Veterans Day ceremony set at Farwell park

The Farwell Chamber of Commerce is planning a major event for Veterans Day.

A special ceremony is planned for 10 a.m. on Nov. 11 at the Parmer County Veterans Memorial in Farwell City Park.

The committee planning the event includes Lee Hutchins and Rev. E.R. Greenthaler.

The ceremony will include:

- The combined Farwell School bands.
- Farwell elementary students, each with a U.S. flag, marching to the ceremony site along with the bands.

- A lieutenant colonel from Cannon Air Force Base will be the guest speaker.

- The Veterans of Foreign Wars Post of Friona will furnish a color guard.

- A wreath will be laid at the memorial.

Hutchins said everyone is invited to this ceremony, especially veterans.

Davis wins Farwell commissioner post

It may have been a huge win for President Clinton across the nation Tuesday, but the results were different in Parmer County where Republican vote totals were large.

Parmer County totals gave Bob Dole 2,042 votes to Clinton's 676. Ross Perot got 160 votes here.

In other races at the top of the ballot:

- U.S. Sen. Phil Gramm, a Republican, easily defeated challenger Victor Morales. In Parmer County, Gramm got 2,225 votes to Morales' 685.

- U.S. Cong. Larry Combest, a Republican, had no trouble with his Democrat opponent, John Sawyer, winning reelection by a large margin. In Parmer County, Combest pulled 1,287 votes to Sawyer's 535.

- Longtime state Rep. Pete Laney, D-Hale Center, who is also Speaker of the Texas House, had a tough foe in Hollis Cain, a Springlake-Earth farmer. Laney's seat was targeted by state Republicans. But Laney also won re-election easily. It was reported, though, that the only county to give Cain a majority was Parmer County where Cain got 1,475 votes to Laney's 1,318.

In the Parmer County elections, two new county commissioners were elected -- both Republicans:

- In a wide-open race for the Farwell area commissioner post, the winner was Republican Jerry Davis, with 361. Coming in second was write-in candidate Ed Corn, with 248. Third was Democrat Lowell Primrose, with 231. And write-in candidate D.H. Foster was 4th with 97. Primrose had defeated incumbent Robert White in the Democrat primary.

- Friona area commissioner Johnny Mars, a Democrat, lost his bid for a second term to Republican John Tannahill, 435-371.

And in the solo countywide race, for county tax assessor-collector, incumbent Democrat Doris Herington turned back the challenge of Republican Teresa Ancira, 1,683 to 1,152.

Three other countywide candidates were unopposed. So the trio of Democrat incumbents all won -- Rex Williams, county sheriff, 2,194 votes; Johnny Actkinson, District attorney, 1,990 (Parmer County total), and Charles Aycock, County attorney, 1,996.

Here are other Parmer County totals in statewide races:

- Railroad commissioner: Republican Carole Rylander, 2,057; Democrat Hector Uribe, 559.

- Justice, Supreme Court: Republican John Cornyn, 1,766; Democrat, Patrice Barron, 620.

- Chief Justice, Supreme Court: Republican, Tom Phillips, 1,911; Democrat, Andrew Kupper, 634.

- Justice, Supreme Court: Republican James Baker, 1,803;

Burial was in Sunset Terrace Cemetery in Farwell. He died Monday in Lazbuddie.

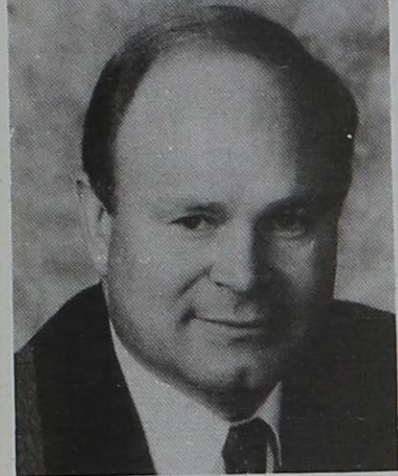

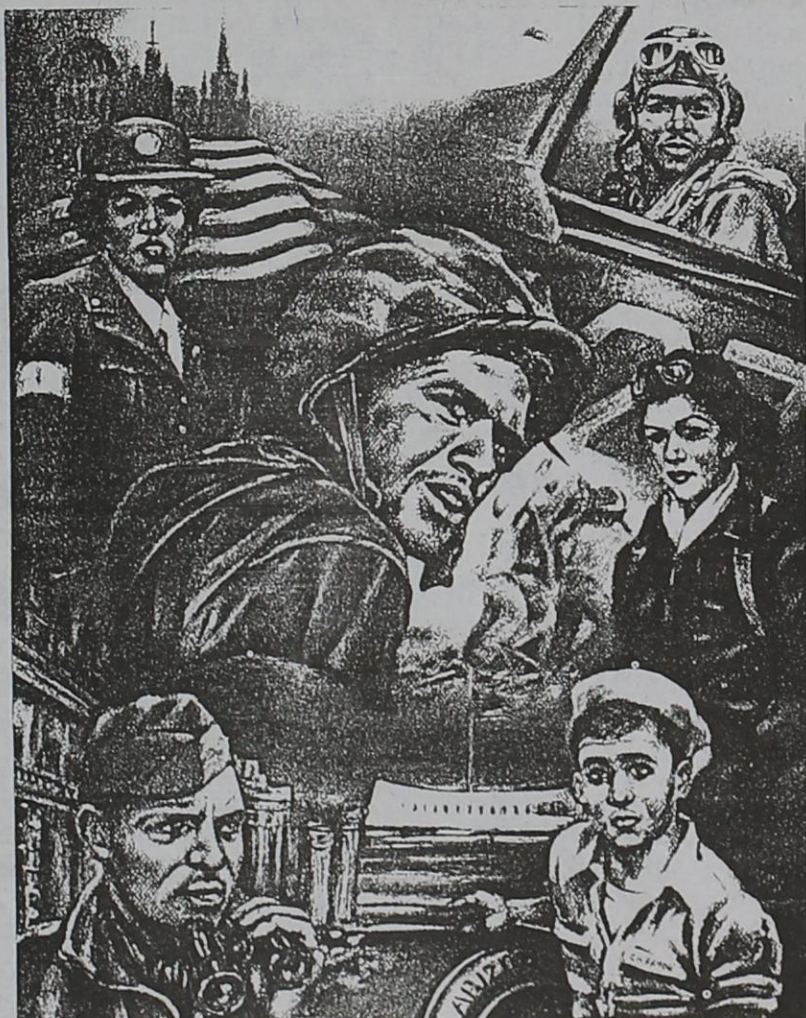

There was standing room only on the visitors' side last Friday in Ft. Sumner to watch the Texico Wolverines blank the Foxes, 14-0 and claim the title of district champs.

Texico enters the state playoffs Saturday at 2 p.m. mst when they host Capitan. The winner plays the winner of the Tatum-Escalante match. Other quarter-final matchups are Ft. Sumner-Cloudcroft and Jal-McCurdy.

Against Ft. Sumner, the Wolverines were ready to play, with Tobie Askew scoring on the first offensive play for Texico. Ft. Sumner came back immediately but the Wolverine goal line defense proved too tough for the Foxes. Several more times Ft. Sumner threatened to score, only to be denied by the defensive line.

Brandon Autrey had two interceptions, and Tobie Askew and Mel Askew had an interception apiece. Plus, Phil Peabody and Jake Boazman recovered fumbles.

Tobie Askew made a spectacular punt return, and as a whole had a great night, with 154 yards rushing. Pecos Chumley contributed 64 yards rushing, Mel Askew had 11 and Matt Holguin had 2.

Coach Partain and the Wolverines had been waiting for this match the entire season, and it proved to be one of the best this year. Texico's substitute band director, Jason Davis, also contributed to the excitement by bringing the Wolverine marching band, along with a sound system to perform for the crowd.

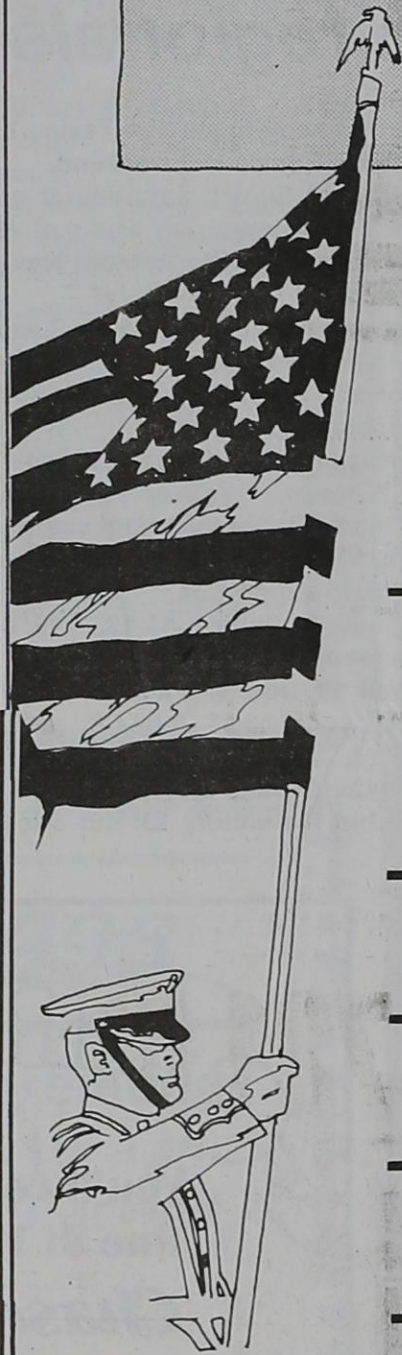

Whitharral tops Lazbuddie

It was a battle of titans at Lazbuddie last Friday as Whitharral, the state's No. 1 ranked team, defeated the No. 5 ranked Longhorns, 40-22.

Whitharral is 9-0 overall and 4-0 in district, and in the state playoffs. Lazbuddie is 8-1 overall and 3-1 in district. The Longhorns finish the regular season with a game at Amherst tonight (Friday) at 7:30. If Lazbuddie wins, they are in the playoffs, too. If Lazbuddie loses, a coin flip will be needed between 2 or 3 teams.

Coach Mark Scisson said the Longhorns had their chances, but the first quarter hurt. Two missed tackles gave Whitharral 16 points in that quarter. Also, Lazbuddie had the ball on the Whitharral 10 yard line twice, but couldn't score. So the game was closer than the score indicated.

Whitharral took the early lead with two touchdowns in the first quarter -- on a 38-yard run and a 78-yard pass. The kicks were good and it was 16-0 at the end of the stanza.

Lazbuddie closed the margin to 16-8 when Adam St. Clair scored on a 2-yard throw from Josh Morris. The Jason Thomas kick made it 16-8. But Whitharral responded on a 7-yard TD pass to take a 24-8 lead into the half.

It was nearly an even second half as both teams scored twice more. In the third quarter, Whitharral tallied on a 7-yard pass while Lazbuddie scored when Justin St. Clair took a 2-yard pass from Morris (the kick missed). And in the final quarter, Whitharral scored on a 12-yard run while Lazbuddie's Brice Foster made it to paydirt on an 8-yard pass from Justin St. Clair, followed by a Thomas kick.

Justin St. Clair hit 7 of 17 passes for 141 yards and rushed 19 times for 105 yards. Foster ran 11 times for 100 yards.

Team stats were: first downs, Whitharral 15, Lazbuddie 10; rushing yards, Whitharral 29 for 212, Lazbuddie 30 for 205; passing, Whitharral 8 for 21 and 272 yards, Lazbuddie 13 of 30 for 176 yards; punting average, Whitharral 2 for 35 yard average, Lazbuddie 5 for 35 yard average.

Whatever the field of endeavor, absenteeism is a critical problem. Absent workers don't produce, absent students don't learn, AWOL soldiers don't fight. Jesus came to Thomas and said, "Reach forth thy finger and behold my hands; and reach forth thy hand, and thrust it into my side; and be not faithless but believing." Jesus dealt with the absent disciple graciously and forthrightly.

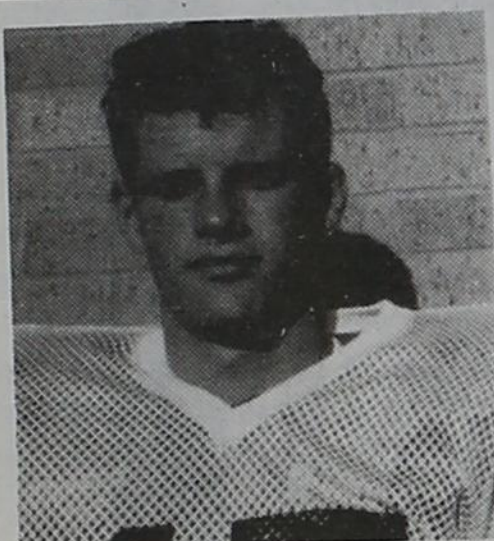

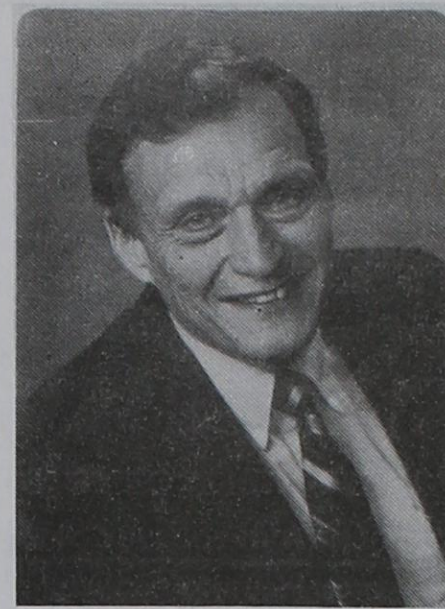

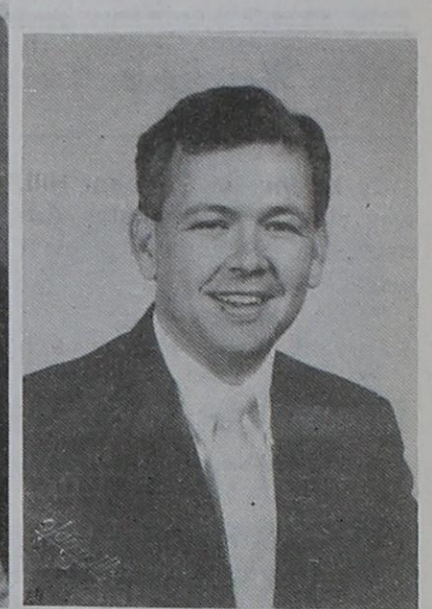

colored straws -- red for Democrat and blue for Republican.

Higher costs of natural gas used to generate electricity are the primary cause of a request SPS filed Nov. 1 with the Public Utility Commission of Texas for increases in the "fuel cost recovery" portion of electricity bills.

If approved, the average Texas residential customer of SPS, using 800 kilowatt hours of electricity a month, would see a hike of about \$1.96 on their monthly bills from January through June 1997, said SPS. But starting in July 1997, the increase would drop to 79 cents monthly.

SPS noted its rates are 20 percent below the national average.

EPA sets a tolerance for Tilt fungicide

From the Texas Department of Agriculture:

Grain sorghum farmers in the High Plains, including Parmer and Bailey counties, received the information they needed to sell their harvest when the EPA set a tolerance for Tilt, a fungicide used to control northern leaf blight.

Farmers had petitioned the state ag department to get a crisis exemption to use Tilt in early September. The regulation EPA released on Oct. 31 sets time-limited tolerances for combined residues of Tilt in or on the raw ag commodity sorghum in connection with EPA's granting of an emergency exemption. Unless EPA takes further action, the tolerances will expire on Oct. 31, 1998.

Estimated losses to commercial grain sorghum producers without Tilt would be over \$14 million.

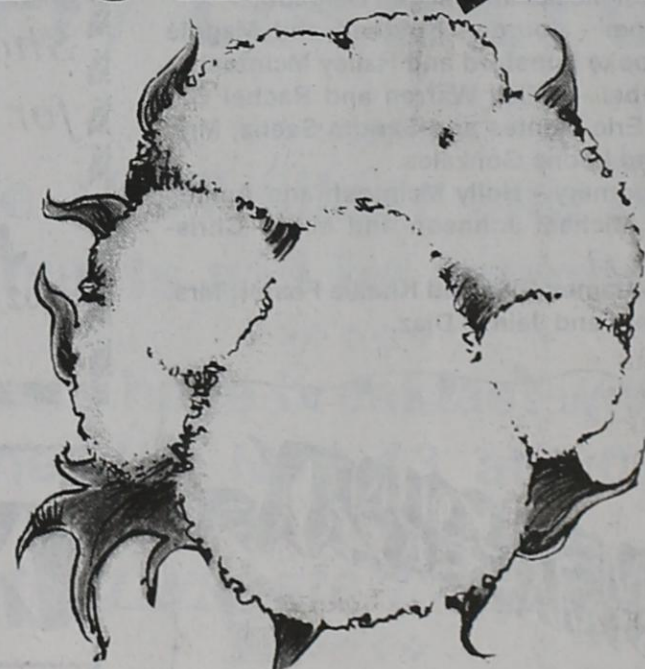

Then Anderson threw a long pass that was tipped by Mark Lunsford into the hands of Williams, who ran all the way to paydirt. The play covered 71 yards. The Meeks' kick made it 14-7 at 5:23.

Grant Oppliger tackled the kick returner at the Hornets' 34. On defense, Spencer Ketcherside and Michael Treadway had good tackles, and Adrian Gonzales provided good pass defense. Sudan punted to the Farwell 21. Anderson hit Lunsford with an 11-yard pass but Sudan recovered a fumble at midfield.

On defense, Steven Miller, Spencer Ketcherside, Guerrero Olmos and London had good tackles as the first quarter ended.

Sudan scored from the 1 at 10:55 to tie the game again. Farwell started at its 4 due to a penalty. Anderson hit Lunsford

with a pass for 28 yards. But Farwell lost a fumble at its 35. Sudan scored on a 25-yard run at 8:35 to take a 21-14 lead. Farwell was held and Williams punted 53 yards. Sudan hit a long pass to the Farwell 18. Steven Miller had a QB sack for a 6-yard loss. Sudan went for it on 4th and 19 at the Farwell 23 but David Everett broke up the pass in the end zone.

Injuries hurt the Steers in the first quarter as Armstrong, Olmos, Treadway and Steven Miller were among its numbers.

On defense again, Lunsford, Steven Miller and Gonzales had good tackles. But Sudan hit a long pass on 4th and 6 to keep its drive alive. On 4th and 8 from the Farwell 9, Sudan passed again -- but it was intercepted at the Farwell 2 by Everett who raced all the way back for a 98-yard interception for a TD with 4 seconds left in the half. The kick was blocked and Sudan led 21-20 at the half.

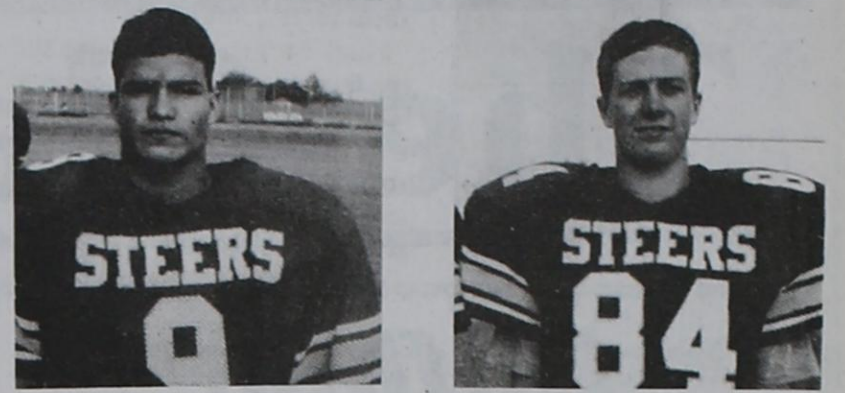

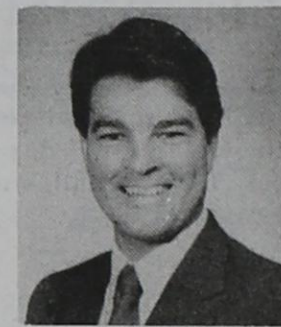

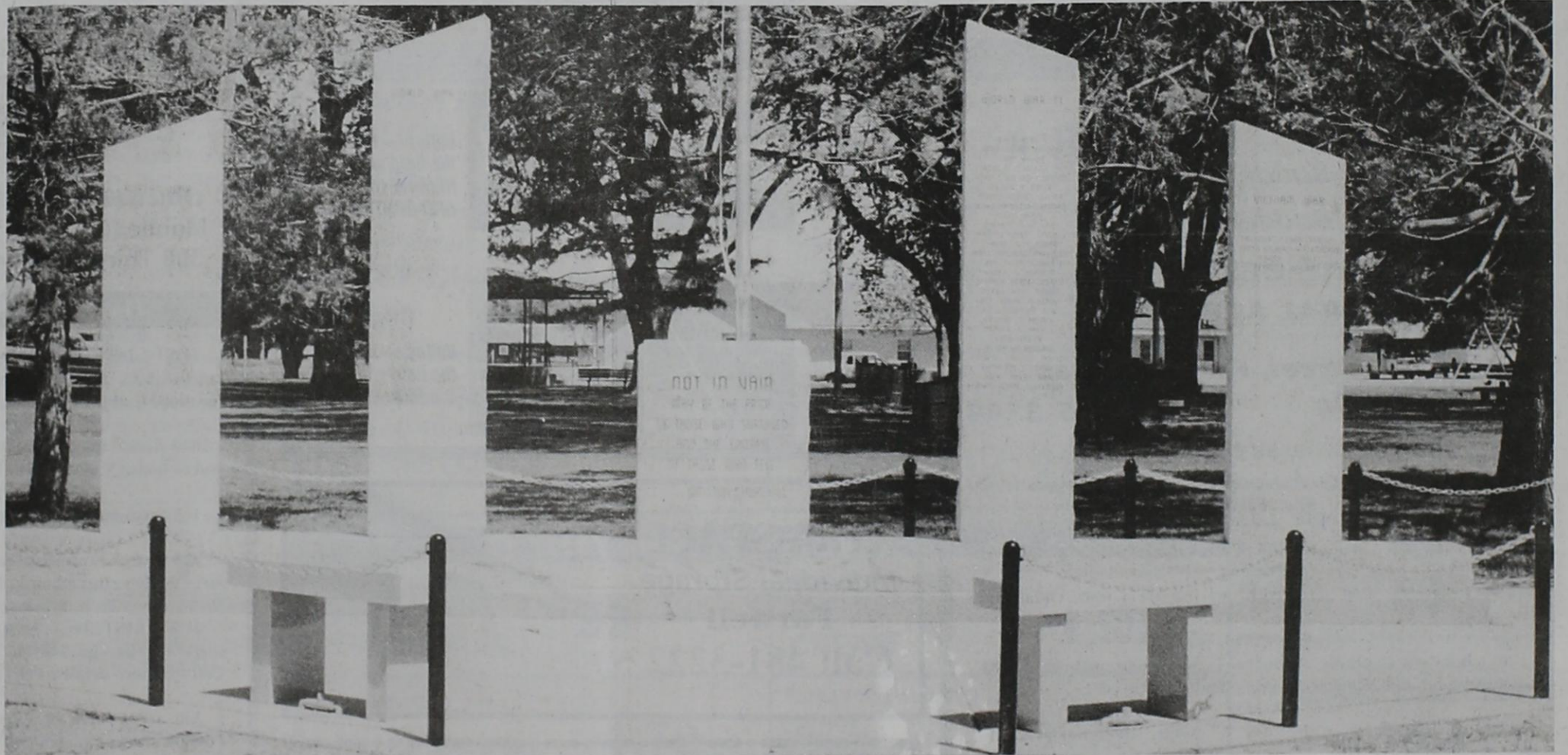
