After achieving what no Farwell football team ever had accomplished before winning its first 11 games - the Steers' bid for a state title was spoiled in the Area Championship game by West Texas High, 21-6, last Friday.

West Texas, a consolidation of three schools, went into the game as a 26-point favorite over the 11-0 Steers. West Texas is now 12-0.

More than 2,500 fans saw the game at Canyon High School Stadium.

Farwell Schools okay new tax

The Farwell School Board heard little opposition at the special tax hearing Monday to the proposition that tangible goods be taxed.

One individual voiced some concern: "I don't object to paying the tax (on vehicles) if they put everyone's on the roll. It's not fair if I have to pay it and my neighbor down the street isn't going to pay it."

Board member Steven Kaltwasser expressed a concern about the situation, but added, "If we don't put vehicles on the tax roll now, we won't be able to tax them

Member Ronald Byrd added, "I think our new city marshal or police chief will take care of it (enforcing the law)."

During the discussion that ensued, members pointed out that farm vehicles are exempt from taxation, and so are vehicles over 10 years old.

Board member Tom Nichols requested that board president Doyle Johnson write to the Department of Public Safety and to local law enforcement agents requesting that the tax be enforced.

Following the tax hearing, the board unanimously passed the proposition that tangible personal property including automobiles be taxed.

The board also discussed the taxation of freeport goods. Freeport goods are items which pass through an area, but are not kept there longer than 175 days. The board postponed action until they found out whether agricultural goods were exempt from this tax or not.

The board discussed the possible changing of the board back of the police patrol car, meeting times, but the action was tabled.

The board passed a resolution requiring all administrative personnel to reside within the boundaries of the

school district. They also discussed, but did not pass an amendment to the budget for athletic and band travel.

The board also met Tuesday with Hank Wheeler, the consultant they hired to find a replacement for John Grigsby. He will be meeting with representatives of community



LEARN WHAT CHRISTMAS SAFETY'S ABOUT!

A CHRISTMAS SAFETY CHECK

- Before hanging strings of lights, spread them on the floor and check for frayed or bare wires, cracked insulation, loose connections, and damaged plugs or light sockets.
- Check extension cords for wear or damage and don't run them across walking areas.

Test lights before putting them on

- the tree. Unplug them before making repairs or replacing bulbs.
- Overloading circuits with too many lights can cause fire. Follow manufacturer's instructions about the number of lights allowed on one circuit.
- Never string lights on a metallic tree.

- Choose a fresh, green tree, trim its base and keep it in plenty of water. If the needles are brown and break off easily, it could be a fire risk.
- If you buy an artificial tree, make sure it has been tested for flammability by Underwriters Laboratories (UL).
- Always turn off lights before leaving home or going to bed. You'll save money and be safer, too.
- Do not use inside lights on the outside. All outside lighting equipment, including lights, cords and plugs, should be waterproof and made for outdoor use. Also, hang sockets downward and don't leave a socket empty.
- When hanging lights on the rooftop or in tall trees outdoors, stay clear of electrical lines.





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

Recipe of Week

Fried Pheasant

Remove legs and wings from a cleaned pheasant and cut the breast in half. Discard the back and neck. Allow the pheasant to soak in cold salt water for several hours (3 Tbs. of salt to a quart of water). This is to remove any blood clots that may be in the pheasant because of shot. Remove, rinse in cold water and dry thoroughly.

Place 2 slightly beaten eggs in a shallow dish. Mix 1 Tbs. of cold water with the eggs. Dip pheasant pieces into egg mixture, then roll each piece in a mixture of 1 c. flour, 1 tsp. salt, and 1/2 tsp. pepper. Dip each piece into egg mixture again, and then roll in fine dried breadcrumbs. Allow to stand for an hour or two in the refrigerator.

Melt enough lard in a heavy skillet to cover the bottom of the pan with 1/2" of grease. Brown the pheasant pieces carefully in the lard.

Place the browned pieces in a roasting pan with a cover. Pour 1 1/2 cups of cream over the pheasant; cover, and allow to steam in a 350 degree oven for about 40 minutes or until tender.





SPS files to lower its rates

Southwestern Public Service Company (SPS) has filed to lower the "fuel-cost recovery factor" on electric bills beginning Jan. 1, 1990, for its

Texas retail customers. This will have an overall effect of lowering electric rates 9.2 percent or \$42 million, for these customers.

The filing was made with the Public Utility Commission of Texas (PUCT), which regulates the fuel-cost portion of electric rates.

"This reduction, on top of our 4.3 percent rate decrease completed earlier this year, will make our service area even more competitive in attracting new industry and jobs," said SPS President and Chief Operating Officer Bill Helton. "We are pleased to pass on these savings to our customers. This new decrease is possible because of lower fuel and purchased -

power expenses." The cost of fuel to operate SPS power plants, plus the cost of power purchased from other companies, makes up about half of SPS's overall costs to serve customers. Electric utilities are not permitted to earn a profit on the cost of fuel or purchased power. Changes in these costs are passed on to

customers. In Texas, the fuel - cost recovery factor may be adjusted periodically by filing with the PUCT. In New Mex-

ico, Oklahoma and Kansas, SPS will pass on the savings through automatic fuel-cost adjustments.

"This decrease will make SPS one of the most competitive utilities in the state," said Helton. "SPS's average industrial rates already are lower than the averages for all regions of the country, using figures reported in 'Energy Users News.' This decrease will make our service

area even more attractive to current and prospective in-

dustries." The amount of decrease will vary according to usage and rates applicable to different types of customers. Texas residential customers using 1,000 kilowatt hours a month on SPS's standard rate would see their monthly electric bills decline by \$4.87, from \$69.67 to \$64.80.



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

ENMR Telephone Cooperative, recently installed switching facilities which will soon offer the first Electronic Voice Mail System in the region.

Voice Mail will host a majority of services, beyond those now performed through the use of answering machines or services. Voice Mail is much more sophisticated than the traditional systems now offered on the market. Electronic Voice Mail offered through ENMR Telephone Cooperative, will omit the need to purchase additional equip-

ment, as the service will be based on a monthly fee through the Cooperative.

Voice Mail will instantly store telephone messages. These messages may then be retrieved at any time, from any location by the subscribers of this service. Electronic Voice Mail acts as a filing cabinet for stored messages. The subscriber may then continue to store the message, or void the message from the file. This service will especially benefit businesses as after hour calls

will be answered, and important messages will always be received.

The Management team of ENMR Telephone Cooperative, visualized the necessity of Electronic Voice Mail Service in the areas served by the Cooperative. The man-

agement then brought the project before the board of directors. Upon their approval, ENMR ordered the equipment and began installing it. The Voice Mail System is now in the programming stages, with service expected to be offered soon to the public.


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Texico FFA'ers attend confab

ESA to sponsor 8th annual pheasant hunt

Theta Rho chapter of Epsilon Sigma Alpha is sponsoring its 8th annual pheasant hunt this year.

The hunting sites will be located in Parmer and Bailey Counties in Texas, and will be reserved for pheasant and duck hunting through the pheasant season dates, Dec. 9-24.

The annual event is a fund-raiser for the group's philanthropic projects. In the past this has include \$15,000 (over three years) to the Community Center; money and equipment for the New Mexico Girls Ranch; the establishment of the Rosa Roberts Educational Fund with Opportunity Plan, Inc.; playground equipment for the Farwell City Park, along with donations to such worthy causes as the Texico- Farwell Rotary Club polio project, Hodges Cancer Center, St. Judes Children's Hospital and the Parmer County Child Welfare Board.

Sorority members make sure that there is plenty of cover for birds to hide in so that the birds can grow and multiply safely. They talk to landowners to get permission for the use of their land and pay a fee to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department to establish a shooting reserve. Then the land is posted as such.

After the land is set up, the sorority estimates the number of hunters who can safely hunt in each area. They patrol the preserves to make sure there are not unauthorized hunters.

To hunt on the ESA preserves, one must be a licensed hunter and purchase a permit for the preserve. All permits are good from the date they are issued through the closing day of the season. Permits are good for any or all land secured by the sorority. Each participating landowner is given one or more complimentary permits.

Each hunter must have a Texas hunting license. Those hunting ducks must have a duck stamp. Texas hunting

licenses may be purchased locally at Hughes True Value and at the Parmer County Clerk's office. This is located on the first floor of the Parmer County Courthouse.

The preserve land will be posted and open only to hunters buying permits from ESA. Each hunter will be given a map of the posted land and will be free to hunt on any of the preserve land. The preserve will be patrolled so that only those having permits will be allowed to hunt.

Permits sold will be good from the date issued through the remainder of the season. Permit prices for the 1989 hunting season will be: Dec. 9-10, \$75; Dec. 11-17, \$50; Dec. 18-24, \$25. Permits sold for hunters ages 12 and under \$25.

Reservations may be made by mail by contacting Altha Herington, Box 542, Farwell, Texas 79325, (806) 481-9351. A \$25 non-refundable deposit is required to hold reservations this year for the ESA hunt because reservations have been limited.

When making reservations, hunters should indicate whether they will hunt with dogs. The preserve land will be posted and open only to hunters buying ESA permits. Due to reports from landowners of reduced pheasant
