She received top student awards for Algebra I and Spanish I her freshman year, and Algebra II her sophomore year.



Low Moisture Stops Planting On Dryland

Following very light, but welcome rain during the past week, Bailey County Agent Spencer Tanksley said most of the county is now getting very dry.

Although Muleshoe recorded just over half an inch in the city, no rain was recorded south of the sandhills in the dryland crop areas.

"The continuing high, dry winds are really hurting us," said the county agent. "Planting is going on at a fast rate and irrigated land is in good condition," he added.

Tanksley, who spent Wednesday checking out southern Bailey County said he has seen some cotton up, but has noticed vacant spots in many fields, where the wind has robbed the soil of needed moisture.

He said the rain received in the immediate Muleshoe area was "very beneficial, but dryland farmers are hurting. The moisture is just not there to put a crop in."

Despite talk about West Texas wind, producers had gotten accustomed to the past four or five years when the spring time wind was not so bad. Now, consistent 30-50 mph winds, day after day, are even beginning to hurt irrigated land.

Tanksley said some corn is beginning to be hurt as the farmers continue to lose moisture.

Some producers are beginning to use "buster planters" trying to get their crops in.

"We sure could use about two more inches of rain," he added, "It's time to be doing things, farmers have until May 31 to get their crops in."


He thanked several people and several businesses who provided services to the Booster Club and gave two priorities for the upcoming year.

When Is A School Teacher --Not A Teacher?

(Editor's note: How well do you know your school teachers in Muleshoe? Do you think you know them -- real well? Well, in that case, you may be in for a little shakin' up about this one!)

Who's a teacher with a definite twinkle in their eye -- always friendly and considerate? Okay! Who's a teacher who is in high school? Yeah! You're right! It could be several teachers. Now! Who's a teacher who drives a bus, is a baseball umpire, is a minister, and what's this a motorcyclist? Come with me, let's meet David Gray.)

He's not a Muleshoe native, a native Texan? Nope! But, although he took a round-about way getting here -- he's an asset to Muleshoe.

Just who is this school teacher, minister, sportsman, and cyclist who came to Muleshoe from Ohio.

A native of Ohio, he graduated in the top 10 in his class and received a scholarship to college. He attended Olivet Nazarene College 1964-1969 in Kankakee, Ill. where he majored in English and History.

And, from there, he taught 1969-1971 at Hayward Junior

High School in Springfield, Ohio. Becoming disenchanted with teaching, he started his trek to the southwest.

He had become a Nazarene minister in 1971 after receiving his minister's license in Ohio. He became a minister at the Plum Street Nazarene Church.

Moving west, he accepted the pastorate of the Nazarene Church at Deming, N. M., where he stayed two years.

From there, he temporarily by-passed Texas and accepted a pastorate at the Pryor, Okla Nazarene Church. While in Pryor, he was also in jail ministry, as he had been at Deming.

Something new was added at Pryor. He taught in a co-ed reformatory in Oklahoma, teaching everything from runaways to robbers. He said there was absolutely no nonsense at the reformatory, was very strictly disciplined and the school sure believed in corporal punishment.

Along came 1975, and David decided to move his family to Seagrave, and worked in the oil fields in Denver City for a year. During that time, he was filling in as guest minister at the

Nazarene Church in Muleshoe. He was asked to take the church, but could not afford to move at the salary offered. He finally moved to Muleshoe to take over the church and found there was an opening for a teacher. Being certified as a teacher in Ohio, Oklahoma, New Mexico and Texas, he spent a year at Junior High School, in Comp-Ed with the Migrant Program.

Then, when Wayland Ethridge moved from junior high to high school as principal, David moved to high school also.

And, he is one very busy teacher. He teaches CLA (Correlated Language Arts); and is the second teacher for CLA in the Muleshoe schools.

He is the first teacher in high school in ESL (English as a Second Language) I-IV; he is TEAMS Tutorial in Language Arts and also teaches one regular English II class.

And, if that's not enough, he drives a school bus; opens the gym for Little Dribblers; works at both football and basketball games and has high school detention on Saturday mornings 8 a.m.-12 noon.

Oh! And, why did he originally

become disenchanted with teaching in Ohio? Well, he explained that he was spending more time refereeing than teaching, up to and including taking a knife away from a youngster in the auditorium of the school. Guess that would make you take a good, long look at whether it pays to be a teacher or not.

Tired of trying to keep up with this unique teacher who leads not a double -- not a triple -- but a quadruple life? Hang on! There's more!

Although he is no longer in active ministry -- David is still director of Christian Education at the Community Church on the Morton highway.

An accomplished vocalist, he does part of the music, and performs solo at times.

About 11 years ago, in his second year of teaching in Muleshoe, and needing additional income for his young, and growing family, he started umpiring in Little League Baseball (now the Bronco League). When he started, he received \$3 per game, and worked about 20 hours, four nights a week.

He went on to become, and



In what was termed a "good representation," 116 of the nearly 200 eligible voters cast a ballot in the Beef Referendum vote in Bailey County last Tuesday.







Deadline Nearing For FmHA County Committee Petition

Bailey County farmers interested in election to the Farmers Home Administration county committee have until May 19 to get their nominating petitions signed and turned in, according to FmHA County Supervisor, Jay McKay.

One person will be elected for a three-year term to the three-person committee at the June 30 election. McKay said anyone who has an interest in a farm in Bailey County as owner, tenant or sharecropper is eligible to run for the committee seat and to vote in the election. A spouse of an eligible farmer also is considered to be a farmer for those purposes.

Nominating petitions, which must be signed by the nominee and two eligible farmer voters, and other information can be obtained at the FmHA county office at 115 E. Ave. D, Muleshoe, McKay said.

FmHA county committees perform a variety of duties, including making decisions on applicants' eligibility for FmHA farm loans. Two committee members are elected by county farmers, and the third is appointed by FmHA.
