

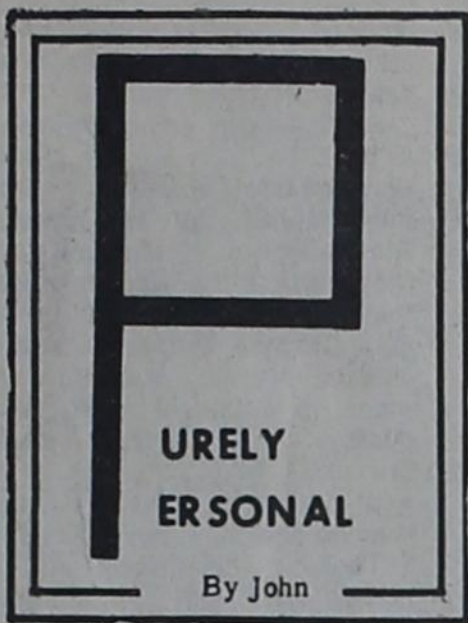

The ill-advised Vietnam Moratorium Day demonstrations are over and as usual the electronic media prominently played up the radicals, the pinkos and the plain nuts. Very little was put on TV about the many patriotic demonstrations supporting the country and the administration.

Unfortunately, we must say, many of the large metropolitan papers were also guilty of this omission. The Amarillo Daily News has a very conservative editor in Wes Izzard; he always writes a good conservative column. But we have noticed that whoever is in charge of the front page make

up evidently does not consult with Wes when it comes to choosing either page one pictures or stories. We think that in the issue of October 16 the Daily News missed the boat in reporting on the infamous moratorium.

In contrast to the Amarillo Daily News front page, the Lubbock Avalanche Journal ran a four column picture in full color showing four students waving American flags and standing in front of a fence painted red, white and blue. On the fence was the inscription, "America, love it or leave it!" There was also a good sized story right under the picture about the many counter protests in Lubbock. Adjacent to the counter protest story was another picture, not in color, of a group of protestors listening to a lecture on the campus of Texas Tech.

The pictorial evidence of the different stripe of youngsters waving the American flag and the crummy looking types sitting listening to a moratorium harangue is certainly overwhelming. This is the kind of equal and obvious comparison that we like to see. Too bad the TV moguls keep up such a slanted view of American patriots.

Many are the things that upset the well-laid plans of mice and newspaper editors -- this week it was the aftermath of the Amazing Mets' victory in the World Series.

In picking games for the Merchants Football Contest, the editor takes into account the different time zones in which the various professional clubs play. We do this so that we are sure of getting the final scores early enough on Sunday morning to let us score the weekly contest. Monday morning sees a parade of interested contestants coming or phoning about the contest outcome. We do not like to disappoint them.

## Rains Continue In Area

Rain in the amount of 3.10 inches had been dumped on the Texico-Farwell area by early Wednesday morning. Rains began Monday night, continued at intervals through Tuesday, and began in earnest again about 2 a.m. Wednesday. At press time the storm clouds were still dumping water on the already-drenched area.

Farmers in the area have mixed emotions about the generous rainfall, depending on whether they have more wheat acreage or if they have row crops still to be harvested. The rains are a great boon to the wheat farmers, but at the same time, sorghum crop farm-

ers who have not completed harvest are watching the weather with a wary eye. The rain alone will do little damage to the sorghum crops; however, should a freeze follow closely on the heels of the rain, most of the grain crops will be down on the ground making it difficult to harvest later.

Cotton in this area was heavily damaged by the early freeze which came two weeks ago. However, any cotton which has begun to open prior to the rainy weather will have the lint damaged by the rain.

The rainfall has been general throughout the Panhandle of Texas and in Eastern New Mexico.

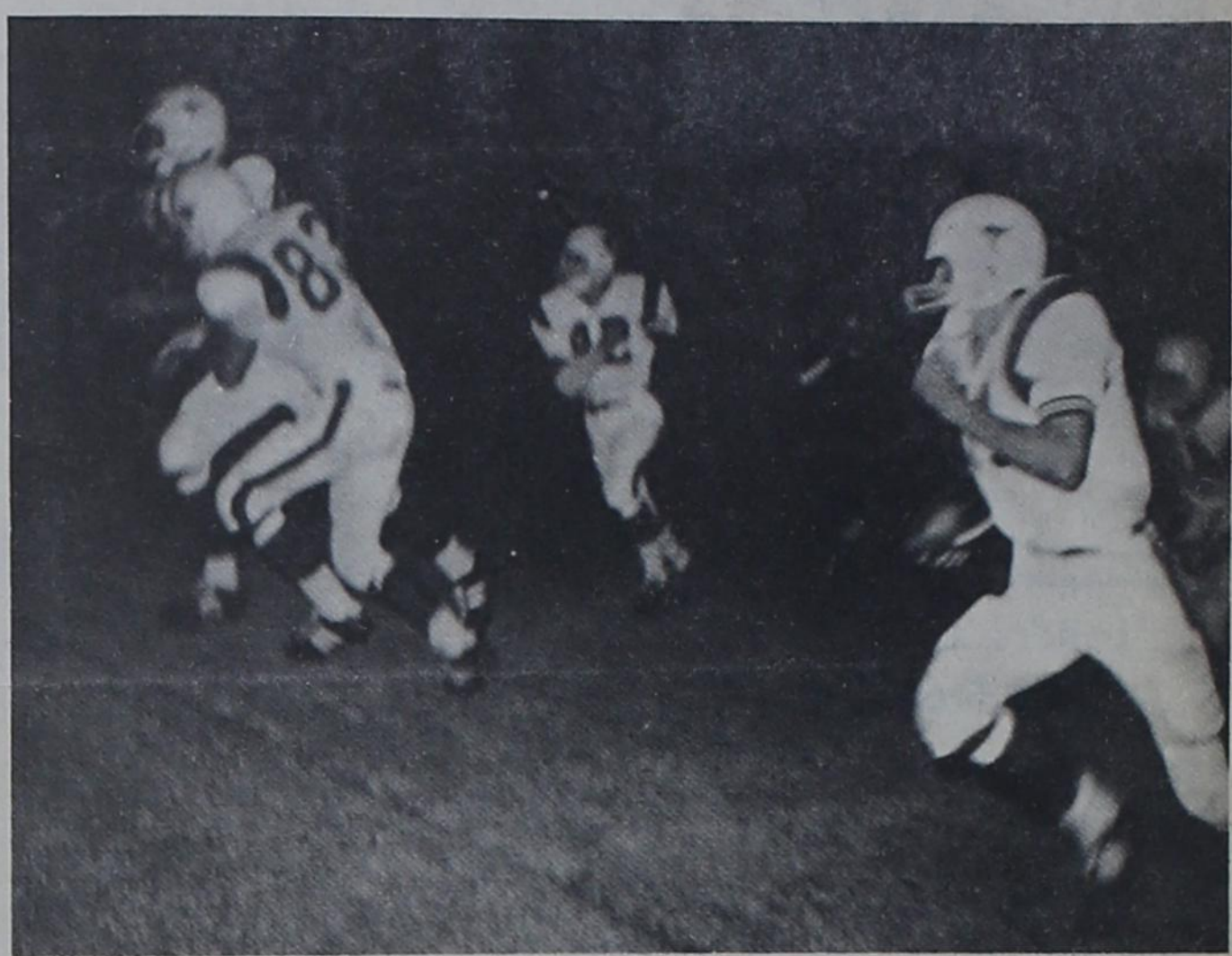
### Score One For The Horse

Mike Greer, Farmer County Highway Patrolman, has a story which would do for any "believe it or not" column, but one which is none the less true. "Seeing is believing," said Greer.

Early Monday morning Greer was called to the area southeast of Friona on FM 2397 to investigate an accident involving two horses and a Thunderbird automobile.

According to Greer, the Thunderbird, driven by Jack Thomas Jackson of Plainview, an employee of Missouri Beef Packers, was attacked by one of a pair of sorrel horses as it was being driven down the highway.

The story goes like this: As Jackson approached the area southeast of Friona on his way to work, two sorrel horses appeared alongside the road. ## Steers Stomp Wolverines

A fired-up herd of Farwell Steers trounced the Springlake Wolverines Friday night in the first district tilt of the season for both clubs. The Steers ran up a 20-6 halftime lead and went on to win by a score of 34-12. Greg Hargrove was back in fine form after missing last week's contest with an ankle injury. He completed 8 of 13 passes for 75 yards and one touchdown and scrambled for another.

Mark Williams led the receivers with 33 yards on three

receptions. Gary Erwin paced the ground attack with 87 yards followed by Barry Williams with 74. Special credit should also be given the Steers fine defensive corps as they gave the offense the ball seven times on four interceptions and three fumble recoveries, scored one touchdown and set up another in addition to holding the powerful Springlake club to only 12 points.

Play began on the Farwell 31-yard line following an 18-yard runback of the opening kickoff by Danny Prince. With

the Steer line opening good holes in the Wolverine's defense, Farwell powered to the Springlake nine in ten plays. Danny Prince found running room and scampered into the end zone to put the Steers out in front. Bob Wiman's kick was good and Farwell led 7-0 with 8:53 remaining in the first period.

Following the kickoff, Hoyt Glasscock came in to direct the Springlake offense. The Wolverines gained the midfield stripe before the Farwell defense held and forced the punt. On the first play from scrimmage, Steve Sanderson scrambled on a Steer fumble on the ten to regain possession for the Wolverines. Three plays later, Glasscock scrambled seven yards for the first Wolverine points. The snap was fumbled on the conversion attempt and Frank Galvan and Bob Wiman broke through to smear the holder before he could reset the ball, maintaining a 7-6 edge for the Steers.

Farwell was unable to gain the necessary yardage following the kick and they were forced to punt. On the second play from scrimmage, a surprised Glasscock watched rover Frank Galvan intercept his lateral and race 30 yards for the second Steer tally. Wiman's kick was true and Farwell led 14-6 with 3:39 remaining in the first period of play.

The kick was returned to the Springlake 40 by Glasscock, but the Wolverines were denied a first down and forced to punt. Dean Stovall returned the kick to the Farwell 39 where the Steers went to work. They pushed into Springlake territory, but the Wolverines regained possession when Dan Prince was jarred loose from the ball after catching a pass and Glasscock recovered. Frank Galvan again gave Farwell the ball as he fell on a fumble on the Steer 37. The Steers were unable to move, however, and were forced to punt.

The two teams then exchanged interceptions as Stovall picked off a Glasscock aerial on the Farwell 39, only to have Glasscock intercept a Hargrove toss three plays later on the Springlake 48. The Wolverines were unable to sustain a drive as

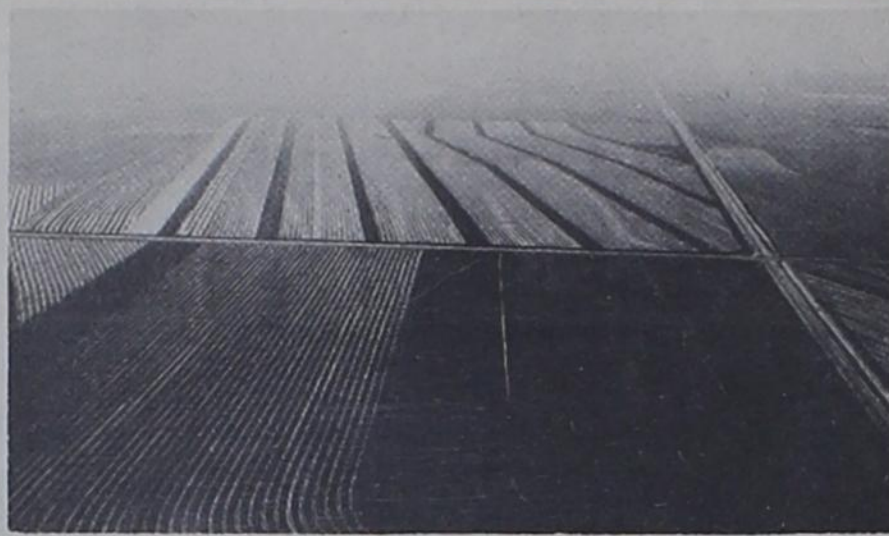

**Terraces Add To Farm Profits**

The narrow margin between costs and returns in farming presents the farmer with the problem of keeping costs sufficiently below revenue in order to provide a desirable profit. The fact that the financial position of the farmer is most often that of a debtor makes his costs and returns to capital investment of primary importance.

The investment of capital in terracing and leveling sloping fields prevents the loss of rainfall runoff moisture, and increases yields by maintaining a higher level of moisture content in the soil, thus increasing the probability of producing satisfactory crop yields. In situations where excessive rainfall runoff is the problem, terraces are constructed so as to allow safe and effective dispersion of the surplus water, thereby reducing water erosion. Terraces also serve as guidelines for contour farming. Parallel terraces reduce and sometimes completely eliminate point rows, therefore increasing the efficiency of the farmer's labor and equipment.

The cost-price squeeze of today dictates that the farmer adopt the use of technology in order to increase productivity. The adoption of parallel terraces with leveled intervals is one such alternative and must reduce per-unit costs in the ranges of output in which the farmer plans to operate. Therefore, the leveling of terrace intervals must increase productivity at least enough so that revenue will increase an amount equal to the cost of leveling allocated over a period of time.

In order to determine an increase in yield necessary to maintain the same level of net revenue for dry land grain sorghum the estimated cost of terracing and leveling is divided by the price of grain sorghum. For example on a slope of 1.5% the cost per acre for terracing and leveling amortized at 7% interest for ten years must equal the increase in net revenue brought about by their use in order to economically justify their adoption. This increase being 391 lbs. per acre

**Crane Hunt Set Nov. 1**

The Muleshoe Jaycees have scheduled their seventh annual Sandhill Crane Hunt to be Nov. 1 through Nov. 9, 1969.

The Muleshoe Jaycees have arranged again for land adjacent to the Muleshoe National Wildlife Refuge. This refuge is the oldest in the state of Texas, and during the winter months, there are as many as 100,000 sandhill crane wintering away from their arctic breeding grounds. The Muleshoe population represents the largest concentration of this species in the United States.

The Jaycees will also provide transportation to and from the hunting area. Shells and li-

censes will be available and the guides will leave the Dinner Bell Restaurant, 1700 W. American Blvd., which is hunt headquarters, one and one-half hours before sunrise each day.

Costs for the hunt are as follows: \$5.00 - Day; \$7.50 - Weekend; \$15.00 - Nov. 1 through Nov. 9.

The hunter who kills the largest bird during the hunt will receive a Remington Twelve-Gauge Automatic Shotgun.

they were forced to punt from the Farwell 39.

The ball came out to the 20 on a touchback and Farwell took over from there. Hargrove moved his troops to the Springlake four in 12 plays and then capitalized the drive by hitting Stovall in the end zone for the TD. The kick was blocked. With 40 seconds left in the half, the Steers held a 20-6 margin. Springlake moved to the Farwell 19 on a 32-yard runback, an interference penalty, and a 28-yard scamper by Glasscock. Stovall prevented the touchdown as he grabbed a Glasscock pass in the end zone with four seconds remaining and ran it out to the 20 to end the first half action.

The Wolverines moved to the Farwell 27 following the kick before Gene Sheets pounced on a Springlake fumble. The action only served to postpone the drive as Sanderson recovered a Steer fumble on the 38 four plays later. Glasscock then moved his club in to score, going 38 yards in 11 plays and carrying the final few inches himself for the TD. Stovall broke up the pass on the point after attempt, making the score 20-12.

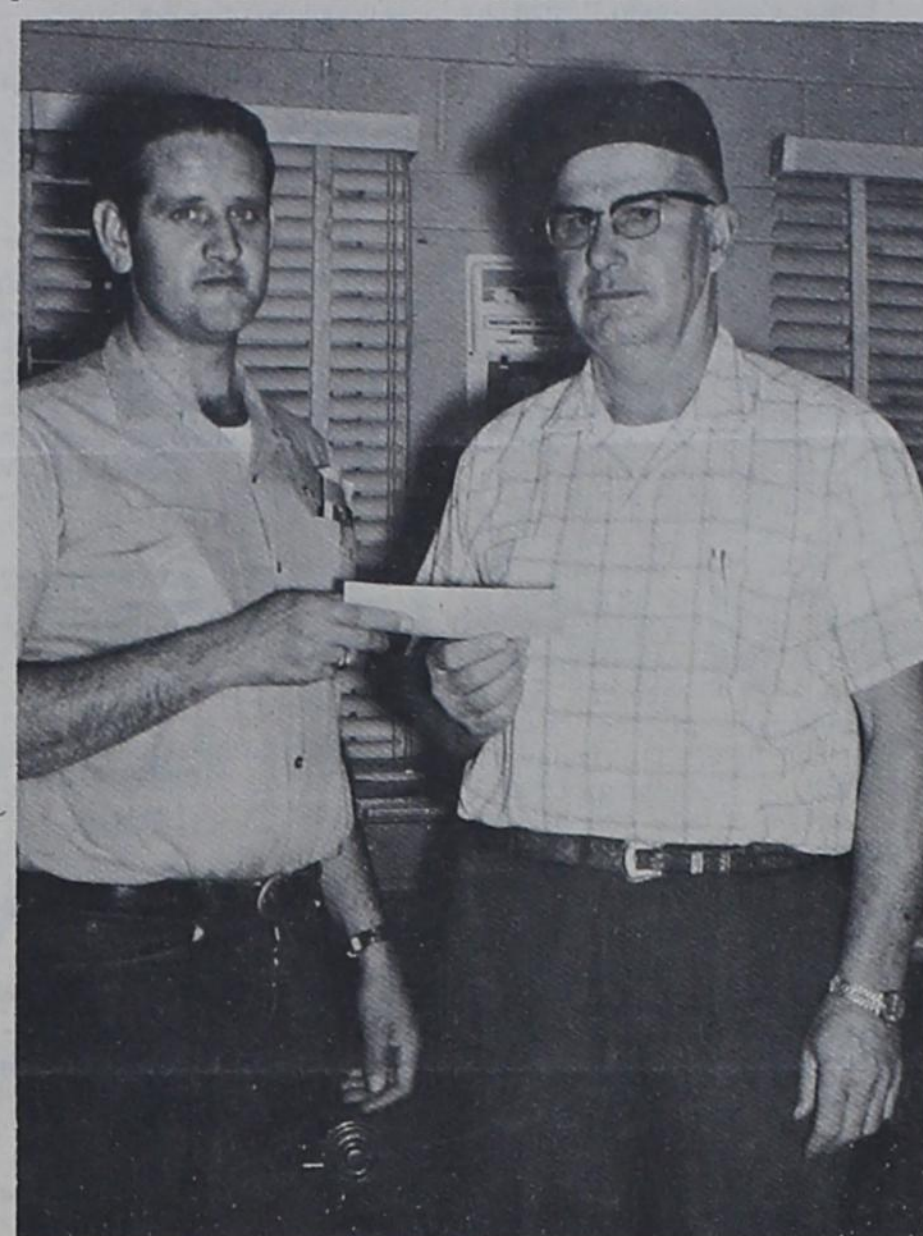
Jones, Jerry Mathis and Bill Prince.

2/3 cup sugar

Mix pumpkin, cream, egg yolks and vanilla; mix dry ingredients and add to first mixture, blend well. Pour into unbaked pie shell and place in 450 degree oven and bake 15 minutes. Lower heat to 350 degrees and continue baking for one hour. Cool and serve with whipped cream.

### An Error

The corrected recipe reads:

- 1 cup shortening
  - 2 cups sugar
  - 4 eggs
  - 1 teaspoon vanilla
  - 1 teaspoon lemon extract
  - 1 teaspoon rum extract
  - 3 cups flour
  - 1/2 teaspoon soda
  - 2 teaspoons baking powder
  - 1 teaspoon salt
  - 1 1/4 cups buttermilk
- Combine first six ingredients, mixing 1 1/2 minutes in electric mixer; sift flour, baking powder, soda and salt and add alternately with the buttermilk to first mixture. Pour into greased tube pan and bake at 375 degrees for 50-55 minutes. While cake is baking make the following topping: Bring to rolling boil 1 1/2 cups sugar and 3/4 cup water; remove from heat and add 1 teaspoon rum extract. After removing cake from oven, stab top with long-tined fork and pour topping over top of cake. Allow to cool, remove from pan and serve when desired.

# Sugar Beet Acreages Being Set For 1970

Proportionate shares (acreage allotments) will be in effect for 1970 crop sugar beets. This is necessary in order to avoid excess production. The national sugar beet acreage for 1970 has been set at 1,450,000 acres. The 1969 planted acreage was 1,660,000 acres. Texas is to have 40,784 acres in 1970. The 1970 sugar beet program includes the following basic provisions:

1. Set asides of not less than one-half of one percent of each state allocation will be made for each of the three categories -- new producers, adjustments in initial farm proportionate shares and appeals.

2. Proportionate share allotment areas (such as a territory served by one or more beet sugar companies, a county or a group of counties) will be established at the option of the State ASCS Committee.

3. If allotment areas are involved, a base acreage for each area will be established by using one of the following:

a. The larger of 70 percent of the area's 1969 accredited acreage plus 30 percent of the area's 1967-68 average accredited acreage during any of the years 1965 through 1969.

b. The area's largest accredited acreage during any of the years of 1965 through 1969.

c. Seventy-nine percent of the area's 1969 accredited acreage plus 30 percent of its 1967-68 average acreage.

d. Such other formula selected by the State committee the need for which is justified to and approved by the Deputy Administrator, State and County Operations, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, for application to one or more of the area's accredited acreage records during the years of 1965 through 1969.

4. Area bases shall be factored to the State Allocation less the set-asides.

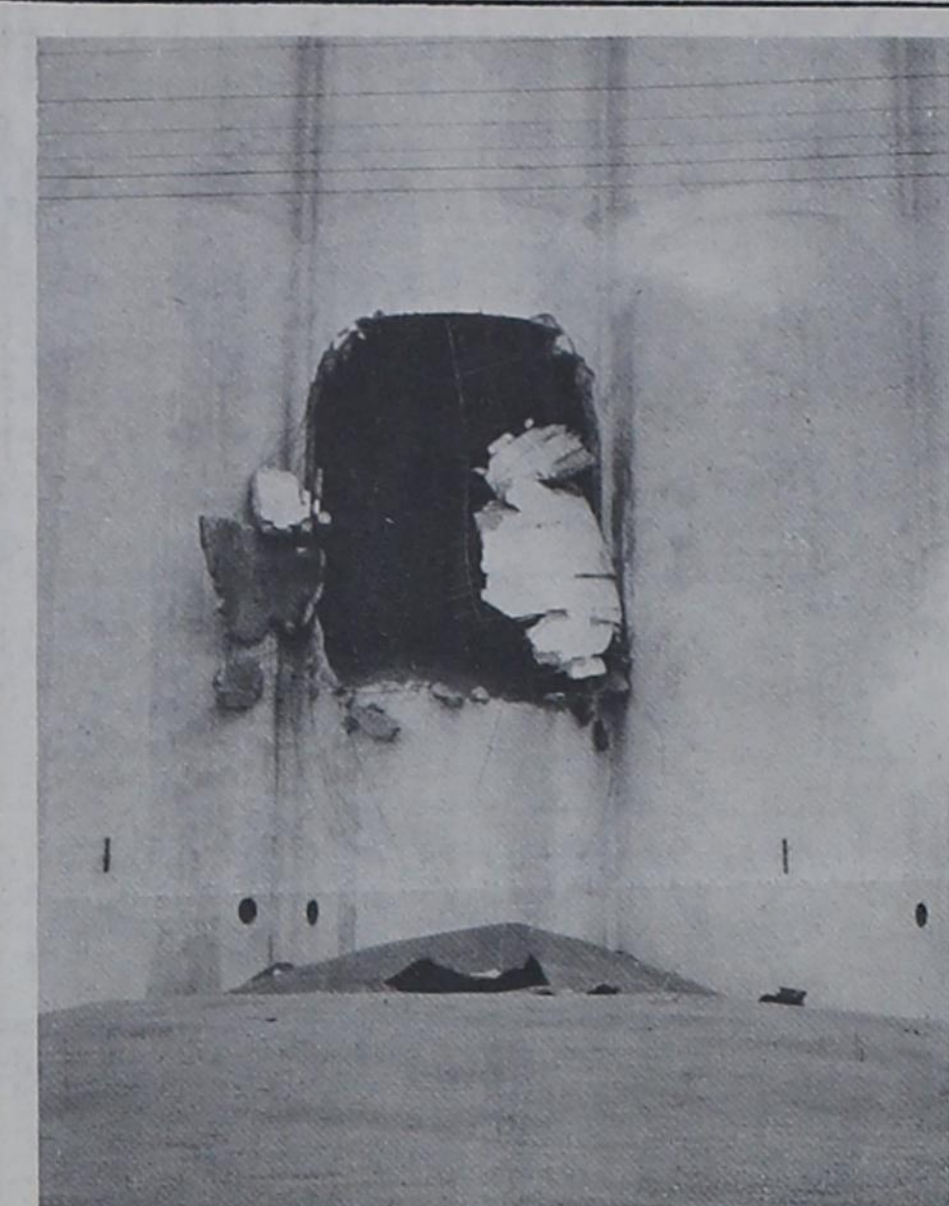
5. Individual farm bases will be established within each area of a state or within each state if areas are not established by use of one of the methods in Item 3 for establishing area allotments, as selected by the State Committee. In land history regions, the history of the farm (as constituted for 1970) will be used. In regions where the personal history of farm operators is permitted under the Sugar Act, and is used,

farm bases will be calculated by using such personal records or a combination of land and personal history.

6. Initial farm proportionate shares will be established by factoring farm bases to area allotments less the set-asides or, where areas are not created, to the State Allocation less the set-asides. Where appropriate, adjustments will be made in such shares.

7. Marketing within proportionate shares is one of the conditions that a producer must meet to qualify for Sugar Act Payments.

8. A producer desiring a sugar beet proportionate share (allotment) must file an application for such acreage with the ASCS Office maintaining his farm records. Applications may be filed at anytime during the period October 27 through November 21, 1969.

### On The Farm In Parmer County

**CROP SURVEY**  
The annual survey, basis for the official crop production estimates for Texas and each of its counties, will soon be underway. This is an important survey since the information gathered is used for many purposes. Certain farmers and ranchers in Parmer County will be among the 35,000 in Texas receiving a questionnaire.

If the sprayer is powered with a gas engine, drain fuel tank and carburetor and pour a tablespoon of engine oil through the spark plug hole. Turn motor over by hand to distribute oil on cylinder walls. Proper care of equipment will extend the period of trouble free operation.



Those who receive the questionnaire are urged to complete it as soon as possible and return it to the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service, Box 70, Austin, Texas 78767. Accuracy in completing the questionnaire is stressed.

The survey is a joint responsibility of the Texas Department of Agriculture and the U. S. Department of Agriculture's Statistical Reporting Service. Cary D. Palmer is the state statistician and his office will be mailing the questionnaires.

**CARE OF EQUIPMENT**  
Proper care of pesticide application equipment prior to winter storage will prevent deterioration and insure its working condition for next season's use.

First, the equipment should be thoroughly cleaned. Flush with clean water; remove all strainers, screens and nozzles and wash them in kerosene using a soft brush.

Mix a medium size box of wash-day detergent and 30 gallons of water in the sprayer tank. Circulate this mixture through the bypass pressure regulator and jet agitator for 30 minutes. Drain the mixture. Replace the screens and nozzles. Fill the tank one-half full with one part household ammonia to 49 parts of water. Circulate this mixture through the pump and bypass, allowing a small amount to leak out through the nozzles.

Let the solution stay in the sprayer overnight and run it through the nozzles. Flush with two full tanks of clean water with the nozzles removed. Dry moisture from the tank, hose, and boom, and coat with a light coating of rust inhibitor or motor oil. Fill the pump with a thin motor oil and plug all openings with pipe plugs. The pump may also be stored by submerging it in a container filled with a light motor oil.

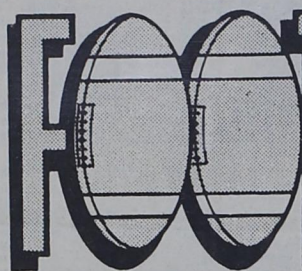
