More paperwork needed before getting married

Getting married in the state of Texas now requires a little more paperwork and puts an extra step in the application for a marriage license. It also costs a little more than it did before.

The extra step that is now required by law is that applicants must now sign an affidavit swearing that they do not owe any child support or back payments.

If the applicants do not sign this affidavit, no marriage license will be issued to the couple.

This new law was effective Sept. 1.

This is an effort to crack down on delinquent child support. The term "Deadbeat Dads" or "Non-Paying Parent" has become an all too familiar one in the lives of many children caught in the middle of a divorce or paternity situation.

Applicants might also find it helpful to bring proof of payment status or the final documents of being cleared of having to pay child support due to a child becoming 18 or over.

Kelly and Jacque Olguin of Lake Sumner, N.M., were the first couple to apply for a marriage license in Parmer County under the new law.

Kelly has children from a previous marriage in California and had heard about the new law taking effect. He had paid his child support all along and his youngest child recently turned 19, thus clearing him of having to pay any further child support. He had been sent all of the documentation proving this status.

Half a century later, lost B-24 discovered

Editor's note: Will Anderson, son of Robert and Carrie Anderson of Farwell, is a commander in the U.S. Navy. He is currently assigned to the American Embassy in Brazil. Periodically, over the years, Will has sent the Tribune articles from his points of call. Here's his latest:

The day was April 11, 1944, at a distant U.S. Army Air Corps base called Waller Field on the island of Trinidad, off the coast of South America.

A B-24 Liberator bomber was preparing for take-off, to continue its long journey from the U.S., hopping from airfield to airfield on its way to join the war against Germany, in Italy.

The Allied Forces had landed in Italy earlier and were moving up the peninsula in an attempt to break into Nazi Germany from the south. American and Brazilian soldiers fought shoulder to shoulder in the struggle.

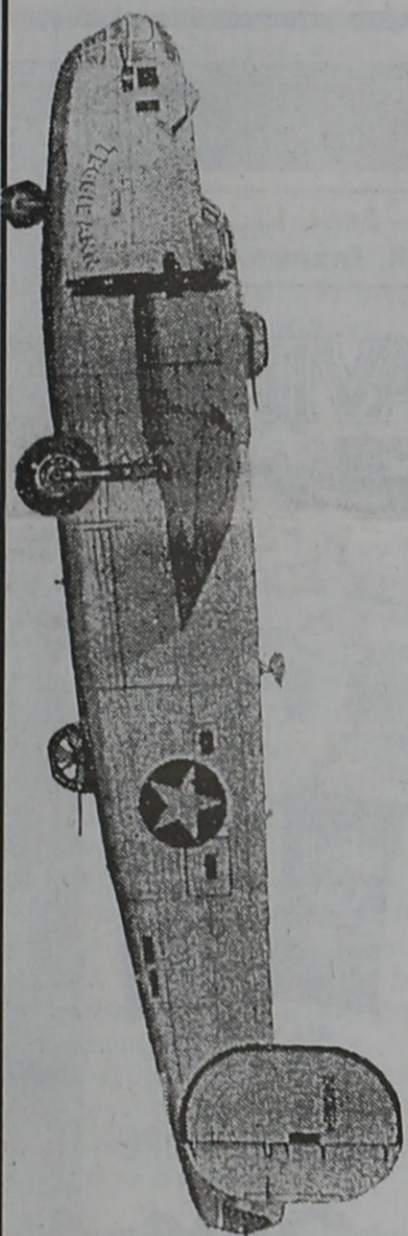
The 10 young Americans who took off that day as air-crew on the B-24 came from farms and towns and cities across the U.S. But Lt. Edward Bares, Lt. Floyd Kyte Jr., Flight Officers Robert Pearman and Lauren Stevens, and Sgts. Harry Furman, Herman Smith, Max McGilvrey, John Rocassey and Michael Frasel would never see their homes again after that fateful day.

For unknown reasons, their B-24 never arrived at its next stop-over, Amapa, Brazil. Searchers were never able to locate any trace of the aircraft. Another handful of young men had been lost in the worldwide war effort than would not end for more than 16 months.

But now, 50 years late, a lone gold prospector was cutting his way through the Amazon rainforest, about 50 miles north of Amapa. This dense rainforest, which is fed by one-sixth of the world's fresh water supply, covers an area larger than the entire western half of the continental U.S. It is largely uncharted and always dangerous, and jealousy guards its secrets. But on this day in 1994, that prospector accidentally stumbled upon one of its secrets. He came upon a crash site of the B-24 bomber deep in the earth beneath a canopy of towering trees.

When the prospector finally reached a settlement later, he reported his finding. But the follow-up expeditions were unable to retrace his exact route to locate the crash site. More than a year later, a patrol of the Brazilian Army's 3rd Jungle Infantry Battalion was finally successful. And this time they were prepared to steal at least one secret from the rainfor-

The Texico Wolverines saw their season record drop to 1-1 when they lost to the Dexter Demons in an away game last Friday, 28-0.

The Wolverines next play at Tatum tonight (Friday) at 7:30 p.m. It will be Texico's third straight game on the road to open this season.

Coach Barry Partain said Dexter had a well-balanced team, but Texico had a letdown after the big win over Loving. "We had problems with our punting game. A bad snap hurt, and we had a long runback against us, too," he added.

In the first quarter, Texico mounted a pretty good drive downfield. Mel Askew ran for 35 yards. And Brandon Autrey

caught a 17-yard aerial from Pecos Chumley. But a 35-yard field goal try by Luis Trillo missed. Meanwhile, on defense, Brad Foreman had an interception. Dexter scored on a 65-yard punt return to take a 6-0 lead at the end of the first quarter.

In the second quarter, Dexter increased its lead to 14-0 on a 15-yard TD run and a pass for the extra points. Texico had one good drive, spearheaded by Chumley with some excellent running.

In the third quarter, Autrey caught a 42-yard pass from Askew as Texico managed to get to the Demon 35 yard line, but was stopped there. On defense, Leroy Salinas had a strong tackle. Dexter went up, 22-0 on a 34-yard run, and run for the extra points.

Dexter finished its scoring with a 31-yard TD pass in the final period.

Parent Link called 'a success'

The Parent Link phone system at the Texico Schools has been deemed a complete success by the school administrators, teachers and parents.

The system was installed after the schools received a grant from the State of New Mexico to install the system. Last year was the first year it was operational and usage of the system by parents and teachers within the district was very high.

The system has even more capability and usage features this year. A Call-Out feature was implemented. This feature calls the homes of students to give recorded messages to their parents. For example - if a student was absent from class on a Monday, the teacher gives the Parent Link that student's number that afternoon. The system then dials the home phone number of the student and when the parent answers, a recorded message stating that the student was absent from school today is played.

If no one answers the phone, the system keeps redialing the number until it reaches someone.

This feature helps to cut down on truancy in the school system and is a way to keep parents informed of the student's whereabouts, even though they may know that they were out of school due to illness or for other explained absences.

The Call-Out feature also enables the schools to alert parents to any delays or schedule changes for athletic teams or groups that travel away from the school for programs, games or field trips. If a bus gets a flat tire and the volleyball team will be an hour late arriving back at the school, a coach or teacher just has to call the Parent-Link with all the student numbers and a message about being late and the circumstances. The system then will call the parents to alert them to the delay and the circumstances with that recorded message.

est. They had with them the hand-held Global Positioning System (GPS) receivers with which the patrol could fix its position anywhere on the face of the earth. It uses navigational satellites high in the heavens, to an accuracy of a few feet. With this information began Operation Liberator -- the mission to search for any remains of the aircrew which went down with the bomber 51 years earlier, to identify them, and to return the remains to their homes.

On July 4, 1995, 12 personnel from the U.S. Army's Central Identification Lab, Hawaii, arrived in Brazil. This is the command that has specialized in identifying the remains of U.S. soldiers killed in Vietnam.

They were joined by 13 Brazilian military personnel. Major George Spoth of the U.S. Air Force and Lt. Col. Steve Stacey of the U.S. Army, both who are assigned to my Military Liaison Office in Brazil, were there to assist in any way; primarily they acted as translators for the Portuguese and English speaking soldiers.

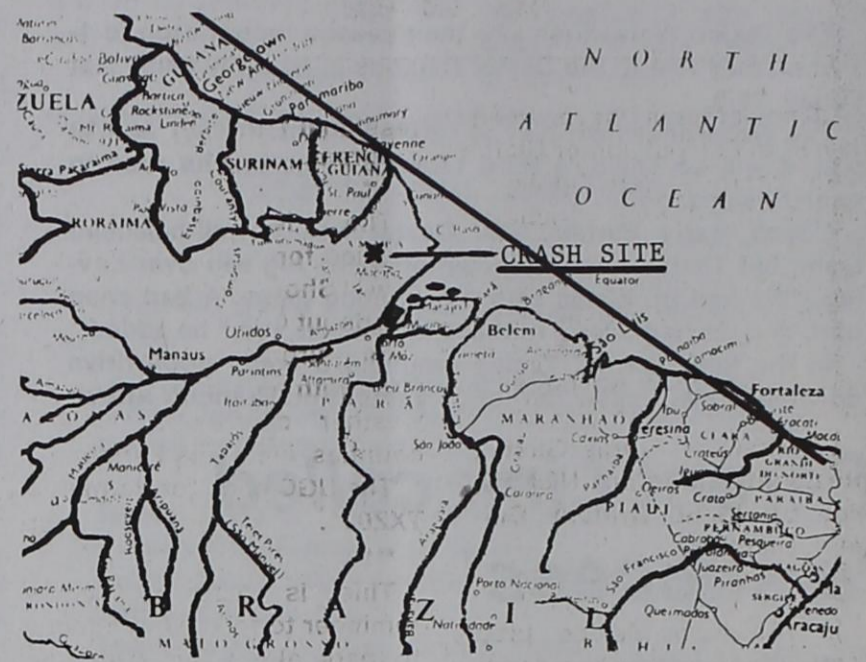
A clearing was cut to allow the team to arrive at the crash site by helicopter. After setting up a camp and work area, they began 17 days of carefully measuring the crash site and searching for remains. The harsh climate of the rainforest made it difficult. But it appears the remains of all 10 aircrewmen were recovered. Their medical records, which had rested in storage all these years, were waiting for them in Hawaii,

where the task of identifying each man will take a bit longer.

The soldiers who conducted the search, and the airmen who had died in World War II, were lifted from the rainforest by chopper to the airfield in Amapa. The U.S. Ambassador to Brazil, Melvyn Levitsky, was on hand, along with the Governor of the Province of Amapa and local military commanders, to mark the first step in the long journey home for these honored dead. The caskets, draped with U.S. flags, were passed from the hands of Brazilian soldiers to the hands of American soldiers and carried aboard a U.S. Air Force transport plane.

Levitsky spoke with emotion at the gratitude that the U.S. feels toward Brazil, noting that Brazil had joined the war effort against the Axis during World War II, and for helping recovered the deceased airmen today.

The Governor of Amapa responded that the people of Brazil could learn a lesson in the meaning of citizenship from the U.S. In all these years, American had not forgotten its war dead and it maintains a commitment to honor them and, if possible, to bring them home to their final resting place among their comrades and families.

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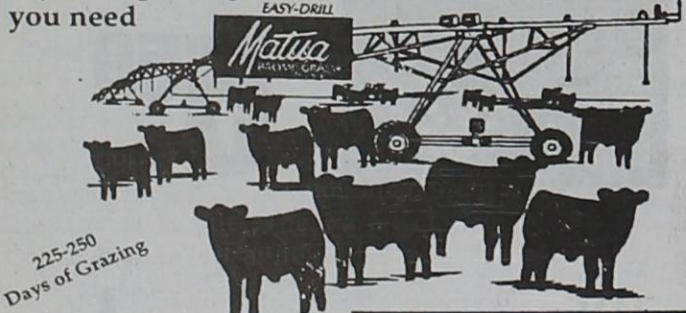

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
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Lazbuddie celebrates with big school reunion

I had the opportunity over the Labor Day weekend to see a football game at Texas A&M. With son Rob now a junior Aggie, I wanted to see one ball game at Kyle Field during his studies there.

To see 70,000-plus fans doing their "whoops" and other assorted cheers was most interesting. But the one I thought was really special was their war chant.
