#### 30 minutes. Drain the mixture. Replace the screens and nozzles. Fill the tank one-half full with one part household ammonia to 49 parts of water. Circulate this mixture through the pump and bypass, allowing a small amount to leak out through the nozzles.

Let the solution stay in the sprayer overnight and run it through the nozzles. Flush with two full tanks of clean water with the nozzles removed. Dry moisture from the tank, hose, and boom, and coat with a light coating of rust inhibitor or motor oil. Fill the pump with a thin motor oil and plug all openings with pipe plugs. The pump may also be stored by submerging it in a container filled
