It's time for the annual Texico cleanup before Border Town Days.

The Texico Chamber of Commerce voted Monday to ask all city residents who wish to help out to meet at 5 p.m. mdt Monday at the Citizens Bank branch in Texico.

"Bring your hoes, lawn mowers or just yourselves," said Chamber President Lewis Cooper. "We hope everyone who can participates."

The cleanup is not expected to take that long, but will depend on the amount of participants. Areas along the parade route will be cleaned. Refreshments will be offered after the cleanup, said Jim float in the Border Town Pierce.

In other business, Cooper reported that the City Council wants to meet with the Chamber about community concerns. Cooper will attend Tuesday's City Council meeting to report back.

Among the concerns mentioned were:

- Taking a survey to deter-

mine if the city qualifies for some federal funds. This has become significant lately in light of the water well problems. Farwell is taking a similar survey at present.

- The need for a building inspector.

- A new community center. - Upcoming legislative redistricting. Albuquerque may gain a representative, while eastern New Mexico has lost some population.

The Chamber voted \$10 annual dues for the "Keep New Mexico Beautiful, Inc." group. By participating, the Chamber may be able to get some shrubbery at a low cost.

The Chamber will have a Days parade. Ann Cooper was asked to check on the cost of buying magnetic signs that can go on the side of a vehicle. The sign would say "Texico - Gateway to the Land of Enchantment" and feature the city's logo, that was designed in a contest a couple of years ago.

Greg Qualls of Texico and his mother, Rhonda, have returned from Washington, D.C. where Greg received the Jefferson Award.

It was presented to the **Texico** Elementary student and other youths from around the U.S. aboard the ship, "The Spirit of Mount Vernon," as it sailed down the Potomac River.

In addition to the youths, there were also adult winners of the Jefferson Award. The adult recipients will be honored in a program that will be televised in September.

While in Washington, the group stayed at Mount Vernon College and traveled to several sights aboard a tour bus. In between sights, the kids took turns entertaining one another. One boy sang, and another did a magic act In addition, the BTD com- while Greg Qualls was able to assist during the magic act.

The group saw many famous sights including, the Smithsonian's Air and Space Museum, the Washington Monument, the Lincoln Memorial, the Reflecting Pond and the Vietnam Memorial, the Capitol, and Mount Vernon. They even heard a band concert on the steps of the Capitol. "We had three days of sheer running around. We were up by 6 a.m. and on the go until 11:30 - 12 at night," said Mrs. Qualls. The group was lucky that overcast skies tempered the normally sultry Washington weather, so that they could enjoy the long days of sight seeing in comfort. The Smithsonian's Air and Space Museum was by far, Greg Qualls' favorite sight. It contains many displays that allow youngsters to see, touch and manipulate some

high tech equipment.

home. In the midst of the well manicured grounds stands the burial site of George and Martha Washington. Mrs. Qualls noted that a few steps away are the unmarked graves of his slaves and the slave quarters.

"I felt the Good Lord wanted us to be on this trip. It was sobering to me to realize what these children had done to win their prizes,"said Mrs. Qualls.

One first grader had found \$2 in a bottle and used it to start collecting money for the Salvation Army. By the time the first grader was done, he had collected \$20.

An older child collected \$8,000 to aid the families of his area who had families in Saudi Arabia.

Another child collected 200 pairs of shoes for the poor.

Redistricting discussed

The Parmer County Commissioners and County Judge Bonnie Clayton met with Bobbie Hill of the firm Northern and Daugherty on July 16 to discuss changes in Parmer County voting districts caused by the 1990 census.

Last month, members of the Parmer County Citizens Advisory Committee on Redistricting had met with Virginia Daugherty of the same firm. She explained new guidelines about voting districts. Now Ms. Hill has met with **County Commissioners to get** their input.

Ms. Hill explained that the new voting districts are based upon census boundaries that were set up by the federal government using geographical boundaries as seen on satellite generated maps rather than arbitrary township lines. A computer was used to designate census blocs within each geographical area.

great distances to drive in order to vote. There were no proposed changes within Farwell.

The county commissioners' districts were the subject of the most discussion. Farmers normally want to vote for the person who takes care of the roads in front of their farms, but sometimes another commissioner has to care for the roads for an adjoining area. An attempt was made to create voting districts that match the working districts.

The commissioners suggested very few changes. For instance, one rural census bloc proposed by the government had 1 house in it. The census taker marked the entire census bloc 100% minority. The information was sent to the federal government which used it in preparing the voting precinct maps. Now the family has moved, and the census bloc will remain on government maps with the designation of 100% minority for the next 10 years unless a change is made. The government process to change a designation calls a petition signed by 25 voters within an census bloc be presented. Some rural census blocs like the one the commissioners pointed out do not have 25 residents. The commissioners noted that Lake- of moisture on their farm in view voting district, for instance, has only 16 voters. On the county ballot, voters are asked to vote on two propositions:

- "The constitutional amendment to allow the voters of a county education district to adopt certain exemptions from the district's ad valorem taxation for residence homesteads and to provide for the taxation of certain tangible personal property."

 "The constitutional amendment providing for the issuance of general obligation bonds to provide educational loans to students." The state is asking for the right to issue \$300 million worth of additional bonds to finance student loans.

The other ballot has three propositions on it:

 The exemption of 20 percent of the market value of the residence homestead from ad valorem taxation in (name of county education district). "

 The exemption of \$10,000 of the market value of the residence homestead of an individual who is disabled and of \$10,000 of the market value of the residence homestead of an individual who is 65 or older from ad valorem taxation in (name of county education district). -- The taxation of all tangible personal property, other than manufactured homes, in (name of the county education district) that is not held or used for the production of income.

If voters fail to allow the exemptions on the ballot with two questions on it, the exemptions on the other ballot are automatically null and void.







All area youngsters are reminded that registration has begun for the Border Town **Days Decorated Bike Contest** at Texico City Hall.

This year offers a special incentive: Ted Lopez, of Tedson Trailers, is donating a brand new bike to the winner of "Best of Show" - the bike judged as best decorated regardless of age category.

This year's BTD theme is "Salute to Our Troops." It's important to follow the theme,

since that is a large portion of the judging.

Also, an anonymous donor has provided funds for cash prizes in each category. And every entrant in the contest will receive a free ticket to ride the Bell Train.

"Everything is ready at Texico City Hall for registration," said Rhonda Qualls, who is in charge of the bike contest.

The registration deadline is 3 p.m. Friday, July 26.

Mrs. Qualls said that youths planning to enter the decorated bike contest in the parade need to register, giving their name and age, to be eligible for the cash prizes and free train tickets.

No motorized bikes are allowed in the contest.
