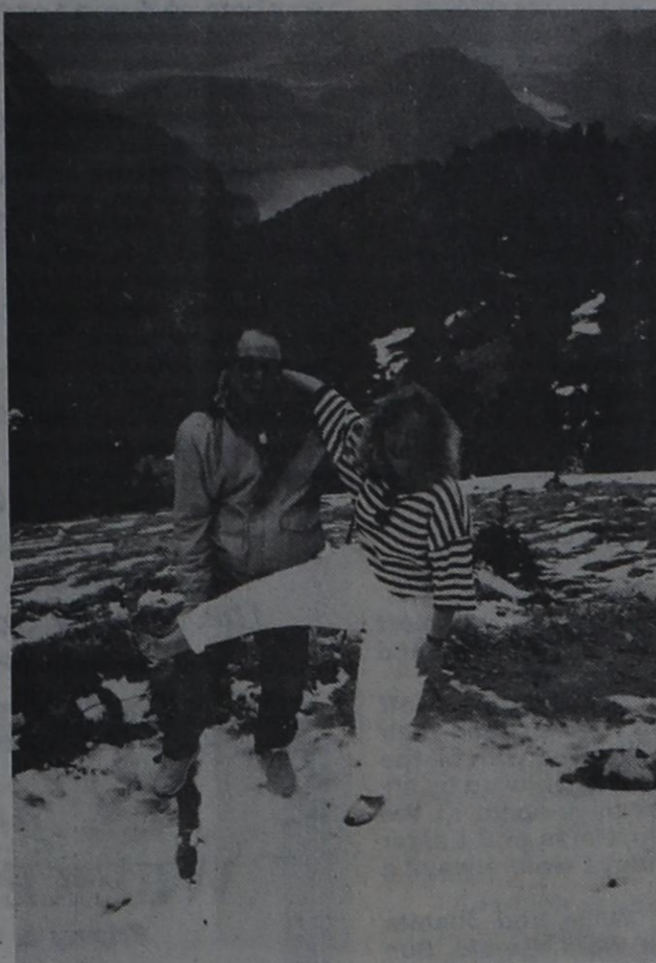

Kristine studied in West Germany

The Lazbuddie community turned out to greet Kristine Miller "Welcome Home" after a year as a foreign exchange student in West Germany.

Kristine was greeted at the airport by about 20 friends and relatives when she arrived in Lubbock on Aug. 6. About three times as many friends and relatives awaited her at home.

"They had tied yellow ribbons on the trees, and cars, and signs. It was really great - even if I hadn't slept for about 24 hours," said Kristine.

Kristine, the daughter of Mike and Pam Miller, attended Lazbuddie High School, and will be a freshman at Texas Tech this fall. She spent her year as a foreign exchange student in Muenster with four different host families. Muenster is near the Dutch border.

Kristine's first host family lived on a farm outside Coesfeld where she went to school. They did not speak English, and they did not have children her age.

The farm Kristine stayed on was about 130 acres. Her host family was shocked by the size of farms in America. Her hosts enjoyed a fairly high standard of living even though they had a farm about 1/10th the size of many farms in this area.

Kristine lived on the farm for only six weeks because it was difficult to get from the farm to school. Each morning she had to ride a bicycle about ten minutes to get to a place where she met her ride into town.

"I had to get into a car with people I didn't even know, and who couldn't even speak English," said Kristine. They dropped her off at one school, and she had to walk to her own school.

Kristine's second host family lived in town, so one of her problems was solved. The father of the family taught German, so another of Kristine's problems was solved. His tutoring helped her to learn enough German that she was able to communicate easily. They also had two children her age, which made her stay more enjoyable.

After Kristine overcame the initial culture shock and the loneliness of being away from family and friends, she was able to really enjoy her stay in West Germany. She went to school and traveled a lot.

School in Germany is more like college than high school. It goes from about 8 a.m. until noon. Students may skip class. They spend class periods discussing the material assigned, but they do their reading and writing at home. Homework often takes several hours.

Kristine noted that her classmates did not do things together as much as American students do. Each student seemed to go his own way after class. There was cheerleading or team prac-

tice to tie the students together as a unit after class.

While in Europe, Kristine visited France, England, Holland, Spain, Portugal, Switzerland, Austria, and Germany. And, Kristine's parents were able to join her for one of her holidays. They toured southern Germany together.

Kristine's second host family took her skiing in the Alps for nearly a month when the family went on vacation.

Besides traveling, Kristine enjoyed plays, movies, and art exhibits. She also enjoyed tasting the new foods in her host country.

"I really liked the food. It was really great. They eat their big meal at noon, and snack on bread and cheese and sausage at night," she said.

Kristine definitely did not spend her time watching television while she was in Germany. "They only have three channels, and they are boring. They have news and weather every hour," she commented.

Kristine noted that dating is a little different in Germany than it is in the United States.

"They start dating much later than we do - about age 20," said Kristine. Dating is often "Dutch treat" with the girl paying her own way. The couple often meet at a meeting place instead of the fellow picking the girl up at her home.

Couples who have been dating a long time often start a joint savings account or buy furniture together before the wedding. Lately, though, things have started to change to a more American pattern in Germany.

Northern Germany, where Kristine stayed, was under British control after World War II. The people there are more attuned to British habits and customs than American habits and customs. They speak English with a British accent.

"They were never rude, but I didn't feel that people in that area really like Americans," said Kristine.

Generally, though, Kristine loved her trip. "There is no way I could have gotten such an education any other way. It was hard, but it was great," she said.

Kristine's trip was sponsored by the Muleshoe Rotary Club. While at a Rotary function in Germany, she met Giesla Bungarten, sister of Franka Bungarten who was the Rotary exchange student in Farwell in 1985.

Texico to lower speed limits

The Texico City Council Tuesday authorized City Attorney Dunae Hamar to draft an ordinance to lower the city's speed limit from 30 to 25 miles per hour.

The 15 mph zone around the school will remain the same.

Councilman Steve Chancy also suggested that stop signs be placed at north-south intersections nearer the highway. Currently, once a motorist turns onto Texico streets from the highway it's several blocks until he comes to a stop sign.

But the council decided

to go with just the lower speed limits for now and see how it goes.

The Texico cemetery also was discussed. The question had arisen at the past meeting over who owned it. It was found that the cemetery was deeded to the city in 1940.

It was noted that when you buy a lot in the cemetery, you join the cemetery association and pay annual dues. A lot costs \$75.

Chancy brought up the need for extra territorial zoning to keep undesirable industries away from the city's limits. Hamar said the city

can zone up to five miles outside its limits if it joins in a joint powers agreement with Curry County.

Current places would be "grandfathered" in.

The city plan and zoning commission will be asked to look into this topic.

In other business, the council:

- Was told that someone had dumped a truckload of garbage outside the landfill gate. The town marshal has found a person's name on stationery in it and will talk with him.

It was noted that the landfill is open free of charge to city residents. They need to get the gate key at city hall in order to use it.

- Heard councilman Doyal LaRue report that he checked to see if state funds were available to help repair the community center building. Funds are currently frozen.

- Decided to meet with representatives in the next two months of computer companies to hear their presentations.

- Said the escort service located near the Port of Entry may move to the site next to Town & Country.

- Asked councilmen Butch Tharp and Bryan Kube to draw up specifications and get bids for a new drain along State Line Road. The cost is roughly estimated at \$3,000.

- Chancy said the city is again having a problem with dogs and cats running loose. He said one person has 30 or 40 cats. He suggested buying traps and having another rabies clinic.

It was indicated that a crackdown may be coming on persons who own animals which are not licensed.

- Discussed a problem getting the Clovis police to page the Texico marshal after his regular business hours. Mayor John Hadley will talk with Clovis police officials about it.

Weekdays, between 8 a.m. and 5 p.m., persons can contact the marshal by calling City Hall. At other times, they need to call Clovis police who will page him.

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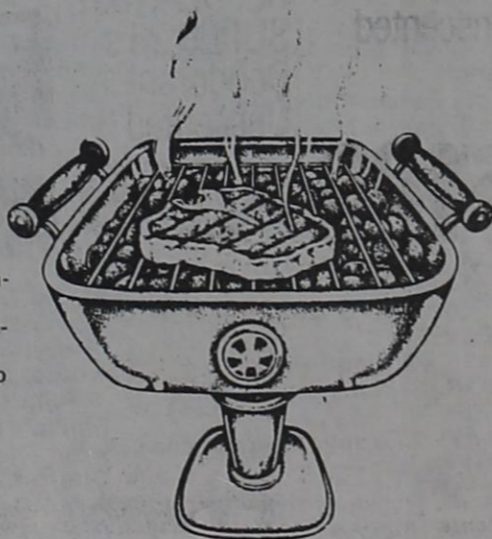


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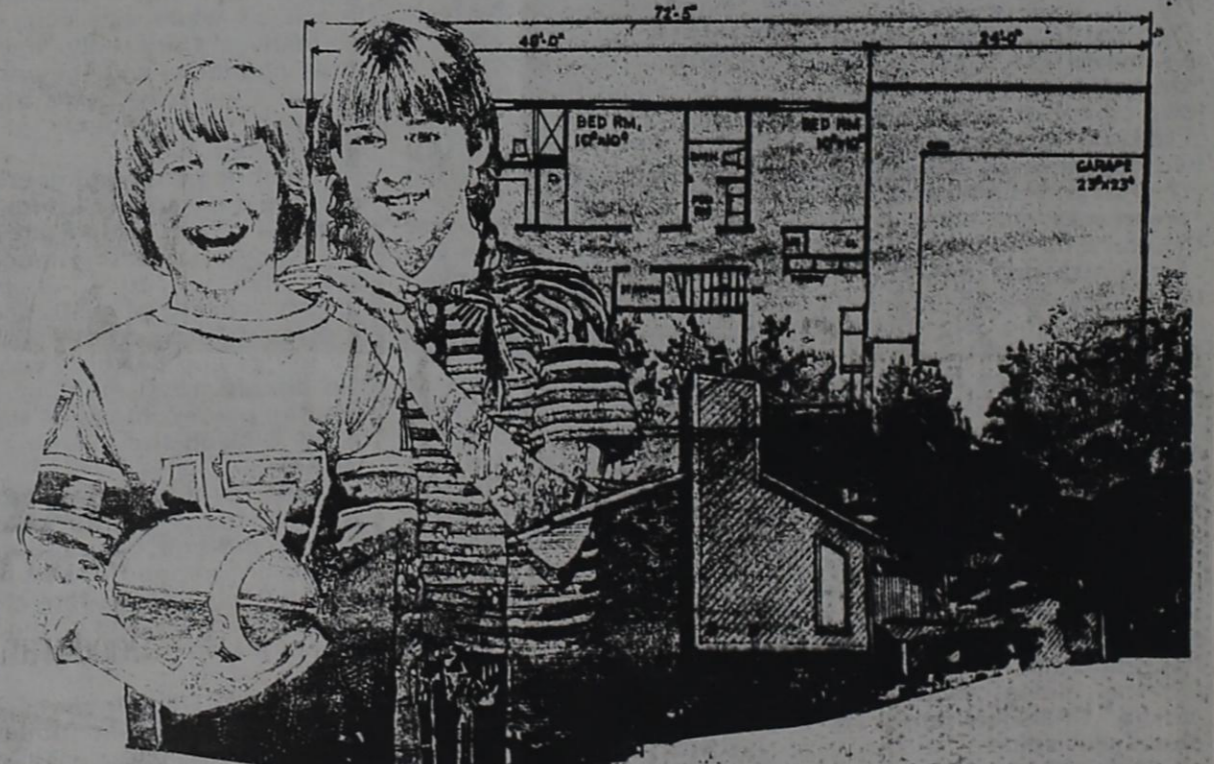
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Mr. and Mrs. Mac Hancock Sept. 3, 1947

Texico Schools show hike in student population

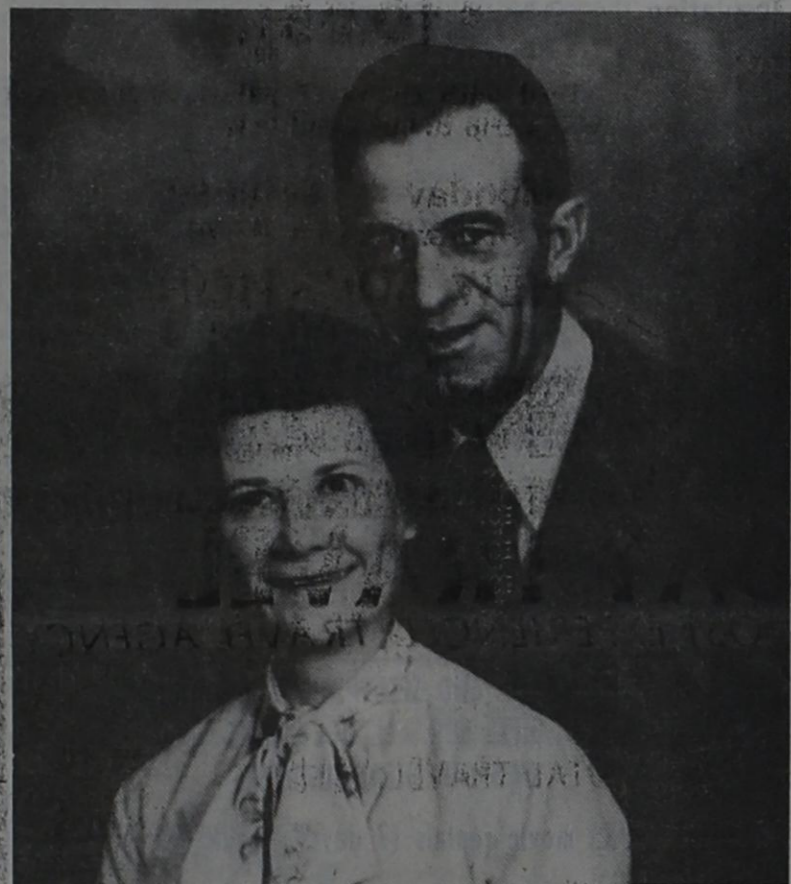
Texico schools opened their doors for the 1987-88 school year on Monday. They reported higher enrollment this year than last, with growth in the elementary school.

The high school reported 133. The junior high school reported 86, and the elementary reported 215. The total enrollment is up to 434. Last year's total enrollment was 425, so that there was about a 2% increase in total enrollment.

"First day enrollment figures are always a bit misleading," said superintendent James Pierce. "We always have a few late enrollments."

Each year there are a few students who move here from other places or who are ill on the first day of school. These students often show up later in the week.

"We got just about the number we projected," Pierce added.

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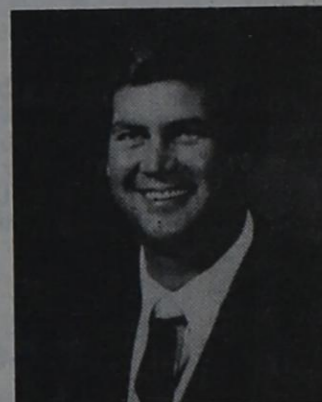

scrimmage - we have a few minor problems to work on, but I was really pleased with our passing," said Coach Michael Littlejohn.

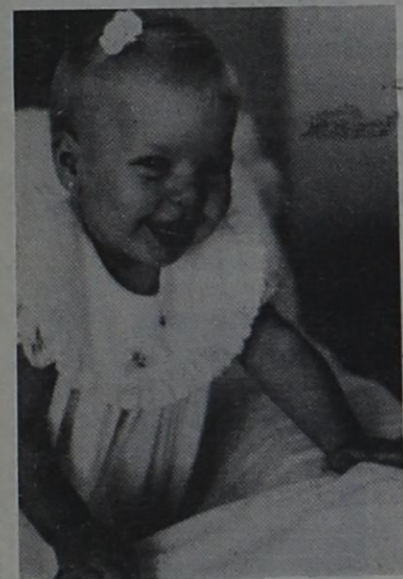
"Elida and Tatum will be the teams to beat this year," said Littlejohn. Elida won the state championship in volleyball last year.

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Recipe of Week

Cynthia Thigpen's Brunch Casserole

8 slices of bread, cubed 2 lbs. sausage, browned and drained 1/2 c. grated cheddar cheese 1 doz. eggs 2 1/4 c. milk 3/4 tsp. dry mustard 1/2 c. chopped onion 1/4 c. chopped green pepper 1 can cream of mushroom soup (10-3/4 oz.) 1/2 c. milk

Grease a 13x9x2 inch pan. (You may want to use a larger pan or 2 pans 13x9x2 inches because it overflows in one pan of that size. Use a shorter baking time if you use two pans.) Spread bread cubes in bottom of pan; top with sausage, then cheese. Beat or mix in a blender the eggs, milk, mustard, onion and green pepper. Pour egg mixture over ingredients in pan. Refrigerate 1 hour or overnight.

Mix together mushroom soup and milk; pour over other ingredients. Bake at 300 degrees for 1-1 1/2 hours or until a knife inserted into the center comes out clean. Serves 12.

Cool Lemon Pie with Butter Pecan Crust

crust
1 package (7 oz.) Martha White Bran Muffin Mix
1 c. chopped pecans
6 Tbs. melted butter or margarine

filling 1 can (14 oz.) sweetened condensed milk
1 can (6 oz.) 1 can frozen lemonade concentrate, thawed
1 carton (4 oz.) frozen whipped topping (softened).

To prepare crust, pre-heat oven to 350°F. Combine crust ingredients until well blended. Reserve 1/2 c. of mixture and crumble into an 8 or 9 inch square pan to make the crumbs which are sprinkled on top of the pie. Press remaining mixture into one 9-inch pie pan. Bake both the crumbs and crust mixture 8-10 minutes. Remove both from oven; stir 1/2 c. in square pan to break into fine crumbs.

Cool the crust. Fill with Lemon filling, sprinkle with crumbs and chill several hours.

To prepare filling, combine the sweetened con-

densed milk with the lemonade. Fold in the frozen whipped topping. Pour filling into crust. Top with crumbs.

Chili Cheese Twists

1 c. flour
1 tsp. chili powder
1/4 tsp. salt
1/8 tsp. cayenne
4 Tbs. butter
1/2 lb. sharp Cheddar cheese, grated
4 Tbs. sour cream

Preheat oven to 400°F. In mixing bowl combine flour, chili powder, salt and cayenne. Cut in butter until mixture resembles coarse meal. Add cheese; stir to mix. Stir in sour cream and press to form dough.

Roll out on lightly floured surface into a 16 x 10 inch rectangle of even thickness. Trim edges. Cut 1/2 inch wide strips from long side. Cut strips in half for 5-inch lengths. Twist strips in half for 5 inch lengths. Twist strips and arrange on lightly greased baking sheets. Bake in 400° oven about 10 minutes until lightly browned on edges and bottom. Cool on racks.

Makes 3 1/2 dozen. Allow 3 per serving.



Mrs. Jerry D. Owen attended a workshop at the Region 16 Service Center in Amarillo to learn about dyslexia. "We are starting a new program for reading, and we have adopted new reading bases, so it made sense to add updated materials about dyslexia at this time," said Mrs. Owen.

Marcie Cole and Pat Owen have also been to the TIER Reading Conference at West Texas State University this summer. It featured Dr. Jack Cassidy's "Read for Your Life" program and information by Pat Cunningham of Scott Foresman and Dr. Terry Gier. The program was directed by Joleta Edinburgh.

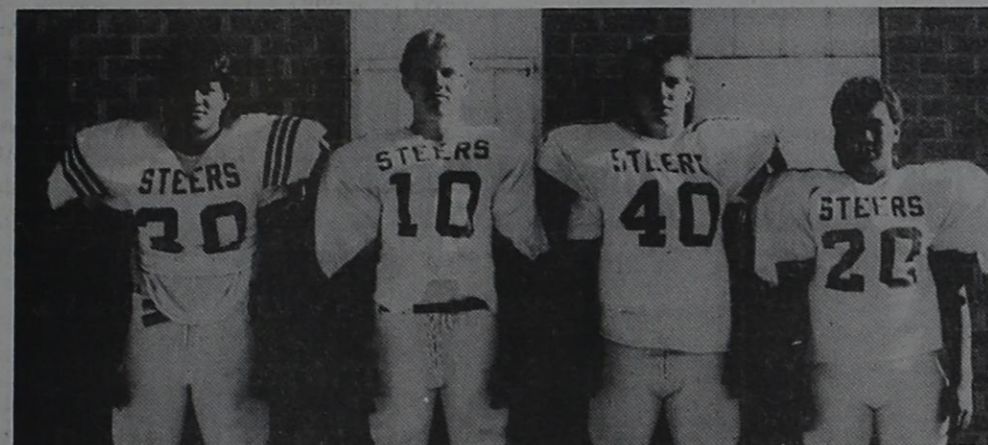

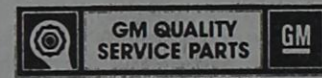

The kitchen staff of Farwell Convalescent Center prepares the nutritious meals, which are then delivered to the elderly, handicapped and those with temporary illnesses.

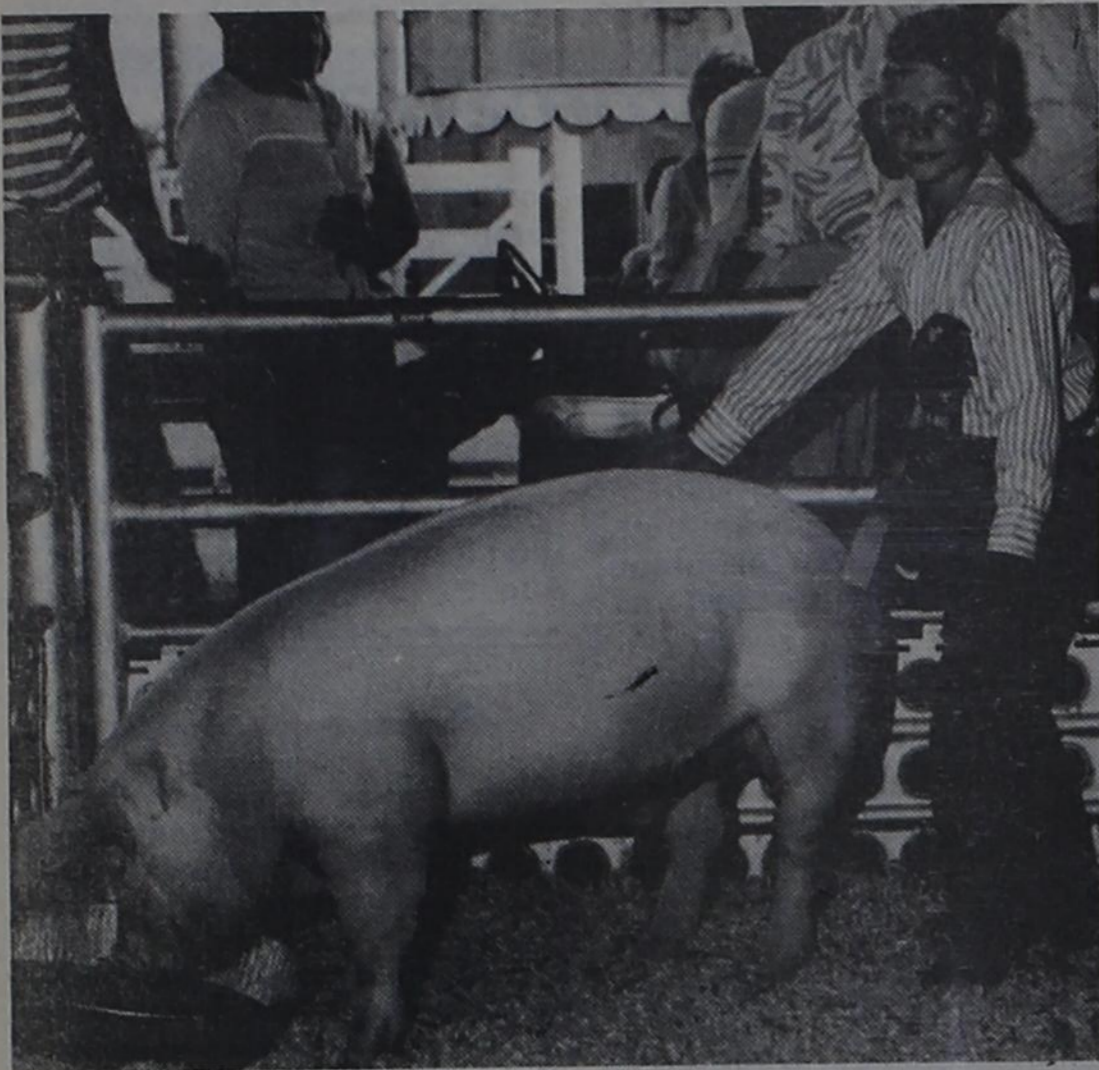

This is a vital service provided to those in need. We are grateful for the volunteers who participate in this program.

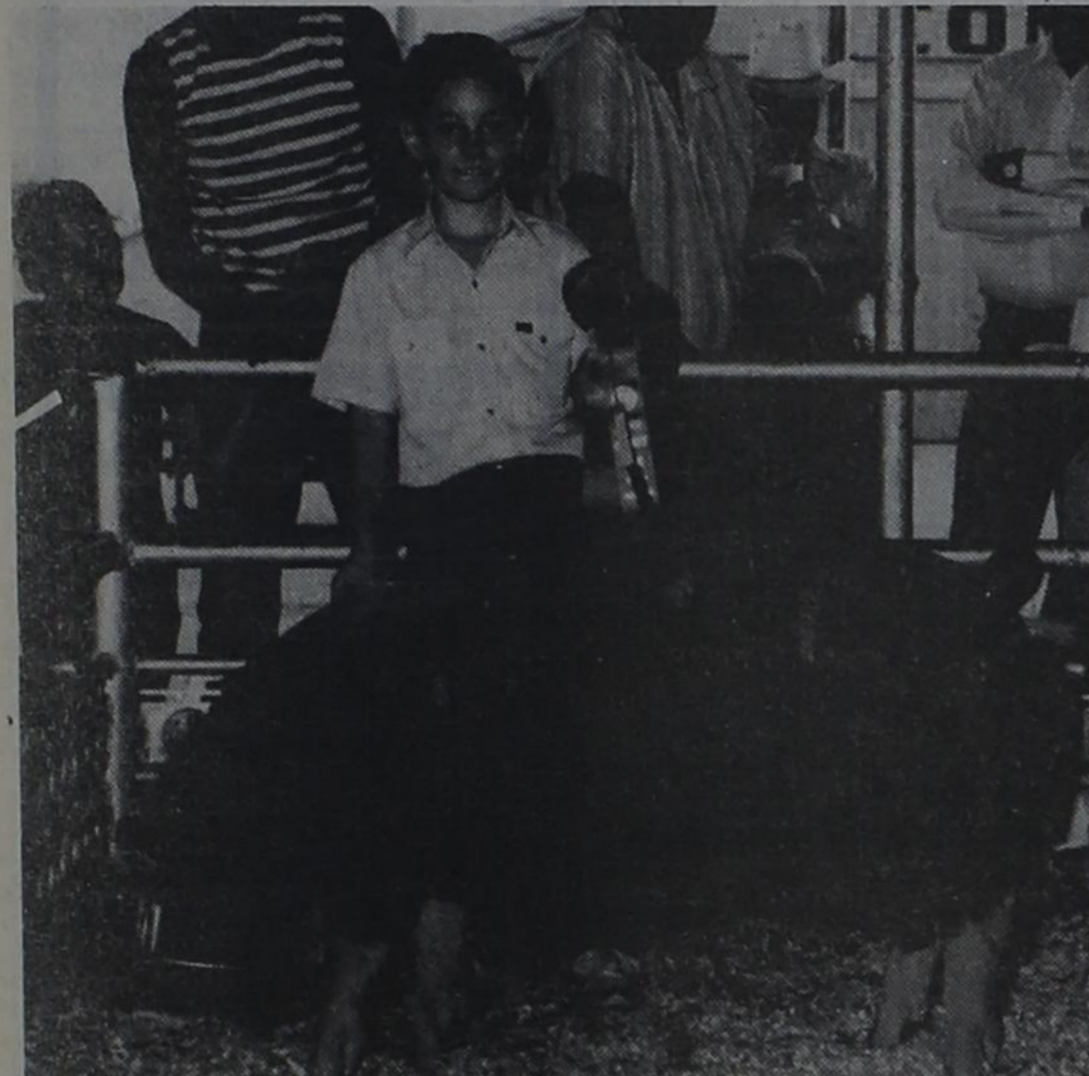
