We're glad to hear that Jim Martin of SPS got promoted, but we're sorry to see him go.

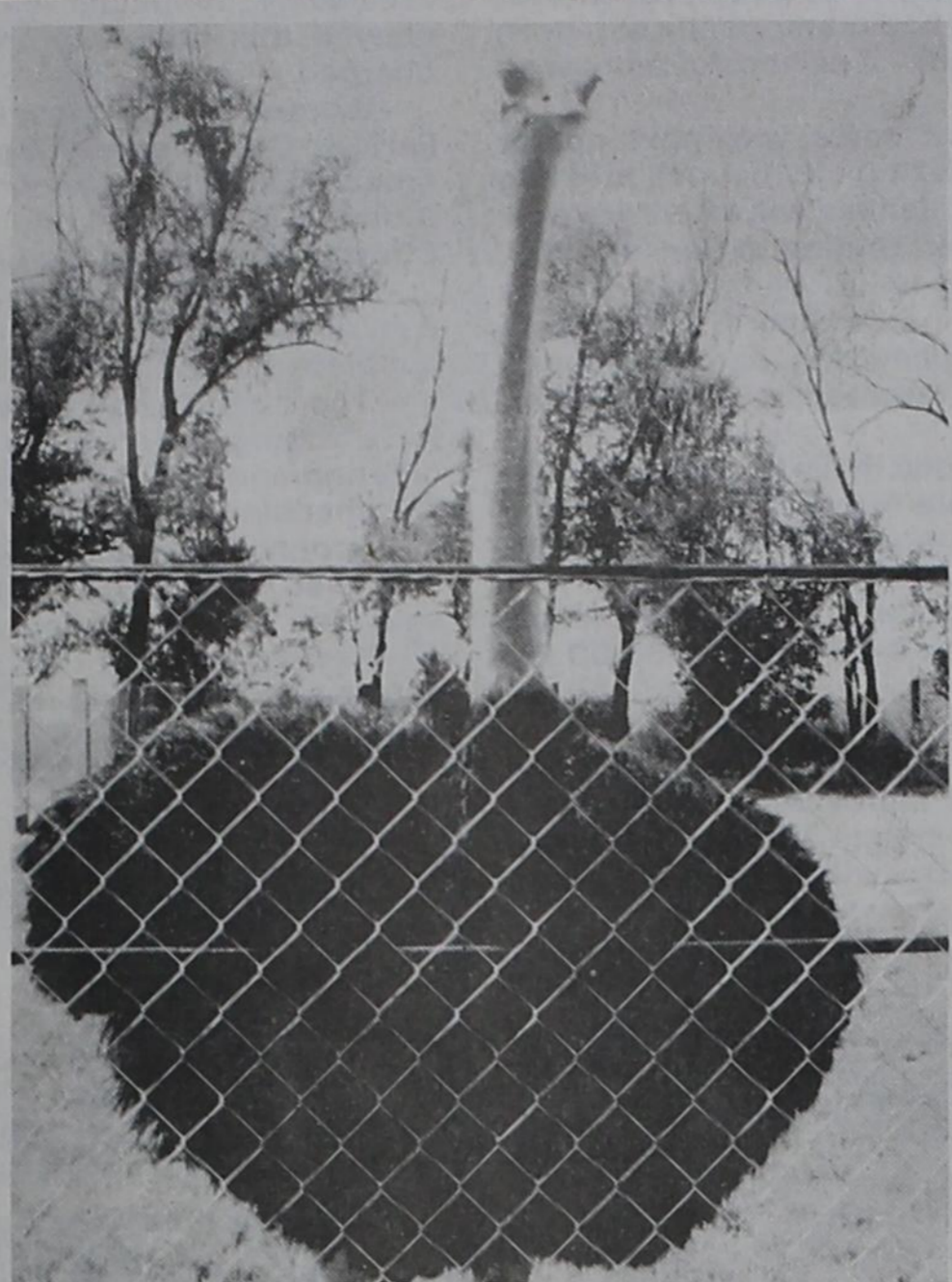
Jim has been an active worker in our area and his drive and enthusiasm will be missed.

Standard time resumes Oct. 25. Set your clocks back one hour Saturday night.

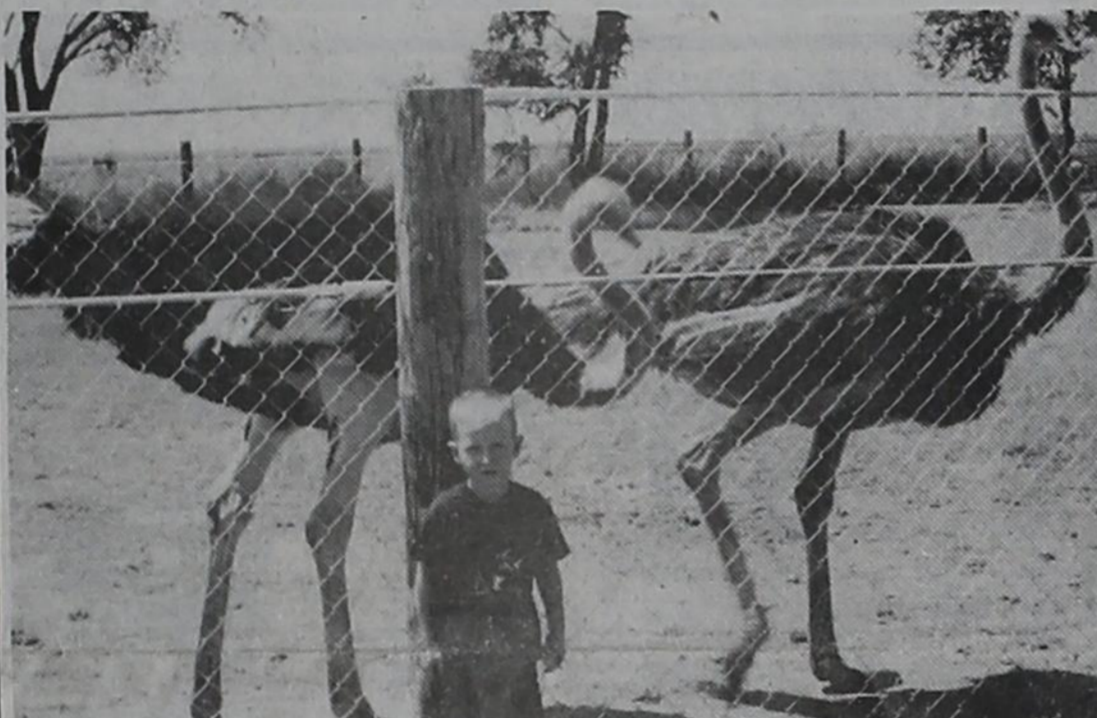

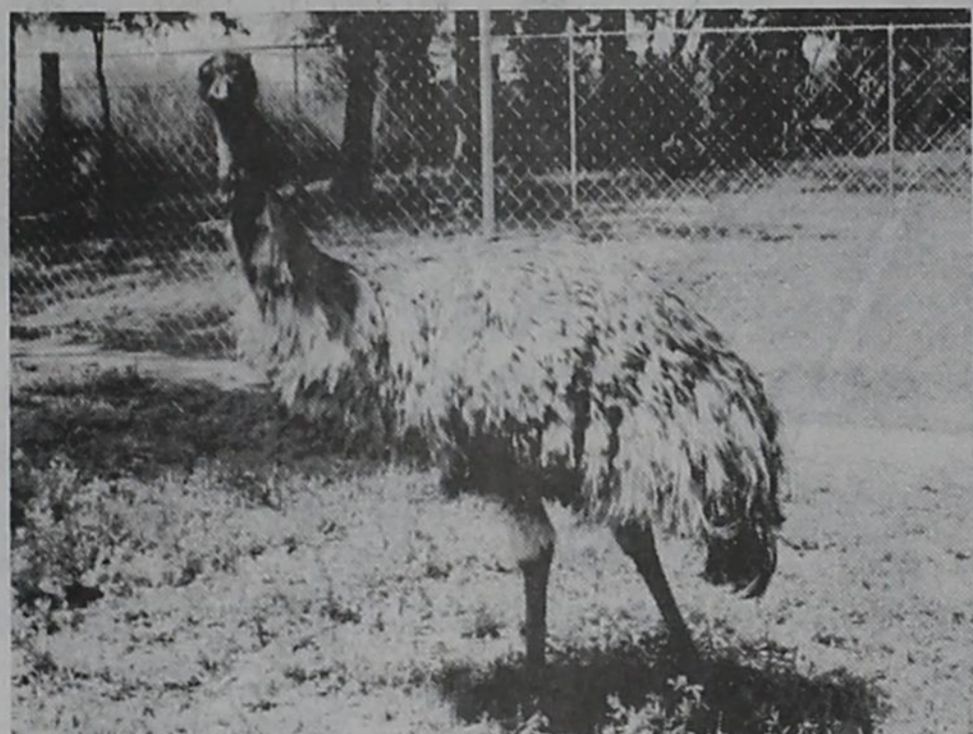

A new industry

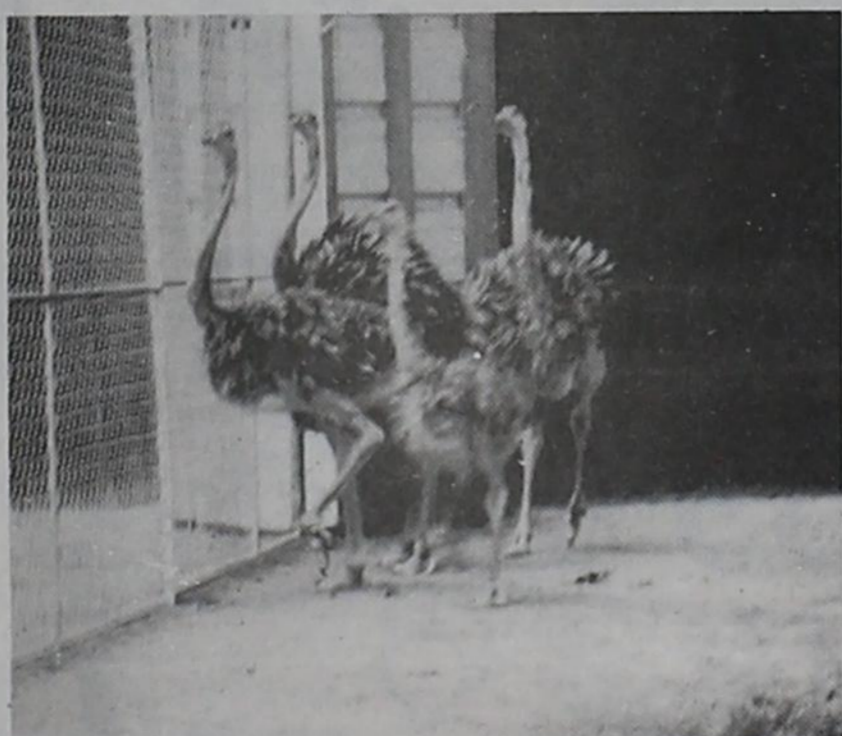
Farwell's Darren and Darrisa Sudderth boast the only local ostrich and emu raising facility. The new nationwide industry is on the upsurge.

She not only maintained her lead for the second week in a row, but boosted it by getting 7 right last week. This is the first time in 4 weeks that a leader kept in front.

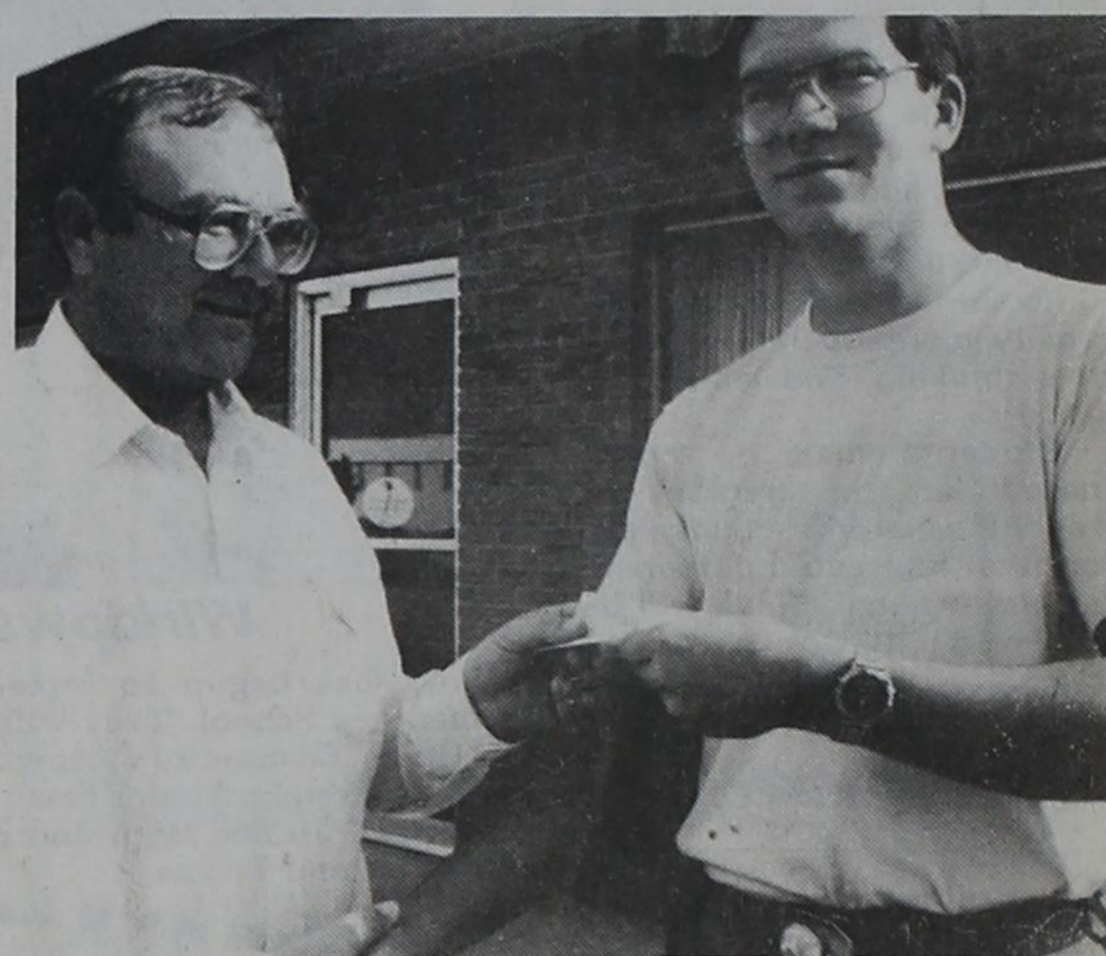
To show how low the scores have been this year, normally it takes over 8 points a week to place high in the contest. Mrs. Gartin is leading with less than 8 points a week.

Farwell acts on police

The Farwell City Council moved ahead Tuesday on hiring a city police officer.

Mayor Chris Gikas appointed a committee of three councilmen - John Carlson, Pat Howard and Royce Bethel - to look into advertising for an officer and suggesting the best applicants to the full council. This committee will meet shortly to begin its work.

The question of how to fund an officer was answered. Gikas is proposing that funds from the city's general fund certificates of deposits be used as start-up. Currently, Farwell has about \$150,000 in general fund CD's, and another \$45,000 in other CD's. It is estimated that the start-up cost for a city police department will be between \$30,000 and \$50,000.

Carlson, who has opposed starting a city police department, expressed strong reservations against depleting the city's contingency fund. After the CD's are gone, then what? he wondered. Higher taxes?

Besides the contingency fund money, it's assumed that part of the funds needed each year will be raised by the police officer himself, through issuing tickets. But Gikas stressed that this should be a small part of the revenue needed. "We don't want a speed trap here," he noted. The mayor emphasized an officer is needed to patrol at night and watch for break-ins.

Gikas also noted that cutbacks can be made in other areas, to ensure more funds for a police officer, such as not improving all the city's alleys. He also noted that the 7.99 percent tax hike approved last month will bring in another \$4,000 a year.

Texico may move up to Class 2A

Texico principals Carolyn Abell and Anna Southard attended a New Mexico Athletic Association meeting on Oct. 21 where the possibility of re-alignment for several schools, including Texico, was discussed.

"As of last week there were no written proposals for re-alignment," said Mrs. Abell. "If no proposals are made, Texico is scheduled to move up."

Written proposals must be made by Dec. 1.

Mrs. Abell indicated that she wasn't too worried about the possibility of changing from 1A to 2A classification

for sports.

"We already play Dexter, Jal and Eunice," said Mrs. Abell. All of these schools are 2A.

Distances to be traveled for games is not a factor, she added. "We already travel up to 200 miles to play."

She believed, though, the most important indicator of the decision making process is the fact that if Texico moves up to Class 2A, there would only be 7 schools left in the state in Class 1A playing 11-Man football.

"The regulations say you have to have 8 teams to be in a championship playoff," she noted.

'Red Ribbon' events planned

Farwell students will again participate in Red Ribbon Drug Awareness Week to help make them aware of the dangers of drug abuse.

According to school nurse Rebecca Smallwood, program co-ordinator, activities planned are:

Friday, Oct. 23 - Red ribbons will be handed out by the junior high cheerleaders, and special emphasis will be placed upon being drug free. Junior High cheerleaders will also hang red ribbons as decorations.

Monday, Oct. 26 - National Honor Society will put red ribbons on cars. A drug free poster contest will be held in the elementary school, and Junior High and Senior High health classes will make drug free posters to decorate the halls.

Tuesday, Oct. 27 - Ribbons will be handed out to all students and staff. A High School group will perform a drug free rap for younger students.

Wednesday, Oct. 28 - Everyone needs to wear red. Fifth grade classes will perform a drug free skit for the younger students.

Thursday, Oct. 29 - Students will be asked to sign drug free pledge banners and commit to being drug free.

Friday, Oct. 30 - Everyone is asked to wear jeans and red shirts. Classes will take drug free posters to their pep rally. At 2:15 there will be a red ribbon walk to display the school wide drug free commitment. Students will carry drug free banners.

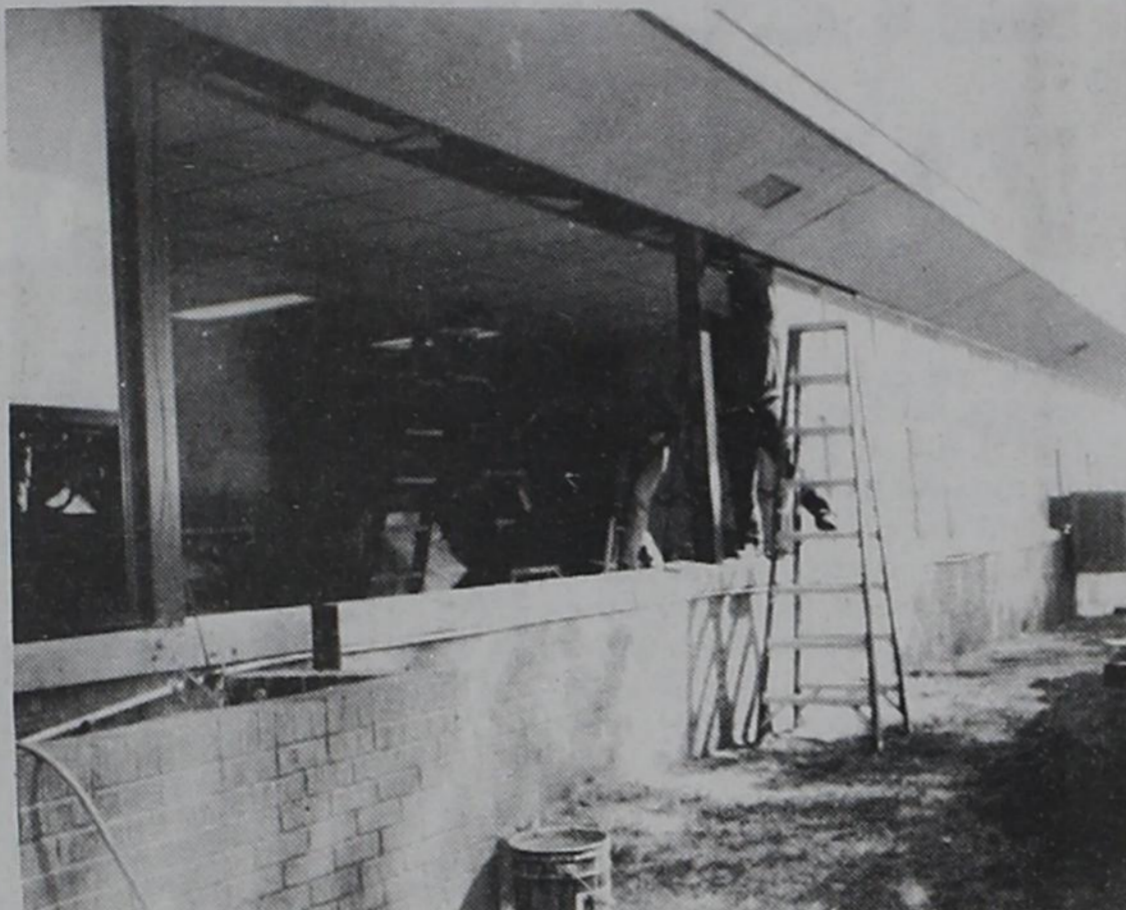
Nominations sought

Farwell

Later in the meeting, some good financial news was announced by city clerk Cynthia Thigpen. The city has been paying more than \$1,900 a month for workers' compensation insurance. But since the trash pickups have been taken over by Waste Management, this insurance dramatically has been reduced to more than \$500 a month - a savings of more than \$16,500 a year for Farwell.

But some not-so-good financial news was next up for discussion. As was noted at the Texico city council meeting last week, new Clean Water Act guidelines will affect Farwell.

Water Supt. Dee Hammit reported that as of Jan. 1, 1993, the city will have to start paying for EPA-mandated tests that the state had been paying. And on July 1, 1993, tests will be taken for 20 chemicals, emphasizing lead and copper. Houses built in the 1980s will be targeted, with tests taken in 20 of those homes.

But Hammit felt the city wouldn't have a problem with those chemicals. If no problems are found, then the testing doesn't have to be done every 6 months, but once a year, then every other year, then every 3 years.

Asked what the worst-case scenario would be, Hammit estimated the annual cost between \$4,000 and \$6,000 for this extra work.

In other business, the council:

- Rescinded a decision it made two months ago to cut back on the city's work staff because Royce Menning plans to leave in December. This means Michael Robinson will stay on the crew. Robinson also will be the city's dog catcher.

- Heard councilman Martin Kube note he has received a complaint of a house on Sixth Street that was moved into

the city but not fixed up. A letter will be written to the home owner.

- Changed the requirements for tagging dogs and cats. Previously, an annual fee of \$2 was asked, but few persons obeyed this ordinance. Now a one-time fee of \$5 will be charged.

- Agreed to a proposal by Ralph Franse, president of the Farwell Chamber of Commerce, to give Loop 292 (going around Farwell) a second name, honoring the late John Aldridge. Officially, Loop 292 will remain the name but the Chamber can put signs up on it honoring Aldridge.


- Scheduled a zoning variance hearing Nov. 2 at 6:30 p.m. at city hall for Billy Myers, who wants to move a new doublewide next to A-Z Service.

- The agenda had included a request from Lupe Vidaurri for a zoning variance for 800 Ave. B. She didn't attend the meeting and Mrs. Thigpen will call her to see if she wants to schedule a hearing.

- Approved a building permit for Del Black to build a garage and shed at 300 3rd St. behind his home. The council also sold him 10 feet of alleyway for \$200.

- Heard Gikas say that City Hall needs to be painted, both exterior and interior. City employees will be used.



Wolverines fall to Tatum

The Texico Wolverines lost a tough game last Friday to Tatum, 26-7.

The loss put the Wolverines at 4-4 overall and 2-1 in district. Because they will win a 1-0 forfeit over Melrose tonight (Melrose has cancelled its season due to injuries), Texico will be 5-4 overall and 3-1 in district.

"We got down and let Tatum play," said Coach Scroggins. "We were probably better than they were."

Since the Wolverines can't play Melrose, Coach Bruce Scroggins looked around for a team to play this week. Texico will play the Hereford sophomores Thursday at 6:30 p.m. mdt. Texico Junior High will host Melrose Junior High at 4:30 p.m. mdt Friday.

Texico kicked off and Jeremy Stanton tackled the returner. Matthew Williams had a good tackle, as did Daniel Madrid. But Tatum broke through for a 69-yard TD run at 9:43. Louie Delgado attempted a diving tackle but fell short. The kick failed and Tatum led 6-0.

Kelvin Gooden returned the kick to the 31. Gooden and Hadley Gilbert ran the ball but came up short, forcing a punt. On defense, Williams had a strong tackle for a Tatum 7-yard loss. Tatum then had to punt, kicking out of bounds near midfield.

Texico was held and Aaron Ketterling punted 33 yards. Charles Williams tackled the returner. Tatum again struck quickly, this time on an 80-yard pass play, despite good defensive efforts by Delgado and Bobby Winegeart. The kick failed and it was 12-0 at 4:25 of the first period.

Gooden returned the kick to the 30. Again, three runs came up short and Ketterling had to punt to the Tatum 28. On defense, Mike Eaton had a big tackle. Billy Rogers' rush on the quarterback forced an incomplete pass. Tatum punted to midfield.

Gooden got off a nifty run, to the Tatum 22. Delgado gained 7 yards on 2 plays. Gilbert gained 2 and it was 4th and 1. Texico went for it but was stopped.

Corey Horner had a good tackle. After a penalty, Tatum tried 3 passes, all incomplete. The Coyotes punted to Gooden, who returned it 15 yards with the help of some good blocks.

The Wolverine offense swung into high gear. Gilbert ran for 4, Gooden for 3 and Delgado for 9. Despite a holding penalty, Texico kept moving: Gooden ran for 6 and Delgado hit Pat Chumley with a pass. Then Delgado passed to Johnny Salinas for a 29-yard TD at 5:17 of the second period. Ketterling kicked the point after and it was 12-7.

Chumley stopped the run. Tatum fumbled. But then Tatum connected on a long pass play, with Salinas making the tackle at the Wolverine 25. Eaton had a good tackle. But the Coyotes

completed another pass, getting to the Texico 9. Two plays later they scored on a 4 yard plunge at 1:46. The pass for extra points failed and the half ended with Tatum up 18-7.

Delgado returned the second half kickoff 30 yards. He then ran for 14 to the texico 47. Gooden sprinted for another 20 yards. The drive continued, until Delgado was injured; Chumley came in to play quarterback. A penalty moved Texico 5 yards back and they couldn't make a first down.

Tatum started on its 10. Eaton, Gooden and Steve Horner had tackles. Tatum made a first down despite tackles by Kelvin and Tyrone Gooden. But Anthony Garcia caused a fumble, recovered by Manuel Estrada.

An offside penalty against Tatum and runs by Chumley and Kelvin Gooden made a first down. But Tatum intercepted, halting the drive.

On defense, Madrid and Steve Horner had tackles. When Tatum tried to punt, Rogers rushed the punter, causing a fumble recovered by Garcia. But Texico fumbled the ball back on the next play.

Estrada and Tyrone Gooden had tackles. But Tatum hit again on a long pass, with Winegeart making the tackle at the Texico 35. The Coyotes scored on an 18 yard run. A run for two points worked, and Tatum was ahead, 26-7.

Deficiency payment rates looked at

With the end of the 1992 crop year approaching faster than many producers would like speculation about the size of this year's final deficiency payment rate is already underway.

According to Lubbock-based Plains Cotton Growers (PCG) the average price received through the month of July shows that, in general, marketings are outpacing last year and prices remain significantly lower than 1991. How the marketing year ends will have an impact on the eventual amount of the 1992 deficiency payment.

Through July marketings for the 1992 crop year have totaled 6.866 million bales, 1.693 million bales higher than the 5.173 million bales marketed during the same period in 1991.

Prices received on the 184,000 bales marketed during July was 55.3 cents, 10.4 cents lower than the price received during July last year. The weighted average price for cotton through July is 51.27 cents, 21.63 cents lower than the 72.9 cent target price.

Deficiency payments are calculated as the lesser of the difference between the target price of 72.9 cents and either Commodity Credit Corporation Loan rate or the average price received by farmers weighted by total marketings for the preceding calendar year.

For 1992 the maximum possible deficiency payment producers can expect is 20.55 cents. After the 6 cent advance deficiency payment is subtracted the final payment most producers on the High Plains can expect is 14.55 cents.

"Unless price makes a significant upward move between now and the end of the year it is very possible that the deficiency payment will end up near 20.5 cents," notes PCG Executive Vice President Donald A. Johnson. "This should be good news to producers here on the Plains who have lost all or part of their crop and need that higher deficiency payment to try and pay back the money they borrowed on the 1992 crop."

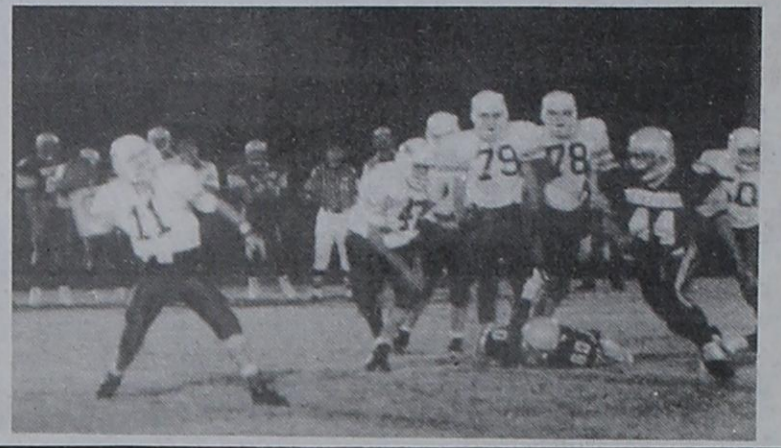
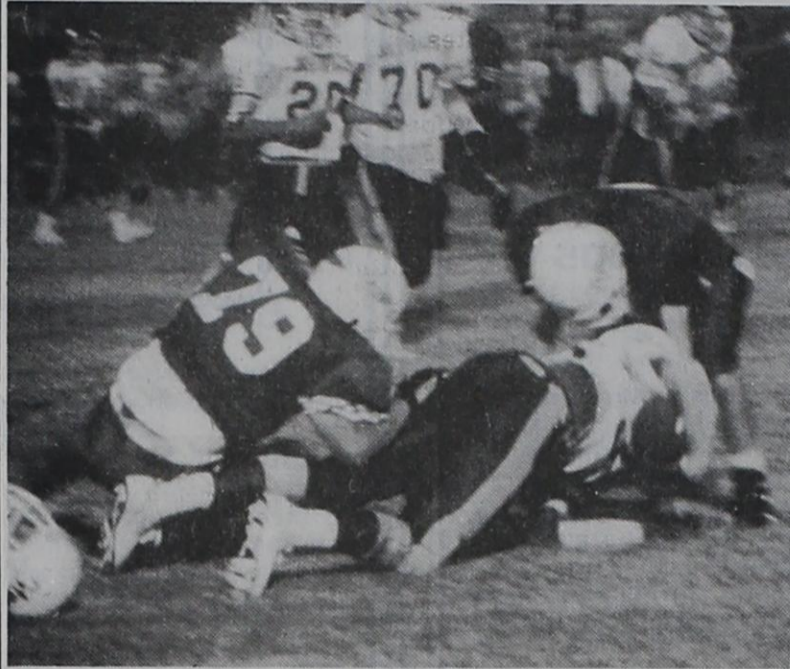

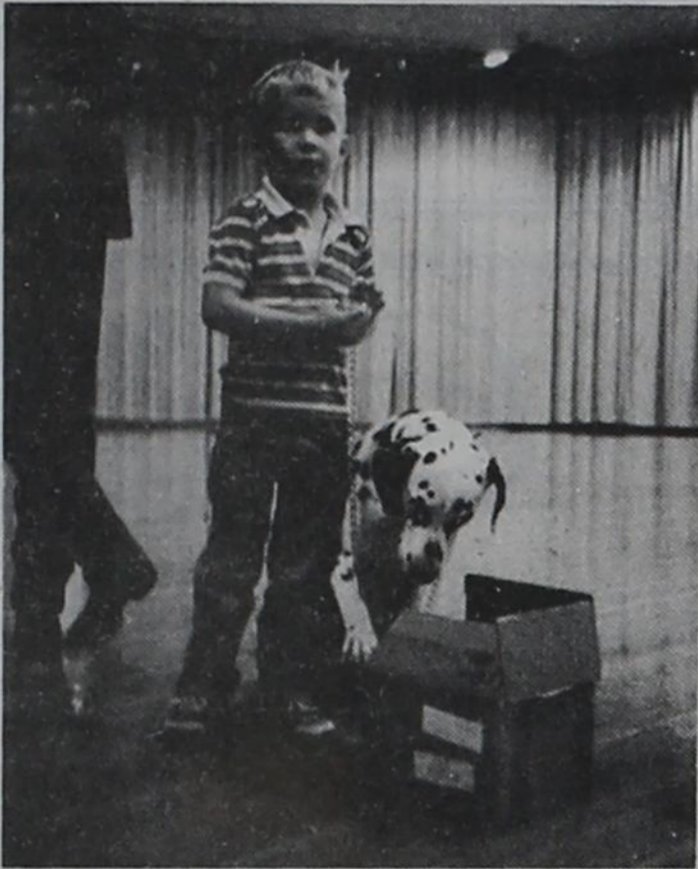

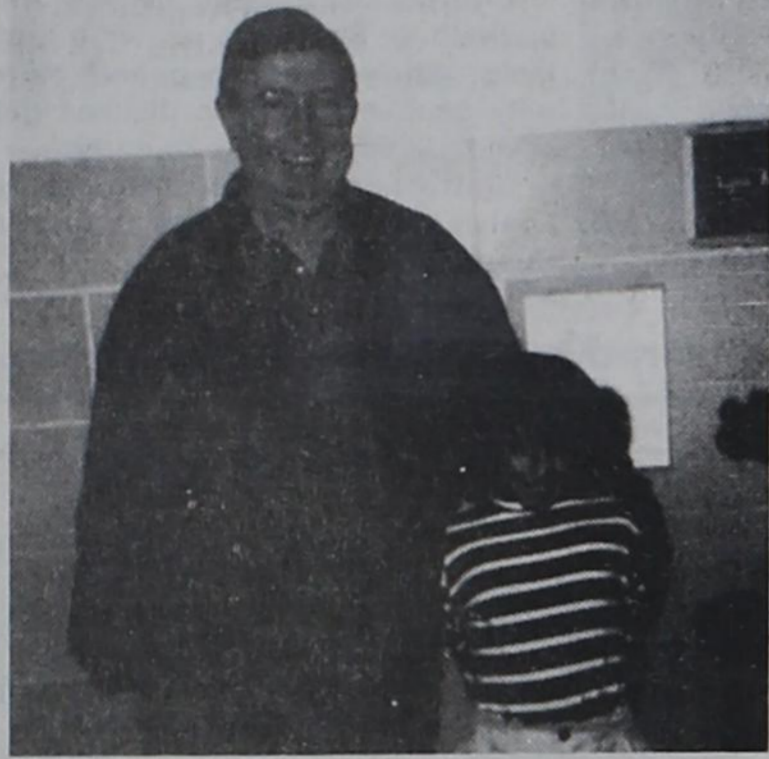

Nazareth beats Farwell; Bovina on tap

The strong Nazareth Swifts defeated the Farwell Steers last Friday, 40-0, in an away game.

Farwell is now 2-5 on the season and 0-2 in district. The Steers host Bovina at 7:30 p.m. tonight (Friday).

Even though the score doesn't indicate it, the Steers outplayed the Swifts in the first half. With less than a minute to go in the first half, Nazareth was up by only 7-0 and on their own 6 yard line. Turnovers continued to plague Farwell - 2 interceptions and 3 lost fumbles - all on their first plays of offense.

Here's how the game went:

Farwell won the coin toss and elected to kick off. On defense, Rob Pomper and Lance Anderson had tackles. Nazareth was stopped cold and punted to the Steer 20. Brent Harrison broke around end for a 45-yard run to the Nazareth 25. Clint Austin bulled for 9 yards and a first down at the Nazareth 12. Ryan Williams hit Harrison with a 5 yard pass. On 4th and 4, Clay Corn's field goal try was blocked.

Nazareth broke open a long run around end to the Farwell 17. Tackles were made by Michael Mendoza, Kade Kent, Justin Mahaney and Pomper. But Nazareth got a first down at the Steer 3, then ran over for a TD at 3:28 of the first period. The kick made it 7-0.

Anderson had a 20-yard kickoff return to the Steer 32. Farwell was held and punted to the Swift 40. Due to a good pass rush, the Swift quarterback threw an interception to Harrison. The Steers started on their own 25.

Anderson ran for 5 and Austin for 6. Austin then gained 10. At midfield, Williams was sacked and Farwell punted. Corn tackled the returner at the Swift 23.

On defense, good tackles were made by Derrick Haseloff and Pomper and Nazareth punted. Harrison returned it to near midfield. Williams hit Dean Rubio with a 5 yard pass. But Farwell was stopped and punted to the Swift 20. Kent recovered a fumble at the Nazareth 12. On 4th and 10, Farwell was stopped 4 yards short of the goal.

Jeremy Ortiz - who later broke his thumb - and Anderson had strong tackles. Nazareth had to punt from its end zone. Harrison returned it 15 yards to the Swift 25. But Nazareth intercepted at its goal line. With 39 seconds left in the half, Nazareth broke loose for a 94-yard TD run. Austin blocked the kick and it was 13-0 at the half.

Nazareth started at its own 30 to open the second half.

Sean Haseloff broke up a pass with a good hit. Austin had a strong tackle. But Nazareth scored on a 35-yard run at 9:54. The kick made it 20-0.

Derrick Haseloff had a good return to the Farwell 40. Harrison gained 16 yards around end, behind a strong block by Rubio. A personal foul against Nazareth put the ball on the Swifts' 30. Harrison gained a first down on 2 carries. On 4th and 10 at the Swift 19, a pass failed.

On defense, Nash Armstrong broke up a pass and Nazareth punted to the Steer 43. On the first play, Nazareth intercepted. Farwell got the ball right back when Anderson caused a Nazareth QB fumble, recovered by Kent.

Harrison gained 15, and Farwell got another 15 yards due to a personal foul against Nazareth. Harrison had to leave the game due to injury. Farwell was now on the Nazareth 16. Austin ran for 4. Nazareth intercepted as the 3rd quarter ended.

Jody Mahaney had a good tackle on defense. Nazareth went for it on 4th and 8 at the Farwell 37 and was stopped. On its first play, Farwell fumbled. Nazareth immediately hit a 33-yard TD pass at 9:10. The kick made it 27-0.

Armstrong returned the kickoff to the Farwell 33. On its first play, Farwell lost a fumble at its 34. Pomper knocked down a pass. On 4th and 9, Nazareth hit a screen pass to the Steer 15. The quarterback scored from the 10 at 6:20. A run for extra points failed and it was 33-0.

Shawn Haseloff returned the kickoff to the Farwell 20. Williams hit Shawn Haseloff with a 7 yard pass. Farwell was held and punted to the Swift 37. Derrick Haseloff and Jody Mahaney had good tackles. Nazareth was forced to punt. Farwell was held and punted to its 29. With 1:27 left, Nazareth tallied on a 36-yard pass. The kick made it 40-0.

Coach Rex Cumpton noted, "I felt like our team gave a great effort Friday night. The game was much closer than the score indicated. We had the ball inside Nazareth's 20 yard line 4 times but failed to score. That makes for a difficult night. We still need to win the next three to have a shot at the playoffs."
