This week, it is certainly difficult to write or to think of anything but the current crisis in Korea. Like most of the general public, we have thoughts on this grave situation, but again like most people, our ideas keep changing. We believe the more a person thinks on this incident, the more confused he will become. One reason for this public confusion seems to be the thought that our own government may not be playing fair with the public. In trying to assess the exact sequence of events, one can not help but recall that only very recently a high placed official flatly stated that the government had a "right" to lie to the people and the press. This was in defense of information that our officials felt the press and the people did not need to know, or that they did not appear to be able to adequately handle the true facts.

We do not know whether a fast reacting tough policy is the best, or a long diplomatic discussion with the USA winding up on the short end will prove to be best in the long run. We do feel that a UN debate will be another classic example of utter futility. We know, you know, and our governmental heads know where to go to talk. Whether it be tough or soft, let's talk to the right men in the right spot. We think our government should talk honestly, straightforwardly, and plainly to the Comrads in Moscow. If we do not feel that North Korea is worth getting New York City blown up over, we are quite sure the Russians will also feel that North Korea is not worth the extinction of Moscow.

We feel this way because we believe that the United States can not or should not take on another conventional "brush" war. On the present evidence, the Vietnam war has almost broken our economy with runaway inflation. We apparently can not superimpose another \$30 billion-a-year war on our present economy and have any economy left. Mathematically, we can not meet the over a billion and a half Asians on a manpower basis, as we are trying to do in Vietnam. Therefore, it is rapidly narrowing down to the big bang. This fact should be made crystal clear to the Russians, because ultimately they make the decisions for all the Communist countries.

We have been lied to, lied about, spat upon, dishonored, and disregarded. We have been drained of our money, our gold reserves, and more importantly drained of thousands of our invaluable, irreplaceable young men. Like the water in our underground sands, some day we will reach an end to our wealth. Unlike our water, we are quite close to an end of our wealth and men. At some point we must quit feeding this monstrous leach and say here we stand or fall.

Our various conversations the past few days has led us to the conclusion that hereabouts a feeling is becoming prevalent that now is the time to quit this continual propitiation of Communist countries. The local feeling seems to be that this latest act of international brigandage is the point wherein we say, unmistakably clear, that we must have satisfaction and a lessening of international tensions or -- the big bang.

Call Sales Tax Election

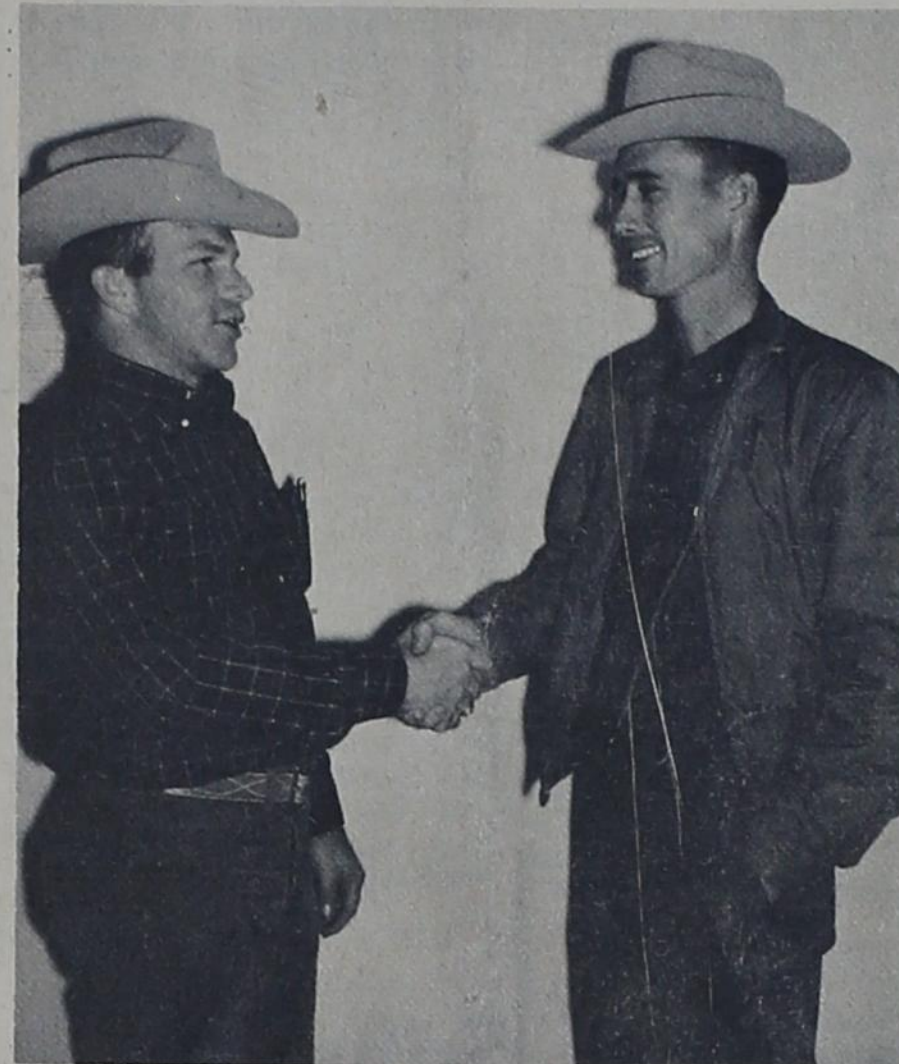
At the Friday afternoon meeting of Farwell City Commissioners, a resolution was passed authorizing the city to call a special election for March 5, on the proposed city sales tax.

The tax issue has been much in the limelight in recent weeks and the election was called at the request of residents who feel that this might be a good way to add needed revenue to the city treasury.

If the tax issue passes, residents will be paying in addition to the two cents (which the state now receives) an additional one cent on items which are now taxable by the state. No other items will come under the city tax.

Mrs. Janie Bowery, city clerk, stated that the commissioners and mayor have looked into the matter and found that approximately \$8,000 annually would be added to the city revenue should the tax become a reality. This would amount to approximately \$8 per person.

In addition to calling the election, the city commission voted to accept bids for new over-

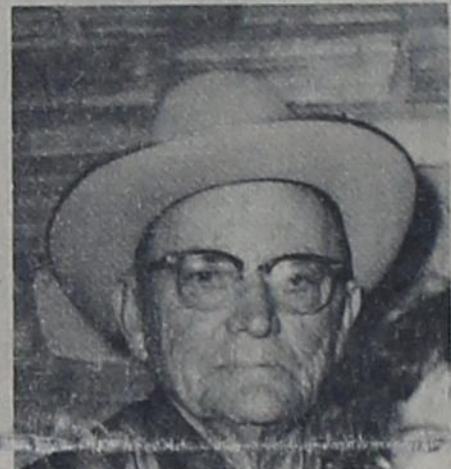

Opportunity For Peace May Be Lost

When will we ever learn? How long will it take us to realize that the Communists understand nothing but force, diplomacy means nothing, unless of course they can use it to their advantage.

As of this writing, the USS Pueblo is still in North Korean hands despite the President's warning that the Communist seizure of the ship "cannot be accepted." So far, no military action has been taken against North Korea. We have been content to confine our actions entirely to diplomatic channels, even though this course has tried and proven futile before. The Communists continue to laugh and spit in our eye.

Aside from the fact that the 83 crewmen serving their country aboard the Pueblo are now in need of their country, our failure to act promptly may have even graver implications. It should be clear by now that the seizure was an act explicitly designed to test our will. It may even have been the key to peace talks in Vietnam. Had we moved swiftly and forcibly, we might have convinced our enemy once and for all that we mean business, a measure of no small value in persuading the Communists to give up the war in Vietnam. Instead, we have stood on one foot and then the other, and have failed to take decisive action, thus encouraging the Communists to further aggression. Unknowingly, we may have insured a continuing Vietnam conflict and possibly a new Korean conflict.

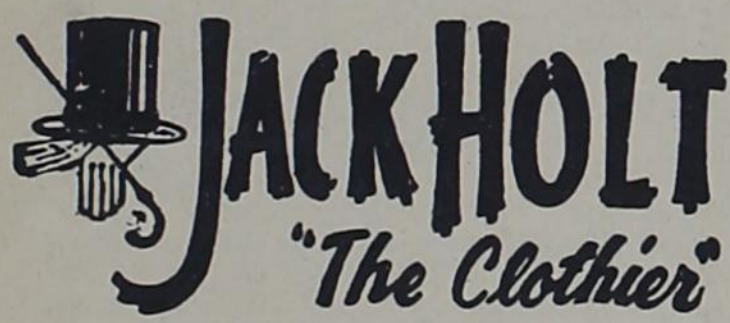
We may also have lost South Korea as a valuable Vietnam ally by our fumbling. South Korea has over 40,000 troops in Vietnam, which cannot be said of many of our so called allies. Our failure to punish an act of Communist aggression in Korea may have convinced her that she cannot count on the United States to resist the North Koreans, and so must bring her own troops home. This of course would delight the Communists to no end.

Let us examine for a moment, the possible Communist viewpoint of the situation. From the Russians' standpoint, the Vietnam war is a good investment. She has absolutely no troops committed to the conflict and is spending, according to latest estimates, around six billion dollars a year supplying the North Vietnamese with weapons. The United States, on the other hand, has a half million troops tied down in Vietnam and is spending many times six billion dollars. At those odds, the Russians undoubtedly favor the Vietnam war and would probably welcome a similar situation in Korea. Who then do we attempt to persuade to mediate the Korean situation? That's right, the Russians. What a laugh the boys in the Kremlin must have gotten out of that.

It is also clear that the North Koreans have no intention of abiding by any United Nations decision on the subject. They have said so in as many words. Where else then do we take our problem? Right again. It might also be worth mentioning, that as of this writing, the United Nations has refused to even discuss the matter.

It has been counseled by some, that we should not "over-react" to the North Korean piracy, that we "play it cool" and "wait and see." I suggest that by so doing, we have literally thrown away any chance for peace in Vietnam in the near future. We may have indeed precipitated a new Korean conflict, for the Communists must surely be convinced by now that we will not back up our words with force. President Johnson, in his earnest desire for peace, may have insured us another ten years of war.

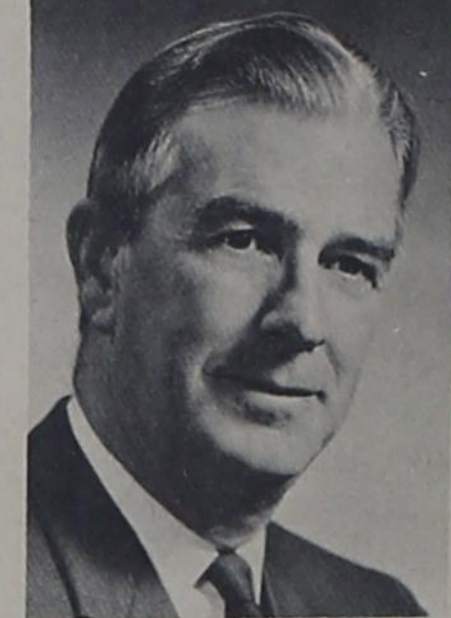

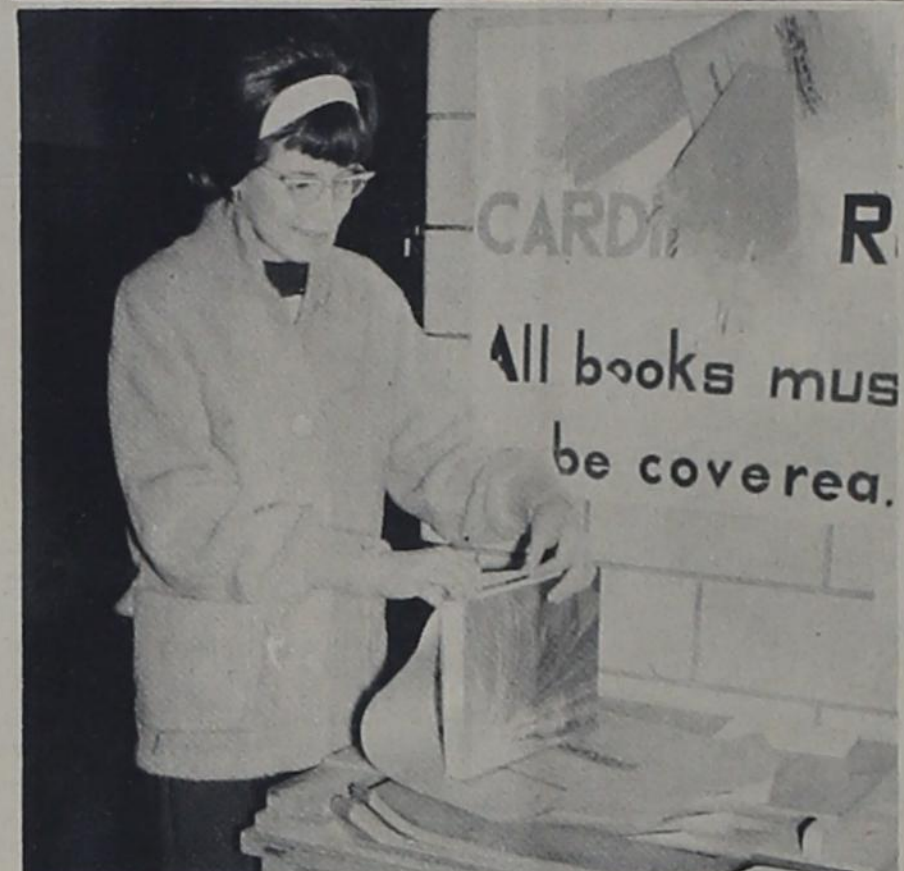

One of the major items discussed was the need for a county-wide survey for potential industry use. Committee members definitely agreed that this would be of benefit to the entire county. It was suggested that the executive committee pursue this idea for such a survey.

This year were (1) control of noxious weeds in the county (2) supporting Water Inc. (3) farm wage and hour laws. It was recommended that a county-wide educational meeting be conducted to explain the farm wage and hour laws.

Sub-Committee chairman reported on the various accomplishments and activities of the different committees during 1967. Reports were given on crops, livestock, soil and water conservation, family living and youth.

Members of the Parmer County Program Building Com-

mittee attending the meeting were: Mrs. Joel White, Andy Hurst, Harry Hamilton, Arlon Hartzog and Bob Wilson. Others attending were Jerry Isbell, SCS; Bill Boling, FHA; Prentice Mills, ASCS; and Ronny McNutt, County Agent.

A total of 44,069 books were checked out during the year; approximately 8,000 more than were checked out during 1966, according to Mrs. Scooter.

Some 943 books, including 101 easy books, 112 juvenile fiction, 41 juvenile non-fiction, 148 young adult fiction, 97 young adult non-fiction, 371 adult fiction and 173 adult non-fiction, were added to the library during the year. Ten books were donated to the library by patrons. Mrs. Scooter states that the library is happy to have such donations.

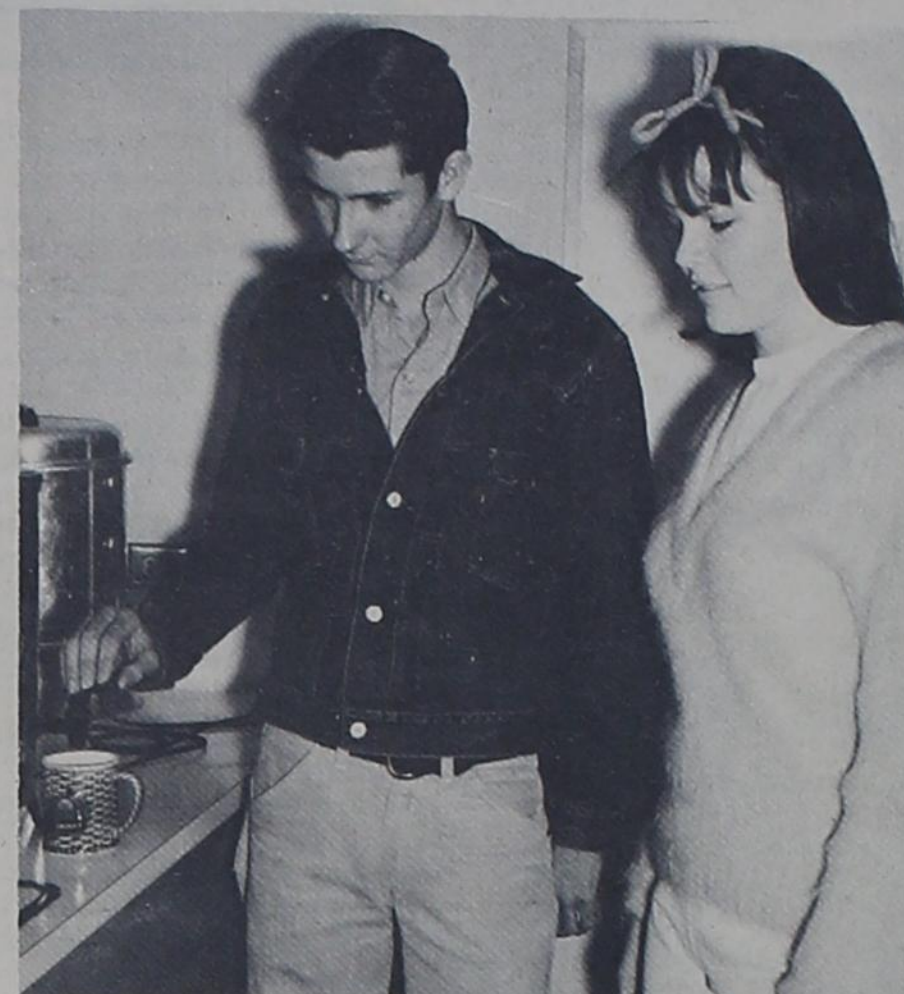
During January of this year, the library has checked out over 4,000 books to readers, with the largest number of books left at Spade, Olton, Whiteface, Bledsoe and Friona.

Mrs. Scooter invites readers in all of the library stops to visit the "bookmobile" and let them know what books "you" would like to see in the library.

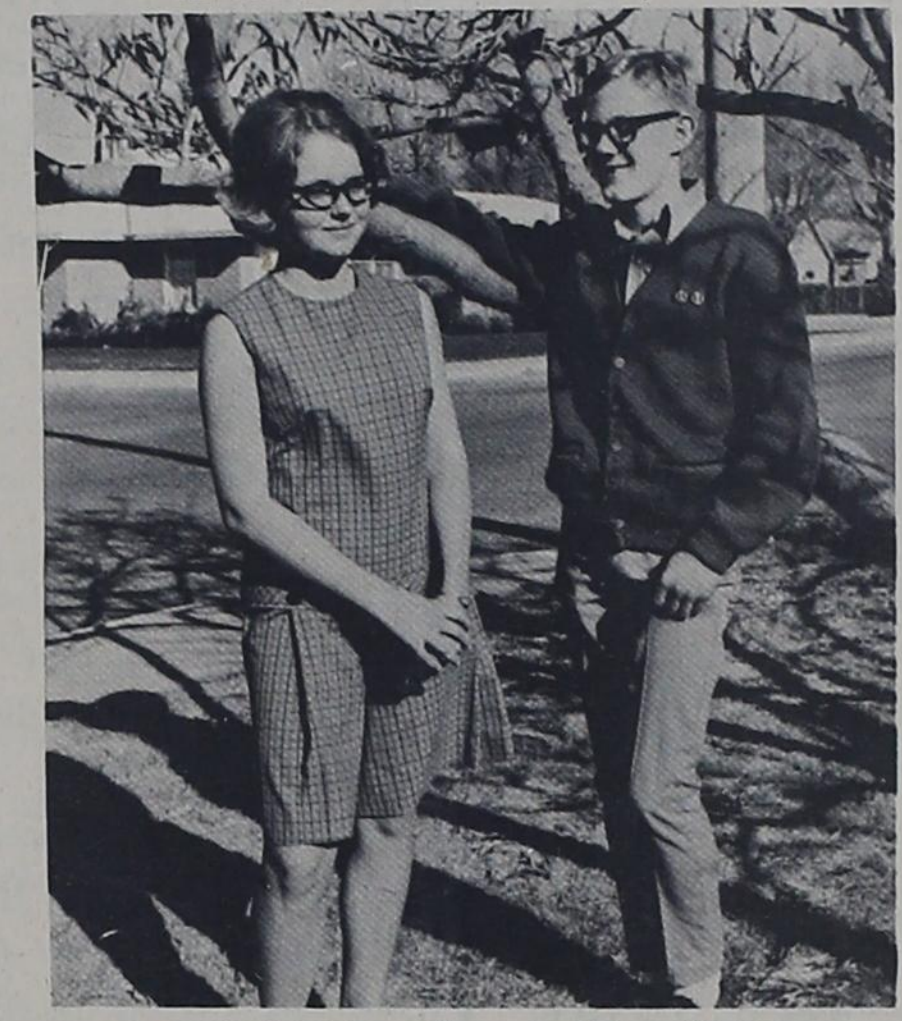

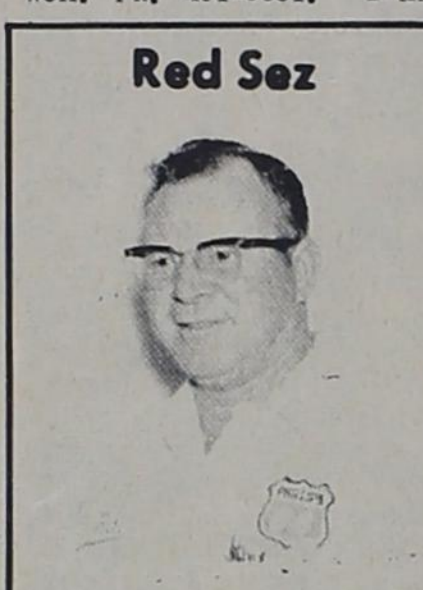
