Pheasant hunting time draws nearer

The Theta Rho Chapter of Epsilon Sigma Alpha sorority will sponsor its fifth annual pheasant hunting preserve, located in Parmer and Bailey counties, for pheasant and duck hunting through the pheasant hunting dates, Dec. 13-28.

The sorority sponsors this event as a fund-raiser for the group's philanthropic projects, and also to benefit any worthy causes in the community. Their first hunt resulted in a \$3,000 donation toward the community center fund, and in 1983, a whopping \$10,000 was donated by the same group, also toward the community center.

The 1984 proceeds bought 24 tables for the Community and \$2,000 more for the center itself. They donated \$400 to the New Mexico Girls Ranch, vacuum cleaners were purchased for Girls Town in Whiteface and they also helped with medical expenses for some local families. They also established the Rosa Roberts Educational Fund with Opportunity Plan, Inc.

The 1985 proceeds went toward purchasing a garage door for the Farwell Community Center, playground equipment for Farwell City Park, sending two washer and dryers to Girls Town in Whiteface, sending money and personal items to the New Mexico Girls Ranch and helping several individuals in our community in time of crisis. They have also donated to such worthy causes as the Texico/Farwell Rotary Club Polio project, Hodges Cancer Center, St. Jukes Childrens Hospital, and the Parmer County Child Welfare Board.

A lot of time and hard work goes into planning of the preserves. The sorority members make sure that all areas of their preserves have plenty of cover for birds to hide in, so there will be some birds there for the hunters. They talk to landowners to secure permission for the use of their land and pay a fee to the Texas Parks and Wildlife to establish a shooting preserve. Then, the land is posted as such.

After the land is set up, the sorority must estimate the number of hunters that can safely hunt in each area. They patrol the preserves to make sure there are no unauthorized hunters.

To hunt on the ESA preserves, one must be a licensed hunter, and purchase a permit for the preserve. All permits are good from the date they are issued through the closing day of the season. The permits are good for any or all of the land secured by the sorority. Each participating landowner is given one or more complimentary permits.

The cost of the ESA permits for this 1986 hunting season are as follows: Permits sold on Dec. 13 or 14, \$75; those purchased Dec. 15-21, \$50; and those purchased Dec. 22-28, \$25. A permit may be purchased for anyone age 12 or under for \$25, all permits are good for the date they are issued through the closing day of the season.

A \$25 non-refundable deposit will be required to hold all reservations with the balance of the permit price to be paid when the permit is picked up. Receipt of deposit will be acknowledged with a post card. If it becomes apparent ESA cannot accommodate a hunter because the quota has been filled, his deposit will be returned. When making your reservations, please indicate if you will be hunting with dogs. The preserve land will be posted and open only to hunters buying permits from ESA. Each hunter will be given a map of the posted land and will be free to hunt on any of the preserve land. The preserve will be patrolled so that only those having permits will be allowed to hunt.

The reserved permits and maps may be picked up Dec. 12 from 7 p.m. to 11 p.m. (CST) or Dec. 13, from 5 a.m. to 10 a.m. (CST) at the Farwell Community Center on 9th

the longest tail feather in the county.

He was a member of the First Baptist Church of Bovina and the Senior Citizens organization.

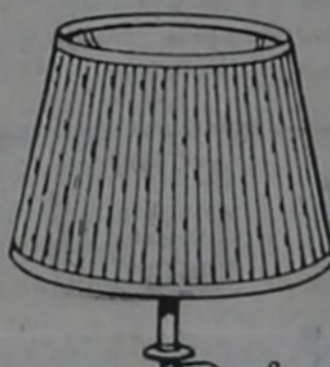

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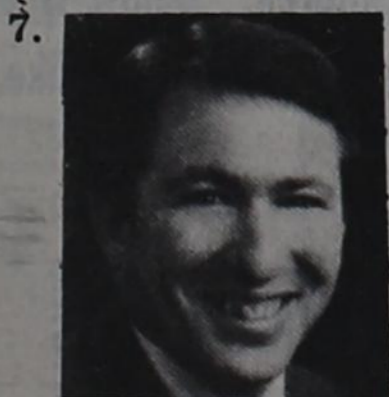
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Texico boys fall to Springlake-Earth in OT, but girls victorious

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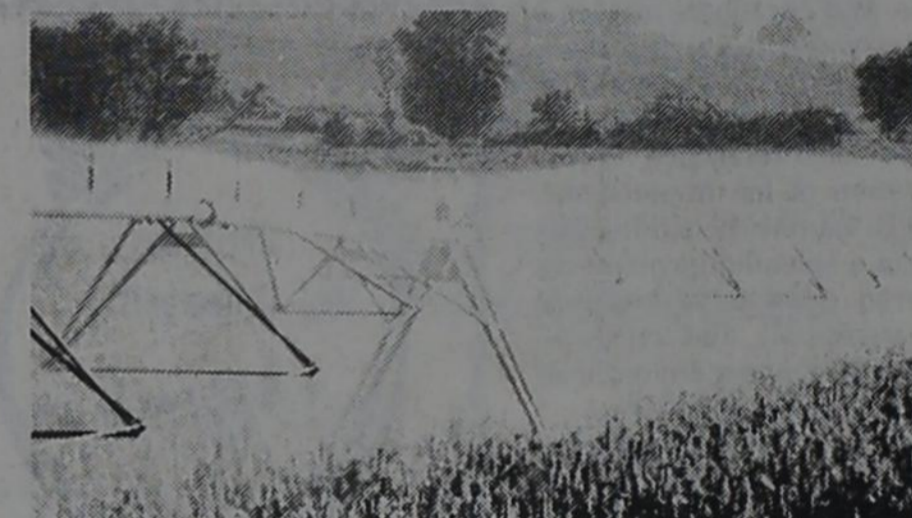
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Philosophical Society of Texas begun

1837: TUESDAY, DECEMBER 5. The Philosophical Society of Texas was founded today by 26 charter members meeting in the capitol of the Republic at Houston, at the instigation of Vice President Mirabeau B. Lamar.

The main purpose of the society, according to a formal statement which it adopted today, is "the collection and diffusion of correct information regarding the moral and social condition of our country." The society does not propose to limit its interest, but includes such matters as Texas finances, statistics, political history, and military history. It also intends to investigate the climate, soil and products of Texas, its animals, aboriginal tribes, natural curiosities, mines, and "the thousand other topics of interest which our new and rising Republic unfolds to the philosopher, the scholar, and men of the world."

Vice President Lamar was elected President, with five Vice Presidents: first, Surgeon General Ashbel Smith; second, Secretary of State Robert A. Irion; third, Congressman Anson Jones; fourth, Congressman Joseph Rowe; and fifth, Major David S. Kaufman.

Other charter members include President Sam Houston, former President David G. Burnet, General Thomas J. Rusk, Chief Justice James Collinsworth, William H. and John Wharton, A.C. Allen, and William Fairfax Gray.

The society will meet at irregular intervals, when called. Its aim, say its founders, is to make Texas as respectful for the acts which adorn civilized life as it has been in the field of military renown.

1842: THURSDAY, DECEMBER 1. In his annual message to the Seventh Congress, meeting in somewhat uncomfortable quarters in the newly designated capital of Washington-on-the-Brazos, President Sam Houston presented a gloomy picture of the state of the nation. It is partly the result, he said, of "acts of selfishness and partiality" too often displayed in the proceedings of the Congress. His message was heard by the Senators as individuals, since no quorum was present. Yesterday a bare quorum was mustered, but since then one Senator has resigned. The House obtained a quorum, after several previous attempts had failed.

Because "temporary expediency" has often replaced public good, the President charged, Texas has experienced a decline "more rapid than perhaps that of any other country on the globe possessing the same natural advantages." He said: "We find ourselves in a condition utterly destitute of credit, without a currency, without means, and millions in debt."

In an obvious reference to the administration of his predecessor, Mirabeau B. Lamar, he said: "The chimeras of a splendid government administered upon a magnificent scale has passed off, and left us all the realities of depression, national calamity and destitution."

His address touched on numerous other matters. He decried the war fever that has swept Texas since the invasion of San Antonio by General Adrian Woll last September. He requested a law against the circulation in Texas of foreign bank notes, which are often preferred by Texans to their own currency. He urged a greater appropriation for the Post Office Department, saying, "A free government cannot exist without mails." He also again requested a treaty of friendship with the Indians.

He devoted considerable time to the "Archives War," in which the citizens of Austin used armed force



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to prevent the government from moving the archives to the present seat of government. "Acts of the most seditious and unauthorized character have been perpetrated by persons styling themselves the 'Archives Committee', positively refusing obedience to the orders of the Executive," he charged, stating that he felt a reluctance to have recourse to such measures as would have enabled him to carry out the provisions of the Constitution. He asked Congress to enact measures for "suppressing insurrectionary acts towards the authorities of the country."

1845: FRIDAY, DECEMBER 5. Former President Mirabeau B. Lamar has often been called "the poet president." He published a book of poems before coming to Texas in 1836, and several of his poems has since appeared in Texas newspapers. This year he has published a new volume of poetry.

It is not well known, however, that ex-President Sam Houston has also delved into poetry at times. For example, on Christmas eve, 1829, he composed the following lines. He was at that time living in Indian territory, after his wife, Eliza Allen, had left him that previous April, and he had abruptly resigned his office as governor of Tennessee.

There is a proud undying thought
in man
That bids his soul still upward
look
To fame's proud cliff! And Long-
ing,
Look in hope to grace his name
For after-ages to admire, and

wonder
How he reached the dizzy, dang-
erous

Height of where he stood; or how,
Or if, admiring his proud station,
fell
And left a name alone!

This is ambition's range,
And while it seeks to reach
Beyond all earthly names
And stand where millions never
Dared to look, it leaves content
The companion of a virtuous
heart!

There is a race of mortals wild
Who range the desert free,
And roam where floods
Their onward current pour
In majesty, as free as Indian
thoughts,
Who feel that happiness and
Content are theirs.

They owe no homas to written
rules,
No allegiance to idle forms,
Which Virtue dare not own!
But proud of freedom,
In their native woods,
They pitch their hopes of endless
joys
In fields where game of never
dying sort
Delights the hunter's soul.

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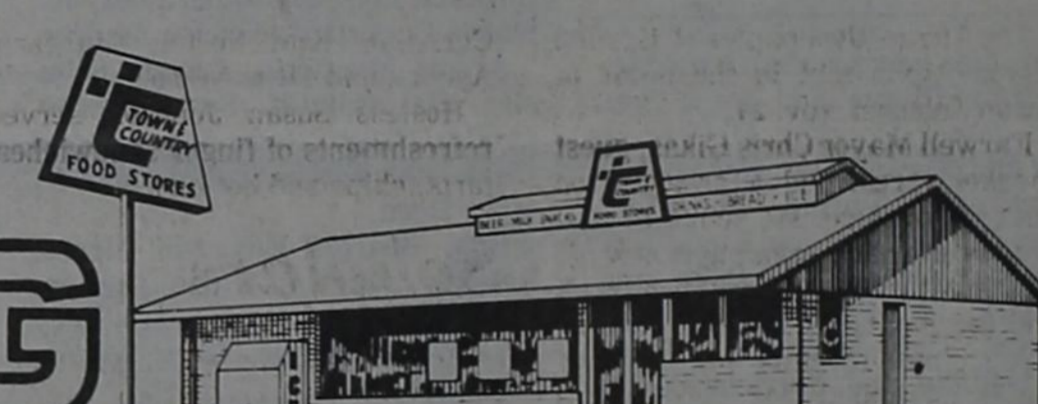

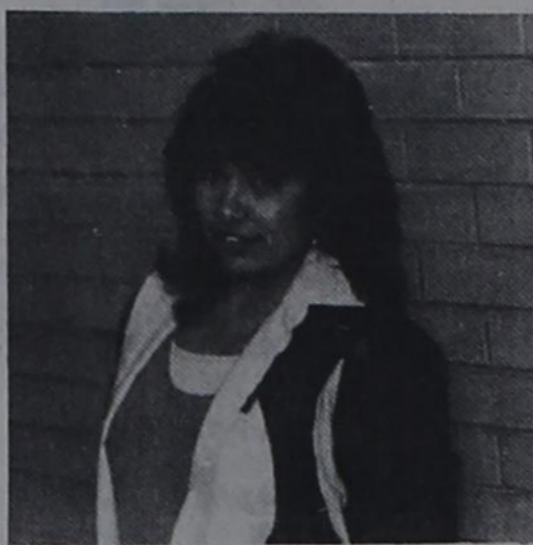

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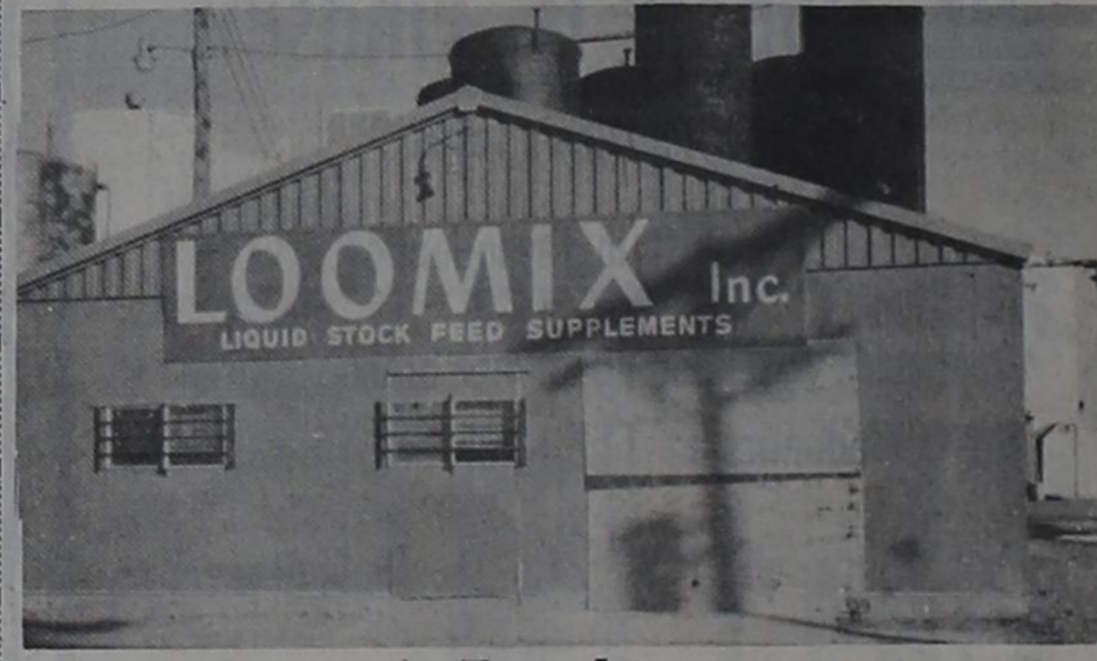

How to create heirloom collars

With a minimal amount of time, you can create beautiful, detachable collars that will be treasured by generations to come.

To make them, select placemats, napkins, doilies, handkerchiefs and broadcloths which are available in local department, fabric and craft stores. Choose table linens that feature cutwork, crocheted edging or applique. Don't hesitate to experiment with different colors.

General supplies include: desired linen, needle, thread, scissors, tracing paper or tear-away, pencil or disappearing fabric marker, straight pins, iron, sewing machine, 1/4-inch wide double-fold bias tape or nylon bias mesh tape, and fasteners (snap, hook and eye, button with elastic thread loop, ribbon or velcro).

Sewing instructions:

1. To make pattern, place tracing paper, over neck opening pattern. Trace the dashed outer line and fold lines.

2. Locate the center of linen by folding linen in half then in fourths. Press with fingers. Place fold lines of pattern on fold lines of linen. Pin in place.

3. For lacy or loosely woven linens, place a blank sheet of tracing paper to wrong side of linen.
4. With short stitches, sew

through all layers on traced line. Cut out neck opening 1/8 inch side seam line. Neck opening can be cut smaller or larger for a custom fit. Remove tracing paper if appropriate.

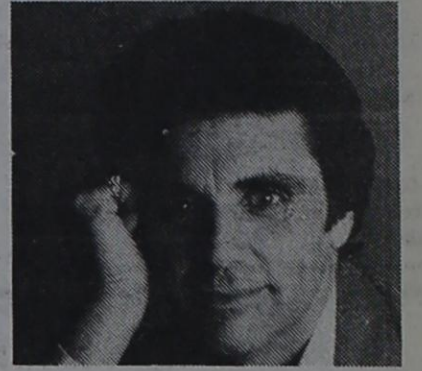
5. Finish edges with bias tape.
6. Attach desired fastener.

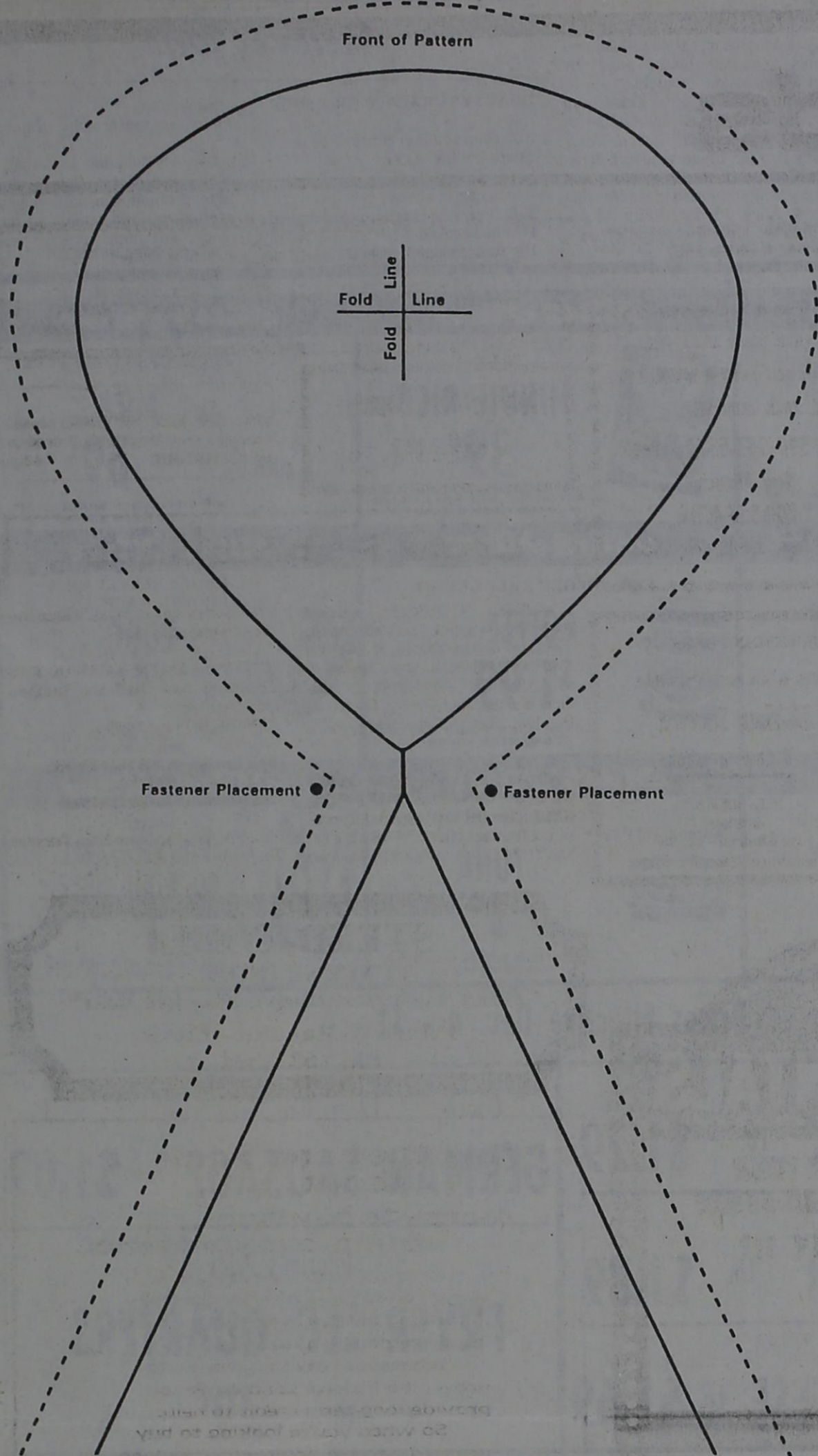

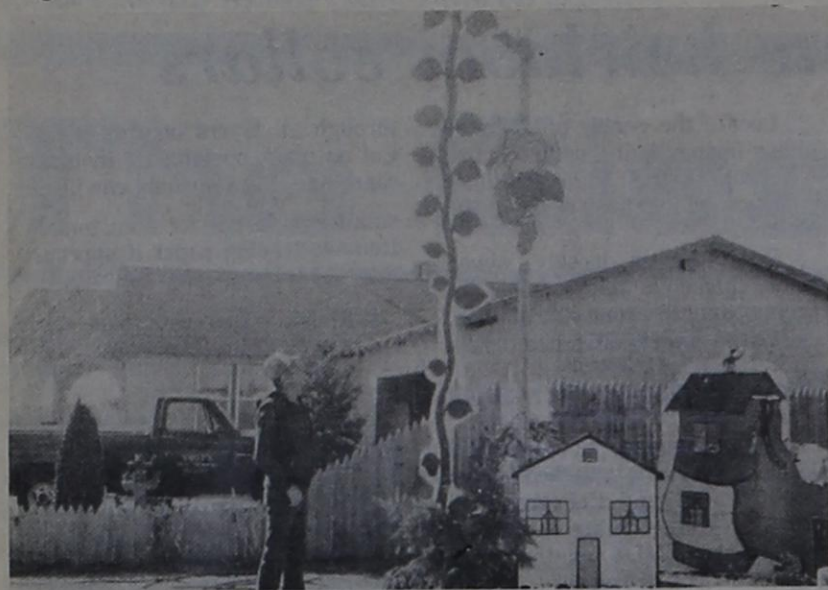

HEARTY TURKEY N' RICE SOUP

1 1/2 oz. can mushrooms, drained

2 chicken bouillon cubes
2 cups boiling water
1/2 cup celery slices
1/2 cup carrot slices
3/4 lb. Velveeta cheese spread, cubed
1 1/2 cups cooked rice
1 1/2 cups chopped cooked turkey or

Dissolve bouillon in water; add celery and carrot. Cover; simmer 20 to 25 minutes or until vegetables are tender. Add remaining ingredients; stir until process cheese spread is melted.
