School Board Reorganizes, Purchases Science Equipment

The Farwell school board, meeting for the first time since the recent election when two new members were elected, was reorganized on Tuesday night. Buck Gregory will again serve as president of the board. Other officers elected were J. T. Ford, vice-president, and Donald Christian, secretary.

Other board members are Harry Sheets, Smokey Gast, Clarence Johnson and Joe Blair. Following the election of officers the board got down to the business of approving the purchase of science equipment for the new building, which houses three science laboratories which will take care of 64 students. Science equipment will be purchased from Taylor Manufacturing Co. Bonds passed for the new school plant in the amount of \$532,000 have been invested in government securities from which they will realize \$14,725 making a total of \$546,725 available on the new building. Of this amount the construction contract for the building is \$459,270; architect's fee \$22,950; chairs for the new auditorium, \$18,203; stage curtains for the new auditorium, \$2,547; for a total amount of \$502,970 they have obligated to spend, leaving \$43,755. Of this amount \$20,700 will be spent for school furnishing and \$7,500 for paving leaving approximately \$15,000. In addition the school will receive \$5,649.50 in NDEA funds for the purchase of science equipment for the school.

Farwell Spellers Win County Bee

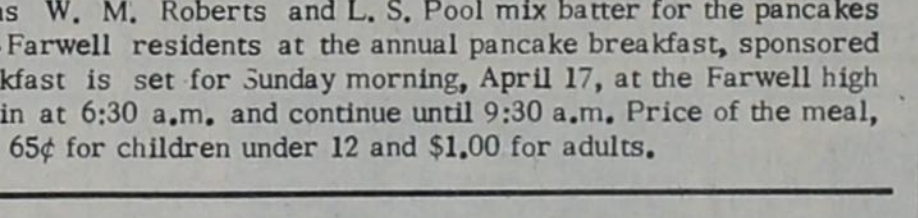

On The Farm In Parmer County

With the warm daytime temperatures lately, some farmers will be getting anxious to start planting cotton. However, we urge farmers to consider some of the following recommended practices for producing this year's cotton crop. These practices have been proven to be practical, economical and beneficial to increasing net income from cotton.

Plant high quality seed that has variety purity. Seed must be of a single adopted variety to produce maximum yields of high quality lint. Deteriorated low quality seed will germinate slowly and the seedling will grow slow. Low quality seed require higher germination temperatures and root development is weak. Low quality seed are susceptible to attack by 15 soil-borne fungi and bacteria while non-deteriorated seed are susceptible to only 2 or 3 microorganisms.

Only about 20 pounds of high quality seed will be needed to plant per acre when an in-furrow fungicide is used, 3 or 4 cotton plants per foot of row should give maximum yields of high quality cotton. When seedling disease has been a problem, an in-furrow fungicide is recommended.

In-furrow fungicide recommended this year for control of seedling follow: Fungicides and Pounds Active ingredient Per Acre: PCNB - Lanstan, 0.50 - 1.00; PCNB - Caplan (Soil treater X), 1.25 - 1.00; PCNB - Olin 2424 (Terraclor Super X), 1.00 - 0.25; PCNB - MM-DD (Panterva), 0.7 - 0.15; Deolaton, 2.0; Caplan - Folpet, 0.75 - 0.75; Caplan - Folpet - DBCP, 0.75 - 0.75 - 1.00; Lanstan, 1.5.

Farmers should not plant before soil temperatures are 60 degrees for several days at 4 to 6 inches of depth.

Consider planting on top of the bed this year. There are several distinct advantages to this method. However, bed planting will give faster emergence, rapid growth, higher yields, better harvesting and better overall quality.

Plan for early season insect control. This may include the use of systemic insecticides at planting time as a means of protection. By using this combination of practices farmers will have a better probability of getting an early, vigorous cotton crop off to a fast start. Combining the use of these

First Aid for Steam Irons - Do some of you use tap water for steam iron when only distilled water is recommended? If you have been doing this for a very long time you no doubt have deposits of calcium and other minerals which leads to sputtering irons and drops of water splattering on clothes.

To correct the problem, follow these simple directions: Dissolve 1 tablespoon of a non-precipitating packaged water softener in 1 cup of distilled or demineralized water. Fill the iron with this solution and let it steam for 5 to 10 minutes, shaking it constantly during this time.

Empty this water and fill the iron with a mixture of two tablespoons distilled white vinegar to 1 cup distilled water. Let steam again for 5 to 10 minutes, again shaking constantly. Pour off this water while steaming is clean. Repeat if not completely clean. This is recommended for cleaning iron every two or three months to keep it in working order.

long, immediately begin to feed on the plant's foliage and bark.

The young worms or caterpillars construct a small, tapered bag of silk-like material and attach to it pieces of bark and foliage. The bag turns to a brown color.

A bagworm protrudes its head and front feet from the bag as it moves about the plant as it feeds but will withdraw into the bag when disturbed. In late summer the bag is attached to a branch and the mature caterpillar pupates within the bag.

The female is a wingless moth and stays inside the bag until the eggs are laid. Then she leaves the bag and dies.

The feeding worms, when infestations are heavy, will remove the foliage and bark from all or parts of a tree or shrub, resulting in the death of the plant or the heavily infested parts.

Dallas, Texas -- Tax relief is available to many retired persons in northern Texas who are living on a fixed pension or annuity. It also is available to older people who have incurred costly medical bills. Those reminders came from the Internal Revenue Service today.

For those on a pension, the benefit may be through the "retirement income credit" provision of the Federal income tax laws. These laws also allow persons over 65 to deduct 100% of their drug and medical expenses. On home sales, those 65 years of age may elect to exclude from their income part or all of the from the sale.

Documents 5018 and 5569, which furnish more detailed information on this subject, may be obtained by writing to the District Director, Internal Revenue Service.

The convention began Monday and closes Friday noon with the installation of the newly elected officers.

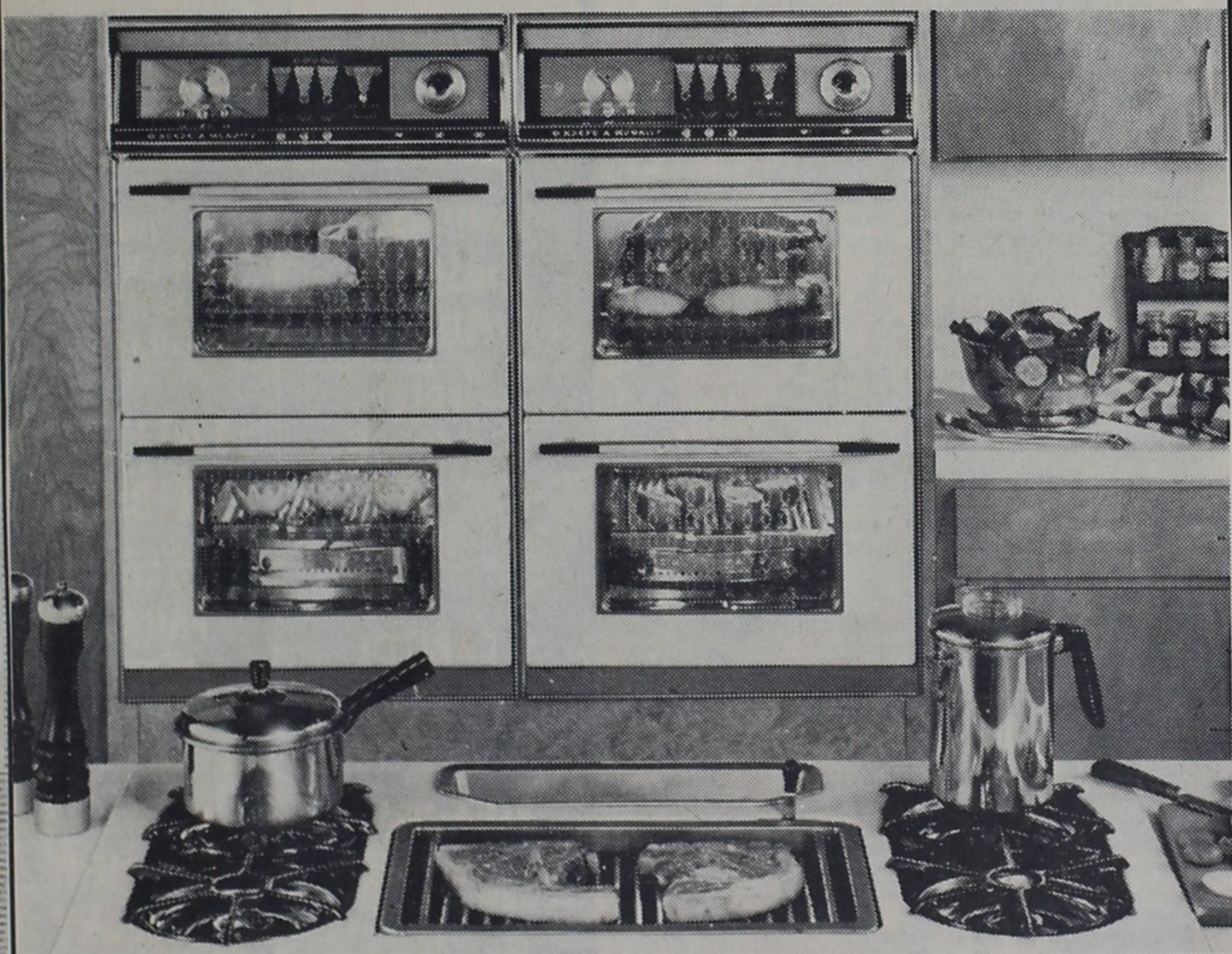
Mr. Haseloff is a member of a floor committee which will present a resolution on the complete reorganization of the administration of the District.

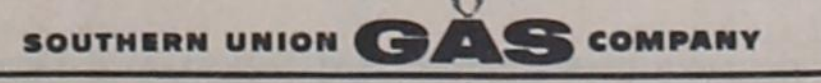

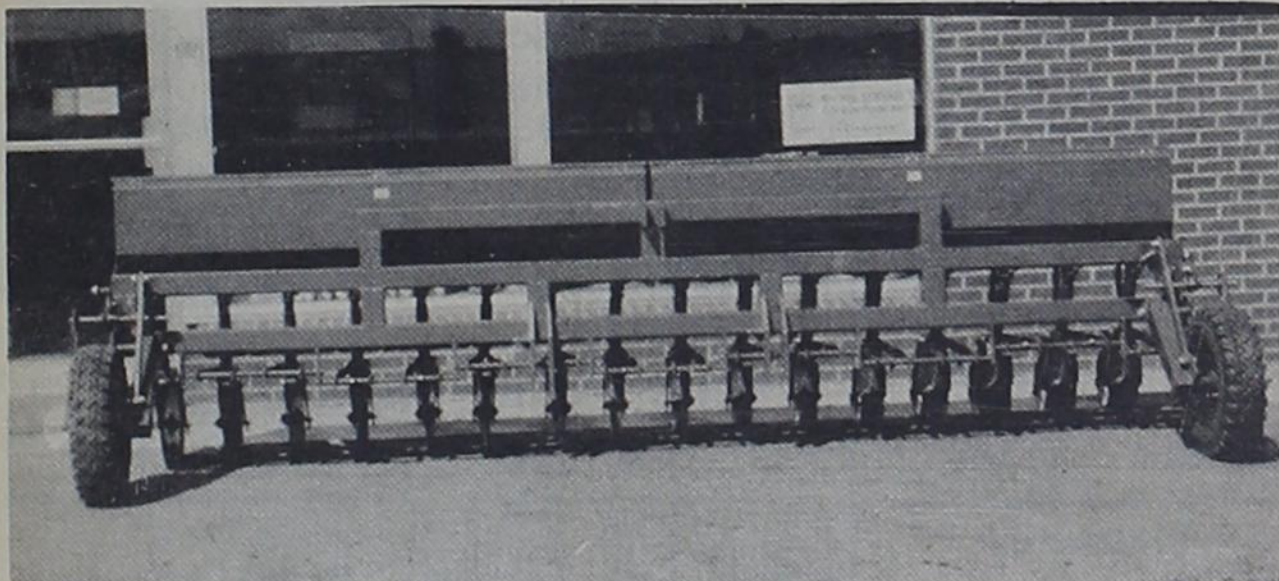

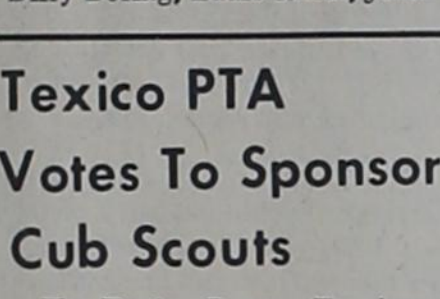

Internal Revenue Question-and-Answer

This column of questions and answers on federal tax matters is provided by the local office of the U. S. Internal Revenue Service and is published as a public service to taxpayers. The column answers questions most frequently asked by taxpayers.

Q - I filed my return as soon as I got my W-2 in January. When should I get my refund?

A - A refund return filed early generally takes about six weeks to process. A missing signature, Social Security number or other error or omission will delay the processing. That is why Internal Revenue urges taxpayers to give their returns a final check for completion and accuracy before sending them in.

Q - How do I handle the money my son earned last year? If it is under \$600 do I have to include it with my income since he is my dependent?

A - No, you don't. Regardless of age, though, if your son earned \$600 or more during the year, he must file a return of his own.

If any tax was withheld from his pay, your son must file a return to get a refund even if his earnings were under \$600.

of "Your Federal Income Tax"?

A - Get in touch with your local IRS office or write to either your District Director or the Superintendent of Documents, U. S. Printing Office, Washington, D.C. 20402. This booklet explains the individual income tax filing requirements in greater detail than the 1040 instructions. It costs 50 cents.

Q - How long has April 15 been the filing deadline for federal income tax returns?

A - It was changed by Congress in 1954. The deadline has been March 15.

Q - A strike put me out of work for some time last year. For part of the time I had strike benefits and then I was able to get unemployment insurance. Is any of this income taxable?

A - Strike benefits are generally taxable unless they are clearly intended as a gift. Unemployment are not taxable.

Q - I had an illness last year that kept me off the job from November until late February. Do I have two waiting periods to establish for my sick pay exclusion since the illness covered two years?

A - No. The waiting period applies to the time absent due to a specific illness whether it stretches from one year to another or not. There would only be another waiting period if you had returned to work and then suffered a relapse which kept you off the job again.

Q - Can I deduct the fee I paid an accountant to help me prepare my tax return?

A - Yes, you can. If, however, you are a cash-basis taxpayer, note that this expense is deductible in the year it is paid. If the accountant did this work and was paid in 1966, the expense would be deductible until 1967, when you file your 1966 return.

Q - I've heard that students get a double tax exemption. Is that right?

A - In one sense it is. A full-time student who files his own return claims an exemption for himself. If his parent provides more than one half his

support then the parent may also claim an exemption for him providing other dependency tests are met.

Q - I am separated from my husband. Which tax table should I use when I file my return?

A - For tax purposes, you are considered married if there has been no divorce or legal separation by the end of your taxable year. Therefore you have the choice of filing a joint return with your husband and using Tax Table B or of filing a separate return and using Tax Table C.

Q - I got a refund on my state tax last year. Is that considered income that has to be reported?

A - If you itemized your deductions last year including the total you paid in state tax, then you have to list the refund as income. If you took the standard deduction last year then you don't treat the tax refund as reportable income.

Q - Where can I find out about retirement income credit? I think I qualify.

A - This is explained on page B-3 of the instructions for Schedule B of Form 1040. These instructions are included in some 1040 packages. Copies are available at local IRS offices.

Q - We suffered several minor casualty losses last year. Does the \$100 deductible apply to each one or to the sum of our losses?

A - The \$100 deductible applies to each separate casualty.

Q - Our daughter was married during the Christmas holidays. Will we be able to claim her as a dependent for 1965 even though she is now married?

A - If you furnished more than one-half the support of your daughter for the entire calendar year, you may claim her as a dependent unless she files a joint return with her husband, provided the gross-income and citizenship tests are met. If she files jointly, you may not claim her exemption.

Q - I qualify as unmarried head of household. Which tax table should I use?

A - If your adjusted gross income is less than \$5000 and you do not claim itemized deductions, use Table B on page 13 of the 1040 instruction book-

let; otherwise, use Schedule III on page 11.

Q - I retired last year after 30 years of government service on a disability pension. Is this taxable to me? I'm 58 years old.

A - Yes, although a disability pension received before the normal retirement age may qualify for the sick pay exclusion. Since U. S. Civil Service employees may retire at age 60 with 30 years of service, your pension qualifies as sick pay and up to \$100 a week may be excluded from income. When you reach age 60 your pension will be treated as an annuity for tax purposes.

Q - Just what do you mean by gross income?

A - Any income that the law specifically does not exempt from taxation is gross income. For example, Social Security pensions are expressly made tax exempt by law, and therefore are not added in when figuring gross income.

Q - When you are counting the waiting period for sick pay, do you include the weekends?

A - You count them unless the illness began on a weekend. Then you start your waiting period with the next work day.

Q - Is there any situation where partners in a business could file a joint return with each other?

A - No. The partnership will have to file partnership Form 1065, reporting its income and expenses. Each individual partner has to file his own Form 1040, showing his share of the partnership net income. He may, of course, file his individual return jointly with his wife.

Q - Do you have to be married to claim the child care deduction?

A - No. Women who are single, married, widowed, divorced, or deserted; as well as men who widowed, divorced, legally separated, or those whose wives are incapacitated or in-

stitutionalized may use this provision of the tax law.

Q - If you claim this deduction, use Form 2441 to compute the amount of your deduction.

Q - I am a housewife and have no Social Security number. Last year I received a little money from my uncle's estate and opened up a separate account. Do I need a Social Security number and do I have to report this income since it is under \$600.

A - The law requires you to have a Social Security number for tax purposes if you received \$10 or more in interest from your account during the year. An application for a number may be obtained from any Internal Revenue Service or Social Security office.

Q - Is there any deduction at all for the college tuition costs I pay for my son?

A - Present tax law does not allow a deduction for this purpose. However, if you borrow money to pay the tuition you may deduct the interest charges.

Q - I'm self-employed and don't need a Social Security number. Why should I bother to get one just for my tax return?

A - The law requires that each taxpayer have a tax account identifying number. For individuals, the Social Security numbering system is used.

Besides the penalty you may have to pay for not having a number on your tax return, no refund check can be issued without this identification.
