Wave of the future

Wave of the Future Well, it's arrived, folks, the wave of the future. Right here at the ol' State Line Tribune.

I've been in newspapering for 25 years and the fourth technological change has just arrived. I'm getting too old for all this upheaval.

When I began in the business, we used what was called hot type." Metal bars were melted down in 2000 fahrenheit temperatures and cast into lead lines. Then, about 22 years ago, a breakthrough was made and newspapers went to "cold type." The old metal machines were done away with and a punched tape was used by early computers.

A few years later came another change. The tape was discarded and replaced by photographic film. Thus, a story was typed in a computer which placed the images on film. This film was pushed through a chemical processor which developed it-a lot like that which you would use for your

This latter process is used by most newspapers but the past 18 months have seen the development of a new system which makes it obsolete: it's called "Desktop Publishing.'

And we bought a Desktop Publishing system last Friday.

Oh, boy! I sure hope I can figure it out. The wave of the future has arrived in the Twin Cities, and it's one of the few new systems in the area. There's one in Canyon, Texas, but I don't know of any others-yet.

The system, put out by a Kansas company, includes three basic units: a laser writer, a computer and a screen. We've bought two computers and two screens since we have two people typing at the same time.

Under the old method, the reporter would write a story on plain paper. It would be edited and then given to the typesetter to retype it on photographic film in the computer.

Thus, the same story would be typed twice. With the new method, the reported types the story directly into the computer. The story is edited while in the computer. Then a button is pushed and it goes through the laser writer, ready to be pasted up on the page.

So you can see that a step is eliminated. The job of a typesetter has been made obsolete by the new technology. That's unfortunate but it happens all the time in industry today. You have got to keep

Yes, you're right.

There are different types of printing in today's newspaper stories. Please bear with us. We are trying different things with our new computer; it's similar to a shakedown

In a couple of weeks, we will run samples of the different kinds of type available to us and then get feedback from our readers. When we go over completely to the new computer, in about six weeks, we will be back to one kind of typeface throughout the paper.

We appreciate your indulgence.

The new computer system is able to produce stories, advertisements, commercial printing jobs and headlines. In other words, it can do it all. It eliminates four machines we currently use: a typesetter, a headliner, a processor, and a

And it also means we will be going with one less person. I'm lucky in that we don't have to lay off anyone. Jenine Foster, our reporter, is leaving in June; her husband, Bobby, has taken a job in Dallas.

When Jenine leaves, my wife Judy will become our reporter. Our typesetter, Betty Jean Castleberry, will become our advertising representative. And me-well, I'll just continue doing the same old things.

The reason I jumped ahead and bought this system is a financial one: these are tough economic times and if this enables us to save money, then there is no really no choice, is there? And the savings will ensure the future of this newspaper for many, many years to come. (We hope.)

Another neat thing about this new system is that it uses regular 8 1/2 x 11" paper. No longer will we have to buy special (and expensive) photographic film and chemicals to

Corn grit processing plant considered

The Farwell Chamber of Commerce asked that this letter be printed:

Dear Sir:

For several years the Texas Corn Producers Board has been working on the feasibility of construction of a corn grit processing plant within the seven county check-off area.

Just recently the Texas Corn Producers Board, in cooperation with the Texas Department of Agriculture, has completed a 3rd feasibility study for a 5,000 bushel per day processing plant to be located in the check-off area. The Texas Corn Producers Board has always believed that a superior quality of corn grits can be produced from the corn grown on the High Plains of Texas, provided strict specifications and quality control is maintained on the

Our feasibility study definitely bears this out. The underlying reason for pursuing the feasibility of construction of a corn grit processing plant was to provide a market for the production of a corn grit processing plant was to provide a market for the producers in the

seven county check-off area.

The 5,000 bushel per day processing plant would only take care of approximately 4% of the corn produced in the check-off area. The Texas Corn Producers Board would like to insure, however, that each producer in the area have a fair share of providing corn for the proposed plant, as well as each present elevator or handler of corn to have an opportunity to construct the corn grit plant.

The feasibility report is predicated on adjacent storage and drying facilites. The estimated cost of a 5,000 bushel per day grind facility would be \$5,000,000. If your firm or association would be seriously interested in constructing, owning and oeprating the proposed corn grit plant, please contact me, and arrangements will be made for you to view the feasibility study

Cornea total sets record

The Lions Hi-Plains Eye Bank of District 2-T1, Inc. in Amarillo helped collect a record number of corneas for transplant in the United States and Canada in 1986, according to figures released by the Eye Bank Association of America

(EBAA) today. The EBAA report shows that in 1986 the 103 eye banks in the U.S. and Canada supplied 31,340 corneas for transplants to help restore sight. In addition, 29,089 eyes and corneas were used for research and teaching programs. Another 7,387 corneas were provided for epikeratophakia, a surgical procedure that corrects refractive errors for patients with high degree of vision loss.

Locally, the Hi-Plains Eye Bank collected 51 eyes and corneas in 1986. 21 were supplied for transpaint, and 3 eyes were used for research and teaching. "We are very pleased with the local and national trends" Virgil James, President of the Eye Bank said. "I feel it is due to the education of the public, and the required request law that is being passed in many areas."

"The amount of eye donations obtained in 1986 was a 22 percent increase over the previous high collected in 1985." Jay H. Krachmer, M.D., EBAA chairman of the board, pointed out as he released the report. "However, despite this progress, between 3,500 and 5,000 Americans still are waiting for transplants because of a shortage of donations."
