Start of a tradition

Today's column is going to be the start of a tradition. Something akin to this will appear each April in the Tribune as long as my fingers can punch the typewriter keys.

This is both good and bad. Bad, because after a decade or two, you may get a little tired of reading about the same topic. Good, because if you don't read what I have penned today, you'll get another chance next year.

It's about the Chicago Cubs. No, it's not about baseball scores. No 3-1 or 5-2.

Rather, it's about a peculiarity of nature. Americans like to root for underdogs. No where, I repeat, no where, is there a more classic case of an underdog than the Chicago Cubs National League baseball franchise.

I began rooting for the Cubbies in 1952, seven years after they won their last pennant. In that first year, they either finished seventh or eighth, I don't remember. What I do recall, though, is they maintained that posture year in and year out.

The great thing about being a Cub fan all these years is that everyone starts out each April with the same record, no wins and no losses. For the Cubs, it's downhill quickly.

But you know the old cliché, "Hope springs eternal..." And it's only right that the start of spring goes hand in hand with the start of the baseball season.

I'll never forget one year in the 1950s, I think it was 1957. The Cubs had just traded for the great slugger Ralph Kiner, who was in his twilight. Anyway, Kiner was going to supply the needed punch behind Ernie Banks, Mr. Cub, in the lineup.

In the opening game at Los Angeles, twice Mr. Cub came to bat with runners on second and third. And twice the Dodger pitcher intentionally walked him to get to Kiner. And twice Kiner struck out.

I remember musing after that opening game loss by the Cubs that although there were 153 games to go (the schedule then had 154 games), the Cubs already were eliminated from the race. "Hope" couldn't have had a briefer moment.

But as I said earlier, my recollections of the Cubs go back even earlier, to 1952. Some of you other old-timers may remember these names: Handsome Ransome Jackson at third, Roy Smalley at short, Wayne Terwilliger at second, Dee Fondy at first, Joe Garagiola (the well-known TV announcer) behind the plate. On the mound were stalwarts such as Dutch Leonard, Paul Minner and Bob Rush. And in the outfield were Bob Speake, Andy Pafko and Hammerin' Hank Sauer. Eddie Miksis was in reserve.

Anyway, one shouldn't live in the past. This is another year, another time. Believe it or not, many scribes even pick the Cubs to win their first pennant in 40 years, since they copped their division last year. Thus, I will use that evidence as grounds for my annual prediction: The Cubs will win a pennant this year, then take the World Series.

But, somehow, this year's prediction just isn't the same as in the past times. This year I could be right. Sure takes the fun out of it.

But it's still fun watching the Cubs run the basepaths, and when the camera pans over the crowd at beautiful Wrigley Field. While others see the current crop of athletes, my mind reminisces to the good, old days when:

-They had a catcher with a sore arm. When opponents tried to steal second base, he could only get the ball there on a bounce. It was fun when, every now and then, he actually got the runner out on his bounced throw.

-They had a terrific prospect who would run like an antelope, make diving catches and hit the ball over 450 feet. So they traded him to St. Louis for a sore-armed pitcher who never won a game for them. And St. Louis got the Hall of Famer Lou Brock.

-They signed their first bonus baby in the 1950s for \$100,000, the most bucks spent on a youngster in baseball history at that time. And when he appeared in his first major league game, the baseball announcer commented on his "beautiful, majestic stroke" as he swung at the ball. However, he struck out and the baseball announcer later said that he would be a great player "once he learned how to hit a curve ball." I'm still waiting.

Celebrity Auction picks up club support

The planned Celebrity Auction to raise funds for the Farwell Community Center picked up support of Twin City clubs Tuesday night.

The auction, whose main sponsor is the Texico-Farwell Rotary Club, is now scheduled at the Community Center June 22. The date was picked so it wouldn't interfere with Pioneer Days in Clovis or a major golf tournament in Farwell.

At Tuesday's meeting of representatives of Twin City clubs interested in raising funds to help pay off loans that were needed to refurbish the center, the Theta Rho chapter of ESA and Beta Sigma Phi indicated they would work together on serving a meal at the auction.

In addition, Farwell Study Club representatives said their club would help sell tickets for the meal, plus help address the letters that will seek donations to the auction.

The auction itself will be free to the public. It would be advertised throughout the area, thus bringing

people from the Friona, Muleshoe and Clovis areas to it.

By having a meal to run concurrently with the auction, it is hoped that the turnout will be larger.

The celebrity auction will consist of seeking donated (tax deductible) items from celebrities, such as movie and music stars, plus area craftsmen and businesses.

At the end of April, letters will be sent out to celebrities throughout the United States asking for donated memorabilia. Curtis Smith Office Supply has agreed to donate the stationery needed for this project, and will help address the letters.

The amount of letters to be sent out will depend on the funds collected. The goal is 1,000 letters, meaning \$220 is needed. Persons who wish to donate any money for postage are asked to bring it by the State Line Tribune office by April 24.

Also, anyone who would like to

donate any items may begin bringing it to the State Line Tribune office immediately. Items can be of any nature. The Tribune office is open weekdays from 8:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. Persons who contribute items will have their names listed in an ad crediting those who helped.

Besides sending out letters, Rotary Club members will be seeking donations from area businesses.

At Tuesday's meeting, one club representative said that animals would be a good "auction" item. If anyone is interested in donating any animals, they are asked to call Mike Pomper at the Tribune (481-3681).

Joe Jones, who is assisting Leslie Lunsford on leading the committee to raise funds for the center, agreed to seek auctioneers for the June 22 auction.

Also, Beta Sigma Phi representatives said they are planning a luncheon and style show in June as a center fund-raiser. More details will be announced later.

Good indications for signups

Although the turnout was light at the meeting of residents interested in the proposed Heritage Square Garden Homes Sunday, there are good indications that signups for the new homes will be gotten.

The project, under the auspices of the Farwell Hospital District, would include up to 16 homes for senior citizens adjacent to the Farwell Convalescent Center.

Homes would be built after persons sign contracts with the Hos-

pital District.

Convalescent Center Director Ron Fechner said he has received several calls from area residents about the homes and that at least one person who attended Sunday's meeting was very interested in the project.

At the meeting, Fechner explained how the process works. Homes will be contracted for \$45,000 apiece. If a person decides to leave, then money is returned to him, depend-

ing on how long he lives in the home.

Fechner also discussed other features, such as: a mini-bus for transportation, recreational area and walkways, features for the handicapped, nursing care if needed, use of Convalescent Center services and the providing of meals and maintenance services by the center.

The next step is for the Hospital District to begin meeting with those individuals interested in owning the units.

Breckenridge will be getting married the first week of May. He and his wife have rented a home south of Farwell.

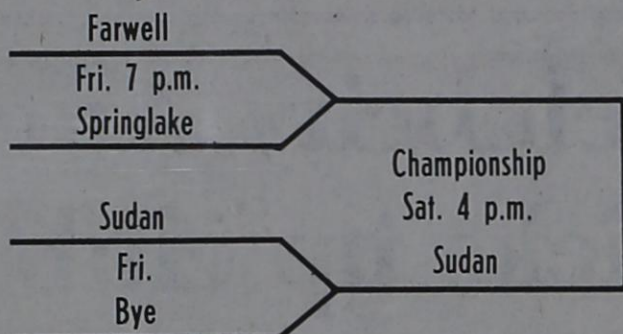
The new drug store will open June 1.

Breckenridge will be in partnership with Dennis and Pat Mitchell of Hatch, N.M.

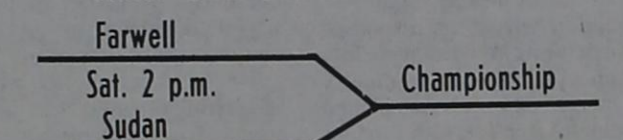

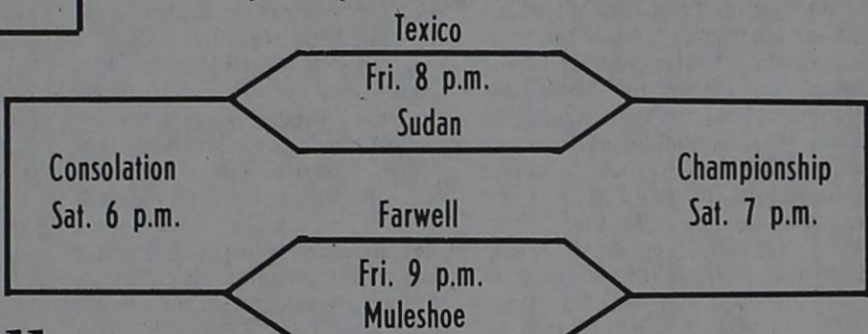

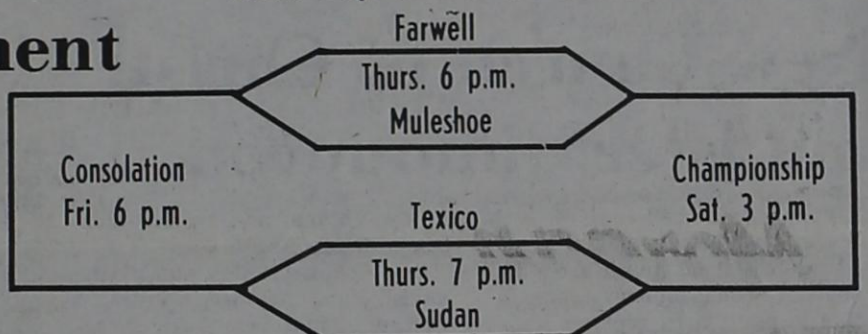

Preference of morning or afternoon sessions will be taken as space and balance of classes permits, says James Craig, elementary principal.

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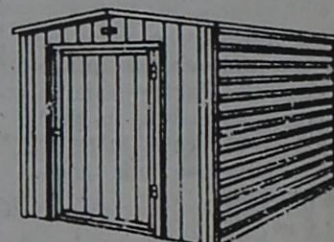

Anna Morales, who also has worked as a teacher's aide in Farwell, opened BB's Bakery in March.

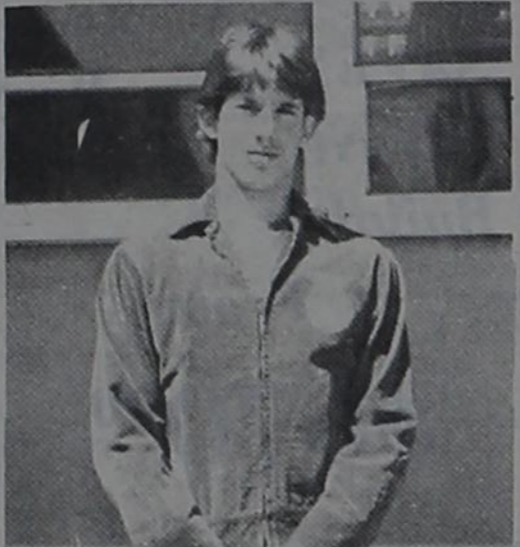
The bakery specializes in Mexican pastry. It is located at 107 E. Third St., Muleshoe; the phone number is 272-5207.

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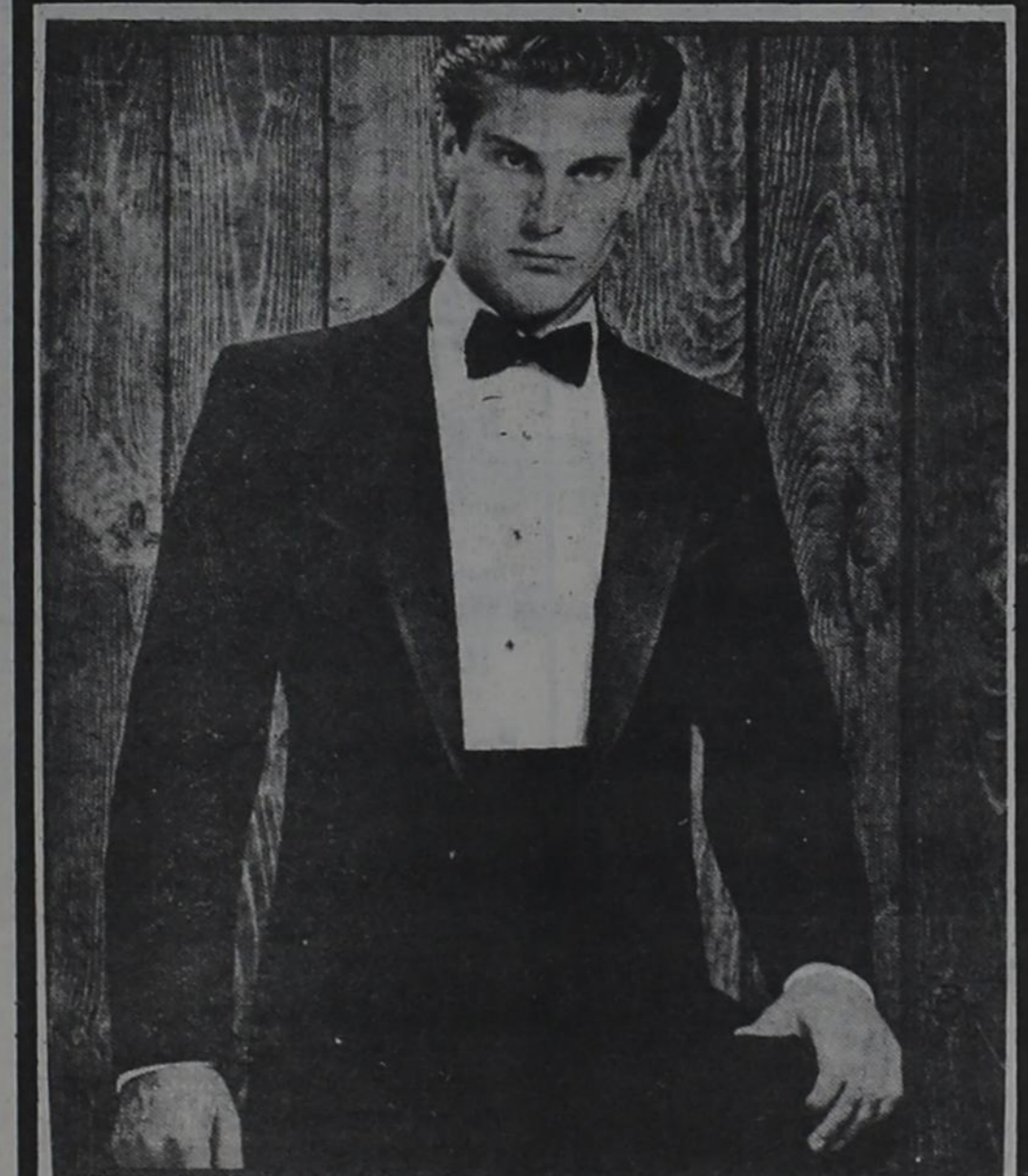
