Monday morning of this week we had the enlightening experience of attending a public hearing regarding Santa Fe Railroad's request to discontinue the passenger train service between Farwell and Houston. This was a revealing peek into the world of high level "jockeying for position."

The State of Texas was represented by an examiner whose job it was to conduct an orderly meeting and to enter into sworn testimony all the pros and cons of the motion for discontinuance. Santa Fe Railroad was represented by a baker's dozen or so of their top level management and legal council.

The main organized resistance to the motion was headed by the various Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen unions. The large mass of the public representatives were in a sense not represented. By this, we mean that if it had not been for the Union representation, who of course were interested in presenting everybody adverse, I doubt if the others of us would have known enough to be heard at the proper time.

Also, we presume that the State of Texas people were paid as this was their job; the Santa Fe representatives probably drew their salaries while they were there, and I also make the presumption that the Union people were likewise paid in some manner for their presence. This left only "the People" who were taking their time, which cost them by being away from their jobs or work and their personal expenses, who were probably not in a hurry. Therefore it seemed to us that the State Examiner could have been a little more concerned with giving these people priority in the presentation of their statements.

As it was, I have the feeling that it was only the intercession of the Union representative that allowed me to give the statement of the Farwell Chamber of Commerce in the some two hours that I was in the room. This is as far as I can go in complimenting the Union in this case.

The application of Santa Fe Railroad to the Texas Railway Commission for discontinuance of this passenger train between Farwell and Houston is a subterfuge to keep it out of an ICC hearing. Now we know the Santa Fe is not going to run a train from Clovis to Texico and back. Therefore, they will drop the run between Clovis and Texico and this places the motion within the purview of Interstate Commerce, in our illegal opinion. We think this should be placed in the hands of the ICC.

We are also quite sure that the run from Clovis to Houston has been a money loser for the railroad. We strongly suspect that the Railroad has not taken a positive attitude toward passenger service in general and means to, quite soon, eliminate all passenger service to and from any point. The elimination of the Houston feeder service will seriously effect the revenues of the San Francisco Chief that connects at Clovis, and then an application to discontinue it will be filed on the basis it loses ground. By this plan of gradualism, all passenger service can be written off as uneconomic for the railroad. Unless our elected representatives of the various governmental levels respond to the needs of the people, we will soon be out of train passenger service.

We will continue this discussion of all the ramifications of this train discontinuance next week. We urge all interested people to follow our discussions and to take positive action by writing our elected officials and letting them know how we feel.

Remember, a vote is the common currency that a politician recognizes as being universally acceptable.

## J. W. Herington Elected --

### Run-Off Set In School Board Election

When the votes from the Saturday school board election were canvassed at the Monday night meeting of the Farwell School Board, J. W. Herington was declared elected with a total of 96 votes for one of the two positions on the board. However, the name of the person to fill the other position is still in doubt, since a runoff election will be required to determine what the outcome will be. Darrell Norton and Melborn Jones each polled 73 votes in the Saturday election. Clarence Johnson, the other candidate (seeking re-election) polled 63 votes.

The run-off election has been set for Thursday, May 2, at Parmer County Courthouse. Polls will be open from 8 a.m. until 7 p.m. in the county courthouse.

Wendol Christian, candidate for county school trustee at large, amassed a total of 146 votes in the Saturday election.

## Club Wins Community Improvement Award

At the fifty-sixth annual convention of Federated Woman's Clubs held last week in Tucumcari, Texico Woman's Club was awarded first place in the state on its Community Improvement Project, sponsored by the Sears Roebuck Foundation from Chicago. Mrs. Sam D. Johnson, state president, presided as master of ceremonies. The award consisted of a Citation and a check in the amount of \$300. The Texico Club is now eligible to

participate in national competition for its Community Improvement Project.

National judges will select ten clubs throughout the United States for semi-finalists, and should the Texico club be in this group, the national judges will come here to view the city park before making a final decision. The national prizes will be awarded at a national meeting of General Federation of Women's Clubs at Boston, Mass., June 10-14.

One hundred per cent of the Federated Woman's Clubs in New Mexico participated in the Community Improvement project. There are 57 clubs in the state. ## Junior Team Wins House Meet

Texico Junior High track and field squad came home from the House track and field meet last Saturday with a first place trophy and four new records. Their big brother team, the Texico senior squad, did not fare so well however, as they came away with a fifth place rating in the meet.

Texico junior high squad amassed a total of 64 points to win the meet while the seniors had 30 points. New records set by the junior high group were in the 100-yard dash, the 120-yard low hurdles, the broad jump, and the 400-relay.

Monte Lambert with a time of 10.8 set the 100-yard dash record, besting the record set by Carter of Grady in 1965; Johnny Dane, with a time of 16.5 on the low hurdles, outdid the time of Peacock of House of 17.5 set in 1965. Dane also set

a new record in the broad jump with a distance of 17.8 1/2 which topped the record of 17.7 1/2 set by Bright of Melrose in 1967. Dane, Martin White, Lambert and Albert Steward were members of the relay team who had a time of 52.8 for a new record.

The junior squad also won the 880 medley relay; squad members were Danny Pearce, Martin White, Albert Steward and Johnny Dane.

Martin White was second in the broad jump, third in the 100-yard dash and fifth in low hurdles. Albert Steward was fourth in the broad jump and fifth in shot put. Monte Lambert was fourth in shot put, while Wesley Clark was second in high jump and third in pole vault. Danny Pearce was fourth in low hurdles.

The senior team came away from the meet with a third place in the 440 relay (Rickey Stanley, Roddy Pearce, Charlie Tipton, Larry Duncan); Lynn Hughes was fourth in the 120-yard high hurdles and second in high jump; the mile medley team (Stanley, Duncan, Pearce and Doug Autrey) was second, while the mile relay team (Steve Chancey, Doug Autrey, Lynn Hughes and Charlie Tipton) placed fourth.

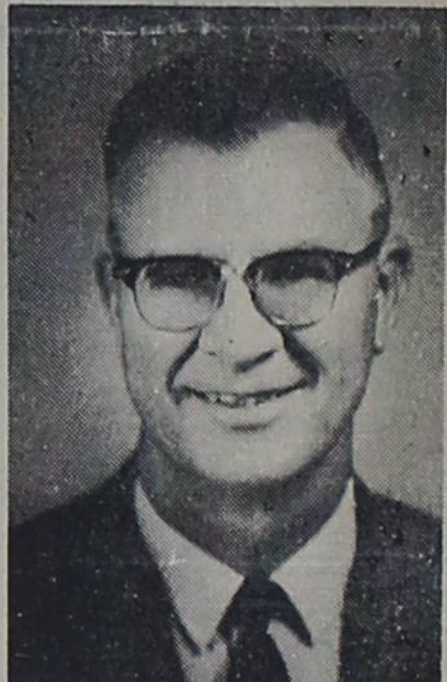

**On The Farm In Parmer County**

Many farmers and ranchers have faced the problem of rapid seepage loss of lakes or stock tanks.

Bentonite is a natural clay which swells 10 to 12 times its dry size when wet. When it is mixed with the soil on the bottom or applied in a layer over the porous soil, bentonite forms an impermeable layer that stops seepage.

There are three methods of applying bentonite, the "blanket method," mixed blanket method, and the sprinkle method.

The blanket method usually results in the most efficient seepage control, but more care must be given in application than the other methods. In the blanket method, the top 4 to 6 inches of soil from the lake are removed and the surface smoothed with a roller. The area is then covered with a layer of bentonite and the 4 to 6 inches of removed soil is carefully replaced.

After replacing the soil roll or tamp it. If possible, control the flow of water into the lake to avoid damage to the treated area.

The mixed blanket method of application is somewhat less effective than the blanket method, but it is faster. First, all surface rocks should be removed and then the soil plowed or disked about 4 to 6 inches deep and smoothed.

The bentonite can then be disked through the soil layer and the surface rolled or tamped.

The sprinkle method of application involves the scattering of course particles of bentonite on the surface of the water. The particles sink to the bottom and swell to stop the seepage. Because uniform application with this method is impossible, this method is the least effective of the three.

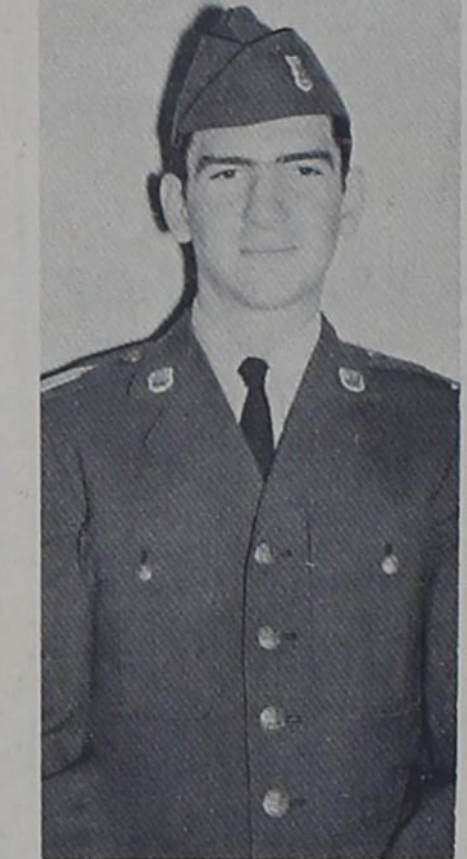

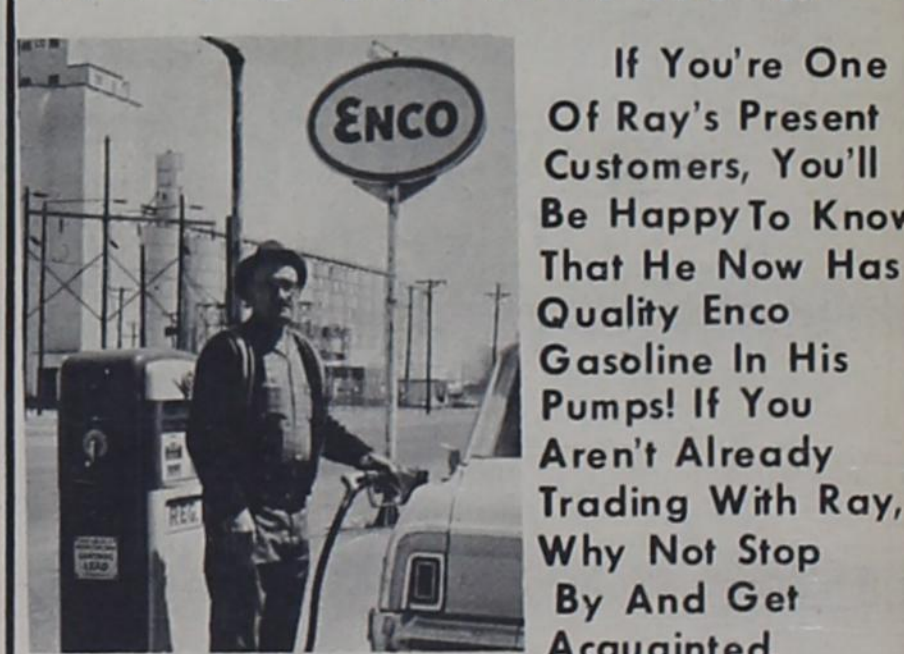

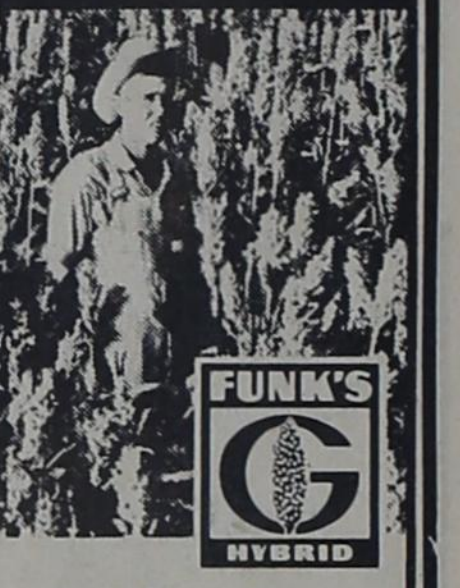
