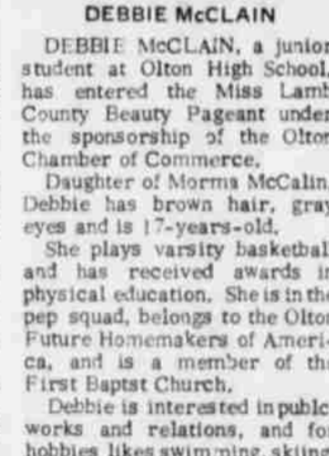

Registration for the Reunion will begin at 2 p.m. Tuesday.

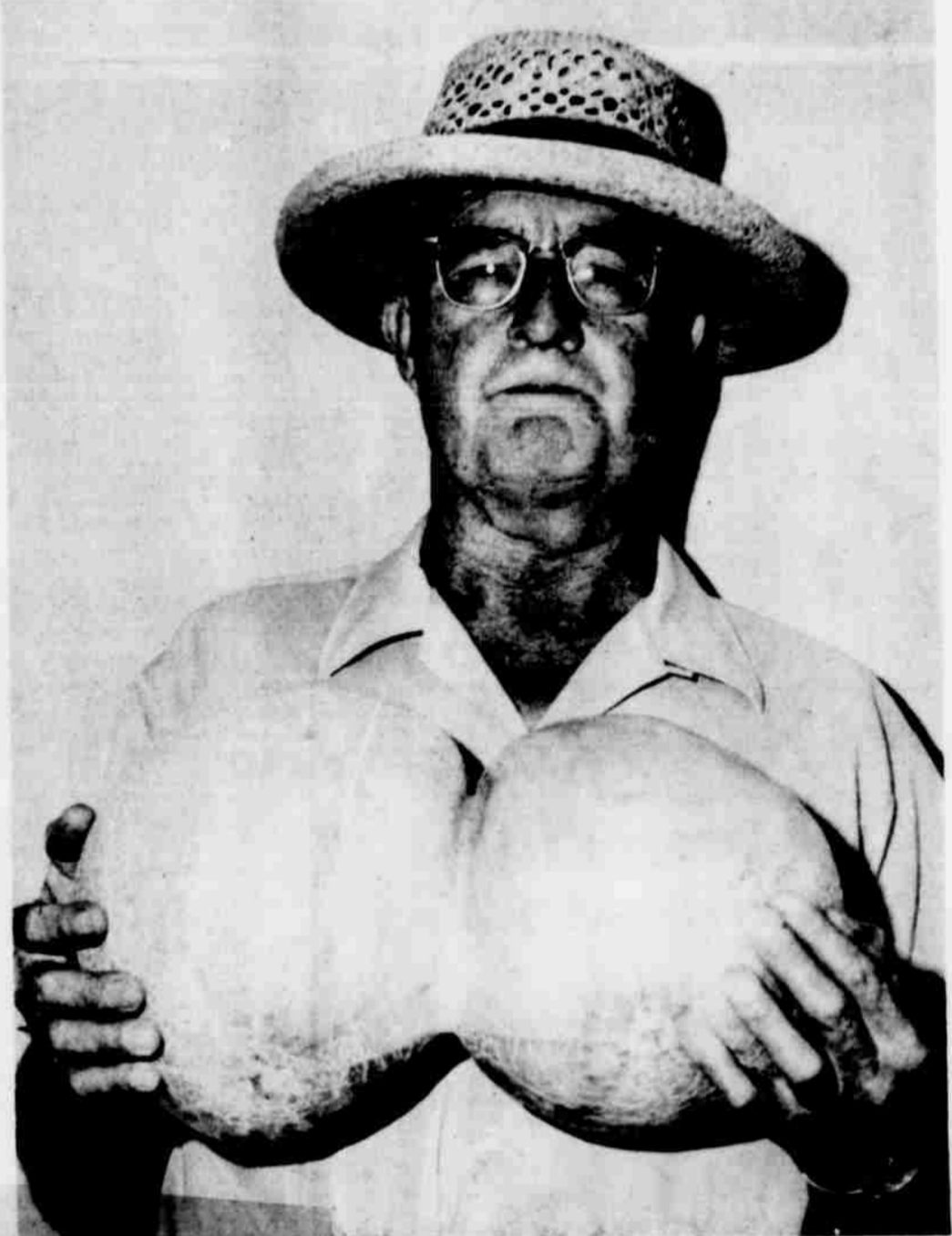

BLEMS MINOR, CITIZENS COOPERATING City Manager Reports On Streets

Improvement work now in progress in Littlefield has numerous minor problems, but the work is going well, City Manager Pat Bradley said.

Bradley reported this week that the city is making extensive street repairs, and some eyes regarding the importance of street maintenance.

Streets, in various states of repair, are being renovated following the passage of a \$365,000 bond.

Approximately 20 per cent of the streets are receiving a single seal coating at a cost of 12.6 per square yard. More than half of the streets are requiring double seal coatings at 29.5 per square yard, and around 25 per cent of the streets will be overlaid at the going price of 72 cents per square yard.

In the process, 53 Chinese elm trees were torn out where the roots were disturbing gutter flowlines and where curbs were lifted, and roughly two miles of curbs and gutters were torn out to correct drainage problems.

Removing the trees and curbs were time consuming and unsightly projects. Each tree was a truck load, and old curbs had to be hauled to the county dump -- a 16 mile round trip.

In some instances the new curbs and gutters are leaving driveways either much lower or much higher than the streets, and in these cases, the city will tear out the driveways and rebuild them to the existing grade. Few are of this extreme, Bradley said, and the property owners have been very cooperative, he said, since water had stood for so long, most were glad to see anything done.

Because most of the bad street conditions were due to standing water that had seeped through the seal coating, spots where water can stand are being eliminated everywhere it is possible. "Oh, we'll still have some bird baths left," Bradley said, "but we're correcting the major problems where the water stands bad."

The majority of the low spots remaining are where valve boxes or man holes are located, Bradley explained.

Crews have finished tearing out curbs, seal coating is just about completed, and new curbs and gutters are being put back. Sidewalk replacement will begin next week.

Barring any unforeseen difficulties, work should be completed on or ahead of schedule.

Pioneer Gas Considers Increase

City Manager Pat Bradley at a meeting in Lubbock Friday night to discuss a gas rate increase for Pioneer Natural Gas.

Bradley is reportedly planning to seek an increase in the gas rate--the rate paid individual customer for gas--but has not announced their intentions.

Representatives from 18 cities in the West Texas system to discuss the situation did not take any action.

On the Texas Railroad Commission approved an increase of 4 cents per 1,000 feet in the gas rate--a charge paid by Pioneer to the gas distribution--and officials believe the burner rate increase will come as a result of the gate increase.

Union Compress Burglarized

Police are investigating a breaking and entering case at Union Compress, where approximately \$700 in equipment were taken from the building.

Entry was gained to the main building through a door that had been pried open. A window had been broken on the tool shed to gain entry there.

Taken from the tool shed were: two pair of vise-grip pliers, three pipe wrenches, four Crescent wrenches, three screwdrivers, one tool box with tools, three end wrenches, one Skill saw, one Addo X electric adding machine and \$40 in cash.

A. V. Gentry reported to police Monday morning that a crate containing an exhaust fan fell from his truck just west of the by-pass construction site. When he discovered the crate and fan missing, he returned to the site, where he found the broken crate, minus the fan.

Gentry has offered a reward for its return.

Chris Andrews reported that his faded red western Auto five-speed bicycle had been taken Friday from Crescent Swimming pool. A friend of his from Levelland had ridden the bike to the pool and it was gone when he returned to where he had left it.

Ken Phillips of Route 1, Amherst reported that someone took a chrome breather and air filter from his 1968 El Camino while it was parked at Crescent Swimming Pool.

Three men have been jailed this past week by city police.

CHISHOLM RECALLS END OF WW II Mayor Remembers V-J

Mayor J. E. Chisholm didn't run up the flags and dance in the street Friday, but neither did the sun sink in the west without his remembering where he was and what he was doing on V-J Day -- 25 years ago.

A captain in the Air Corp, Chisholm was stationed in the Pacific Islands 27 months, just before the war ended, Chisholm and his radar unit were sent to Hawaii on a five-month suicide mission.

The U. S. was losing too many ships to Japanese suicide planes. American Armed Forces were grouped in the Hawaiian Islands readying for the invasion of Japan on Nov. 6. Captain Chisholm and his group had been sent to the Islands to give long range radar protection to American planes to protect them against the Japs diving into the ships in Laiti Bay.

Americans were losing 10 to 15 ships a day from the Japanese "komi kosma" when the

Japanese pilots would strap themselves into their planes, take liquor, fly over the mountains and dive into American ships in the bay.

One suicide pilot could knock out a ship and the method was quicker and more destructive than bombing. Something had to be done so Chisholm's radar unit was sent to the island.

By detecting incoming planes on radar before they cleared the mountains, U. S. fighter planes had a chance to get in the air for a dog fight.

On routine suicide missions, chances of survival were one in 10. On this five-month suicide mission, Chisholm and the other 49 men in the assignment were given one chance in 35 of living through it.

"The first radio message we received," Chisholm said, "was to take all precautions -- 800 Japs were nearing our camp. And us with 50 men."

"The next day two gun boats came in to reclaim our valuables. They thought we were gone."

When word came that the war was over, Chisholm's company had its orders to set up radar platoons on four islands on Nov. 5. The infantry was to precede his company the day before. Everything was already crated and they were to be aboard 30 days.

"The radio operator woke me up at 4 a.m.," Chisholm said, "and said he had just received a message that Japan was making contact for surrender. I woke up the rest of the men, and that's when the celebrating started."

"They got the troops out very fast after that. First the prisoners of war..."

Chisholm said he would like to go back to the Hawaii and the Pacific Islands, especially a little town called Lorente, where they had a radar unit. "It wasn't any bigger than Amherst," he said, "but 15,000 people lived there, sometimes 15 people in a little grass hut. They deserted their town and lived in the hills four years during the war. Some we got to know very well. There was a lawyer and several school teachers with degrees, but they lived so primitive. Even after

living better lives while going to universities.

"They built us a bridge to move our radar equipment over, and all they had to work with was machetes. It was made of coconut logs, but it was just as smooth and level as if they'd had modern equipment."

Chisholm was in the service 50 months, going in in March of '42 after Pearl Harbor was bombed on Dec. 7, 1941.

"Something happened the other day that I'm just real

sorry about," he said. "There were a bunch of kids in our organization -- 18 and 19-year-olds, and we stayed together three years. One came by day before yesterday to see me and I missed him. He left a note and said he'd been to Glorieta, N. M., and that he had his granddaughter with him."

"Granddaughter," he repeated. "And he was just a kid. I'm just real sorry I missed him."

Assault, DWI Charges Made

A 35-year-old Littlefield man from north Littlefield was jailed Wednesday on an aggravated assault charge and released the same day after paying a fine of \$50 plus court cost.

A Littlefield woman was arrested by Bailey County highway patrolmen Sunday and charged with driving while intoxicated. The arrest of 53-year-old Viola Stewart followed an accident in Sudan earlier in which witnesses said she did not stop.

The woman was stopped by Highway Patrolman Joe Young and Harold White, Muleshoe city police chief, at the east edge of Muleshoe after a call from Sudan saying the woman had struck a car driven by Walter Rinehart of Abilene. A man driving behind the Rinehart car followed the woman to Sudan where he stopped and called the Bailey County authorities.

A WOMAN'S VIEW

Red Sea Place

"HAVE YOU COME to the Red Sea place in your life. Where, in spite of all you can do, There is no way out, there is no way back, There is no other way but through?"

AS I START to write this article today my mind is dull and not functioning very well. It hardly seems to be worth the effort.

AS MOST of you know tragedy visited our family again last week, when our loved one Carroll Rowe, was killed in a car accident.

My heart almost broke as I watched the little wife with her two small children board the plane to go back to Dallas to face life without the help of her fine young husband.

WE HEAR of many people facing the same terrible tragedy every day. We read about it in the newspapers and feel sorry for the people, but we can't begin to understand until we experience the same thing.

Listen to it carefully, and then just as carefully refute it with fact and truth and good sense.

LISTEN TO OTHERS. We must do, but we are not obligated to accept their viewpoint; and they have no right to impose it upon us.

We have the right to ask for supporting evidence, or question it

any way we please. If those who speak, do so in good faith, profitable dialogue can be conducted in a climate of peace and good will.

WE MUST LEARN to think for ourselves, even while we give others a respectful hearing. We must have confidence in our conclusions, without closing our minds.

We must be willing to listen to the ideas and opinions of each other. This kind of communication is essential to the common good.

OUR OWN DEVELOPMENT is hindered if we ever reach the place that we are so self-important we think we are right at all times, and are never willing to listen to the opinion of others.

We will also become dateable to those with whom we may be associated.

SUCCESSFUL PERSONS, and those who have the respect of their fellowmen are always willing to admit an error; and they do so in a very gracious manner.

These people never try to force their view upon others with violence, terror tactics, or in any other way.

LISTENING TO OTHERS, especially those with whom we are closely associated, does not require us to give up any of our own rights or privileges.

We are still responsible for carefully evaluating what we hear, and for whatever actions we take.

WE IMPROVE our personal status, and our experiences in human relationships by listening when others talk; knowing that we have the right to talk, too.

Peaceful dissent can be constructive, but any other kind is always destructive.

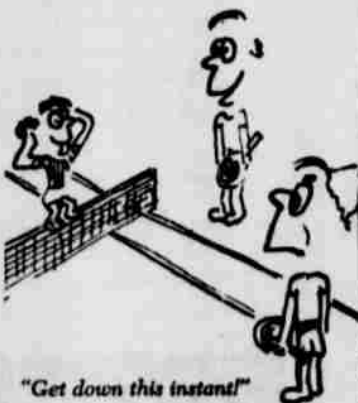

Anton Man Faces

Hereford authorities involved themselves in the case after a series of burglaries began occurring around the area in May last year. Forty cases of burglaries were taken at Dalhart and 16 in Deaf Smith County. Later 50 cases were stolen in Hereford. Then the breakthrough in the Ford County, and 56 cases of burglaries were taken from near Dalhart and 16 cases at Dal-

hereford late last year after the recovery of more than 200 cases of chemicals at various locations in Hereford County. Later, some 125 cases of Arizine, valued at \$650, were discovered on the farm near Hart. Trucks were stolen from several chemical dealers' establishments in several of the counties. Stolen trucks from Dalhart, Farwell, and Hereford were recovered near Hereford, but had been unloaded and left empty.

A hearing last week a year-old Anton Man, Joe Anders, was convicted and sentenced to 10 years in the penitentiary for the bur-

glary of 20 cases of Propazine and five cans of Treflan from around Wildorado in August and September of 1969. The Anton man was brought to Hereford last week from Vega where he was charged with burglary of the Ford Elevator last November. Deputy Harold Wheeler of Hereford said the charges were part of many filed throughout the Panhandle in connection with chemical burglaries over the past five or six years that may amount as high as \$1 million. Anders now faces charges in Hereford.

Charges placed against Anders and two other men after their arrest last December in Lubbock concerned a series of herbicide burglaries in a six-county area. Officials have called Anders the head of the gang.

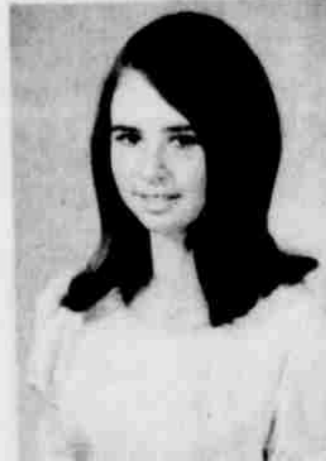
