BUT, I do wish we would compete on the same basis as other countries and not disadvantage ourselves and our fine athletes by fatheadedly ignoring the political actions of a final accolade to our Olympic squad. They were good looking representatives of the United States; they looked like they came to win and we did not dip our national flag as other countries.

Defeat Sundown 54-14 --

Steers Continue Winning Ways

Farwell Steers continued to lengthen their winning streak by downing a previously unbeaten Sundown Roughneck club 54-14. The Blue and White led from early in the game and has massed a 34-0 lead at halftime. The Steer infantry ground out 189 yards and gained another 224 yards through the air in the one-sided victory. Craig Phillips once again proved to be the Steer workhorse carrying 17 times for 106 yards. Dean Stovall was the favorite target of Quarterback Greg Hargrove with four receptions for 101 yards and two Steer touchdowns.

Dean Stovall took the opening kickoff on the five and after a 40-yard runback the Steers set up shop on their own 45. After an unsuccessful series of plays, the Steers punted to Sundown where the Roughnecks took over on their 15-yard line. On the first play from scrimmage Sundown fumbled and an alert Farwell defense recovered. Craig Phillips carried twice to the 11 for the Steers initial first down of the evening. Following a loss, Kyle Sheets carried for 15 yards and Craig gained sufficient yardage for first and goal on the Sundown one yard stripe. Al Phillips went over for the TD and added the PAT via the toe to give the Steers a 7-0 advantage.

The kickoff went into the endzone for a touchback and the Roughnecks went to work. Mike Morgan went nine yards and Jesse Perez carried for the first to Sundown's 33. The Steer defense contained the Roughnecks but a fourth down holding penalty on the Steers gave Sundown a first down. After gaining another first, the Steer defense held and an incomplete pass to Perez gave Farwell the ball on their own 25.

A personal foul on Sundown moved the ball to the 43 and after Craig ground out short yardage on two plays, Greg Hargrove drilled Dean Stovall for nine yards and a first down. Craig picked up 15 for another first on Sundown's 31. A gain of two by Al and another personal foul moved the ball to the 10. On second down, Hargrove found Stovall in the end zone and Al added the point giving the Steers a 14-0 lead.

Farwell kicked off once again to Morgan and Sundown tried to get their offensive machinery rolling. A stout Steer defense proved to be too much and the Roughnecks were forced to punt.

The Steers took control with a first and 10 on their own 34. Craig rambled for nine yards bringing up second and inches. Taking advantage of the situation, Hargrove hit Stovall for 17 yards and another first. Powerhouse Craig once more showed the fans what he could do on a 39 yard scamper to paydirt but a holding penalty on the Steers

nullified the effort. Hargrove then went to Kyle Sheets for 19 and Craig gained the first. He carried on three successive plays the last of which went for five yards and the Steers third touchdown. The kick went wide and the Steers led by a score of 20-0 in the second stanza. After kicking off to Sundown, Robert Haseloff covered a Jesse Perez fumble on the second play from scrimmage. On the next play, however, a pass intended for Stovall was picked off by Jon Lee for the Roughnecks. The joy was shortlived as an alert Mark Williams snagged a Morgan pass and carried it 15 yards for a Steer touchdown. Al added the point bringing the score to 27-0.

Sundown took the kickoff on their 20 on a touchback. Mike Morgan ran for three. On the next play, Gene Sheets gathered in the Steers second interception on a pass intended for Fred Helms to give Farwell possession on Sundown's 35.

Craig carried for five and a pass to Kyle netted 10 yards and a first. Hargrove pitched out to Kyle who scampered 20 yards for a TD and with Al's extra point, the scoreboard read 34-0.

Sundown took the kick on their 32 and moved to their 41 bringing up a third and one situation. Mike Morgan broke into the clear for 26 yards before being knocked out of bounds by Stovall to prevent the touchdown. After a short gain by Perez, QB Jon Lee was heavily rushed while trying to pass. His pass went short and was hauled down by Randy Johnson to halt the drive.

Gene Sheets came into the game to direct the Farwell attack. Though good gains were netted by Milton Walling and Mike Flowers, a fourth and two attempt by Carl Goetsch was short of the needed yardage and the ball went over on downs.

Sundown took over on their 30 but could not muster an attack and were forced to punt to Gene Sheets. After two incomplete passes, Sheets was hit hard and Sundown recovered the ensuing fumble. There was time

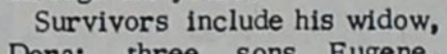
Walter Verner Rites Wednesday

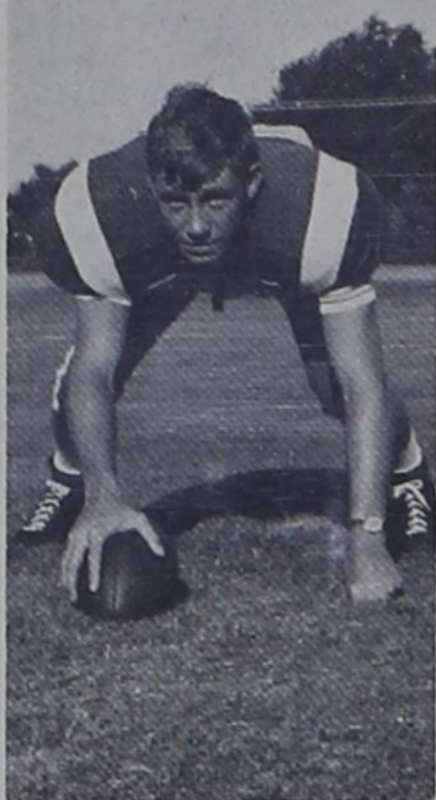
Set Lions Fall Round-Up

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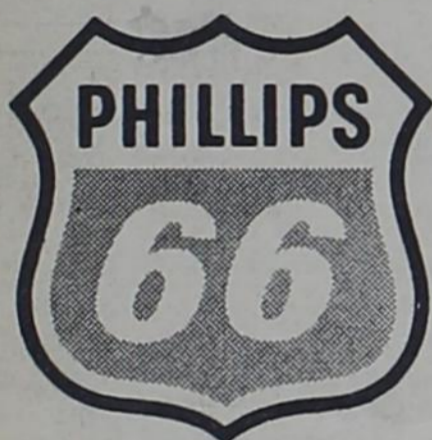

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Here's how it works. Each service class is designated by letters. This provides a convenient means for the engine manufacturer to indicate the service characteristics of his various engine designs and hence their lubrication requirements. Similarly, oil companies use the letter designations to indicate which class, or classes, of service each of their motor oil brands is suitable. Operators can thus select the types best suited to their needs.

If gasoline or other spark ignition engine is involved, there are three kinds of service to consider, with the M standing for "gasoline Automotive". Service ML-light service, Service MM-moderate service, Service MS-severe service.

If a diesel engine is involved there are likewise three kinds of service conditions to consider, with the D standing for "Diesel Automotive".

Service DG-general (not severe operating conditions), Service DM-moderately severe operating conditions, Service DS-very severe operating conditions.

Thanks Gladys—it is truly delicious. The Shepherd's Pie is a fine way to use left-overs and makes a complete meal when served with a light dessert and a tossed salad.

Trifle
Slice white layer or pound cake (Vanilla wafers may be used) one fourth to one half inch thick and place in bottom of crystal serving bowl; over the cake place favorite fruit (peaches or berries workequal-

ly well) which has been drained; 1 box favorite gelatin juice from fruit may be used to make gelatin-set gelatin aside to thoroughly cool. When it is cool (must be cool or mixture will not be of right consistency) pour over fruit; now spoon vanilla custard which has been made and allowed to cool over gelatin-plate in refrigerator until ready to serve. When ready to serve top with whipped cream and garnish with nuts. Recipe serves 16 people.

Shepherd's Pie
Slice left-over roast into thin portions and place layer in buttered casserole, now place a layer of thinly sliced onion, a layer of mashed potatoes (left-over potatoes work nicely); repeat layers until desired amount is in casserole and then pour over entire contents of casserole the beef gravy, left from roast—place in moderate oven and cook for approximately 20-25 minutes. Remove from oven and serve while piping hot! Delicious and fit for a king!
