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Coming on a real world tragedy

(Editor's note: Awhile back, the Tribune asked Navy Lt. Commander Will Anderson, son of Bob and Carrie Anderson of Farwell, to periodically write about his experiences aboard ship.

Currently, he is assigned as a staff materiel officer for Destroyer Squadron 25, homeported in Hawaii. Seven ships normally are assigned to it - a destroyer, two guided missile destroyers and four frigates.)

After leaving the Philippines on Friday the 13th, (defying a curse, sailors tend to be a superstitious lot too!), our Task Group proceeded to the Gulf of Siam and Thailand.

The seas were flat and hot, for a change, and USS Ramsey and USS Elliot made good time. On Feb. 18, we anchored in a small city named Pattaya, south of Bangkok. Also anchoring there were USS Barbel (a diesel powered attack submarine), USNS Catawba (a fleet tug), and USNS Ponchatoula (our fuel and

replenishment ship).

("USS" means a ship is crewed by a full complement of U.S. Navy sailors. "USNS" means that the ship's master and most of the crew are civilian mariners under contract, working with a small complement of naval personnel onboard).

We went to Thailand to participate in a joint exercise with the Royal Thai Navy called Sea-Siam 87-1. The amphibious battle group, the five ships of Task Group 76.3 who participated in the operations in the Bering Sea, arrived later and ran a large amphibious operation named Valient Usher north of us.

But first, we were given five days to see Thailand and to meet the people. I have not dropped the anchor in Thailand in almost 10 years and it was great to be back. We were hosted by the Royal Thai Navy Commander in Chief, Admiral Thep, and the crew was eager to take the opportunity to get ashore again. Pattaya is a very popular

The Texico City Council Tuesday tabled variance requests to allow two businesses in the community.

Betty Pierce is seeking to open a beauty shop in the 500 block of Florence. And Red Pierce is seeking to open a small engine repair shop in the 100 block of Avenue E.

In other business, the council: --Agreed to hire Chuck Fry for 2 1/2 days to help Billy Hammit with city cleanup work.

--Decided to have contractor Johnny Eastwood give estimates on street repairs. Mentioned were Catherine, Lamar, Griffin and Anderson.

--Approved a curb and gutter ordinance. The major change calls for a representative of the city to be on hand when a resident makes a cut in his curb.

--Discussed the new water well. It has been fixed three times since being installed. The council will keep a watch on it.

--Heard resident Dub Howard point out the problem of a blocked drainage ditch along State Line Road near Helton Oil. It was reported that Texas is responsible for maintaining the road north of the highway, and New Mexico is responsible for maintaining it south of the highway.

Howard said Parmer County Commissioner Robert White said he would take care of the problem. Howard said the blockage was causing a deterioration of the street. The council authorized city employees to clear junk from the ditch to ease the clearing by Texas.

--Told Mrs. Larry Bryant, of Anderson Street, that the cleanup of her property has gone well. The cleanup had been asked for at the last meeting.

Police to check three-wheelers

The problem of youngsters riding three-wheelers on city streets and in adjacent ditches was discussed at Tuesday's Texico City Council meeting.

One resident spoke of youngsters shooting across State Line Road near Helton Oil in front of vehicles.

The city marshal will be asked to keep a close watch on that area and others, and take appropriate action against youths violating state law (driving off-the-road vehicles on public thoroughfares).

The Texico School Board Monday named two new principals, both of whom will serve on a part-time basis.

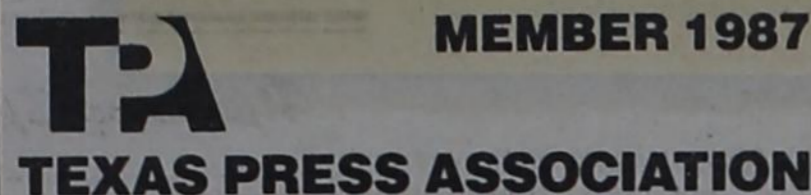
David Lynn, a high school instructor, also will be the elementary principal. He will continue to coach high school football, but not track.

## ENMR shows large growth

The election of directors did not go quite as the nominations committee for ENMR Telephone Cooperative planned.

The committee had nominated Bruce Runyan and Earl Teel to represent District 4 & 5, but Mike Teeter of Fort Sumner made a successful bid for election. Teeter made the point there are now 1953 telephones in the Fort Sumner district, but they have no representation on the board of directors. Teeter drew a large contingent of Fort Sumner residents to the meeting where he unseated Earl Teel.

Elected to the Board of Directors were Ralph Lofton, Bruce Runyan, Travis Wood, Walt Eastland, and Mike Teeter.

Those present at the cooperative's annual meeting which was held on April 25, 1987 at Clovis High School, heard that ENMR does not foresee any local rate increase this year, but AT&T will have three increases.

Out of state access rates will go up .60 on July 1st, and there will be two later increases (one .60 and another .30).

Bruce Runyan reported that ENMR Telephone Cooperative had grown from 800 subscribers in 1950 to 9000 subscribers today. "We are no longer just a telephone company, but are now in the telecommunications business," he said.

A new operator center serves this area.

ENMR leases its fiberoptic and microwave facilities to AT&T. It also leases its computer to other companies for billing purposes. Runyan reported.

Robert Harris, ENMR's manager, reported that ENMR Telephone Coop spent \$800,000 to construct its microwave and fiberoptic lines this year, but they can lease those lines to AT&T for \$500,000 per year.

ENMR also has a request from GTE Spring for a similar

contract, but it cannot fulfill that request at this time. "We have had to spend money to earn money this year," said Harris.

"Our costs have risen, but we are sound. A payment to the FCC in late December distorted our figures to make it look like we are in financial trouble, but it looks worse than it really is," said Harris as he invited members to inspect ENMR's financial statements.

Bruce Runyan noted that two of ENMR Telephone Co.'s

original loans were paid off this year, but the bulk of the money owed has been borrowed since 1975.

President of the Board, Ed Sommerall, noted that "Local service was our first priority. Due to REA's low interest rates, we borrowed money to get to subscribers who never had service before. Without REA financing, we couldn't work. REA financing is necessary. We still need to increase service to new customers."

"Some legislators in more urban areas do not realize that we still have people who need service," he added. There is pressure to put telephone service on a cost per user basis.

Sommerall reported that ENMR Telephone had started ETSC as a wholly-owned subsidiary to handle their long distance service and the sale of equipment.

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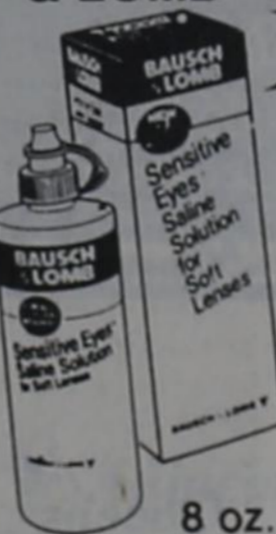
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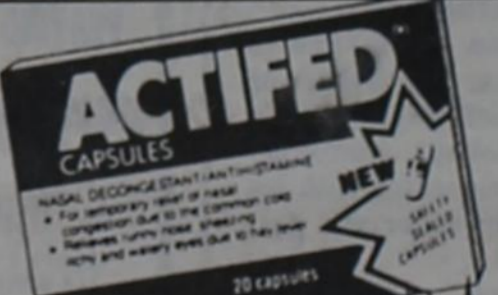

### Firefighters receive money

The Texas Forest Service, at a special ceremony in Muleshoe Monday, presented a check to the city of Farwell as its share for the cost of the Farwell Fire Department's new WEPS (water expansion system) unit.

The new unit can be used to fight small fires and is highly effective. It uses little water, but rather a soapy material to douse kitchen fires, for example.

The Farwell firefighters also are involved in a new Panhandle Fire Fighters Association.

The Texas Forest Service is doing a survey on the possibility of building a communication system. The main topic of Monday's meeting was the feasibility of building a tower with a repeat system. The tower would transmit information to other area departments, if help was needed in emergency situations. This plan would be a mutual aid benefit to all area fire fighters, in Texas, and New Mexico.

A committee was appointed by

Jack Dunham, fire chief at Muleshoe, to work with a radio man from the Texas Forest Service on a 8-12 month study on the possibility of a communication service. The study will include looking at the cost, location and wattage of a relay station and a tower. If this is feasible, a system will be designed and a price estimate given.

If the president and members of the Panhandle Fire Fighters Association agree to go ahead with the communication service, the Texas Forest Service, with federal funds, will share the cost.

The next meeting was set for June 1 at Muleshoe.

### Recipe of Week

#### Cherry Crisp

1/3 c. flour 3/4 c. rolled oats  
1/3 c. margarine 2/3 c. sugar 1 16 oz can pitted sour cherries 1 1/2 TBS. cornstarch 1/8 TSP. cinnamon 1/8 TSP. nutmeg 1 TBS. lemon juice

Combine the flour and rolled oats. Cut in the margarine until the mixture is crumbly; mix in 1/3 cup of the sugar. Set aside for topping.

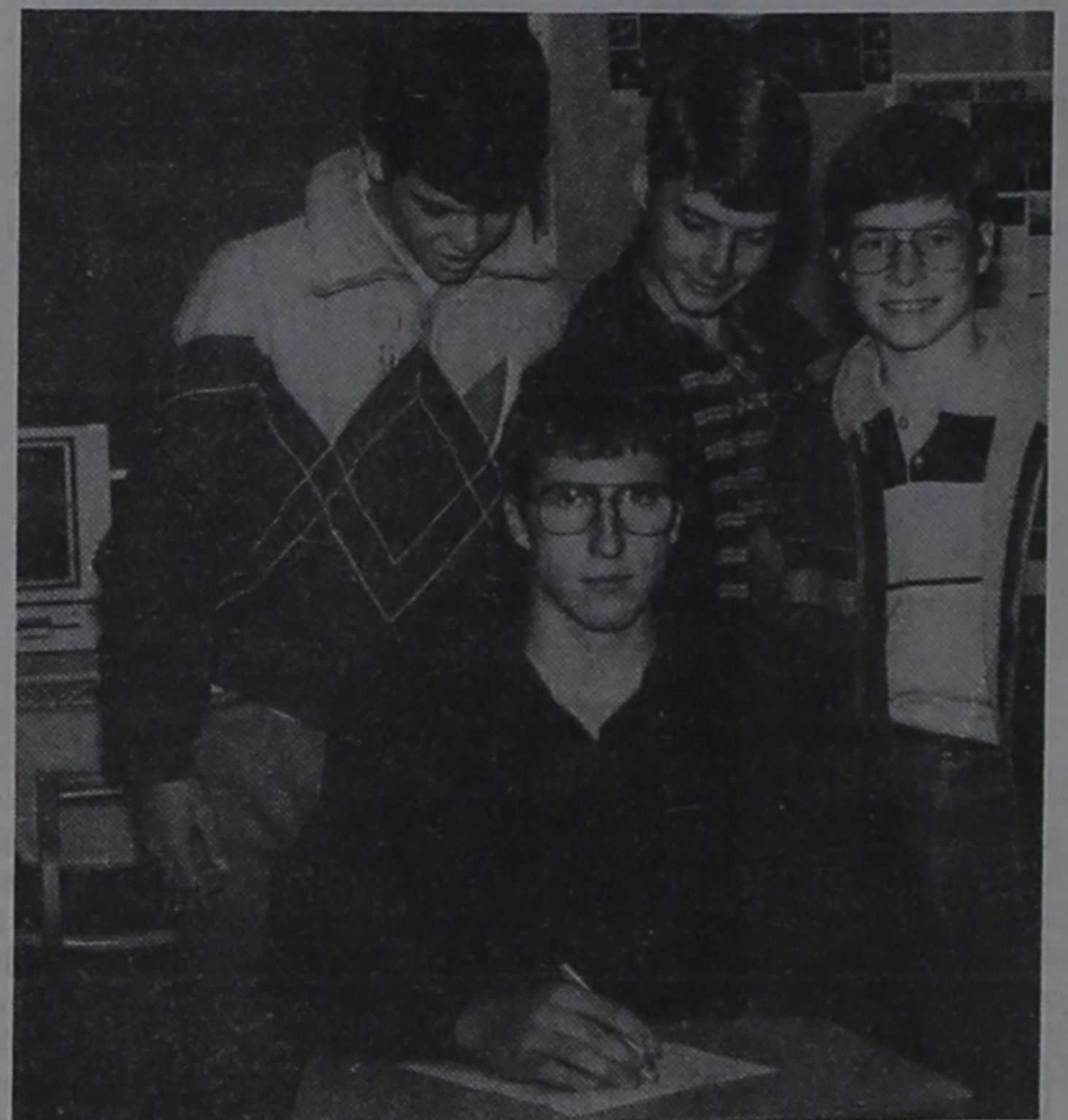
Drain the cherries reserving the juice. Combine the remaining sugar with the cornstarch, spices and lemon juice; slowly blend in the cherry juice.

Cook over low heat stirring constantly, until the sauce is thick and clear. Add the cherries. Pour into a greased 8- inch square baking pan. Sprinkle with the topping.

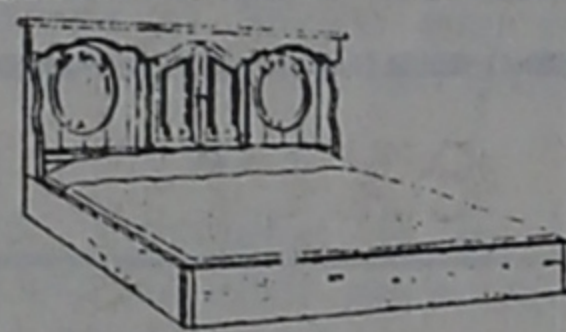

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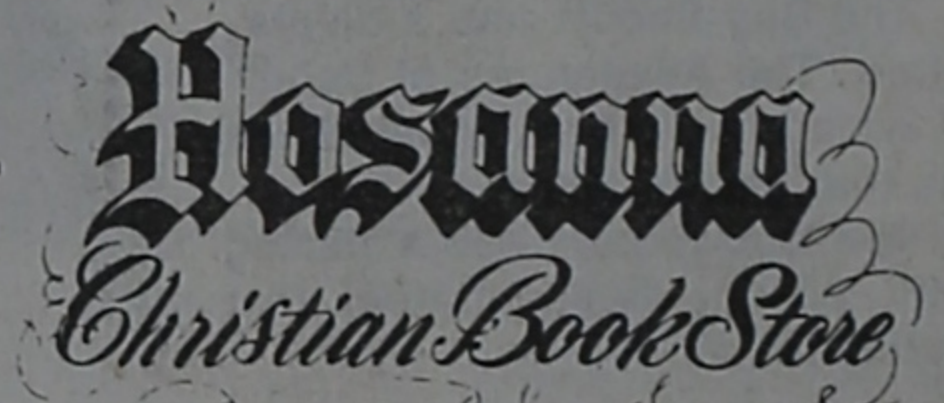

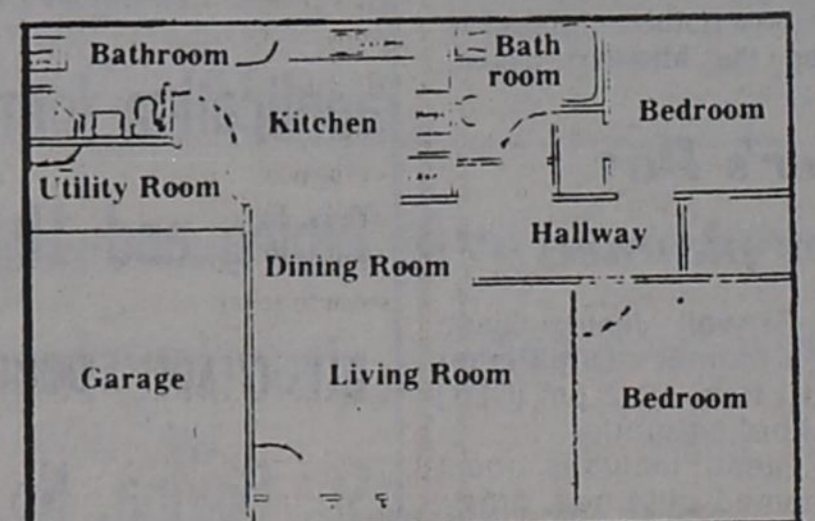

resort and we met people from throughout Asia, Australia, and Europe. I also met a couple of Americans who came to Southeast Asia during the Vietnam War who got out of the service after it ended and stayed here.

We got underway for Sea Siam and joined up the His Majesty's Thai Ships (HTMS) who would participate with us. They were HTMS Rattanakosin, HTMS Chronburi, HTMS Tapi, and HTMS Prabaparapak. I thought they were difficult to pronounce, but with Ponchatoula and Catawba with us, we were in no position to throw stones. The operation, from Feb. 23-28, involved the "Blue Forces" (the good guys) trying to defend Ponchatoula from attack by the "Orange Forces" (the bad guys).

Commodore McKenna, my boss, was Commander of Orange Forces, and we, the 15 members of his staff, were his faithful assistants. Our assets consisted of Catawba, Prabaparapak, and Chonburi, simulating missile launching patrol boats. We also had Barbel, for the submarine threat, and jet attack fighters flying out of an air base in Thailand for the air threat.

The air threat consisted of Thai F-5 fighter and USN A-4 Skyhawk attack jets. The officer in charge of the American air detachment was Lt. Maggie Yarlott of Fleet Composite Squadron 5. She brought 8 other pilots to Thailand from the Philippines (including one other female pilot) to simulate enemy tactics and missile profiles.

VC-5, her squadron, is used to train the men in the cockpits of U.S. jets and in the Combat Information Centers of U.S. ships what to expect from enemy action. Current regulations prevent her from being assigned to a combat squadron, which seems ironic, since she is training the men who fly in those squadrons. Lt. Yarlott and her companion pilots did an outstanding job of not only providing a realistic

training opportunity for us in simulated strikes and air combats, but they also worked closely with the Royal Thai fighters. And interoperability was one of the primary goals of the whole operation.

Back on the ships, a number of personnel had been "cross-decked" - swapping Thai officers and enlisted for Americans. Naval operations of any size are difficult and working with a foreign navy makes it even more so, especially if you do not share a common language. The Thai ships ability to operate and coordinate with us in a language foreign to them was impressive. It was particularly so when we had simultaneous attacks being simulated from the surface, air, and sub-surface.

In the midst of all the "war at sea", USS Elliot came across a real world tragedy. With the expansion of Vietnam since 1975, the flow of refugees from beneath Communist rule (the "boat people") has continued to be a flood.

The officer of the Deck onboard Elliot saw a small fishing vessel in the distance signalling distress. Elliot closed them and found 17 people (5 men, 5 women, and 7 children less than 6-years-old) in a tiny wooden fishing boat. They were out of fuel, low on food and water, and had to bail the boat constantly due to leaks. It was determined that if not assisted, they would probably, all die. They were taken onboard, examined, bathed, and given clean clothes. Meanwhile, their boat had to be sunk because an abandoned vessel is a hazard to navigation to other ships.

Elliot sailors donated clothes and gave up free time taking turns watching after our new guests. A sleeping area was prepared for them below, but during the day they were happiest under a tent that was designed for them by draping a tarp over the after 5-inch cannon.

They were safe and they were well fed and the children all had new

dolls and teddy-bears (donated by sailors who had bought them for their own children back home). Ramsey had a Vietnamese petty officer named Nguyen who had escaped from Vietnam the same way with his family in 1978, and he came over to Elliot to help the doctor with the daily examinations. He also translated for them during the church services (they were Catholic).

Our guests rode with us all the way to our next port-of-call, Subic Bay, Philippines, where they were taken by a refugee organization. But while they were onboard, Elliot felt like she had done something good and worthwhile.

Many of the boat people are not found by friendly ships, though - they are victimized by pirates. With five decades of warfare in the area, there is no shortage of weapons, ammunition, and even smaller calibre cannon. The pirates tend to attack only smaller craft, unlikely to be armed, and their heavily armed speed boats cannot be outrun by most.

They have even boarded a couple of super tankers coming through the Malacca Straits with grappling hooks and swarmed aboard with machine guns to rob the ship's safe and crew. When they catch a smaller boat with women and children onboard they do much worse than steal. The prospect of finding a boat with corpses in it is always a black possibility.

When the operation ended, we anchored in Sattahip for the final briefs and the exchange of handshakes. One of the Thai officers who rode Elliot with us, LCDR Charnarong, told me he was from the capitol of Thailand, Krung Thep. I

asked him why they call it Krung Thep if we call it Bangkok and he said he didn't know - it had always been Krung Thep and he never heard of Bangkok until he met Americans.

I asked him what the Thai people call Farwell, and he said he had never heard of it! I was shocked, of course, but I can only assume that he was not attentive in his geography classes when they discussed important places.

We then set our courses for Subic Bay, and arrived March 6. We have been here for a week now and go next to a big operation with the South Koreans. I will write more about that when it's completed.

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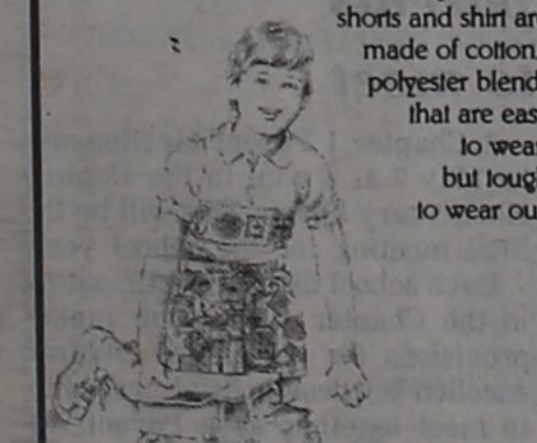

**AN ORDINANCE RELATING TO CURBING AND GUTTERS IN THE CITY OF TEXICO; ESTABLISHING FEES AND PENALTIES REGARDING SAME; AND REPEALING ALL ORDINANCES OR PARTS OF ORDINANCES IN CONFLICT HEREWITH**

1.010 Purpose: It is declared that controlling the installment, modification, and cutting of curbing and gutters in the city of Texico as described in this ordinance is conducive to the promotion of the health and general welfare of the city.

1.020 Applicability: This ordinance shall apply to all individuals, corporations, or other entities operating in the city limits of Texico, New Mexico.

1.030 Prior Approval: Every person or firm desiring to lay or cut any curbing or guttering within the corporate limits of the city upon any public street, shall prior thereto, first obtain from the city a permit to lay or cut such curbing or guttering.

1.040 Supervision: A representative of the City of Texico shall be present and shall supervise any modification or cutting of curbing and gutters in the city of Texico; such representative shall have the authority to immediately stop any such modification or cutting if he or she deems that such operation is not being conducted according to the guidelines established by the City Council for the project or projects of this type in general.

1.050 Grounds for refusal: The city commission may refuse to grant or issue a permit to build, modify, or change a curb or gutter under the provisions of this ordinance whenever it may deem such refusal in the best interest of the public; however, that no refusal shall be given without giving the person applying an opportunity to be heard on such application; and provided further, that such refusal shall require a majority vote of the members of the city commission present and voting.

1.060 Penalty: Any person or firm violating the terms of this ordinance shall be guilty of a petty misdemeanor.

1.070 Repealer: All ordinances, or parts thereof, that conflict herewith are hereby revoked and this ordinance is substituted.

1.080 Effective date: This ordinance is effective five days after publishing same.

### ORDINANCE NO. 234

AN ORDINANCE RELATING TO BUSINESS REGISTRATION AND LICENSES IN THE CITY OF TEXICO; ESTABLISHING FEES AND PENALTIES FOR SAME; AND REPEALING ALL ORDINANCES OR PARTS OF ORDINANCES IN CONFLICT HEREWITH

### CHAPTER ONE: BUSINESS LICENSE FEE

#### Sections:

- 1.010 Purpose
- 1.020 Applicability
- 1.030 Grounds for refusal
- 1.040 Fees -- Designated

1.010 Purpose: It is declared that the licensing and regulation of the occupations, businesses, trades and vocations described in this chapter are conducive to the promotion of the health and general welfare of the city.

1.020 Applicability: No occupation, profession, trade, pursuit, corporation or other business firm shall be required to pay any license pursuant to this chapter if currently paying or assessed a business registration fee pursuant to the provisions of chapter two (2) of this ordinance.

1.030 Grounds for refusal: The city commission may refuse to grant or issue a license under the provisions of this chapter to any person or firm subject to the licensing provisions, whenever it may deem such refusal for the best interest of the public; however, that no license shall be refused without giving the person applying for a license an opportunity to be heard on such application; and provided further, that such refusal shall require a majority vote of the members of the city commission present and voting.

1.040 Fees: The license fee which shall be paid to the city as a prerequisite to the conduct of the businesses named in this section shall be in the following amount:

- Carnivals \$300.00 per day
- Circuses 300.00 per day
- Fortunetellers, palm readers, mediums, phrenologists, and any other business purporting to be able to forecast the future or to influence future events 150.00 per month

- Fruit and vegetable peddlers doing business at a temporary location 25.00 per year
- Pawnshops 250.00 per year

Distress sales, which means any offer to sell to the public, or sale to the public, of goods, wares or merchandise on the implied or direct representation that such sale is in anticipation of the termination of a business at its present location or that the sale is being held other than in the ordinary course of business

### 50.00 per sale

Special sales, which are conducted as a temporary sale with goods, wares or merchandise brought into the city temporarily solely for the purpose of conducting the temporary sale 100.00 per sale

Prize fights and wrestling 100.00 per day

### CHAPTER TWO: BUSINESS REGISTRATION FEE

#### Sections:

- 2.010 Imposed Rate
- 2.020 Exemption
- 2.030 Application to do business required when
- 2.040 Annual renewal of business registration
- 2.050 Application requirements for issuance or renewal of registration
- 2.060 Effective dates and transition provisions
- 2.070 Penalty for violation

2.010 Imposed Rate: There is imposed on each place of business conducted in this city a business registration fee of twenty-five (\$25.00) dollars per year. The fee is imposed pursuant to Section 3-38-3, New Mexico Statutes Annotated 1978, as it now exists or is hereafter amended, and shall be known as the business registration fee. The business registration fee shall not be prorated for businesses conducted for a portion of the year.

2.020 Exemption: No business registration fee shall be imposed on any business which has acquired a business license pursuant to Chapter one (1) of this ordinance.

2.030 Application to do business required when: Any person or firm proposing to engage in business within the municipal limits of the city shall apply for and pay a business registration fee for each outlet, branch or location within the municipal limits of the city prior to engaging in business, unless such person is required to obtain a business license pursuant to the provisions of Chapter one (1) of this ordinance.

### CHAPTER THREE: GENERAL PROVISIONS

- 3.060 Repealer

3.010 Annual renewal of business registration or license: Prior to March 16th of each year, any person with a place of business in the city, shall apply for renewal of business registration or license with the municipal clerk.

3.020 Application requirements for issuance or renewal of registra-

tion or license: Any person filing an application for issuance or renewal of any business registration or license shall include in the application his current New Mexico Revenue Division taxpayer identification number or evidence of application for a current Revenue Division taxpayer identification number. All applications shall be in writing and shall be prepared on a form authorized by the municipal clerk.

3.030 Effective dates and transition provisions: Any person or firm commencing business within the municipal limits of the city after May 1, 1987, and having not previously paid a registration or license fee for the year 1987, shall apply for and pay a business registration fee or a business license fee, whichever is applicable, according to the terms of this ordinance.

3.040 Penalty for violation: Should any person conduct any business in violation of the provisions of this ordinance, the city shall have the additional authority to:

a. Institute an appropriate action or proceeding to prevent the conduct of the business, or to restrain, correct or abate the violation of this ordinance; or to prevent the occupancy of the building, structure or land on which the business is located; and

b. Bring suit in district court for the collection of any delinquent business registration fee or business license fee.

c. Any other relief at law or equity which may be a source of relief for the damages imposed upon the city.

d. The failure of any person to pay a license fee as provided in this chapter with the time limits described in this chapter shall be deemed a misdemeanor.

3.050 Penalty for delinquent payment: (a) A penalty of \$5.00 per month shall be assessed against the applicant if the license or registration fee was not paid within thirty (30) days after a new business was opened to the public, or (b) a penalty of \$5.00 per month for any business licensed or registered for the previous year but whom failed to obtain a new license for the current year by March 15th.

3.060 Repealer: All ordinances, or parts thereof, that conflict herewith are hereby revoked and this ordinance is substituted.

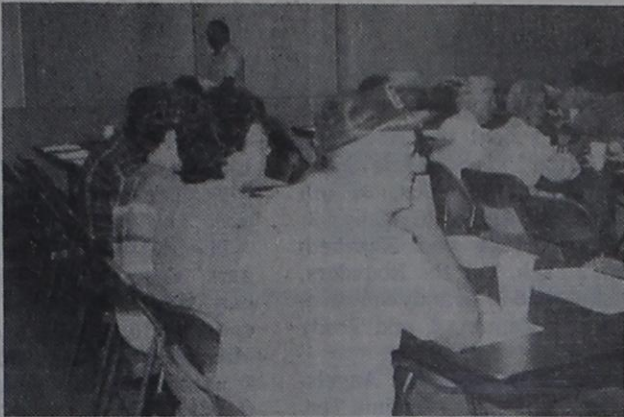
