Every community in Parmer County will be represented at the county-wide March of Dimes TV talent show to be held at the Friona auditorium tonight (Thursday) at 8 o'clock.

Mrs. Roy V. Miller, Friona chairman, says that much interest is being shown in the talent show and that a large crowd is expected to attend.

Mrs. Miller had received 37 entries early Thursday and had turned down numerous others.

Admission for the annual county talent show is 25 and 50 cents and all contributions will be appreciated.

Entrance fees, which were 50 cents per contestant or \$1 per group, will also go into the March of Dimes fund.

Master of ceremonies for the show will be Tom Dycus of KCRS, Midland. Judges will be Mrs. Athlene Ballard of Lubbock and two others, not yet named, to be selected by Mr. Mills of KFDD-TV, Amarillo.

Talent from this show will be selected to appear on the Panhandle March of Dimes TV show on January 28 and 29.

Friona FHA members will sell refreshments at intermission, and

all funds will go into the MOD drive.

Mrs. Miller urges everyone in the county to attend the show and help make the Parmer County March of Dimes campaign a success.

Mrs. Miller would also like to announce that the Black community get-together for the campaign has been postponed until Tuesday, January 17. Anyone interested is invited to attend the meeting which will be held at the Black Club House at 7 o'clock. All contributions will be accepted. Two films will be shown and a social hour will be enjoyed.

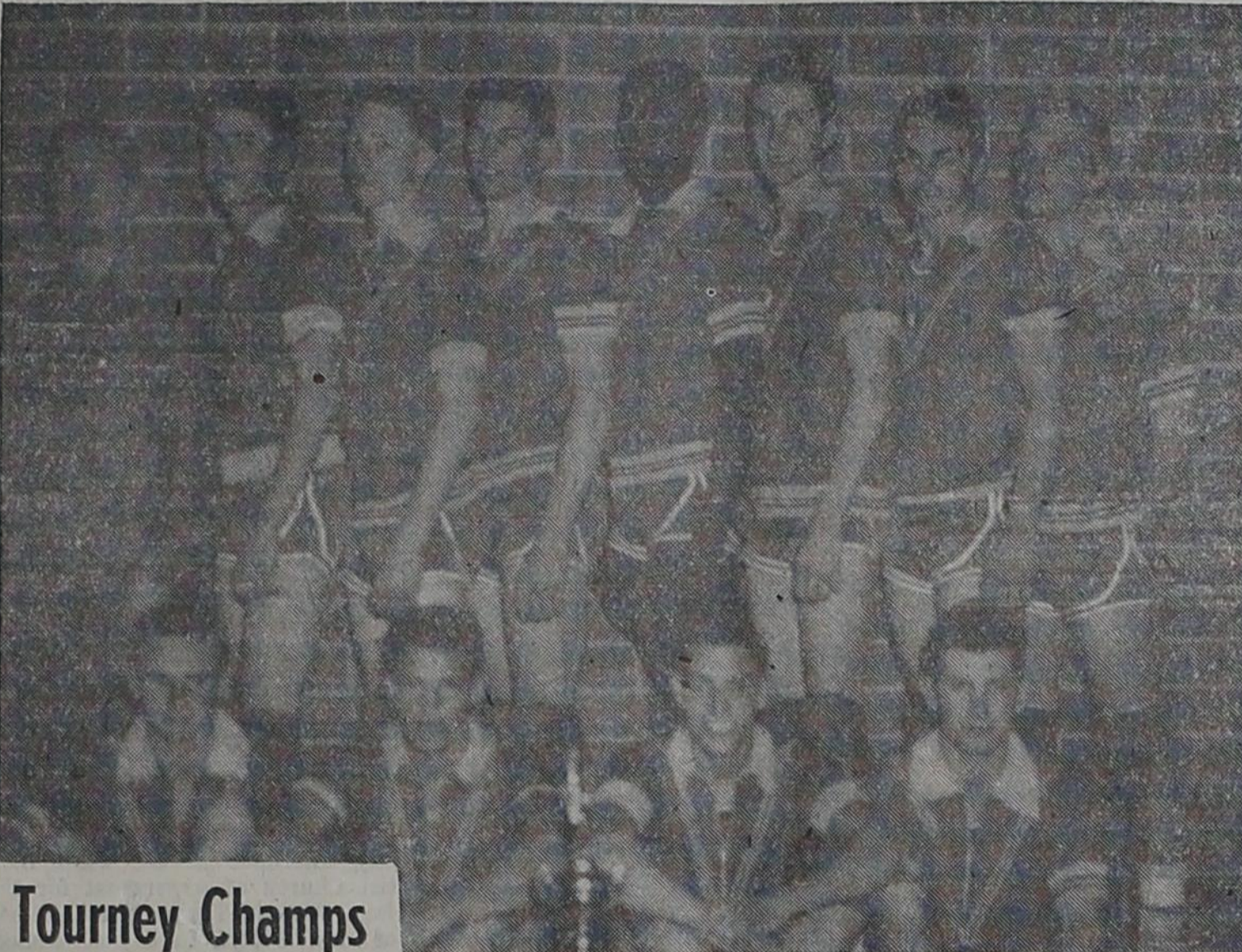

## Bovina Girls, Farwell Boys Win Basketball Tournament

After a two-year drought, the Farwell Steers reached the end of a dreary trail Saturday night in their gymnasium, when they trounced the Mustangs from Bovina by a convincing 13-point margin.

It was the first time they had been able to muster a win over the Mustangs in two seasons of play, and the win brought for them the championship of the Farwell invitational tourney.

The 83-70 loss of the Mustangs snapped a 13-game victory streak for this year. Conference-wise, the loss meant nothing.

## Texico Girls' Meet Starts January 17

Texico girls invitational basketball tournament is scheduled to get underway Tuesday evening, January 17, at 6 o'clock when the Ranchvale and Forrest junior high teams will play the first game.

The tournament, in which eight teams have entered, will continue through Saturday, January 21, but no games will be played on Wednesday, January 18.

Bovina still has won the only district game played by the two teams.

The Mustangs' sister team, the Fillies, wrapped up the tourney girls' crown, 43-32, winning from the Farwell girls in the finals. Boys' consolation winner was Muleshoe, and girls' consolation winner was Lazbuddie.

No all-tournament team was named.

Final game of the evening was unquestionably the feature of the tournament. Farwell's new gymnasium was bursting at the seams with over 1000 spectators, many of whom could not find seats.

For the Steers, it was an important moral victory because up until Saturday night, the Mustangs' armor had proved invincible. The game looked for a while as if it would be another "photo-finish" contest such as the one played at Bovina Tuesday of last week.

Farwell jumped to an early lead, but both teams scored frequently in the first two quarters. At half-time, the Steers led by a 11-point margin. Shortly after the third quarter began, Bovina whittled the Steers' lead to only two points on several occasions, but Farwell always managed to keep moving ahead.

It was only in the last quarter that Farwell was able to build up a lead that appeared it would be a permanent one, and it was.

Referees for the evening called a very close game and fouling was heavy on both sides. The interruptions for free shooting prolonged the game considerably and eliminated, to a certain degree, the "razzle-dazzle" of a game in which rivalry is high.

Neither team made much use of fast-break techniques.

## Steel Building Firm Establishes Farwell As Distribution Point

Announcement was made this week of the intentions of the McRayan Co., Inc., to establish Farwell as its distribution point for New Mexico and West Texas.

From the warehouse to be built here will be distributed Stran-Steel and Dura-Bilt steel buildings, designed for agricultural, commercial, and industrial use.

Ernie Sego of Dura-Bilt in Clovis will manage the Farwell facilities, and local labor will be utilized in handling the large volume of construction units.

A permit has been issued by the City for the company to erect a 40x120 steel warehouse in eastern Farwell adjacent the Lubbock branch of the Santa Fe.

Storage yard space will be leased from the railroad north of the tracks.

Adolph Stuermer, owner of the distributing firm, has been in Farwell in recent weeks completing ar-

rangements for the work. For several months, the company has been leasing warehouse facilities, formerly used by C. M. Henderson, for storage.

### Magness Real Estate Into New Building

Magness Real Estate is established in its new offices in eastern Farwell this week, following the completion of a modern tile-and-brick building.

Work on the structure began about the same time as did work on Fern's department store, which is located just east of the Magness building. Clyde Magness, owner, says that an office is yet to be rented.

## Negro Ball Player Important Member Of Farwell Team

The setting was a hotly-contested game between Farwell and Bovina. The two evenly-matched teams both wanted desperately to win.

George Washington, a jangling-jointed, 6' 2" Negro who edged into the Farwell starting five lineup only a week before, stepped to the free shot line.

Twice he poised, and twice he arched the ball into the air and through the hoop. Cheers from the crowd gave no hint that his color was different from any other boy on the floor.

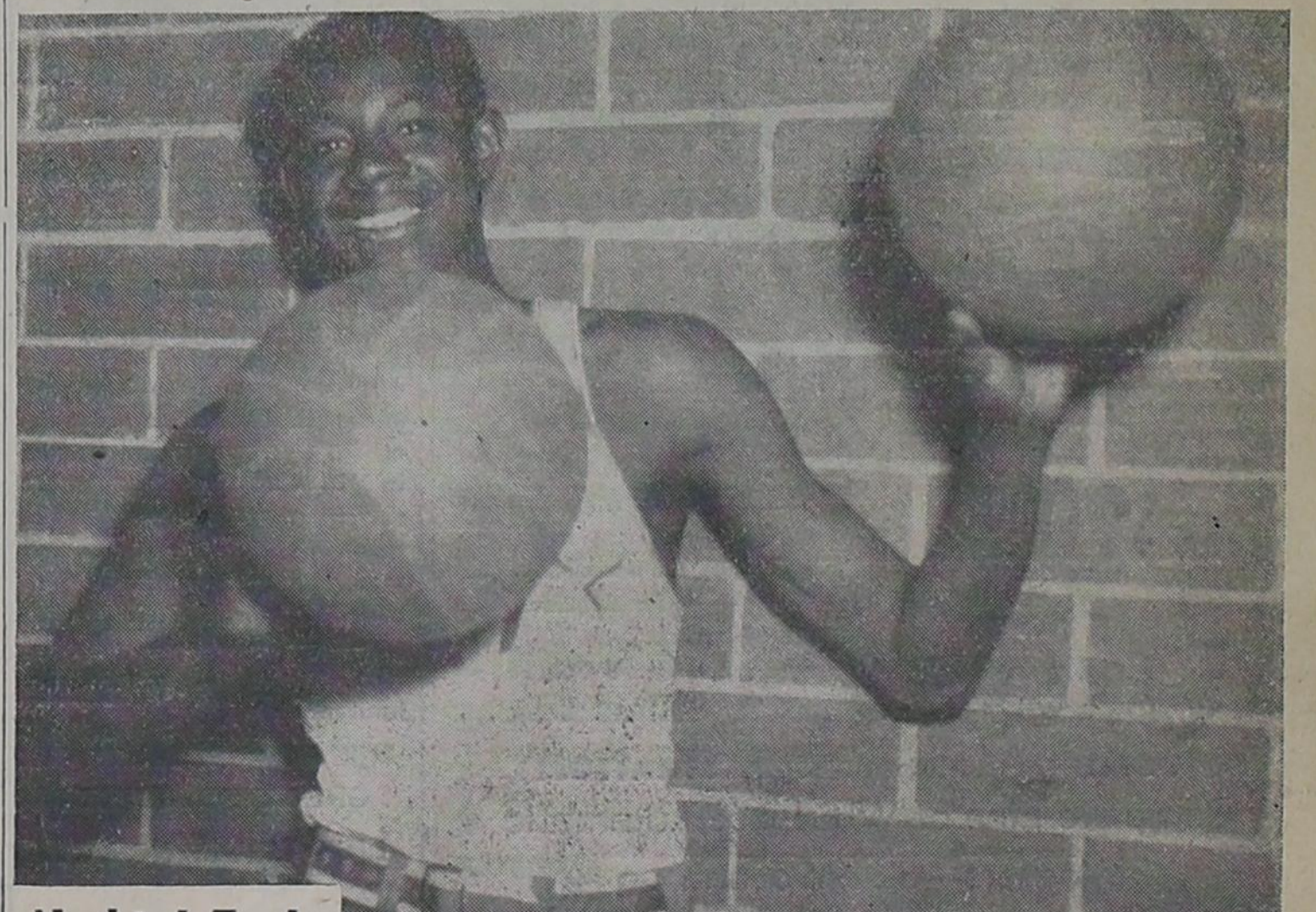
Pats on the shoulder and shouts of encouragement from his teammates also contributed to the impression that there was nothing any more unusual about this game than any other that had ever been played.

Saturday night, Washington played an important part in making a victory for his team possible. He tallied 19 points during the evening, 15 of which were made at the foul toss line. He missed only three attempts to score free shots.

The 169-pound player made area sports history two weeks ago when he began district play with Farwell, marking the first time a Negro has played in competition with whites in the district.

In his first game, there was a hint of hesitation in his play, as if he were feeling himself out. However, George has since warmed up considerably and plays about as aggressively as any other boy on the floor.

# THE TRIBUNE'S EDITORIAL COMMENT

## "Economic Idiocy" Says Representative Hosmer

It has been such a long while since we have heard or read anything about the Upper Colorado River reclamation project that we had figured it was forgotten about—at least temporarily.

However, a news release from Rep. Craig Hosmer of California this week indicates that some federal dunderheads are still trying to pressure the country into developing 500,000 acres of land in the high and now unproductive reaches of Colorado, Wyoming, Utah, and New Mexico at a cost of \$4 billion dollars.

Rep. Hosmer is correct when he claims that, "The whole thing is nothing short of economic idiocy." With all the publicity being given to surplus farm commodities now on the hands of the country, it does seem fantastic that the Bureau of Reclamation would want to spend so much money to do something that is so unnecessary.

Rep. Hosmer says that he ordered reports made from the field offices of the SCS in 19 South-eastern and Midwest states, and came up with the amazing total of 21 million acres of farm land now lying idle.

If the country wants more farm production, it could easily come from this great acreage of unused land already located where rainfall is sufficient, and transportation and markets are near at hand. To get an idea of how much land 21 million acres would be—that would be enough to absorb more than the nation's entire cotton allotment. Furthermore, it is land in classes 1, 2, and 3, and does not include woodlands, pastures, or government lands.

What has been the stimulant to give Rep. Hosmer the urge to seek out these facts we don't know. As he comes from California, it might be logical to assume that any dam across the Colorado River will mean that less water will flow across the country and eventually past the foot of Southern California. This being true, such a plan might mean less water for agriculture and domestic

## Jan. 31, Deadline For Farm Operators Employee Returns

Farm operators who have paid as much as \$100 in cash wages to any farm employee during the year 1955 should file an employer's tax and information return for agricultural employees, John R. Robinson, Administrative Officer, Lubbock, announced today. This tax return should be filed with the District Director of Internal Revenue, Dallas, together with the social security taxes on the wages shown on the form.

Robinson emphasized that this annual report of wages paid for agricultural labor must be filed with the Internal Revenue Service before January 31, 1956. The return must show the name, social security number, and wages paid every employee whose cash wages from the same farmer amounted to \$100 or more.

Farmers, who must make these tax returns and have not yet received or written for the proper forms, should write the District Director of Internal Revenue, Dallas, immediately in order to be sure of getting the report filed before the January 31 deadline, Robinson urged.

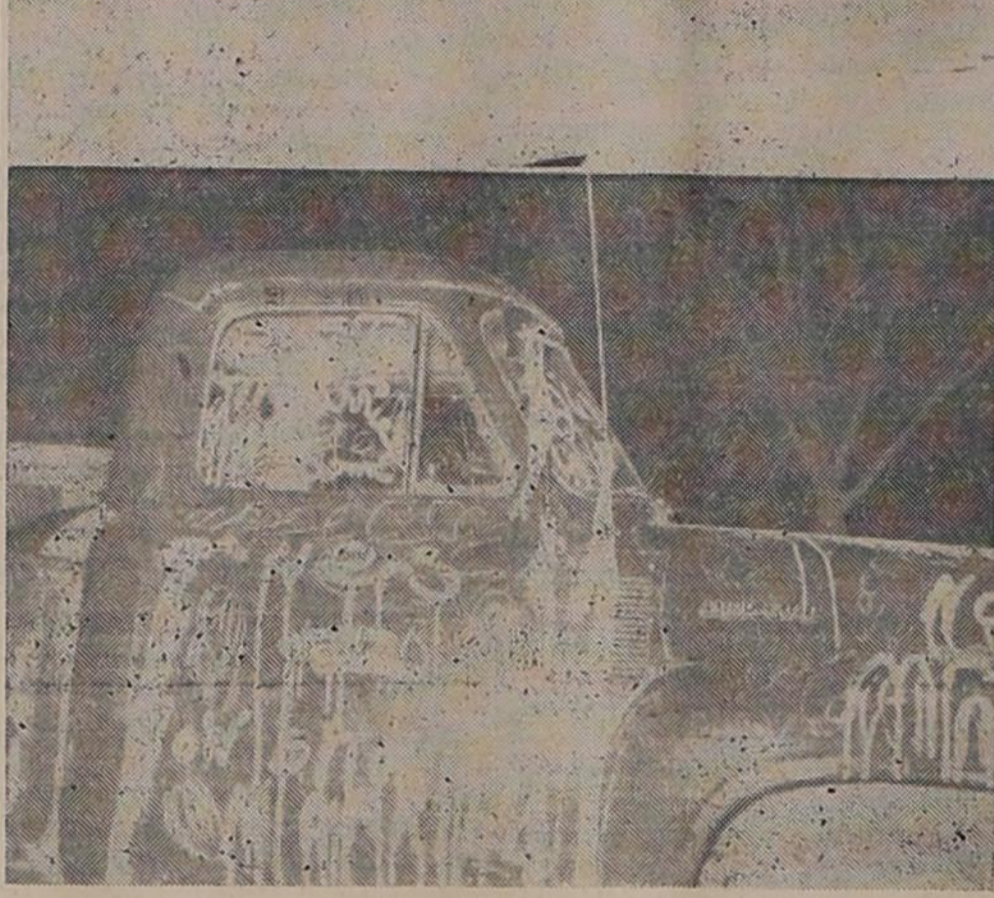

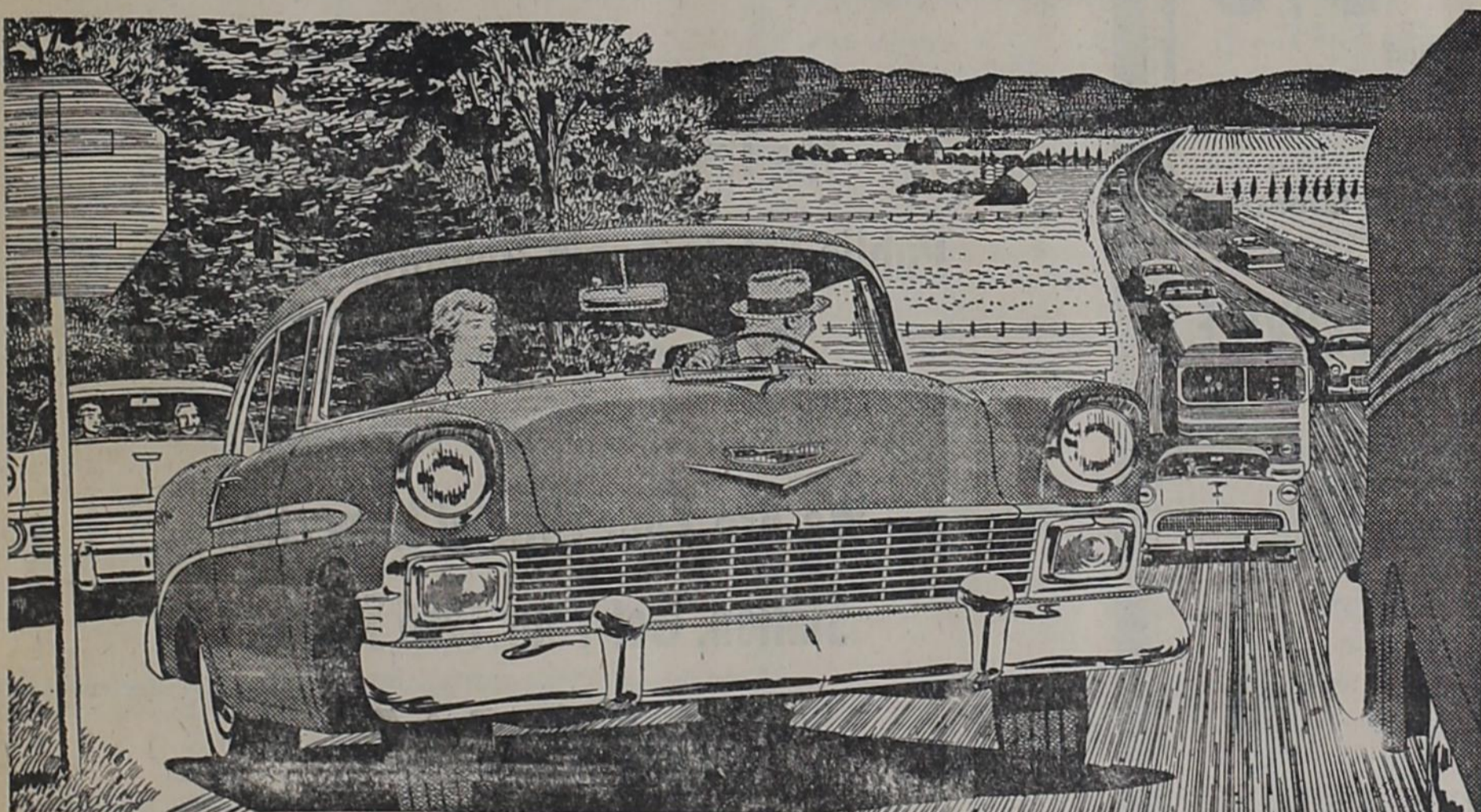

## 25% Gain Shown at First Federal Savings

The first Federal Savings and Loan Association has reported that its assets now amount to \$18,621,936.05, or an increase of 25.5 per cent more than they were a year ago.

C. Roy Smith, association president, in releasing the annual report, said that the institution's progress continued to be based on serving an increasing number of citizens, "and serving them well."

"With each passing year," Smith said, "we serve a growing number of people, either by providing a safe, convenient and profitable place for their savings, or by granting them loans on a sound basis for the purchase of homes."

"To better serve our growing number of people," the president commented, "we purchased the adjoining lot and have just completed a very beautiful addition to our present building for further expansion. In addition, we have just completed the remodeling of our home office by adding a new room for our board of directors and departmentalizing each phase of our operations."

Smith further said that semi-private offices have been added for the Savings and Loan departments, and the accounting and teller department is being streamlined to give the very finest customer service possible. Four of Burroughs Sensimatic window posting machines, which is one of the very best machines available, will be

installed July 1—three in the Clovis office and one in the Portales branch office.

Highlights of the specialized thrift and home financing institution's 1955 operations listed by Smith include:

Net savings in 1955 increased by \$2,572,793.01 or 19.9 per cent, bringing total savings to \$15,546,779.10.

Dividends paid out to savers totaled \$495,950.42.

Home loans increased both in number and amount, with such loans numbering 676 and totaling \$3,737,798.79—gains of 17 per cent and 29.3 per cent respectively. Total home loans outstanding now amount to \$16,454,690.56.

Reserves now amount to \$1,475,742.59 or 19 per cent more than at the end of 1954.

Smith forecast an "unusually good" year for business in 1956, especially for the first six months. The economic expansion of 1955 would continue, he predicted, bolstered by a high level of plant and equipment expenditures, expanding inventories, a high rate of consumer spending, peak employment, and a high level of construction.

Further contributing to an optimistic business outlook, the First Federal president reported, were the facts that 1956 is an election year, and that tax reductions appear to be in the offing.

As for housing, Smith reported that demand continues strong, being sustained by "an intense de-

sire on the part of the public for up-to-date and larger homes, a rising rate of disposal personal income, and a continued high rate of family formation." While housing starts may decline to around 1.2 million units in 1956, down from 1955's production of 1.3 million units, he commented, the year would still go down as the country's third biggest home building year.

Texico basketball teams traveled to Causey Saturday night where they split a double-header. The girls were victorious in a relatively easy game with the final score reading 53-32. Starting for the Texico team were Barbara Caldwell, Shirley Doshier and Sue Reid, forwards; and Gwennette Powell, Sue Doolittle and Mikala Faville, guards.

Causey failed to make a point in the first quarter while Texico racked up 16. Barbara Caldwell was high scorer with 20 points and Sue Reid was second with 19.

Texico boys were defeated in a close game with a final score of 45-42. At half time the score was tied, and at the end of the third quarter Texico had edged by with a three point margin to lead 31-28. George, although amiable and easy-going, doesn't talk much. His oral reservations give him an air of timidity, although this trait disappears on the basketball court.

Asked if his family is proud of his making the team, he replies, "Yes, they sure are. But I don't think I've done so much."

When George first started coming out for basketball last year, he played with the "B" string boys. He never dreamed of making the first team after he became

otherwise eligible to do so.

However, his natural talent soon moved him up to the first squad, and he now appears to be a permanent fixture of the starting line-up.

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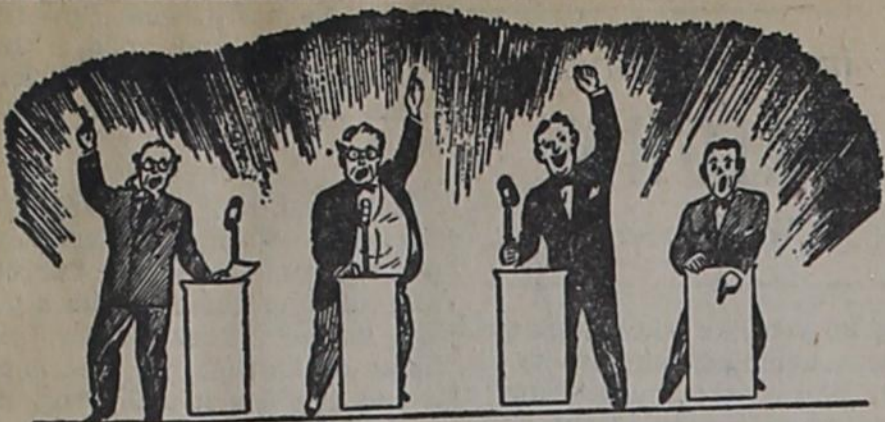

The accident occurred when John Wallace of near Neosho turned off Highway 60 onto a farm road. The truck, driven by England, was loaded with grain and belonged to his employer, R. A. Mills of Burkburnett. It rammed the car from the rear. Almost instantly the truck burst into flames and England hit the ground with his clothing on fire.

At about the same time, a grocery truck, driven by Holman Long of Willard, Mo. crashed into the flaming wreckage and the driver's body was burned beyond recognition. Both trucks were a total loss. The driver of the car was not injured and assisted England in extinguishing his burning clothing. England's only injuries were shock and burns on his back, arms and chest. ## Sewer Tie-On Rates Set by Commission

The cost of tying on to Bovina's sewer system was decided Monday night at the regular monthly meeting of the city commission of Bovina.

If a house or business building ties on to the sewer before the ditch that the sewer line is laid in is covered up the charge will be \$10. Property owners will be responsible for getting their line out to the sewer line.

After the ditch is covered, \$25 will be charged to tie on. A charge of \$50 will be made if the sewer contractor does not leave a place for the property owner to tie on. This \$50 figure will apply in most cases, to new houses because the contractor will leave a place for

all present houses whether they plan to tie on immediately or not, says Roy Fuller, assistant water superintendent.

These prices are subject to approval by Hasie and Green Engineering Company. Hasie and Green are engineers for the system.

The commissioners—Mayor O. W. Rhinehart, Emmett Tabor, and Paul Jones—also agreed that if a water bill is not paid in 30 days, the water to that particular residence or business will be cut off. A fee of \$1.50 will be charged for turning the water back on.

Faulty water meters will be corrected without charge if the meter is causing the user to be charged too much. However, if the user wants the meter checked and there is nothing wrong with it, a fee of \$2.50 will be charged.

Other business of the commission included paying members of the equalization board and the paying of the city's last month bills.

## Work on Sewer Is Progressing

Work on Bovina's sewer disposal plant continues to progress. Electricity has been run to the plant by a Southwestern Public Service crew. The electricity will be used to run the plant's recirculation pump.

The three lagoons or lakes that will be used to store the excess water from the sewer have been completed as well as the drying beds. The drying beds will take care of the solid part of the sewerage as the lagoons handle the water.

What is probably the most important part of the disposal plant—the separation tank—is now under construction, says Henry Minter, city secretary.

The exact date that the contractor, Panhandle Construction Company of Lubbock, will start laying the lines is still not known, Minter says.

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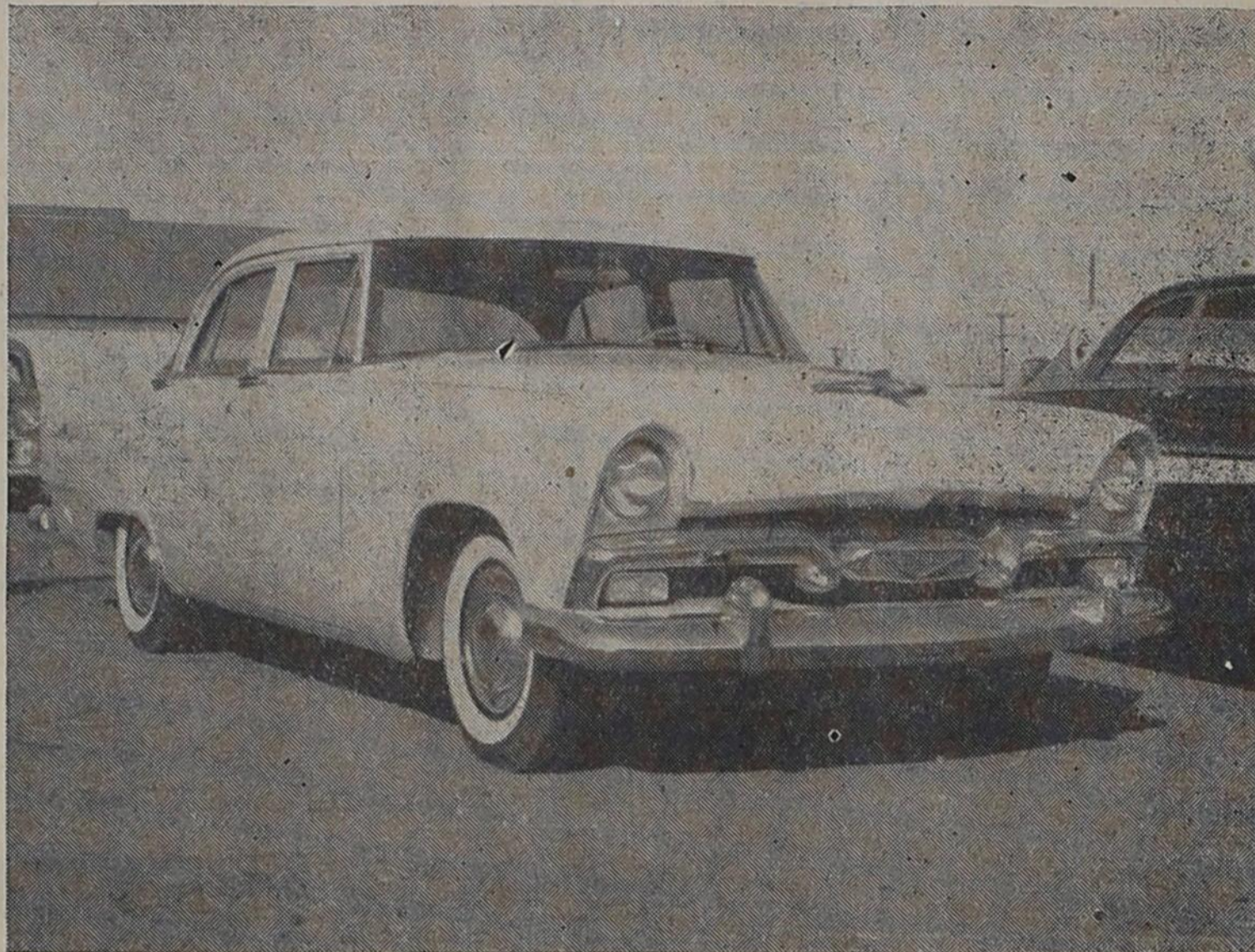

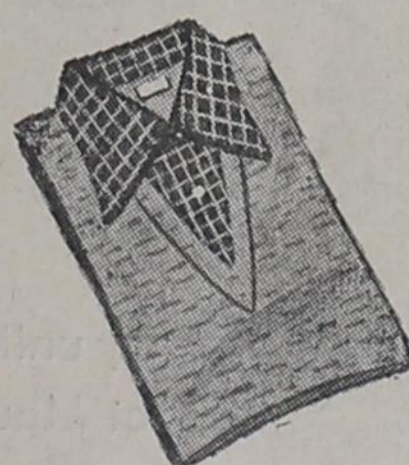
