Do you remember?

We got a real nice letter this week from C. Maynard Martin of Texico. Thank you for your nice comments about our paper, Mr. Martin.

He commented on various governmental issues but asked that we don't print them and I respect his wishes.

However, he also put in some background on the old days in Texico - Farwell and I found them interesting and would like to share them with you.

Mr. Martin began in Progress School back in 1929. Shortly afterward, his family moved to House, N.M.

"I was 6 1/2 years old when we moved but I can remember a lot of the old names," he wrote. "Mr. Roberson that used to run the store at Lariat. He used to give me a balloon every time I went into his store. Balloons were put in loaves of bread wrappers. Then there were Tuckers, Chitwoods, Hillocks, Gregoys, Alexanders, Grosses, Quinns, Josh Blocker, Dwight Osborne, Calf Morgan, Homer and Harold Maris, Jenkins, Newmans, Earl Barger. These names may not be spelled right and the majority have passed away.

"Fifty-nine years is a long ways back, and yet it isn't. My teachers in the fall of 1929 were Emma Beardin and Ruth Burton. Mr. Gross was on the School Board and his son Arnold and I were the same age. What makes me remember Mr. Gross so much was that he had the biggest chaw of tobacco in his jaw that I ever saw."

Mr. Martin told another story from the old days: "I went to a barn dance, only one I can remember, and I must have been 6. Earl Barger's barn. Boone Ellison, seems to me, played a base viola and comb. When us kids got tired and sleepy, there was a granary cleaned out in the barn and we were put in blankets to sleep. You know how kids are - they have to snoop. I remember being out among the Model T's and wagons and seeing some tough guys drinking out of fruit jars."

The Panhandle Regional Planning Commission meets Jan. 31 to review applications for state and federal funds. On their list of 40 applications is one from Parmer County to have an elevator in the county courthouse.
Parmer County is seeking \$87,067, and has agreed to pay \$22,000, for the total estimated project cost of \$109,067.
In all, the 40 requests total more than \$8 million. Last year, the PRPC got \$1,123,000 for the Panhandle area. So you can see that only a few of the 40 applications will get funded this year.
Among the 40 are applications from Bovina and Friona. Bovina wants \$201,500 for street work, and has agreed to pay \$20,250. Friona wants \$74,150 for street work, and has agreed to pay \$11,141.

Buyers' breakfast slated

County livestock show upcoming

The 1989 Parmer County Junior Livestock Show will be held Jan. 30 - Feb. 2.

Weigh in- will be held from 3-7 p.m. on Jan. 30. The Lamb Show starts at 8 a.m. on Feb. 1, and the steer and heifer shows are on Feb. 2. The premium show will be held at 7 p.m. on Feb. 2.

Exhibitors must be enrolled in grades 3- 12 in one of the four public schools in the county, or they must be residents of this county and be in grades 3- 12 in a private school.

Exhibitors may not show more than 2 steers, 3 lambs, 3 barrows, or a total combination of 3 animals, but no more than 2 steers. This rule does not apply to heifers, or commercial steers.

The Parmer County Stock Show Board Advisory Committee includes: Randy Kelley, Lee Hutchins, James Clayton, Keith Garner, Johnny Mitchell, Lloyd Bradshaw, Glen Slayer, and Jerry Simmons.

Complete information about the show is available in the Parmer County Extension Office in the Court House.

Parmer County Agricultural Agent Gary Patterson indicated that the county livestock show would probably have about 175-200 barrows in the show. He estimated that there would be 100- 125 lambs, 8 steers, and 10 heifers in the show.

"We have re-arranged the schedule a bit from last year so that the youth will miss less school because of the stock show," said Patterson.

Lazbuddie releases performance report

The Lazbuddie School District has released its annual performance report. Here are some of the highlights: The district operated during 1987-88 with a budget of \$1,314,856. There were 234 students.

Student Performance

Improvements and gains on both the TEAMS and California Achievement Tests (CAT) were significant. Scores improved strongly on both tests.

Lazbuddie Elementary won the District UIL Literary and Academic competition, despite being the smallest school in its contest. Students won ribbons denoting excellence in every academic category.

The junior high team placed 3rd, with 26 students placing in the top 10 positions and 14 received ribbons. At the high school level, 5 students placed in the upper academic positions and one went on to regional.

The no-pass, no-play rule had a negligible effect at the high school, but did impact at the junior high level. Almost no students at the high school were ineligible, but 5 percent of junior high participants in extra-curricular events were ineligible due to grades during a six weeks grading period.

The pass-fail rate was examined. Retention rate was reduced at the elementary level where 2 students were retained. The previous year there were 10 retainees. At the high school, one student lacked enough credits to be classified at the next grade level. And the number of drop-outs was reduced from 2.2 percent to 1.1 percent.

For the second year, Lazbuddie had a fulltime certified guidance counselor who was instrumental in providing aid in college planning. Seventy percent of the graduates planned to continue their education. And all the graduates who had definite post-secondary plans got some type of financial aid in the form of scholarships, grants or loans.

Curriculum

There were several curriculum changes. The gifted - talented program was expanded to include 6th graders. Seventh graders took keyboarding and computer literacy. Most 8th graders enrolled in band and introductory industrial arts as electives.

At the high school level, fewer students enrolled in music and business courses. Several students enrolled in honors courses. Many students chose the advanced academic track and enrolled in more English, math and science courses.

A Multi-Occupational Training Program was begun.

At the elementary level, the dyslexia program was implemented. A teacher trained in it and an aide taught students for 55 minutes daily.

Teachers have recommended creating an activity period for tutorials, study hall and UIL study.

Several new computers were purchased for elementary and high school use.

Management and Organization

The administration and school board adopted facility adequacy goals in 1983, and all have been met. They include:

Two classrooms converted into a modern library; painted classrooms; in the high school building, ceilings lowered; new fluorescent lighting; new heating units; remodeling old gym; playground equipment added; teacher housing units owned by the school remodeled; prefabricated classroom built to house Chapter 1 regular and migrant students; playground fences built.

Finance

The total tax rate was 95 cents and the financial condition of the school at the current time is very good, school officials said.

The district has lost about \$1 million in value each of the past three years. These losses have been partially offset by lower state values and increases in state funds.

The district tax rate has been 95 cents every year since 1982 except one year when it was 93 cents. The district will be free of bond indebtedness at the end of the current school year.

Kassahn receives 5-year sentence

Parmer County cattleman Jim Kassahn was sentenced Friday in U.S. District Court in Lubbock to 5 years in a federal penitentiary and ordered to pay \$375,000 in restitution.

On Nov. 21, Kassahn had entered a guilty plea in District Court to a fraud charge. He admitted defrauding Hale County State Bank in Plainview by using the same securities as collateral for loans at that bank and a Dallas bank in 1987.

The maximum punishment that could have been given for the crime was 5 years in prison, a \$250,000 fine and double restitution.

In December, 108th state District Judge Jairl Dowell ordered Kassahn and his wife to pay Barrett-Crofoot Inc., a Deaf Smith County feedlot company, about \$5 million, the Amarillo Daily News had reported.

The feedlot had inherited claims of First National Bank against the Kassahns in a settlement with the bank, a lawyer for the bank said. The bank had sued Barrett-Crofoot to prevent the company from selling cattle the bank claimed was collateral for a loan it made to the Kassahns.

First National had sued the cattle company owned by the Kassahns in August 1987, seeking payment of a multi-million dollar loan. Kassahn was accused of misrepresenting his ownership of 37,000 head of cattle.

Claiming Kassahn didn't abide by loan requirements,

the bank declared its loan in default and called in the reported \$12 million of guaranteed principal balance on the outstanding note, about \$5 million which was owed to a Dallas bank.

Kassahn filed for bankruptcy reorganization in September 1987.

Ute project has a problem

A wrench has been thrown into plans for various Eastern New Mexico communities, including Texico, to use water from the proposed Ute Lake Water Project.

The project is designed to make sure the communities have sufficient water 30 to 50 years down the road.

At Tuesday's Texico City Council meeting, it was noted that the project has sent Texico a letter noting that it appears it would cost Texico \$200,000 a year to get water via the project.

Looking down the road, that total seems too much for a small city like Texico to afford. So the council agreed to send a letter to the project saying that Texico still supports the project but cannot afford its expected cost.

It appears Texico is not alone in not affording such a cost. The City of Melrose is expected to send a similar reply to the project.

Also, it was reported that the City of Portales may pull out of the project. Portales was recently told by its officials that the city has enough water for 70 years.

What may happen next is that the project will start lobbying for state and federal aid, pointing out that small cities like Melrose and Texico cannot afford the annual costs.
"Hopefully, the federal government can help lower the cost," said Mayor Steve Chancy.

It also was pointed out that this situation involves Farwell, which has made informal contacts with Texico over the possibility of paying Texico for some of the water from the project if it ever comes to fruition.

In other business, the council showed support for possible plans by Texico and Farwell to share street repair work.

Chancy and councilman Butch Tharp attending a street repair seminar in Albuquerque earlier this month. During it, they went to Santa Fe and were able to buy a used large air compressor for \$350. A similar one in Texas is currently priced at \$2,100.

Chancy said he has talked with Farwell Mayor Chris Gikas informally on a cooperative project. Gikas suggested the two city councils meet and further discuss this, Chancy said.

Chancy outlined what the cooperative arrangement may include:

Two large pieces of equipment are needed - an air compressor, which Texico now has, and a tar pot, which Farwell would buy.

Then a crew of combined city employees would work out a preventive maintenance program for both communities. Major work would include sealing cracks.

"A good maintenance program would save us a lot of money," Chancy said.

The work would not include seal coating and no new employees would be needed, he added.

At its last meeting, the Far-

well City Council also discussed how to keep down street repair costs and Gikas said he would talk with Chancy about a possible cooperative effort.

The council also:
- Agreed to buy a yard of caliche for patching pot holes.

- Applied for a New Mexico Litter Control and Beautification grant of \$550. At first Chancy suggested it be used to help build a small playground behind the Community Center. But the grant guidelines apparently wouldn't allow it. So, if received, it would be used to pick up litter.

- Approved a resolution to increase the fire fund budget by \$13,842. This money was already available in unbudgeted funds that were to be available for next year. The change was needed because the FmHA had ordered the city to pay off its debt on the fire station early.

- Changed its policy on terminating employees. Due to a recent New York court decision, employees will be offered the option of a "due process" hearing before the city personnel board before termination.

year. This will drop the present tax rate 11 cents.

Library has grown

The Friona Public Library is part of the Texas Panhandle Library System, part of a state wide network of libraries.

It is also part of the Harrington Library consortium, an electronically-linked system of libraries in the Texas Panhandle. If they do not have

a book that a person needs, they can locate the material at one of the other 20 libraries in this Consortium.

The library has grown from 150 books in 1963 to housing more than 10,000 books today.

It operates at least 20 hours per week, from 9 a.m.-6 p.m. weekdays.

It is located at 109 W. 7th Street in Friona. It is the building with the mural of Friona's old time Main Street 1911 painted on the side by local artist Bobby Weid.

The library has a group that sponsors fundraising activities and helps with library projects - the Friends of the Library.

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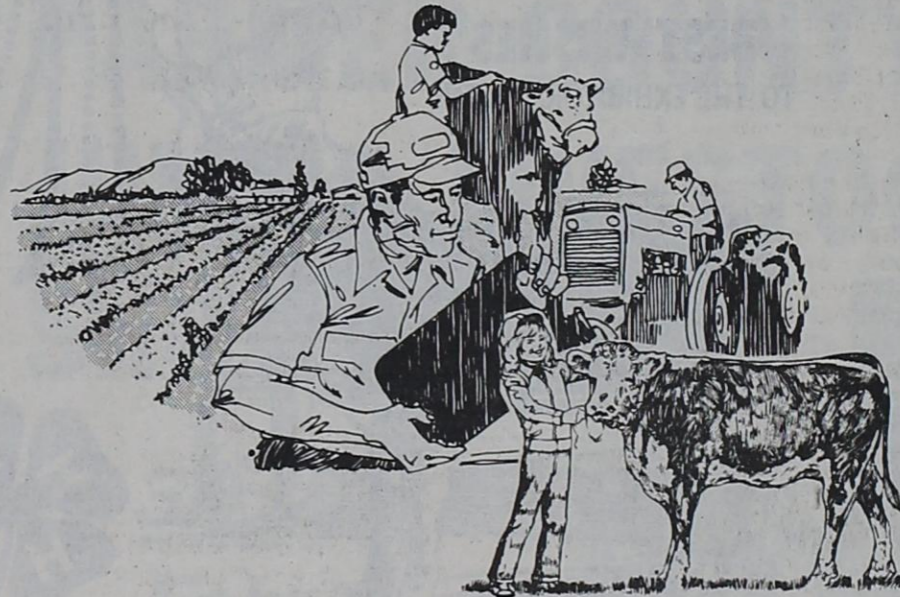

1 Tbs. sugar
