Wendell Harold Petree grew up in Farwell. He left here in late 1940, and joined the Air Force in 1941.

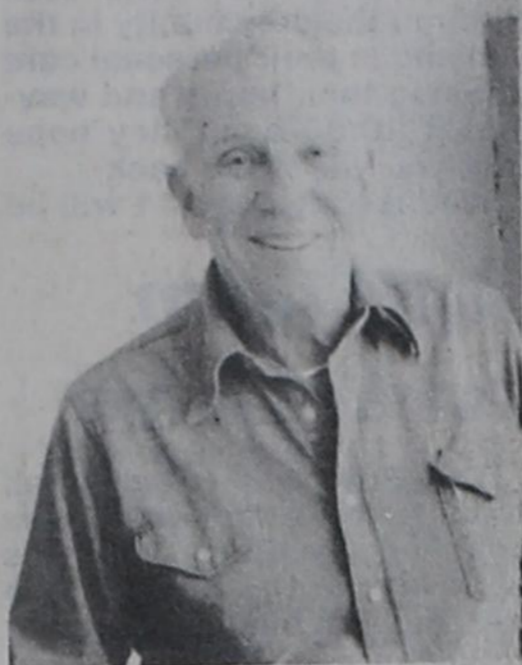
"I was stateside all during the war, and I was on the West coast when Pearl Harbor was attacked. My first reaction was that I was going to be sent directly to the war. Instead, they kept sending me farther and farther east.

Petree first received training as an air craft mechanic. "When I started, we worked on little single engine planes; when I ended, we worked on 8 engine pure jets. My first view of a jet was in 1945 - I thought it was incredible that a plane like that could fly."

In 1944, Petree volunteered for pilot training. "I guess I felt left out of the war, and I always wanted to fly." Petree graduated from pilot training in Pampa, Fla. in 1945.

"I flew B-36's and B-52's after the war. I stayed in for 30 years."

During his stay in the military, Petree was stationed on Guam, Puerto Rico, Thailand, and at various stations in the U.S. For the last 17 years, Petree was assigned to the

Strategic Air Command.

"All we do in SAC is train for a war nobody ever wants to fight," said Petree.

Petree grew up on a farm near Farwell. He helped his grandfather sell hamburgers to all the people who came to view the Hassell murder trial here when he was a little boy.

"As a little boy, the Parmer County Court House was the biggest building I had ever seen," he remembers.

Tranquilizer gun purchased

Texico Marshal Brent Byrum now has the .22 caliber Pneu Dart tranquilizer gun that Texico will be using to control dogs running loose.

The gun shoots a .22 blank cartridge, which pops the dart out like an air rifle would. The dart is loaded with Rompun, an animal tranquilizer.

The rifle makes one popping noise when the dart is fired, and the dart makes a second popping noise when it hits the animal and injects the tranquilizer.

The dog will be unconscious about 30 minutes.

"I talked to two veterinarians, and they recommended

this as the safest, fastest acting drug. They said that this was the drug least likely to hurt the dog," he said.

Animals running loose will be shot with the tranquilizer. Owners of tagged dogs can claim their pets at the dog pound. They will have to pay an impound fee within three days. Well groomed, healthy looking dogs will be held up to three days. Unkempt strays will be destroyed.

"We hope that this will solve the problem of dogs running loose without hurting anybody's favorite pet," said Byrum.
