1953 Parmer County Fair Starts Next Week

Hustle is the word for workers on the 1953 edition of the Parmer County Dairy Show and fair this week, as they rush toward preparation of the big event which will come up next weekend.

Fair directors are optimistic that the county-wide project will be perhaps the most successful this year it has ever been, and they are making plans to accommodate the largest number of spectators ever to visit the show.

Financially speaking, the fair seems to be in pretty good shape this year, despite the "tightness" of cash-on-hand. Contributions are conservatively estimated at \$1000 or better, which is less than was collected last year, but there is a \$500 reserve in the fair treasury which will take up the slack without any trouble.

A fair paper, to include the programs, departments, prize lists, and other information pertinent to the show, will be printed this weekend. The schedule of events will be carried in next week's issue of The Tribune, which is dead-lined for early distribution.

Aside from the usual exhibits and contests in farm animals, visitors this year are sure to be attracted to the kiddie rides, downtown parade, and barbecue which will be added attractions.

Registration for competition will begin Thursday, and Friday and Saturday morning will be generally devoted to judging. A parade Saturday afternoon will attract much interest, predict fair directors, and floats, kiddies and their pets which are entered will file down Main Street in Friona.

Cash prizes for the best floats, as well as the champion pet-shower, will be awarded at the conclusion of the parade. High school bands from Bovina, Friona, Farwell, and Hereford have been invited to participate.

The parade will be under the direction of Dick Hablbinga, and he announces the prizes as follows: school bands, first, \$20, second, \$10; best commercial float, \$10; best float for civic organization, \$15, second best, \$10.

School class or organization floats, first \$12.50, second \$7.50. Prizes for children's divisions: \$5, \$4, \$3, and \$2.

Probably the most popular single event of the fair will be the annual free barbecue sponsored by the Friona Chamber of Commerce. A crowd of 2000 was served at the conclusion of last year's fair, and directors are making plans for that many or more next weekend. The barbecue begins at 6 p. m. Saturday.

The children's rides which have been in the Friona city park will be moved to the fairgrounds during the event, and will be available for entertainment of the small fry who grow tired of looking at exhibits. The rides are under the auspices of the Friona Lions.

All things considered, conditions are pointing toward another successful Parmer County Dairy Show and Fair, predict the men and women who are planning the event.

Different Beliefs Evident On Seriousness of Insects

Some Think Bugs Will, Some Think Won't, Hurt Crops

A sudden and alarming infestation of boll worms and lice or aphids has appeared to dim the otherwise pleasant view of good crops this week, and has left farmers in disagreement over what should, and should not, be done.

The major question revolves around the intense and overnight increase of aphids in fields of feed. These aphids are also called greenbugs and lice, but regardless of their designation, they are becoming pretty familiar sights in the lush grain fields of Parmer and adjoining counties.

In some cases, hundreds of these tiny little parasites can be found in a single head of feed. They are responsible for what is generally referred to as "honey dew" on feed.

Some farmers feel that their presence will sap all the moisture from the heads and leave only a dry, chaffy, and unproductive crop of grain.

The desirability of getting rid of these insects is unquestioned, but how to go about it is debated. The natural enemy of the aphid is the small winged insect known as the lady bug. Sooner or later, experienced observers assert, the lady bugs will gain the upper hand and eliminate the aphids. Lady bugs are a beneficial insect that do no harm to growing crops.

Aphids can be gotten rid of by spraying feed fields, but this process also gets rid of the lady bugs. Then, if a new onslaught of aphids hatches out, there aren't any natural enemies to control them.

Perhaps the aphids will not harm the feed at such a late stage. Perhaps the lady bugs will weed out the parasites in another few days. Perhaps the aphids will ruin the grain crops. These are things that farmers disagree on.

Signs of danger are showing up in cotton, too. County Agent Joe Jones found the infestation such as to warrant a series of community meetings over the county this week to talk over

control problems.

He said that in some instances, bollworm infestation was to the point where poisoning should be gotten underway. In other areas, the worm population is not as severe.

Spraying has already begun in the southern part of Parmer County, and is expected to spread to other parts should conditions warrant.

"These bollworms," says the agent, "appeared very suddenly. They hatched out only last weekend. We must not delay in control measures where they are needed."

Wheat Planting Begins A yearly agricultural season of importance to Parmer County has sort of "snuck up" on farmers. That is the annual ritual of sowing wheat.

With 136,000 acres allotted to wheat for next year, planting is already going ahead steadily. It did not start all at once as it the usual case, since in most instances, subsurface moisture was sufficient to support germination.

In certain areas in the county, wheat is already up to a nice stand, following plantings in recent days.

Students Take Up School Books Again

The vacation is over for 391 Farwell students, who enrolled for the regular term the past week. Classes began in earnest Monday morning, and administrators report "we've never seen things going so smoothly."

Of the total enrollment, 112 are in high school, an increase of about three over last year; and 279 in grade school, a decrease of about six. The first grade, which had been without a teacher until last Thursday, will be instructed by Miss Annabelle Lee, who began her duties on schedule Monday.

50-Year Mark for Bovina Baptists

Of more than passing interest to many people of this area, regardless of their denominational affiliations, will be the 50th anniversary of the First Baptist Church at Bovina, which will be observed Sunday.

Rev. M. D. Durham, pastor, announces that a homecoming will be held in connection with the event, and all former members and pastors have been invited to attend special services.

There will be a special afternoon service, in addition to the regular morning and evening services, says Rev. Durham.

A basket lunch will be spread on the church grounds at noon.

Rev. Weldon Franks, now of Dallas, will be guest speaker for the morning worship service. He served the Bovina church as pastor for almost two years, and during his ministry the church erected a new parsonage.

Rev. Bruce Giles, Earth, will bring the message for the afternoon service. He served the Bovina church as pastor for twenty months. During his ministry in Bovina, the present church building was erected.

Rev. Durham has served the church for two and one-half years. During his ministry there have

been 173 additions to the church, 48 of these for baptism. A cabin has been erected at the camp grounds and paid for and the church is now planning a new educational building.

The afternoon service will begin at 2:45.

History Recorded According to records, the Bovina Baptist Church was organized in 1903 and built a house of worship in 1905. They joined the Tierra Blanca Association in 1906, and at that time the church had only seven members.

They called their first pastor in 1908, who was Rev. J. T. Burnett. He served until 1910 and Rev. B. J. Matthews was called as pastor. That year the Sunday school enrollment was 37.

Rev. G. T. Bailey was called as pastor in 1912 and gifts for the year were \$140.50. Pastors during 1914 and 1915 were Rev. J. T. Burnett and Rev. W. R. Triplett. The membership dropped to ten in 1916 and Rev. Duncan from Amarillo was called as pastor that year.

The membership was increased to 15 during his ministry, and in 1918, Rev. C. D. Potts was called as pastor, and the membership was increased to 20.

In 1919, Rev. W. H. Forbes served for one year. In 1921 G. L. Morris was called as pastor and the first B.Y.P.U. was organized.

By 1925 the church membership was increased to 50 and Rev. J. M. Ranking was pastor. He was succeeded by Rev. L. A. Blair the following year, and by Rev. B. F. Fronabarger in 1927. That year there were 130 enrolled in Sunday school and Joe Head served as superintendent.

In 1929 Rev. M. M. Robinett was called as pastor. Under his ministry the church was split and another church organized in Bovina. He was succeeded by Rev. J. S. Greenwood, who served the church until about 1934. Rev. A. S. Holmes was called as pastor, and brought the two churches together.

Rev. E. J. Speegle followed Rev. Holmes as pastor, coming to the field in 1941 and serving the church for two years. The Bovina church showed a remarkable growth under his leadership. Rev. Fred Stumpp was called as pastor in 1943 who led the church into making preparation to erect a new house of worship. Rev. Bruce Giles was called as pastor in 1945, and as stated above, the present house of worship was erected during his ministry.

He was succeeded by Rev. Weldon Franks, who led in the better organization of the Sunday school and training union. Rev. E. J. Speegle served the church again as pastor for 10 months following Rev. Franks. He served the church until November of 1950.

The present pastor, Rev. M. D. Durham, came Feb. 1, 1951. The church has made a steady growth since 1940. The present enrollment is something over 300.

Twenty-Five Additions Made to Church

Twenty-five additions were made to the First Baptist church, Farwell, during their revival recently, with 14 baptisms and 11 additions by letter. Rev. Dewey Horton, pastor, preached the services.

The last Sunday of the revival, 152 were in Sunday School and 93 were included in Training Union. Nine additions were made to the church Sunday.

About 175 now appear on the church roll, which is about 50 more than were included when the church was organized this spring. "We are quite elated over the growth of our church", a member says.

THE TRIBUNE'S EDITORIAL COMMENT

Letter to Secretary Benson Expresses Tribune's Beliefs

Parmer County, Texas

Secretary of Agriculture

Dear Mr. Benson,

Undoubtedly, Mr. Benson, you are a very busy man. And undoubtedly, you receive many hundreds of letters each week to which you are unable to give personal attention, simply because time will not permit. For that reason, Mr. Benson, we do not make a practice of writing you frequently and complaining to you of the petty problems which we see from day to day relative to the branch of the government in which you serve.

But we feel that it is time for someone of Parmer County to speak up about the matter of "drouth disaster" relief which has been administered to us during the past few months.

While it technically cannot be stated that our opinion is the mind of the county at large, we honestly believe that we are in agreement with 85 per cent of the population, both rural and town, when we say that we feel it is no longer necessary for Parmer County to be included in the subsidized feed program organized to help offset the effects of drouth in the Southwest.

More than three inches of rainfall have been received over all the county in the past 60 days. Some areas have received considerably more, but this is a conservative figure. These rains have relieved the depressing condition of rangeland in Parmer County and pasture is now in fair to good shape. In addition, Mr. Benson, Parmer County has been blessed with an abundance of underground water resources which have permitted us to harvest over one-half million bushels of wheat in the county, and to bring to near-maturity crops of feed and cotton which to the present time have never been surpassed.

Some persons have come to this paper and volunteered the names of ranchers and farmers who have procured feed and not made use of it. We do not desire a "witch-hunt," however, Mr. Benson. Although it is possible there have been abuses in this program, the same can be said of any other program of this nature that could be used as a comparison.

The thing we object to is the designation of the program itself. Everybody who hears the remark that Parmer County is in the "drouth disaster area" laughs. To call us a disaster county is a sham, Mr. Benson, as you or anyone else will very readily be able to observe if you should have the chance to drive through our area at this time.

People are mocking the administration, Mr. Benson, because of this ridiculous situation. This newspaper does not censor your branch of the government, because we have watched the program

grow out of meetings at Lubbock and Amarillo between you and the people of this part of the country, and we find that you have only done what was requested that you do.

We are not trying to say, Mr. Benson, that there are not certain parts of Texas and the Southwest that are far worse off than we, and perhaps are "entitled" to your relief program. But to say that Parmer County has its back against the wall because of the drouth is inaccurate.

Neither are we trying to say that the county committee appointed to administer your program locally has done anything other than the best that could have been expected. They, quite naturally, did not relish the idea of having to say, "Now you, Mr. Brown, need this feed and may buy it; but you, Mr. Green, should be able to get along without it."

We recognize that the man producing beef in Parmer County (and elsewhere in the nation) is penalized by the system which arbitrarily forces him to produce a commodity for sale on an open and competitive market, while the things which he must buy to produce this commodity are supported by government subsidies. Therein lies the real problem in this matter, Mr. Benson.

To receive fair treatment with his problems, the cowman should either be entitled to having his products supported by the same system that supports the things which he must buy; or he should be permitted to purchase his "raw goods" on the open market where he is forced to sell his product. But "drouth disaster" programs are not the answer at this time, Mr. Benson.

We are not at odds with the cattlemen of Parmer County, because they indeed are placed at a disadvantage at the present time because of the reasons above mentioned. They are being unfairly penalized. But the distasteful essence of the program now extended as a remedy for this situation is undermining the fundamental confidence in the American government shared by most of our citizens.

With due consideration of all these things, we cannot help but believe that it is only fair to the taxpayers of the nation that this farce regarding Parmer County as having a "disaster" be dismissed. There are other counties who fill the same qualifications as ourselves, but we will not attempt to speak for them.

We respectfully submit for your consideration Mr. Benson, that the disaster feed plan is no longer necessary or desirable in Parmer County, and if you would like to have additional and more specific proof of our statements, we will be happy to procure them for you.

Thank you for your attention in this matter.

Juggler To Appear On First Assembly

Roger Ritenbaugh, juggler, will appear on the first outside assembly at Farwell schools, Wednesday, September 9, in the school auditorium. He is sponsored by Southern School Assemblies.

Ritenbaugh, the talented and versatile performer, has a diversified background before becoming a full time entertainer, the publicity release says.

During World War 11, Ritenbaugh served three years in the United States Army Air Corps. After attending Air Force Technical Training Schools in Radio and Gunnery, he was assigned to a crew on a B-17 Bomber. He was then sent overseas to England via Labrador, Iceland, and Northern Ireland. While stationed in England he completed 31 high altitude combat bombing missions on a Flying Fortress. He holds the Distinguished Flying Cross and the Air Medal with Oak Leaf Clusters.

Upon discharge from the Service at the end of the war, Roger decided to get some formal art training with the idea of becoming a commercial artist. He enrolled the Art Institute of Pittsburgh and surrounded himself with pencils, charcoal, paints and brushes. In the meantime, he became fascinated in another art . . . the art of juggling. At first it was only a hobby, but there were times when he would spend more time

at his practice juggling sessions than at his artwork.

Discovering it was more fun entertaining people with his amusing juggling manipulations than being hunched over a drawing board, Roger left for New York City to get some schooling in the Theatrical Industry. He took a short course at the Jackson School of Stage and Radio, located on Broadway itself. Besides the school training, he gained additional experience by appearing on the vaudeville programs of numerous theatres in New York City.

15 Units Underway For Labor Camp

Construction work on fifteen single-room units to house Spanish American workers being used in this area is going forward at a fairly good clip, according to a check-up this week.

H. H. Weis, construction foreman, said on Monday that he had hopes of getting the work completed within "the next two weeks", but added in the same breath that it was hard to estimate the actual amount of time which would be required to finish the work.

The units are being built by Bert Chitwood, on property owned by Chitwood on the southeast side of town, past the water tower. Tentative plans, developing on the number of such workers needed in the area, are to construct a 10-unit block next year, Weis indicated.

The buildings will be frame, with wood damaged in the Rockwell Lbr. Co. fire being utilized as far as possible. Each single unit, 16x20, will be piped with gas and cold water, and a general bath house and toilet facilities will be added, to be connected to the city sewer.

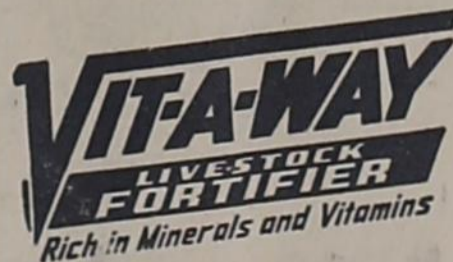

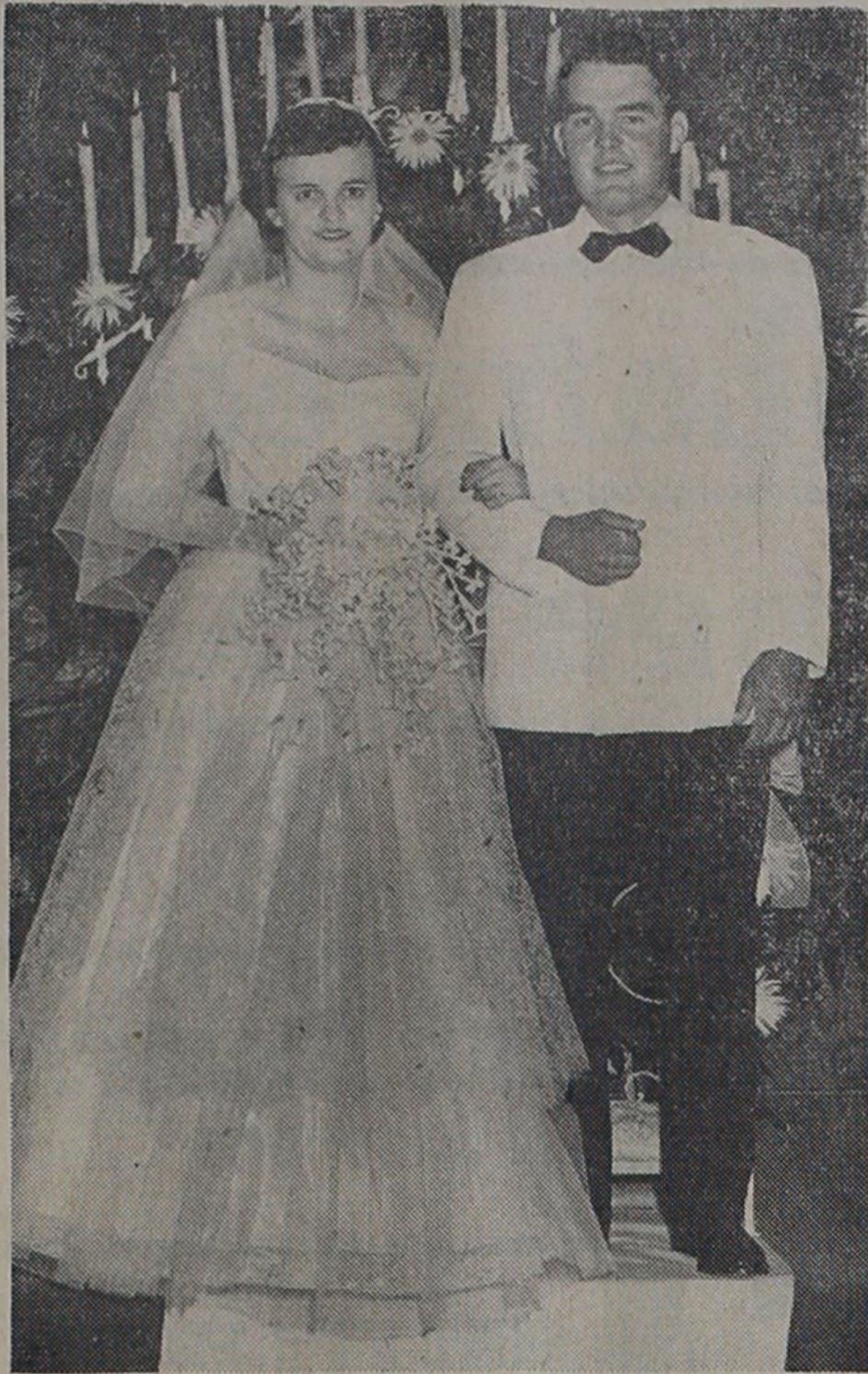

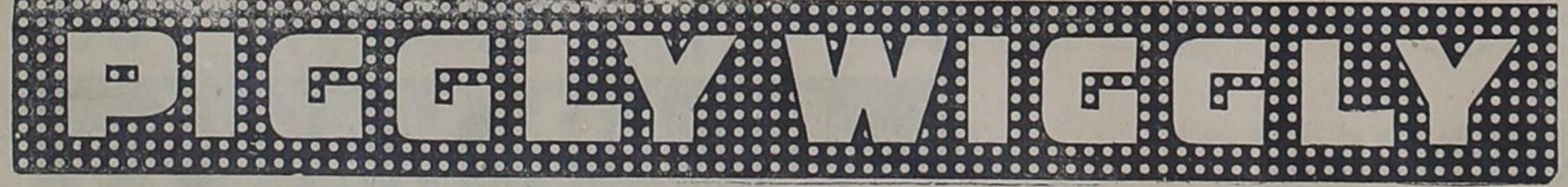
