshoe and the girls team from Tucumcari, N.M., garnering honors by taking first place team trophies. According to records 152 individual contestants submitted a total of 274 entries for the affair.

In the top awards department for the Farwell rodeo, All-Around Cowboy honors went to Sherman Presley of Muleshoe while LaDawn Primrose of Tucumcari took honors as All-Around-Cowgirl. Sportsmanship Awards for the three-day rodeo were awarded to Micky Parsons of Dumas and Bill Blasingame of Hereford.

Five events were open to female participants in the TSHSRA - sanctioned rodeo. Lynn Culver of Plainview took first place in barrel racing competition with a time of 18.278. She was followed by Lori Primrose of Tucumcari with 18.310 for second place with third place honors going to Tammy Cleveland of Dumas, 18.311; fourth, Bobbi Sue

Greenhouse, Dumas, 18.419; fifth, LaDawn Primrose, Tucumcari, 18.482; and sixth, Candy Thoreson, Gruver, 18.522.

Lee Ann Williams of Farwell took top honors in pole bending competition when she was clocked at 20.826. Second place in the event was awarded to LaDawn Primrose with a time of 21.027. Koell Primrose of Tucumcari took third place at 21.142 while fourth went to Sherri Starkey of Happy with a time of 21.283. Taking fifth was Lynn Culver of Plainview with 21.804 and sixth place was taken by Candy Thoreson with 21.972.

Top honors in goat tying were awarded to Teresa Cluck of Gruver with a time of 12.148. Second was LaDawn Primrose, 12.430; third, Tammy Cleveland, 13.609; fourth, Debbie Jones of Claude, 13.968; fifth, Jackie Keyser of Perryton, 14.496; and sixth, Lynn Culver, 16.135.

Steer riding competition for girls was topped by Tammy Cleveland with a score of 48 points followed by second place DeLinda Howard of McLean, 47; third, LaDawn Primrose, 41; fourth, LaDonna Woodlee, Hereford, 40; fifth, Lori Primrose, Tucumcari, 40; and sixth, Valerie Tipps of Happy and Koell Primrose of Tucumcari, both with 39 points.

Final competition for the girls, break-away roping, was topped by Debbie Jones with a time of 5.080. Others placing were: second, Lori Primrose, 5.257; third, Candy Thoreson, 5.496; fourth, LaDawn Primrose, 5.661; fifth, Tammy Cleveland, 35.561. No qualified run was made for the sixth place position.

Boys events opened with bareback riding competition during which Kelly Taylor of Lubbock grabbed first place with a score of 54. He was followed by second place Glenn Springer of Lubbock, 46; third, Bill Brecheisen of Hugoton and Dennis Howell of Tascosa, both with 44; fifth, Clinton Franz of Clayton, 43; and sixth, Lucky Lundergreen, Tascosa, 42.

Bull riding competition was won by Sherman Presley of Muleshoe with a score of 54. Second place went to J. T. Henry of Happy, 52; third, Bill Homfeld, Hereford, 50; fourth, Glenn Trimble, Boys Ranch, 48; fifth, Clinton Franz, 46; and sixth, Doug McIntyre, Lubbock, 45.

A rodeoer from Hugoton, Mark Brubaker, took top honors in steer wrestling competition with a time of 5.680. Placing second was Monte Cluck of Gruver, 6.341; third, Scott Steinkruger, Hereford, 9.864; fourth, Garland Dahl, Gruver, 12.748; fifth, Dave McLeod, Hereford, 17.563; and sixth, Mike Flores, Stratford, 26.914.

Calf roping competition was led by Sherman Presley who had a time of 11.806; second, Bill Brecheisen, 16.086; third, Matt Brown, New Mexico Military Institute, 16.928; fourth, Ross Wilson, Claude, 18.989; fifth, Jeff Goodwin, Dumas, 22.545; and sixth, Dan Ellis, Muleshoe, 26.786.

Ribbon roping competition was won by Clint Irwin of Gruver with a time of 10.674. Second place went to Jim Henderson of Muleshoe, 12.320; third, Micky Parsons of Dumas, 14.004; fourth, Mike Flores, 14.551; fifth, Dan Ellis, 14.661; and sixth, Bill Brecheisen, 15.430.

Dan Ellis and Eddy Mardis, both of Muleshoe, took first place in team roping competition when they were clocked in at 16.346. Taking second place was the team of Bill Blasingame of Hereford and Micky Parsons of Dumas with 19.263. Third place was garnered by Kyle Jones of Bovina and Brent Johnson of Hereford with a time of 19.896. The team of Johnson and Jones took fourth with 29.144 and Kipp Goodwin and Jeff Goodwin of Dumas came in fifth with 30.874. Sixth place went to Jimbo Westel and Brant Lookingbill of Vega when they were clocked at 31.313.

Trophy belt buckles went to the first, second and third places in each event with saddles presented to the All-Around Cowboy and All-Around Cowgirl of the competition.

## Life Saving Techniques Given At CPR Workshop

A great deal of interest was shown by the group attending the demonstration training course in Cardio-Pulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) held Friday, March 28, in the Community Room of Security State Bank in Farwell. The one-night workshop was given by Dr. Jerry Don Gregory who says he will give a "repeat performance" of the demonstration to any interested group.

Dr. Gregory pointed out that the Cardio-Pulmonary Resuscitation technique is a combination of mouth-to-mouth breathing and chest compression. It takes about three hours to complete the training course.

Friday night's class of about 20 persons, using a dummy called Resusa Annie, learned to place the patient on a firm

surface and rapidly assess the situation.

Then, Dr. Gregory explained, the procedure is simple as ABC -- A for airways, get them open; B for breathing, breathe for the patient; and C for circulation, start chest compression.

After sizing up the problem, the airway is opened by tilting the patient's head back as far as possible and pulling his chin and jaw down to move his tongue forward. One must check for airway obstruction from vomitus, food, loose dentures, or other foreign objects, and clear the obstruction by rolling the patient's head and upper body to the side, scooping out foreign body with two fingers; then hyperextend the neck again.

Breath into the patient's mouth by pinching his nostrils shut and forming an airtight seal with your mouth over his mouth. Quickly blow five or six large breaths into his mouth and continue breathing for the adult patient 12 to 15 times a minute. For a child or infant, breath 15 to 20 times a minute over the nose and mouth.

"In an effort to get circulation started again," according to Dr. Gregory, "you must position yourself so your shoulder and upper body are directly perpendicular over the patient's sternum (breast bone). Place the heel of one hand just above the lower third of the sternum with the other hand on top of your first hand, interlacing your fingers to keep them off the chest wall. Next, depress the sternum one to two inches with each compression, removing the hand completely from the chest wall after each smooth downward stroke. The chest must be compressed 60 times per minute. If you are alone, compress the chest 80 times per minute. After the initial breaths, alternate two breaths with 15 sternal compressions," concluded the doctor.

"Because they are smaller and have faster heart and respiratory rates, the CPR must be adjusted for infants and children. The neck is extended but not as vigorously and you cover both the nose and mouth with your mouth, giving smaller breaths 15 to 20 times per minutes. Using the heel of one

hand, compress the sternum while you support the child's back with your other hand. Depress an infant's chest one half to three-fourths inches and give 80 to 100 compressions, breathing after every fifth compression," Dr. Gregory told his students.

Those in attendance practiced what they learned on the dummy. All came away with the feeling they would be better prepared should they encounter an emergency situation at home or on the job that would require this technique. "The life you save may be your husband's, your wife's or your child's," expressed one of the participants in the training course.

Any group interested in this workshop should contact Dr. Gregory and he will be glad to set one up.

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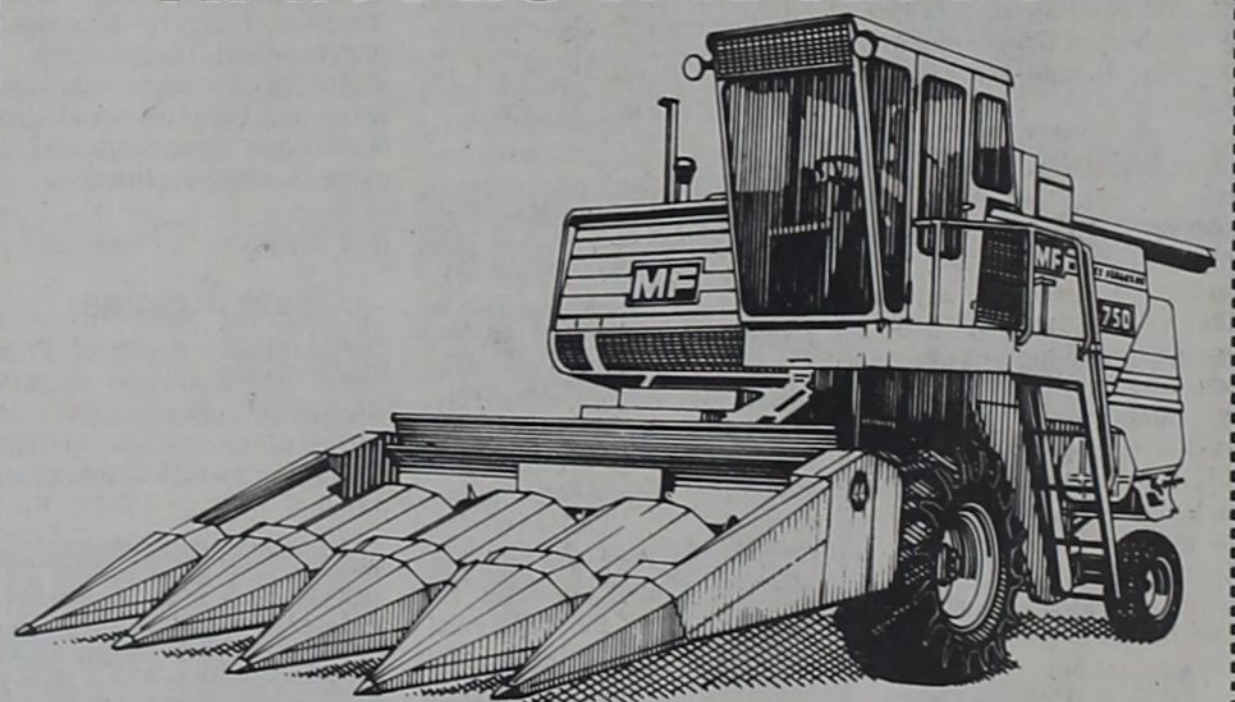
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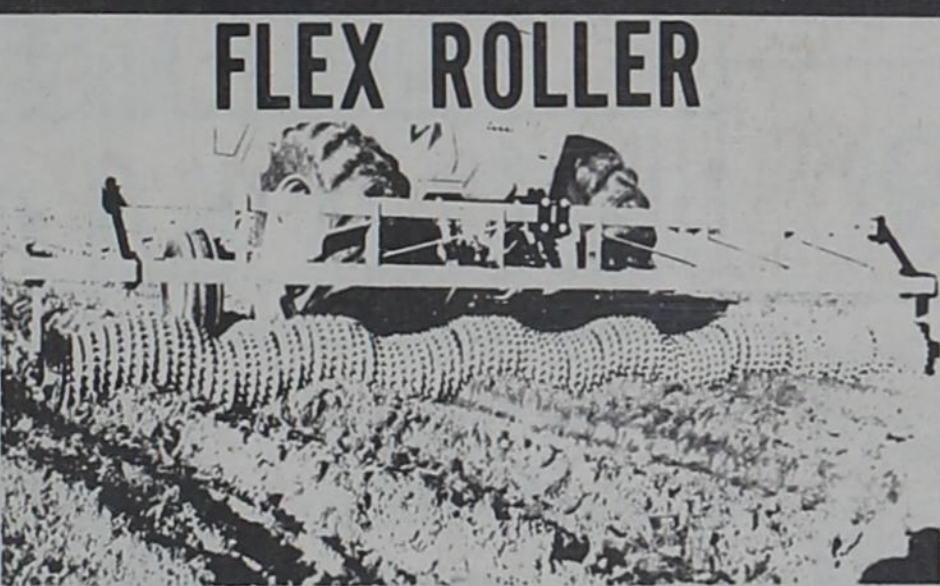

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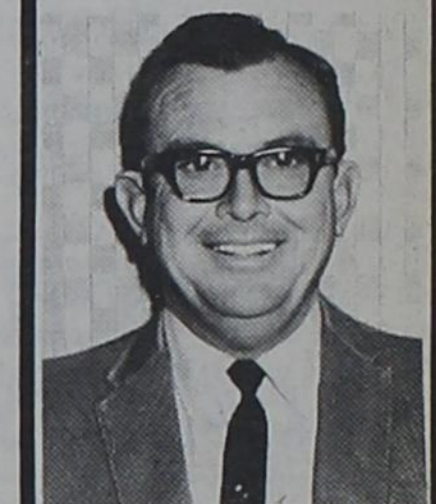
## Donna Clapp Elected To TBEA Position

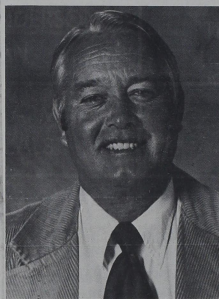

## Cancer Crusade Slated April 6-11 In Farwell

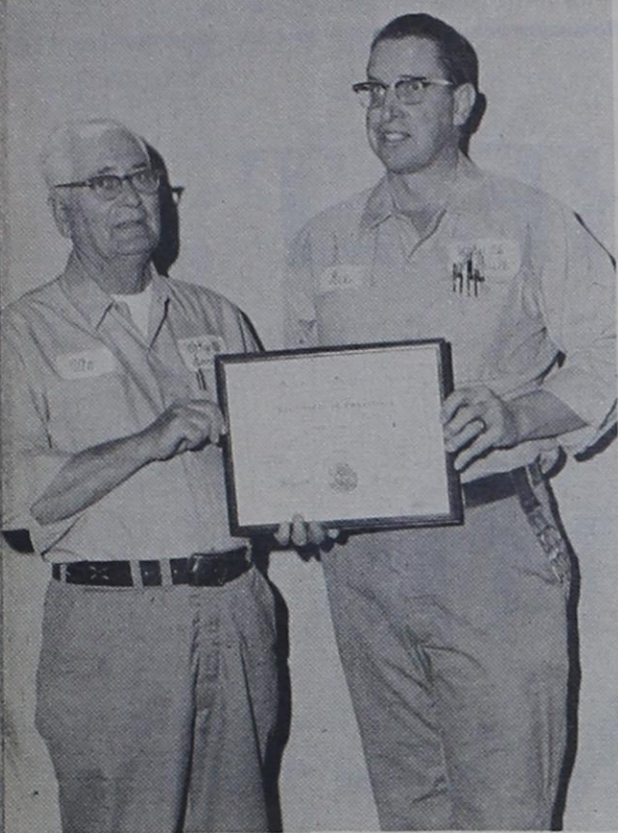
Mayor Gil Patschke has declared the week of April 6 through April 11 Cancer Week in Farwell.

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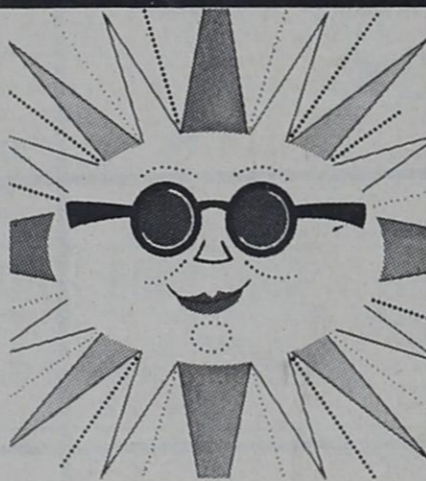
