UP 79 STUDENTS IN TWO YEARS

School Enrollment Shows Small But Steady Increase

Littlefield school enrollment for 1971-72 was up nine students from last year's enrollment during the first five days of school.

314 students. There are 159 fifth graders and 155 sixth graders.

and 163 sophomores add up the total of 370 students in high school, compared to 383 last year.

Comparisons of the new figure show that this year's enrollment is up 79 students from two years ago, making the second year in a row that enrollment has increased.

Two years ago, 1,850 students were enrolled and at the same time three years ago, the total enrollment was 1,918, compared to 2,010 the year before that.

There are 399 students in the primary building this year, with 51 of that number in the kindergarten classes, 200 in the first grade, 150 in the second grade and 13 in level one special education.

In Elementary I, 152 third graders and 161 fourth graders are enrolled—a total of 313 students.

Telephone Rate Change Delayed

President Nixon's wage-price freeze will delay inauguration of new long distance telephone rates for calls within Lamb County and other portions of Texas.

L. L. Porter, traffic director of General Telephone, said lower rates for customers who dial their own intrastate long distance calls would have gone into effect Sept. 1.

But the rate changes were coupled with higher rates for persons placing long distance calls through the operator, causing conflict with the wage-price guidelines.

"The change in rates would have brought customer dialed station-to-station calls within the state in line with already established lower dial-it-yourself rates and calling periods for interstate calls," Porter explained.

He said the long distance rate changes would be delayed until termination of the wage-price freeze.

FM 168 Work Slated In 1972

The Texas Highway Commission has approved the expenditure of \$551,000 for highway Farm to Market Road improvement in Lamb County during 1972.

District Engineer Oscar L. Crain of Lubbock said that a total of 8.7 miles in Lamb County, from the Castro county line on FM 168 to South of Olton, will be involved in the annual program.

Work, which will include reconstruction, grading, streets and surfacing, will be under the supervision of Rhea E. Bradley, supervising resident engineer, of Littlefield.

The work is part of the Highway Commission's combined Farm to Market Road Improvement and State Highway Safety and Betterment Program for 1972.

'Overnight' Mail Delivery Sought For City, Area

Littlefield Postmaster George Thompson said the Littlefield post office and 55 area towns in the Lubbock sectional center are included in plans for "overnight" delivery of first-class mail deposited here by 5 p.m.

The goal is next day delivery of letters and other first-class mail within cities and surrounding area. This affects more than half of all first-class letter mail.

By Sept. 9, regional and local post offices will identify exact areas where next day delivery will be provided for ZIP-coded first-class mail deposited by 5 p.m.

A minimum goal of 95 per cent successful performance has been set for Oct. 31.

In Littlefield, as well as other communities, in order for next day delivery, the first class letters will have to be mailed in time for the 5 p.m. pickups and will not include mailings after carriers have made their deliveries nor mail deposited in receptacles after pickups.

At a minimum, overnight delivery will be provided within and between all 55 post offices in the Lubbock sectional center. In addition, many destinations farther away such as the Dallas area, will receive overnight deliveries, too.

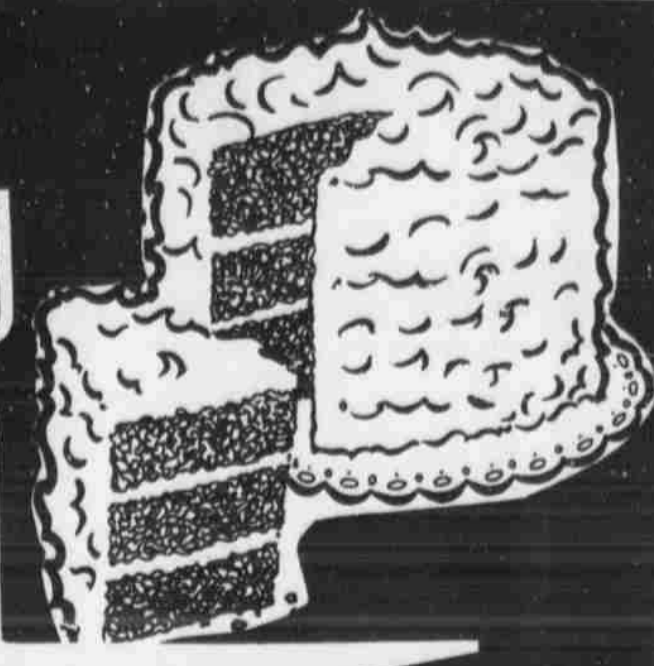

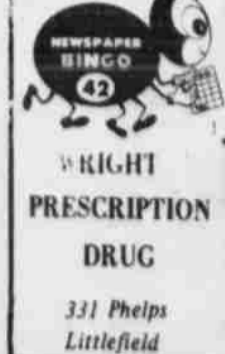

**FACTS CONCERNING RERECORDING OF BRANDS IN TEXAS**  
 All brands and marks on Texas livestock must be recorded with County Clerks after August 30, 1971, according to a new law passed during the last session of the Texas Legislature. Producers will be given a six-month period (August 30, 1971 through February 29, 1972) in which to register these brands and marks and the location on the animal which they are currently using, after which time any unrecorded brand will be available for use on a "first-come" basis. Producers shall record the marks and brands whether the brands and marks have been previously recorded or not.

All brands and marks must be rerecorded every 10 years. Each County Clerk records for his or her given county only, so many producers may need to record their brands in additional counties if their operations are extensive. The owner shall have the right during this six-month period to file the mark and brand now recorded in his name. In the event it cannot be determined from the records who first recorded the brand and mark in the county, then the person who has been using such mark and brand the longest shall have the right to have the brand and mark recorded in his name. It should be noted that it is illegal to brand livestock without first properly recording the brand with the County Clerk in the county in which the livestock are held. When the brand or brands are recorded, the location on the animal on which the brand is to be applied must be designated. If the brand is to be applied to more than one location on the animal, it must be so recorded and each additional location for the brand on the animal shall constitute a separate recording. There is no limit to the number of brands and/or marks which may be recorded in a county by a person as long as requirements of this law governing the recording and rerecording of livestock brands are met. Minors may have marks or brands separate from that of the father or guardian, which must be recorded or rerecorded as provided by the new law. After the expiration of six months from the taking effect of this Act, (February 29, 1972) all records of marks and brands now in existence in the County shall no longer have any force or effect and after the expiration of six months, only the records made after this Act takes effect shall be examined or considered in recording marks and brands in the County. It is important to note that if a Producer filed his mark and brand several years ago and his brand is the only brand filed of that nature he will be able to retain his brand whether he

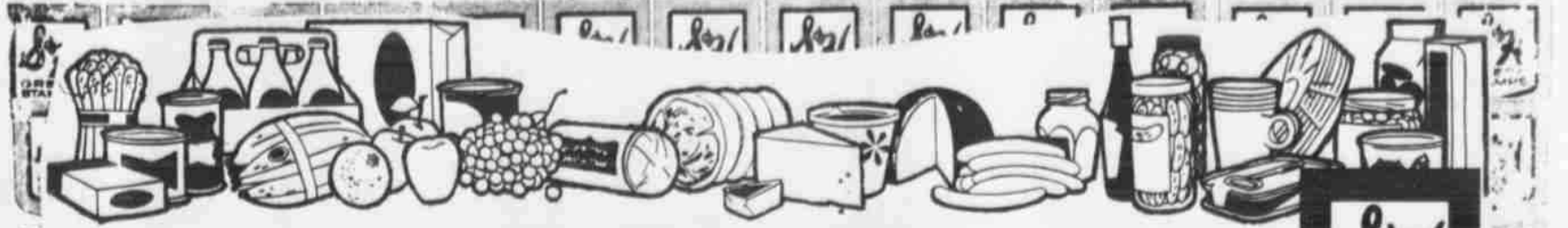

# Wildcats Edge Mules, 5-4

## Funk Goes 53, 11 Yards For 2 Littlefield Scores

Littlefield's Wildcats, prepping for their season opener against Crosbyton here next Friday night, won a controlled scrimmage at Muleshoe Friday evening, 5-4.

The Wildcats were more physical against the Mules, and Coach Jerry Blakely said the team showed "a lot of improvement, overall."

Mistakes still dotted the Wildcat performance, particularly against wide plays and in the secondary.

Muleshoe's Bobby Hayes, leading scorer in the Mules' AAA district and also an all-district performer last year, used a pair of the Wildcat miscues for touchdown runs.

But the Cats also got a stellar running performance from Ralph Funk, who scored twice on line runs.

"Our offensive line blocked a lot better than a week ago against Tahoka," said Coach Blakely. "We still aren't executing well offensively, but we're showing improvement."

Blakely said the play of the defensive ends and middle linebackers was much improved, and he singled out Linebacker Bill Hamblin as a standout on defense.

Funk broke the scoring ice in the scrimmage, running 53 yards for a TD after taking a pitch from QB Jay Trammell.

But Hayes came back with a 65-yard run

on the Mules' next possession and the score was tied.

QB Alan Mackey led Littlefield's second offensive group to a score, ripping off runs of 19 and 31 yards to set up the tally. Mackey got the score on a three-yard keeper.

But Muleshoe came back to tie it up at 2-2 on a 62-yard pass play.

Mackey ran 34 yards to the Mule 21, then raced 18 steps to the six-yard line to set up Littlefield's third score. He scored on a sneak from the one-yard line, making it 3-2, Littlefield.

From that point, Littlefield got two TD's on goaline series, and the Mules picked up a pair in their tries from the 10-yard line.

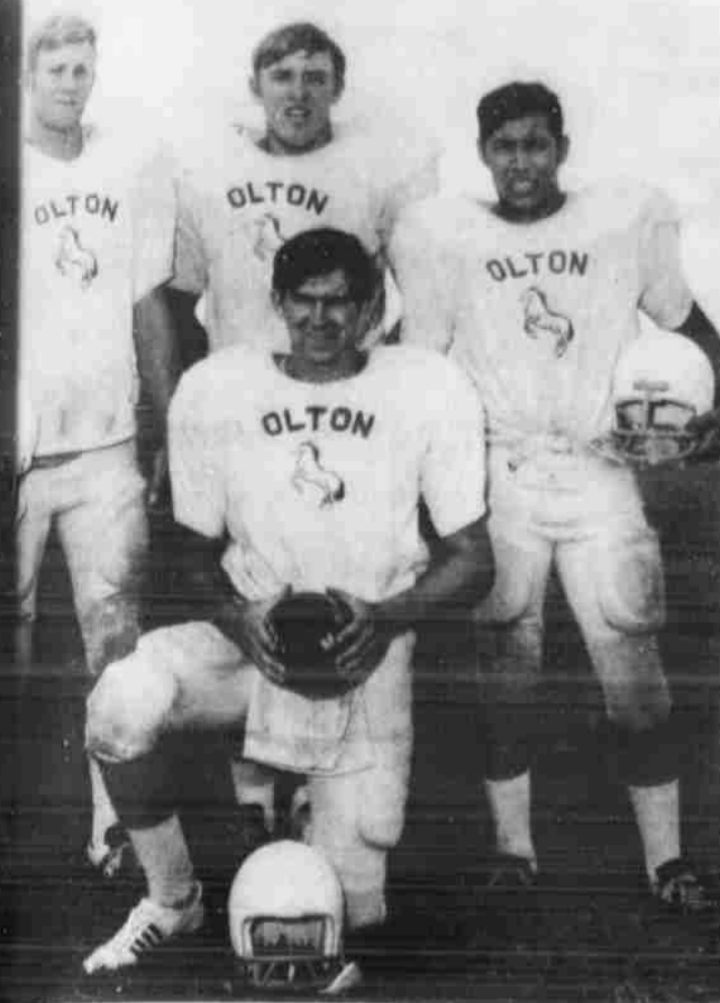

**Farm Bureau Officials Tour South Pacific**

A delegation of 72 Texas farmers, ranchers and Texas Farm Bureau officials who comprise the membership of the TFB's 1971 Foreign Agricultural Tour will depart Wednesday, Sept. 8, for a 19-day tour that will cover four countries in the South Pacific.

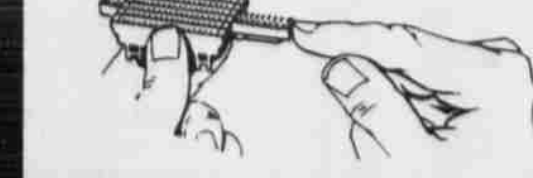

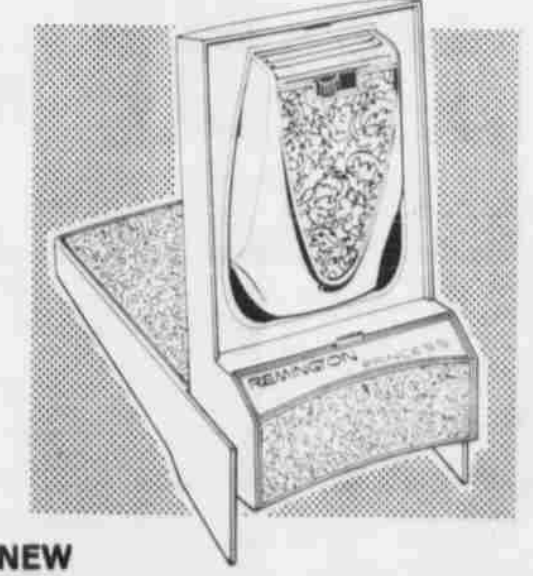
