

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Questions most frequently asked about proper lubrication by farmers and ranchers.

Q. What do you mean by "API Engine Service Classification" and these letters MS, DM and DS?

A. This system developed by the API (American Petroleum Institute), provides a guide for the selection of oils suitable in various engines. It classifies general ranges of service needs based upon-Engine design and construction-Operating conditions-Fuel

Here's how it works. Each service class is designated by letters. This provides a convenient means for the engine manufacturer to indicate the service characteristics of his various engire designs and hence their lubrication requirements. Similarly, oil companies use the letter designations to indicate which class, or classes, of service each of their motor oil brands is suitable. Operators can thus select the trypes best suited to their needs.

If gasoline or other spark ignition engine is involved, there are three kinds of service to consider, with the M standing for "gasoline Automotive". Service ML-light service, Service MM-moderate service, Service MS-severe ser-

If a diesel engine is involved there are likewise three kinds of service conditions to consider, with the D standing for "Diesel Automotive".

Service DG-general (not severe operating conditions), Service DM-moderately sev-

NURSERY

Often, we think of fall as the season when gardening is done and all we have to do is toast Borger, Tex. and Vassar, Kan. our shins and do nothing. Actually, things we do in the fall for our yards and gardens will pay bigger and better dividends his text Daniel 7:13-14. He will time of the year.

An application of Sulfasoil for added iron, sulpher, zinc and to condition soil by dissolving a lot of the alkali will do more good this fall than at any other time of the year. Roots of evergreens and perennials grow all winter. Plants, like people, will do better where the roots are deeper and better conditioned. The same applies to winter watering. We would rather miss one application of water during the hottest summer months than to miss one during the inconvenient winter. In this temperature zone, watering in the winter is more inconvenient than impossible.

Another must in the line of fruit trees is treatment of borers. These wormy rascals can well wreck a tree during winter if left alone. Some people follow a well-thought-out plan to catch borers above ground in the spring. This works well because borers follow the sap up and down. To catch them either way breads the cycle and when the practice of double protection is followed, it works wonders. The most popular treatment is probably "Borer-Sol." Another preventive measure that pays off well is a spray

against fruit tree scale. Still another resolve to make now and keep next spring is to spray fruit trees agianst worms.
