





Diagnostic equipment in the lab can be used to detect diabetes, gout, hepatitis, mononucleosis, cholesterol and many other diseases. All types of blood tests and urine tests are performed in the lab.

Minor surgery and obstetric surgery can be performed with the surgical equipment available in the clinic.

Scattered rains accompanied by cool temperatures gave the area around the Twin Cities a slight relief Thursday night and Friday morning from the recent unusually warm temperatures.

More wind and electricity came out of the clouds Thursday night than rain, but an area south of Texico received approximately one inch of moisture.

Around Lariat, .3 inch was reported. Only sprinkles of rain were received in an area northeast of Farwell. South of Farwell, one rain gauge showed .52 inch.

Only a trace of moisture was reported for the Oklahoma Lane area. In Texico-Farwell approximately .1 inch fell. Everyone surveyed reported a large amount of electricity in the air during the rain and considerably high winds.
