Another prediction

I was looking back on the first issue in September of last year and my column that week was entitled "Cowboys are stronger." I wrote they were definitely a Super Bowl contender again, and was right.

But my predictions that Lassic (who was a starting tailback due to Smith's hold-out) would be a candidate for Rookie of the Year was off. Lassic did well during the two games he played in, but once Smith returned, Lassic sat on the bench.

Another prediction I made, that the special teams would be stronger especially due to their new speedster, Kevin Williams, proved correct. Williams was a game-breaker.

Another key, I had written, was that the kicker, Elliott, would be okay. That didn't pan out and the Cowboys went with Eddie Murray, who was superb.

And the final prediction, that the Cowboys' defense would wear down opponents in the fourth quarter due to the Dallas depth, was very much correct.

Now for this year's predictions:

It all depends on health. If the Cowboys stay relatively healthy, they will contend for the Super Bowl again. But if the injury bug hits, the depth is no longer there.

I remember when owner Jimmy Jones was explaining about his problems trying to sign Smith last year and noting how the salary cap was putting a hurt on the negotiations. Jones was right. The salary cap hurts a team with high-paid players.

And there's no team in pro football that comes close to the number of star players that Dallas has. How many went to the Pro Bowl last year? About 15?

So the salary cap caused the loss of some key back-ups, and starters. During this year's pre-season, whenever Dallas put its second team in, it usually was a disaster.

On the good side, Dallas has some young athletes who will get better down the road. But right now, they're too fresh for the competition.

But, to reiterate, if players like Aikman, Smith, Novacek and Irvin stay healthy, that potent offense is tops in football.

What I worry about is that so many key Cowboys are entering the season recuperating from last year's injuries: Maryland, Haley, Stepnoski, Irvin, Harper, Smith, Tolbert. Realistically, that doesn't look good.

So my prediction this year was must be based on health. A healthy Cowboys' team should go 12-4. With key injuries, it's anybody's guess.

A sidenote: I'm tired of hearing all the broadcasters talk about how great the

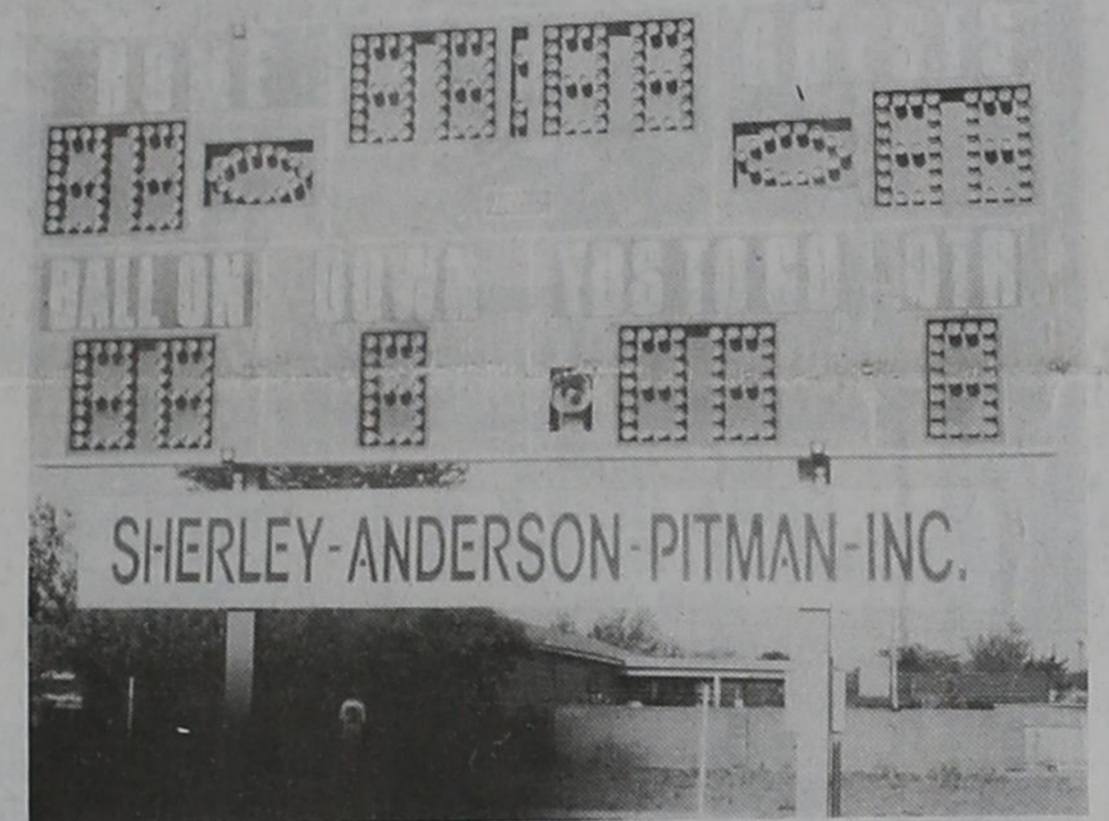

Football contest is under way

The annual fall pastime - the Area Merchants Football Contest - begins its 36th season today. The entry blank is on the back of this newspaper issue; more entry blanks are available at the Tribune office.

In order to have a strong chance at the grand prize, it's vitally important to enter every week. So be sure to watch for the first week's contest.

The top prize for the winner of the 12-week contest will again be two tickets to see the World Champion Dallas Cowboys play at Texas Stadium. They will play the Cleveland Browns on a Saturday afternoon, Dec. 10.

The grand prize winner also will get \$50 in cash, a night's lodging for two at the Radisson Hotel, game day breakfast, transfers to and from the game, and transportation to and from the airport.

And the reason the Tribune is able to offer the contest, and the weekly cash prizes (\$10 for first and \$5 for second) is due to the following sponsors:

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Rules for the 1994 contest will be the same as in the past. A person must be at least 12 years old to enter. Entrants must choose 12 teams they think will win the selected games.

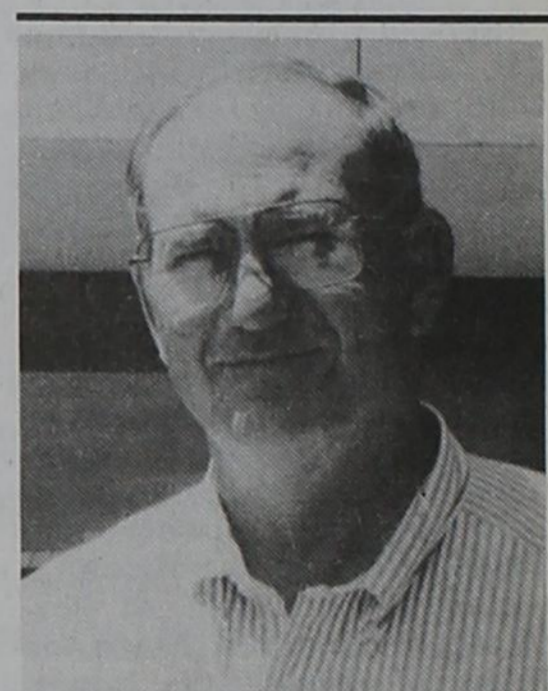
Funds donated

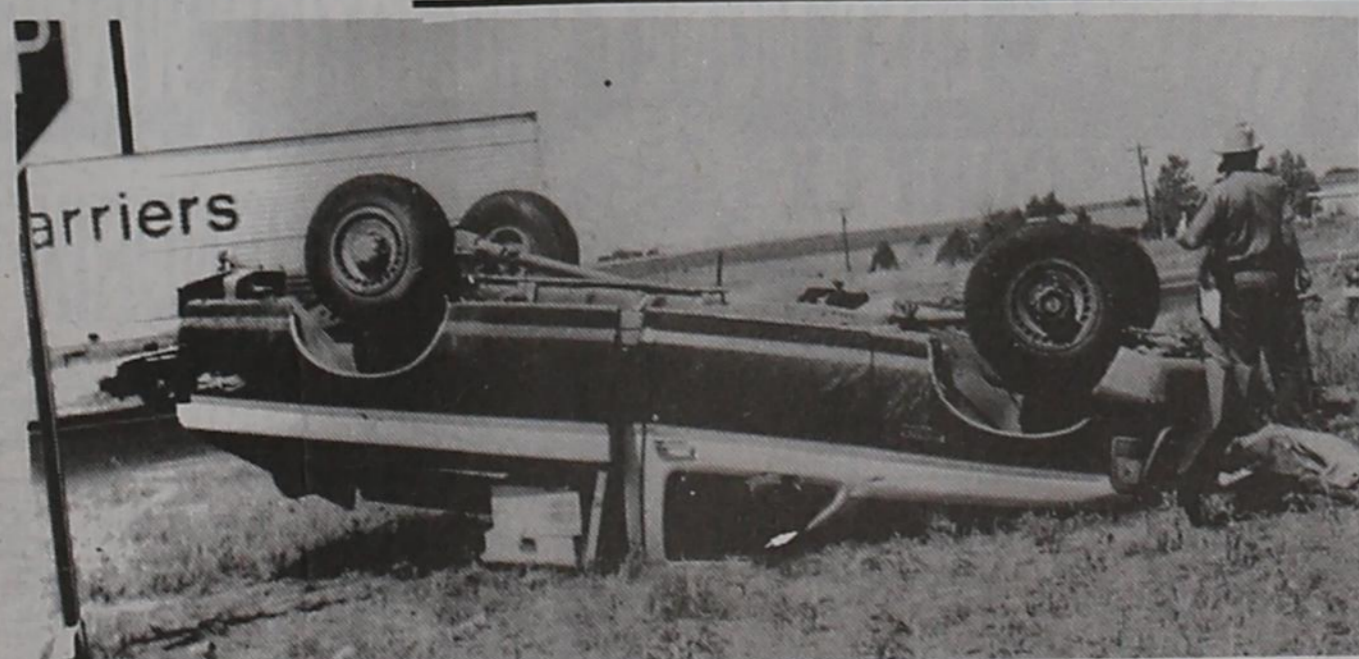
Also, the Chamber voted to place an ad in the Tribune listing the cutting horse competition schedule and a list of all Chamber members.

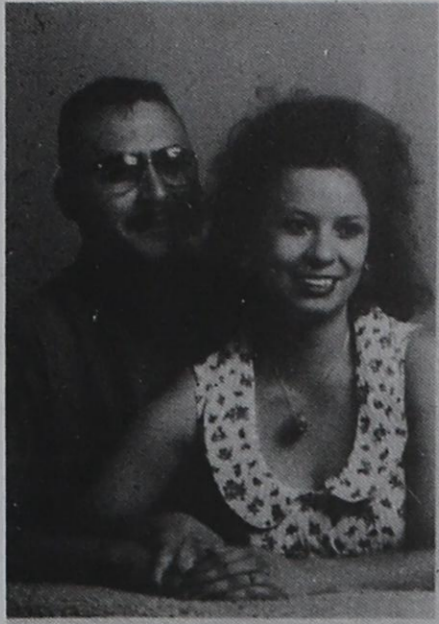

White pants needed

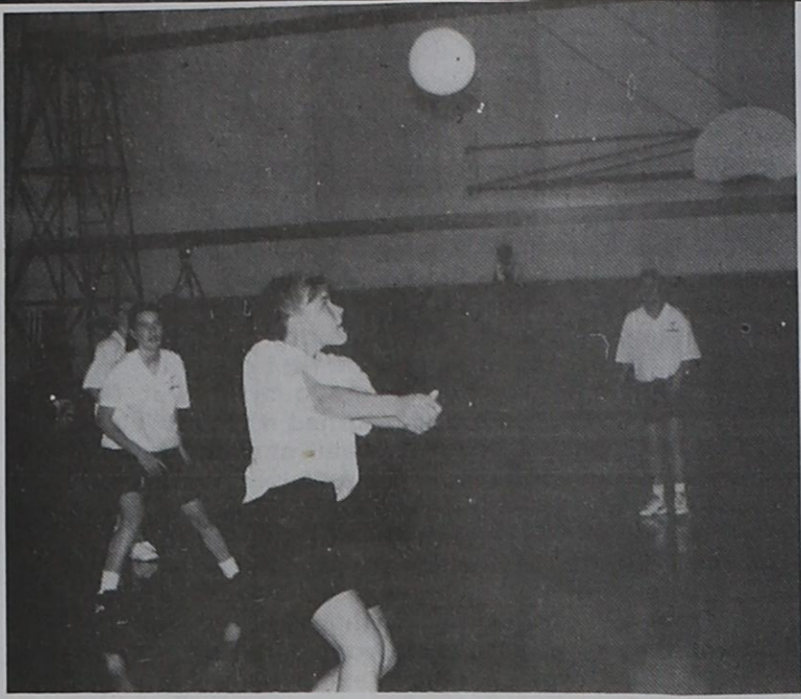
Texico Band director Robert Simmons called to say that some Texico students are having trouble finding white pants to go with their band uniforms.

Scattered showers brought much needed rain to the high plains early Wednesday. It was accompanied by cooler temperatures.

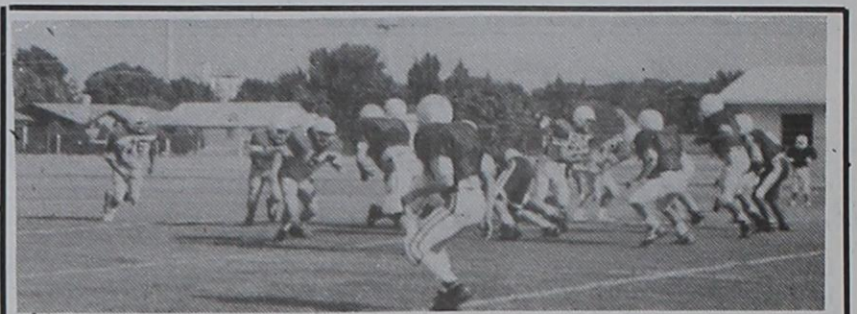
About 1.4" of rain were measured Wednesday morning at the Sherley Anderson Pitman grain elevator in Farwell, according to April Stout.

Yalonda McFarland measured 1.66" at their home in Farwell, and 1.61" of rain at the Sherley Anderson Grain Elevator in Lariat.

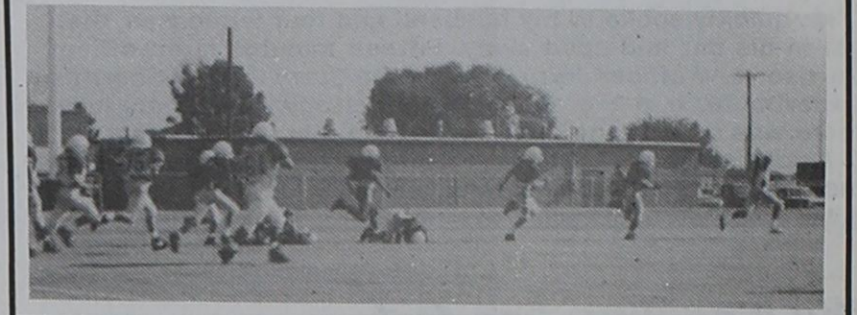
Scott Brown measured .7" at the Sherley Grain Elevator in Lazbuddie.

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Sheriff's Report

Here is the weekly report from Parmer County Sheriff Rex Williams:

On Aug. 26, Henderson Griggs, 28, Bovina, was arrested by the Texas Highway Patrol on a charge of DWI 2nd. The case is pending in county court.

On Aug. 27, Jesus Vargas, 22, Friona, was arrested by Friona police on a charge of possession of marijuana. The case is pending in county court.

On Aug. 23, in 28th District Court, with Judge Jack Young presiding:

- Tommy Frank Allen Jr., 18, Friona, charged with burglary of a building, received deferred adjudication and placed on 3 years probation.

Parmer County Adult Probation Office Ed McPeak reports that crime classifications in Texas are having some changes, effective Aug. 31. They include toughened penalties for persons convicted of DWI.

For example, persons convicted of DWI offense would serve 3 days - going to jail on a Friday, they could be released on a Sunday. Now, persons convicted of DWI 1st offense are sentenced to a minimum of 72 hours in jail.

If convicted of DWI 2nd offense, it's a 15-day minimum in jail.

'No illegality ... so far'

To the Editor,
I read with interest "Border Banter" and would like to comment on several items in Aug. 19 column.

I appreciated your humor concerning Major League Baseball and specifically the Chicago Cubs. My late father was a Cubs' fan for years, each of which was quite lean.

Though I have never lived in Washington, D.C., I do agree wholeheartedly with your assessment of the Beltway. And likewise I agree with your viewpoint on the Rwandan and Somalian situations.

With accolades like that, you know, as a newspaper editor there's something else coming. You've been "set up."

Here it is. I sharply disagree with your conclusion concerning Clinton and Whitewater. Like you, I did not vote for Bill Clinton. But, I am not ashamed to say who I did vote for. I voted for George Bush. He was simply the best qualified of the three major candidates. You say that Clinton is doing his best. That makes my point.

He was never close to being qualified to lead a nation of 240-plus million people. He came to Washington as the ex-governor of Arkansas. According to recent studies, that state has the worst health care system of the entire 50 states. As Rush Limbaugh would say, "For those of you from Rio Linda there are only 50 states." And now Bill has a health care plan for all of us. Amazing!

Further, you wrote, "Whitewater was mostly political... I didn't expect to show any illegality on the President's part. It appears I was correct, so far." I hope you are emphasizing, "so far." Remember, the Congressional hearings were minutely limited in scope at the demand of the Democrats. Some estimate they only involved three percent of the total Whitewater affair. And on the House side, Henry B. Gonzales, in effect, put a "gag order" on Republican questioners.

The Senate side was much more viable. To his credit, Donald Reigle of Michigan (a Democrat) did a superb job in chairing that committee. And, as one Senator pointed out, "We've learned more about Whitewater in three weeks than Special Counsel Fiske learned in six months." If the hearings and/or investigation under new Independent Counsel Starr wind down or are stopped, then your assessment will be correct. We'll just never know. But I am very convinced that if Whitewater is properly and completely investigated, the American public will learn there were many illegalities in which the present President was involved, including those of criminal nature.

As one Senator said, "If the investigation into 'Watergate' had been as limited as this one, Nixon would have served two terms." Watergate, at its worst, was a bungled burglary and the attempted cover-up thereof. It was like a little kid caught with his hand in the cookie jar. Ironically, Nixon and his burglars didn't even get to taste the cookie! But Whitewater, on the other hand, has a dead body (perhaps) more, right in the middle of its mystery.

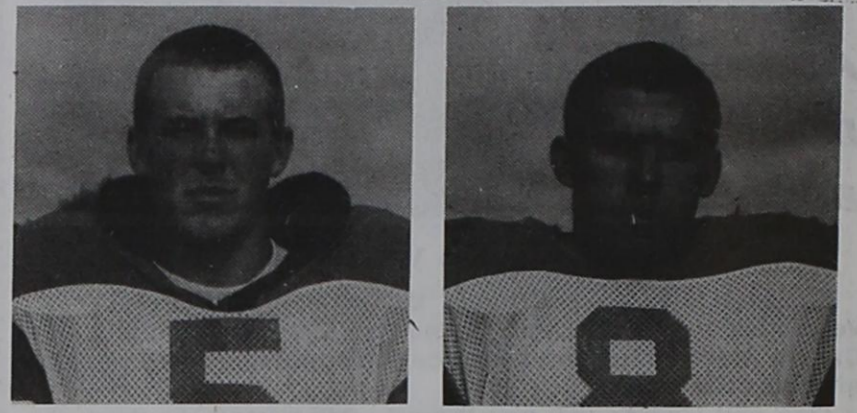
