
Lynn Mahaney reports that 26 booths have signed up for the arts and crafts fair. Last year, we had 28 so it looks like we'll beat that total by July 28.

2 Farwell teachers quit

The Farwell School Board Tuesday accepted resignations from teachers Verona Traynor Vaughn and Cynthia

The board voted to stop its contributions to the Plaintiff Intervenors Committee which had handled the Edgewood v Kirby case that forced the state legislature to revise its whole school funding process. Other school systems in the state plan to pursue the case farther, but Farwell

won't. Board members were advised that even if the courts rule the new state funding legislation unconstitutional, the local school district will still receive the amount of money that the state projected for them for the 1990-91 school year. Any additional changes that the courts mandate in the future will be reflected in budgets for years to come.

In other action, the board: - Set the time and date for the public budget hearing for 6 p.m. on Aug. 14.

 Voted to continue using the same student athletic insurance that it has used in the past. It will be administered in the same manner as it has in the past.

Smallwood to do missionary work



Jack Smallwood, son of Joe and Jackie Smallwood of Farwell, will soon be a missionary in Tanzania.

Smallwood is a 1982 graduate of Farwell High School. After college, he earned an associate degree from Clarendon Junior College and a bachelor's degree from New Mexico State University. He is a member of First Baptist Church in Farwell.

Smallwood recently returned to Farwell with a degree in agriculture education, but he really wasn't sure how to best use his education. He began volunteering some time at his church. He worked with the youth in grades 3-6 who are in the RA program there. He really enjoyed what he was doing. "That is when he really felt the call to be a missionary,"

said his mother. He found that his skills would be helpful in missionary work, and he began investigating the opportunities available. He has been assigned as an agriculture supervisor in Tanzania for the Southern Baptist Foreign Mission Board.

Smallwood's first stop is Virginia where he will receive orientation before leaving for Africa. Then he will go on to Tanzania where he will help with agricultural projects.

Few, if any, countries today want missionaries who simply spread the word about the religion of their choice. They want missionaries who can teach skills or complete projects that will benefit their people. Tanzania needs help in the field of Smallwood is one of 97 people who will attend the

orientation in Virginia July 5-20 sponsored by the Southern Baptist Foreign Mission Board, and then work overseas as Journeymen through the International Service Corps (ISC)

The journeymen will fill jobs in such fields as student work, nursing instruction, literacy education, vocational skills training, elementary teaching and graphic design. They will work alongside experienced missionaries for two years after completing orientation at the board's Missionary Learning Center in Rockville, Va.

Eight of the group were selected for assignment with Cooperative Services International, the Southern Baptist agency that assists nations where missionaries do not work. The journeyman option is a path of service for college

graduates under age 30 who want to serve two years after attending orientation with others of the same age. All ISC workers, including journeymen, pay as much of their living expense as they can while on overseas fields.

With nearly 15 million members, Southern Baptists are the largest evangelical denomination in the United States. Working with other Christians, they have a goal to help every person in the world hear the gospel message of Jesus Christ by the year 2000.

When he returns from his training in Virginia, Smallwood will present a program at First Baptist Church in Farwell at 7 p.m. on Sunday, July 22. He will play his guitar and sing at that time. He will also tell everyone about the work that is in store for him in Africa. The congregation will hold a commissioning service for him at this time.

When Smallwood leaves Farwell July 24, he will fly from Lubbock to Atlanta, Ga., to Amsterdam, Holland; to Dar Es Salaam, Tanzania. Then he will have a three day drive from the east coast of the country to the high plains of the western part of the nation.

"Transportation is very primitive there," said his mother. She has been told that there is only one train that crosses the nation, and it does not operate on a regular basis as our trains do.

Mail service is primitive, too. "It takes our post office 3 days to get a letter to Tanzania, but it takes about a month for letters to get to the missionaries. The mail arrives at the nearest big town and waits there until someone comes to get it. Whoever is going from that area just picks up the mail for everybody," said Mrs. Smallwood.

"We gripe about our government and all the laws we have. but what would we be without it?" she wonders.

When Smallwood arrives on the high plains of Tanzania he will live near another missionary and his family. They raise cattle and rabbits and a small garden, and they share the Gospel, and build new churches.

Smallwood will be bringing some seeds with him for planting at the mission.

"People in that area live one day to the next. Many of the children starve before they are two years old. Mostly, they eat cornmeal mush, and don't get enough protein," said Mrs. Smallwood. One of Smallwood's jobs will be teaching the people of the area ways to store and preserve what they produce.

It seems odd to Mrs. Smallwood that the natives of Tanzania do not raise more cattle and eat it. The high plains of Tanzania are surrounded by some of the world's largest lakes, and the nation gets more rainfall than we get here. The native grasses have supported all sorts of wildlife for eons. It seems like an ideal place to raise cattle.

But, the people can't afford to raise cattle right now. The missionaries are teaching them to raise rabbits for protein in their diet because are much cheaper than cattle to purchase and they multiply very fast.

Mrs. Smallwood thought that her son Jack's friends might like to write to him while he is in Africa. His address in Africa will be: Box 224, Kasulu, Tanzania, East Africa.

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

White grubs often infest lawns this time of year, especially

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Conservation advice given

With Farwell having well repair problems lately, it draws attention to the fact that water is exceedingly precious in this area.

Here are a few tips on water conservation that Mrs. Cynthia Thigpen, Farwell city clerk, suggested:

- Put a brick in the tank of the commode to decrease the amount of water used when flushing. It will still work just

- Stop all dripping faucets. Those drops of water add up to gallons in a year's time.

- Rinse dishes in a sink full of water instead of letting it run constantly while doing dishes.

The following information from the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 adds more tips on

conservation and the need for it in this area. - A deep, thorough water application is best. This encourages deeper roots which gives the vegetation a thicker root zone soil profile to draw moisture from. Frequent

watering with hand- held hose- end sprayers encourages only shallow root development. - Homeowners can achieve better water applications by using sprinklers that throw large droplets of water rather than a fine spray mist. The finer the mist, the more susceptible the drops are to loss by wind drift and

- Lawn water use is about one- fourth of an inch per day. Therefore, an application of about two inches of water on lawns each week will provide enough water to maintain a healthy lawn. However, any water losses occurring during your irrigation application due to use of inefficient sprinkler systems, sidewalk irrigation or runoff will have to be made up in order to achieve a two - inch water application.

- Irrigating the lawn in the early morning helps reduce water losses associated with wind drift and evaporation. In the morning, the wind is usually calm and temperatures are lower. Also, watering in the morning allows the sun to gradually dry out the turf, which reduces the likelihood for turf diseases.

- It is important to position sprinklers so that sidewalks, driveways and streets are not being irrigated. Watering these surfaces costs homeowners money without benefitting lawns or gardens.

- Lawns are water- stressing when grass blades fold up in the late afternoon or footprints remain in the turf after walking across it. If these symptoms occur, lawns should be irrigated within 24 hors. If not, the lawn will wilt and eventually turn straw-colored.

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Recipe of Week

Spring Steak & Spinach Salad 3 Tbs. Kikkoman Lite Soy Sauce, divided 3 Tbs. red wine vinegar,

1 clove, garlic, pressed 1/4 tsp. black pepper 3/4 lb. boneless tender beef steak, about 3/4" thick 1/4 c. vegetable oil

1/4 tsp. oregano, crumbled 1 lb. fresh spinach, washed, stems removed and leaves torn into bite sized pieces 6 ounces fresh mushrooms, sliced

3 medium oranges, peeled and cut into sections.

Blend 2 Tbs. Kikkoman Lite soy sauce, 1 Tbs. vinegar, garlic and pepper; pour over steak in large plastic bag. Press air out of bag: close top securely. Turn bag over several times to coat both sides. Marinate 30 minutes; turn bag over occasionally. Meanwhile, combine remaining 1 Tbs. lite soy sauce, 2 Tbs. vinegar, oil and oregano; set aside. Broil steak 4 minutes on each side for rare or to desired doneness. Cut steak across the grain in thin slices; combine with spinach, mushrooms and oranges in large bowl. Blend soy sauce mixture; pour over spinach mixture and toss to combine.

# Dangerous Debris or Buildings

Texico's clean-up ordinances

At the first "brainstorming session" of the Texico ad hoc cleanup committee last month, it was suggested that residents needed to know what ordinances governed them.

At that time, the State Line Tribune volunteered to run the pertinent ordinances in full.

So here they are:

Dangerous buildings or debris; removal; notice; right of municipality to remove; lien.

A. Whenever any building or structure is ruined, damaged and dilapidated, or any premise is covered with ruins, rubbish, wreckage or debris, the governing body of a municipality may be resolution find that the ruined, damaged and dilapidated building, structure or premise is a menace to the public comfort, health, peace or safety and require the removal from the municipality of the building, structure, ruins, rubbish, wreckage or debris.

B. A copy of the resolution shall be served on the owner, occupant or agent in charge of the building, structure or premise. If the owner, as shown by the real estate records of the county clerk, occupant or agent in charge of the building, structure, or premise cannot be served within the municipality, a copy of the resolution shall be posed on the building, structure or premise and a copy of the resolution shall be published one time.

C. Within ten days of the receipt of a copy of the resolution or of the posting and publishing of a copy of the resolution, the owner, occupant or agent in charge of the building. structure or premise, shall commence removing the building, structure, ruin, rubbish, wreckage or debris, or file a written

objection with the municipal clerk asking for a hearing before

the governing body of the municipality. D. If a written objection is filed as required in this section.

the governing body shall:

1. fix a date for a hearing on its resolution and the objection; 2. consider all evidence for and against the removal

resolution at the hearing; and 3. determine if its resolution should be enforced or

rescinded.

E. Any person aggrieved by the determination of the governing body may appeal to the district court by:

1. giving notice of appeal to the governing body within five days after the determination made by the governing body; and

2. filing a petition in the district court within twenty days after the determination made by the governing body. The district court shall hear the matter de novo and enter judgement in accordance with its findings.

F. If the owner, occupant or agent in charge of the building, structure or premise fails to commence removing the building, structure, ruins, rubbish, wreckage or debris:

1. within ten days of being served a copy of the resolution or of the posting and publishing of the resolution; or


2. within five days of the determination by the governing body that the resolution shall be enforced; or

3. after the district court enters judgment sustaining the determination of the governing body, the municipality may remove the building, structure, ruins, rubbish, wreckage or debris at the cost and expense of the owner. The reasonable cost of the removal shall constitute a lien against the building, structure, ruin, rubbish, wreckage or debris so removed and against the lot or parcel of land from which it was removed. The lien shall be foreclosed in the manner provided in Sections 3-36-1 through 3-36-6 NMSA 1978.

G. The municipality may pay for the costs of removal of any condemned building, structure, wreckage, rubbish or debris by granting to the person removing such materials, the legal title to all salvageable materials in lieu of all other compensation.

H. Any person or firm removing any condemned building, structure, wreckage, rubbish or debris shall leave the premises from which the material has been removed in a clean, level and safe condition, suitable for further occupancy or construction and with all excavations filled.

#### Weeds

An ordinance pertaining to the public health and welfare; providing for an requiring the cutting and removing of all weeds on all lots or tracts of land in the town of Texico, New Mexico; and providing a penalty for the violation hereof.

Section 1. Every property owner, and every occupant, lessee or agent of the same, is hereby required:

a. to keep all lots or tracts of land owned or occupied by them within the Town of Texico free from growing weeds, and to cut and remove the same as often as the growth and

b. To remove from all lots or tracts of land owned or occupied by them within said Town all trash or debris, including but not limited to wrecked and abandoned motor

vehicles and vacant and delapidated buildings. Section 2. It shall be unlawful for the owner or occupant of any lot or tract of land to suffer or permit any weeds to grow and remain upon such lots or tracts of land, or to suffer or permit the accumulation of trash or debris upon the same, or to permit the growing of such weeds or the accumulation of such trash or debris in the street or alleys abutting any such lot or tract of land. Any owner or occupant of such lot or tract of land who fails, refuses or neglects to cut or destroy such weeds, or to remove such trash or debris, after five days written or printed notice from a duly authorized official of the Town shall be fined in a sum not to exceed \$100.00. Each time that such owner or occupant shall, after receiving such notice, fail, refuse or neglect to comply with the terms thereof, shall be deemed to have committed a separate and distinct offense.

Section 3. In the event that:

conditions of the same may require.

a. Any lot or tract of land is vacant and the owner thereof shall refuse or neglect to cut and remove such weeds or to dispose of such trash and debris after five days written or printed notice from a duly authorize official of the Town, or

b. The owner of any lot or tract of land is unknown or is a non-resident of the Town, and weeds or not cut and removed or trash or debris disposed of within five days after notice to do so has been posted on the premises affected thereby by a duly authorized official of the Town,

then and in that event a duly authorized employee of the Town shall proceed to comply with the terms of said notice of shall employ some other person to do so. The employee of the Town carrying out the terms of the notice shall determine and keep an account of the cost of compliance and report the same to the Mayor and Board of Trustees, and the Mayor and Board shall levy a special tax and assessment for such cost against the lot or tract of land so benefitted and involved and enforce the collection of the same in the same manner as for the repairing and building of streets and sidewalks.

#### - Vehicles -

An ordinance prohibiting the abandonment of vehicles and restricting the parking thereof; restricting the disposition or keeping of wrecked, non-operating or discarded vehicles on streets or private property; providing for impounding of certain vehicles; and imposing penalties.

Section 1. Definitions. When used in this ordinance the following words or terms shall be taken to have the following meaning:

1. "Person" shall mean any person, firm, partnership, association, corporation, company or organization of any

2. "Vehicle" shall mean a machine propelled by power other than human power designed to travel along the ground by use of wheels, treads, runners, or slides and transport persons or property or pull machinery and shall include, without limitation, automobile, truck, trailer, motorcycle, tractor, buggy and wagon.

3. "Roadway" shall mean the entire width between the boundary lines of every way which has been dedicated to the public use for purposes of vehicular travel.

4. "Street or alley" shall mean that portion of any roadway which has been improved in any fashion for the purpose of vehicular travel.

5. "Property" shall mean any real property within the city which is not located within the street or highway boundary

Section 2. Abandonment and parking of vehicles. No person shall abandon any vehicle on any roadway within the City. It shall be presumed that any vehicle which has been left at any place on a roadway within the City for a period of more than 72 hours consecutively is an abandoned vehicle. No person shall park or stop any vehicle on any street or alley within the City, whether or not said vehicle is abandoned, for a period of more than 30 days consecutively.

Section 3. Leaving of wrecked, non-operating vehicles on street. No person shall leave any partially dismantled, nonoperating, wrecked, junked or discarded vehicle on any street

or highway within the City.

Section 4. Disposition of wrecked or discarded vehicles. No person in charge or control of any property within the City, whether as owner, tenant, occupant, lessee, or otherwise, shall allow any partially dismantled, non-operating, wrecked, junked, or discarded vehicle to remain on such property longer than 48 hours; and no person shall leave any such vehicle on any property within the City for longer than 48 hours; except that this ordinance shall not apply with regard to a vehicle in an enclosed building, a vehicle on the premises of a business enterprise operated in a lawful place and manner. when necessary to the operation of such business enterprise; or a vehicle in an appropriate storage place or depository maintained in a lawful place and manner by the

Section 5. Notices of Violation. Should any employee of the City observe any violation of Sections 3 or 4 of this ordinance, or should any such employee of the City observe any vehicle which has been parked or stopped upon a street or alley in excess of 30 days in violation of Section 2 of this ordinance, it shall be his duty to serve upon either the owner of the vehicle involved or upon the owner or occupant of the property involved, a notice in a form to be supplied by the City Marshal, which notice shall command the recipient thereof to cause any such violation of this ordinance to terminate within a period not in excess of five days.

Section 6. Impounding. In the event of failure to comply with any written notice issued pursuant to Section 5 of this ordinance, the City Marshal or any city employee designated by him is authorized to remove or have removed any vehicle left at any place within the City to which a notice to comply has been issued. Any such impounded vehicle shall be retained until claimed by its owner or disposed of in accordance with law. Possession of any such impounded vehicle shall not be returned to its owner unless or until the owner has paid all costs of removal and storage.

Section 7. Removal of abandoned vehicles. The City Marshal or any City Employee designated by him is authorized to remove any abandoned vehicle from the place where it is abandoned to the nearest garage or other place of safety. Whenever an employee removes an abandoned to the nearest garage or other place of safety. Whenever an employee removes an abandoned vehicle from a street or alley as authorized in this Section 7, the employee shall immediately send or cause to be sent a written report of such removal by mail to the state department whose duty it is to register vehicles, and shall file a copy of such notice with the proprietor of any public garage in which the vehicle may be stored. Any vehicle impounded pursuant to the provisions of this Section 7 may be reclaimed by its owner upon payment of all costs of removal and storage.

Section 8. Penalties. Violations of this ordinance shall be punished by a fine of not more than \$300.00 or by imprisonment for a period of not more than 90 days, or by

both such fine and imprisonment.

Section 9. Severability. If any section, paragraph, clause or provision of this ordinance shall for any reason be held to be invalid or unenforceable, the invalidity or unenforceability of such section, paragraph, clause or provision shall not affect any of the remaining provisions of this ordinance.

Section 10. Repeal. All former ordinance or parts thereof conflicting or inconsistent with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.



enter, you must be at least 12 years old.


