One final school note: A Texas district judge has ruled in favor of the poorer districts in a case in which they challenged the state's school financing system (Farwell schools were one of 67

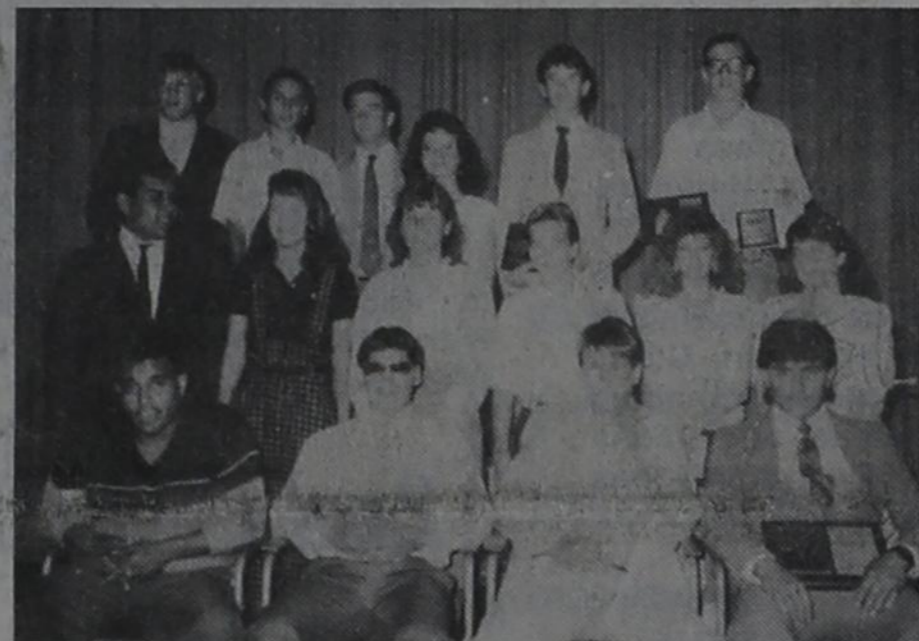

Texico students receive scholarships

The Texico High School and Junior High School hosted their 1987 annual Honors Night Awards program May 14 at the Educational Complex auditorium.

The high school awards ceremony was opened by an introduction of the faculty by Brette Southard and David Loera.

Thirteen Texico seniors received Special Act Scholar Certificates and Scholarship Recognition at the awards program.

Tammara McDonald received the Neal Snipes Memorial Scholarship in the sum of \$200 (Given in the memory of Neal Snipes, a senior at Texico in 1982.)

David Loera received the Eastern New Mexico University Talent Day Scholarship of \$200 (for the 1987 academic year). He also received the Bucky Walters Scholarship award in the amount of \$100.

Jesus Martinez was the recipient of the E.N.M.U. Clovis Full Tuition Scholarship for the 1987 academic year. This scholarship is renewable if academic progress is maintained. He also received the Highland University Presidential Scholarship for the full tuition and the E.N.M.U. Portales Talent Day Scholarship in the amount of \$200 for the 1987 academic year.

Jubal Pierce was the recipient of the University of New Mexico Excel Scholarship in the amount of \$1,000 for recognition of outstanding academic achievement. The Excel scholarship is renewable for three years with completion of 30 hours and 3.0 grade point average.

Jubal also received the E.N.M.U. Provost Scholarship for the full tuition for the 1987 academic year and the Younger Scholarship in the amount of \$700. The Provost scholarship is renewable if academic progress is maintained and the Younger scholarship is administered at the rate of \$350 a semester if academic progress is maintained.

David Martinez received the Telephone Pioneer Of America Academic Scholarship in the amount of \$200. In addition to this scholarship, he received the Eastern New Mexico University - Clovis full tuition scholarship for the 1987 academic year. This scholarship is renewable if academic progress is maintained.

David also received the University of New Mexico \$1,000 Excel Scholarship and the E.N.M.U. - Portales Talent Day Scholarship in the amount of \$200 for the 1987 academic year. The Excel scholarship is for recognition of outstanding academic achievement. This scholarship is renewable if academic progress is maintained.

Brette Southard was the recipient of four different scholarships. The first was from the University of New Mexico \$1,000 Excel Scholarship for recognition of outstanding academic achievement. This scholarship is renewable for three years with completion of 30 hours and the maintainance of a 3.0 grade point average.

The second scholarship was the E.N.M.U. - Portales Friends of Eastern Scholarship.

The third was the Younger Scholarship in the amount of \$700 (\$350 a semester) if academic progress is maintained and the fourth was the Neals Snipes Memorial Scholarship in the amount of \$200 given in memory of Neal Snipes a senior at Texico in 1982. This award is given annually to a top academic boy and girl.

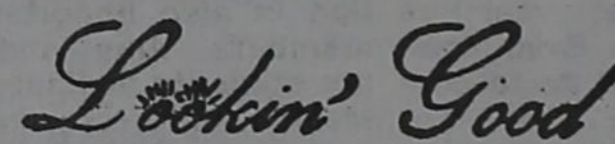
The camp's purpose is to acquaint young people with the fundamentals of

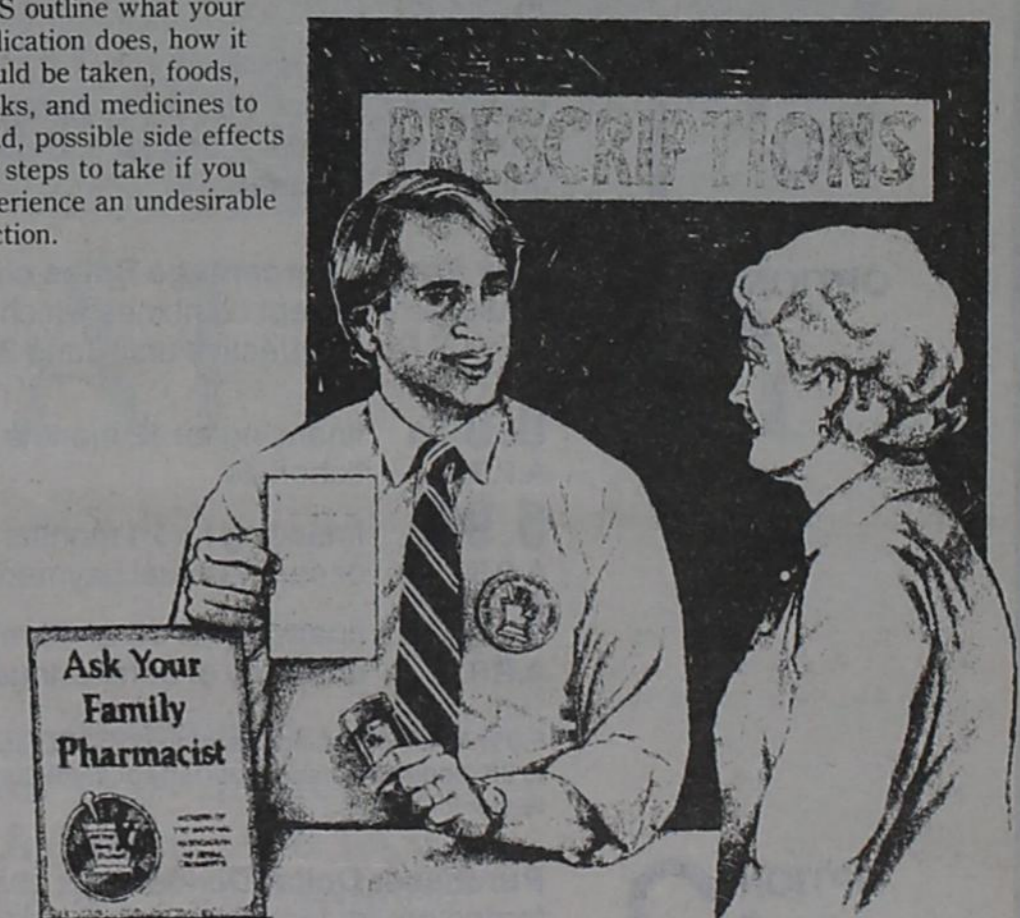

- Confectioners sugar

Aycock receives Eagle scout award

The Farwell Community Center was the setting May 15 for a Court of Honor for Eagle Scout Candidate Chris Aycock, a member of Boy Scout Troop 200 of Farwell.

The Court of Honor was opened with a flag ceremony led by Scout Clay Corn. Presenting the colors were Scouts Cody Monk and Rob Pomper. The invocation was given by assistant scout master Steve Stephens.

Serving as emcee was Conquistador Council Commissioner George Crowl of Clovis. Special guests were introduced: Farwell Mayor Chris Gikas; El Llano Grande District Executive Jim Cowman; ELG District Round Table Chairman Lyle Norris; ELG District Advancement Chairman Ken Huey; ELG District Advancement Chairman Terry Stovall, all of Clovis; and Mr. and Mrs. Jack Kassahn of Bovina. Mr. Kassahn was active in scouting in past years.

Crowl explained the steps involved in fulfilling the requirements for the rank of Eagle Scout. A boy must earn a minimum of 21 merit badges including safety, emergency preparedness, first aid and citizenship in the community, the nation and the world.

He must plan and provide leadership in carrying out an approved service project. Mt. Olivet Cemetery, south of Farwell, was the object of his service project. With the help of Troop 200 members and other persons, weeds were burned, grave sites were cleared and tombstones were righted.

Chris then compiled a list of persons buried there, using lists from sources included the scouts' survey of tombstones, area historical books, funeral home records and lists previously published by Hugh and Wilma Mosely and by Lucille Franse's sociology class of 1986. The grave sites were then located on a plat of the cemetery. Finally, the plat map and list were filed in the Parmer County Clerk's Office.

The Eagle Scout ceremony was conducted by the Kiowa chapter of the Kwahadi Lodge of the Order of the Arrow. The Order of the Arrow is a group within scouting dedicated to camping, cheerful service, and preservation of Indian traditions and lore.

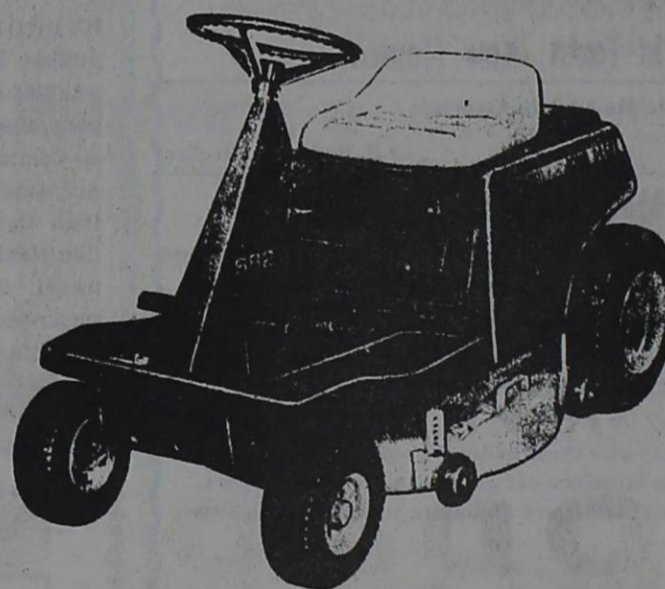
