



Political log rolling, back scratching, and vote trading is not in the area of school consolidation and tax raising. We think that consolidation has been discarded for the time being, but we still look forward to the unpleasant fact that local taxes will be raised as our State Foundation funds are decreased.

We in the smaller districts may have won a battle but we are far from winning a war. We say this by reason of another "release" that has come across our desk. This one comes from the Governor's Committee on Public School Education which contains some statements with which we disagree and with which we know many local folks also disagree.

These statements are made in a dogmatic manner and in a context which leaves no doubt that they (the committee) are right and that you and I are wrong. Therefore, we do not see any possibility that any argument that local members of small communities could make would be either listened to or given consideration of by these folks.

With such a closed mind attitude by the committee members, we can only foresee a continued push by them and the "big government" thinkers to erase small schools and small communities.

Another recent article to come to our attention is a pamphlet on the Amarillo College School of Vocational Arts. We are quite impressed by the scope of the instructions offered and the teaching philosophy involved in offering these courses. This Amarillo vocational school could be studied with profit by those who are pushing for an expanded Junior College System and also by those wanting to consolidate the smaller schools into bigger educational complexes.

This idea of offering training in a trade is a very sound idea and is something our technological society needs very badly. How much better it would be if some of these adepted "social" students were enrolled in a course in diesel mechanics. A graduate of a trade school in diesel mechanics would not have to riot to "find" himself. Plenty of eager employers would be finding him -- with a good job offer.

If more of these "involved" specimens were in truth involved in a good course in radio and television servicing, later on they would be involved in a good day's work and also a good day's pay. Instead of providing higher education, for which, apparently, many students are not capable of and do not want, a good sound education in a lucrative service profession would be far superior.

This might eventually force many of the loafers to go to work and deprive them of their "thing", but society can not and will not go on indefinitely supporting non-workers at taxpayers' expense. The sooner the eggheads of higher education wake up to a few facts of life, the lower our taxes will be and the better overall education we will be furnishing to our ever increasing younger generations.

Teams from Farwell High School took the first two places in the UIL district 3-A Gold Tournament held at Farwell Country Club on Monday.

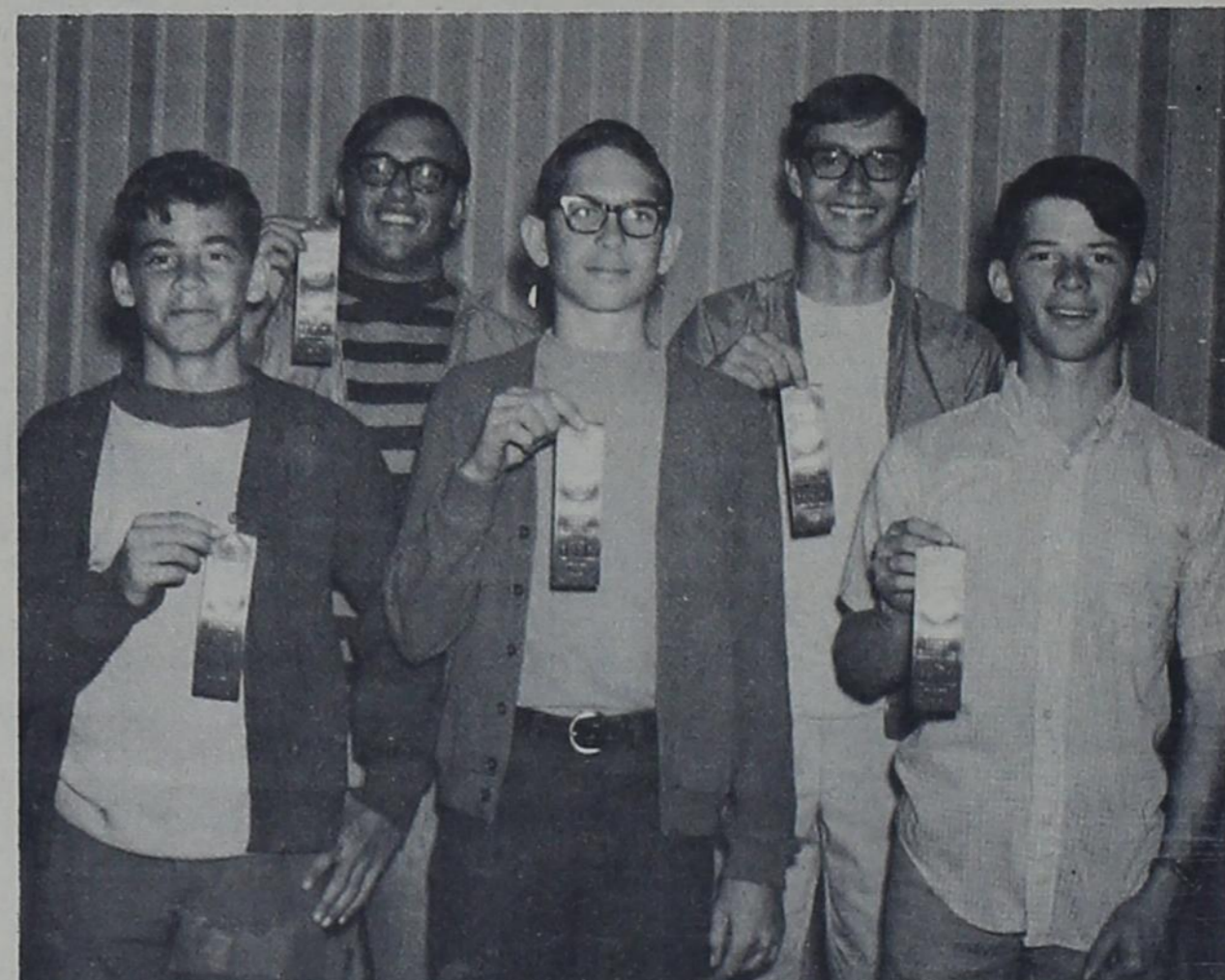
Three members of the championship team, Greg Meeks, Danny Prince, and Robin Mahaney, were first, second and third place medalists, respectively.

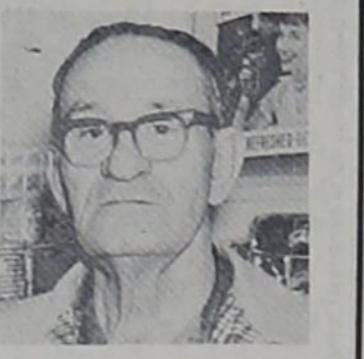
