
According to the State Highway department, Texas now has 2,238.84 miles open to traffic. This is 2.84 miles more than California will have when their project is completed. Texas will boast of 3,170 miles of interstate roads -- more than any other state, naturally, when its system is finished. The completion date for the interstate system is set for the mid 1970s. 

"These pests live on animals continuously and feed as much as 20 times a day," explains Dr. Bill Clymer, area entomologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. "A moderately heavy infestation of 5,000 flies can extract one-half pint of blood or about one per cent of the blood value of a 1,000-pound animal."

> uncontrolled infestations of horn flies can cause a loss of one-half pound of flesh or one quart of milk per day," points tional Park and Glacier Nationout Clymer.

To combat horn flies during periods of peak populations, insecticides may have to be applied on a two-to-four week basis, he adds. In addition to spraying, other methods that are effective are dusting, dipping, self-treatment dust bags, back rubbers and mineral treated salt blocks.

Numerous insecticides are

available for controlling horn flies. Information on these can be obtained from the "Texas Guide for Control of External Parasites of Livestock and Poultry" available at the local county extension office.
