#### Voter Registration Behind 1971 Total

Unless more than 657 eligible voters in Lamb County register to vote before the primaries and general elections this year, this county is going to come up 657 short of the total number who registered to vote last year.

On Jan. 31, 5,874 had registered in Lamb County. Several have registered since that date, but not nearly 600-700, according to Tax Assessor-Collector Herbert Dunn. By Jan. 31, 1971, 6,531 voters had registered.

There is no registration deadline this year, but voters must register 30 days before they are eligible to vote in any election. By voting at any time during the next three years, registration is automatically renewed.

# Short Order Cook Is Hamburger King

If Tot Allen had all the buns he's turned into hamburgers together, he'd have a rick of buns a block wide and 10 stories high, and it would take several semi trucks to hold all the onions he's chopped.

Does he cry when he chops the onions? "Everytime!" the hamburger king answered. "There's just one way to keep em out of your eyes - just don't chop

Tot and Alma Allen have sold hamburgers for 42 years in the 38 places they've owned. Eighteen of these have been in Anton. The Allens opened their first cafe in Anton in 1928 and sold hamburgers for 10 cents each for many

"During the Thirties lots of people sold hamburgers for a nickel," Allen said, "but never did.

For 38 years Allen has bought fresh ground round from the same Anton grocer. I make my own meat patties," Allen said. 'Don't put nothin' in 'em but meat, either, You don't get enough to hurt you, but what

you do get is good." Allen doesn't go for frozen meat patties. "I don't eat frozen food and I don't sell it," he said. If there's a secret to being a hamburger king, it's to use the best of everything. "Back in the winter tomatoes were \$8.75 a lug, and I still put 'em on," he

The Allens have owned cafes and restaurants in Lubbock, Carlisle, Abernathy, Shallowater, Countyline, Sudan, Albuquerque and Ruidoso besides the Anton locations. For the last several years they've stuck strictly to the drive-in business where there is "the most pay for the least work.

Allen says the 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. business hours are on account of old age. "We can seat 4,000 people, four at a time," Allen says of the four chairs that line one wall of the small front.

At 72 years, Allen still declares that retirement is foolishness. "We quit last year from December until August and doing nothing like to have run us crazy Retirement doesn't suit me. I've worked all my life; I don't have to, I just do it to get something to eat. And that old Dutchman gal over there can cook, too," he said

"If there is anything I can't do, I don't know what it is. I played baseball until I was 56. Now I get my exercise working with my fruit trees and flowers. I won't let my wife out in the yard. "She tromps the

# Audit Accepted, CPA Rehired

City councilmen accepted the city audit for the past fiscal year ending Sept. 31, 1971 and passed a resolution to join efforts to seek approval of the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) for the proposed cable television service for Littlefield, during their regular meeting Thursday night.

In addition to accepting the city audit, councilmen voted to retain Public Accountant Alvin Webb and Associates as auditors for another year.

Alvin Webb, Benny Zahn and Bill Tom Grant appeared to discuss the audit. Councilmen decided to accept the audit after a few minor designated changes were made.

The progress of the Littlefield cable television service was explained by A.C.R. Stone of Diversified Communication Investors, Inc. in Lubbock.

He explained that the Federal Communications Commission would enforce a 35-mile zone ruling because of an earlier objection from a Lubbock television station of allowing Littlefield to have cable television. Stone informed the councilmen that the distance from Lubbock's post office to Littlefield's city limits was measured, and that only .47 square miles-constituting 8 percent of the area of 5.81 square miles in the entire city limits of the city of Littlefield is within a 35 mile arc from the reference point in Jobook, at 1 tal the 47 schare mas has a population of 31 persons.

These 31 persons could not be served with cable television because of the Feb. 2 adoption of FCC rules and regulations which place restrictions on the carriage of television signals by cable television systems located in communities within 35 miles of the reference point of a community with a licensed or authorized television broadcast station.

The new FCC rules and regulations become effective March 31.

Councilmen decided to authorize the mayor, mayor pro tem, and the city attorney, or any one of them individually to sign on behalf of the city, along with Diversified Communication Investors, Inc., any petition or request for waiver of the rules of the FCC which might be deemed necessary by Diversified for its proposed CATV system for the city.

In other matters of business, councilmen discussed taking over the management of Bull Lake as a recreation area this

City Manager Pat Bradley informed the councilmen of Senate Bill 385, which concerns water pollution control duties of

Bradley stated that the city has until May 1 to file an inventory of waste discharges in the area. Councilmen instructed the city manager to respond to the state's questions concerning the situation.



## A Thriving Business?

Or you can dampen the ful and nice to put on your table stain and rub in a soap or detergent until a thick suds is formed. Whichever method you use, work in the cleansing agent until the outline of the stain is gone, then rinse well. Repeat if necessary. It may help to dry the fabric between

Some candles use food coloring as a dye. This type of stain requires soaking in cool water for 30 minutes or longer. If the stain has not been removed, work in a detergent and then rinse. If the stain remains after the detergent treatment, use a chlorine or oxygen bleach.

There are a number of candle manufacturers that use other types of dyes that are more permanent. These dyes are best removed if soaked in cool water immediately after the wax drips onto the cloth. The soaking should be followed by a detergent treatment and bleach if necessary.

On the market today are a number of stain-resistant, noiron, cotton-polyester cloth tablecloths that take the worry out of entertaining. I strongly recommend this type of table linen for a family with children. I dislike plastic tablecloths for anything other than everyday

If you have frequent problems with household stains then you would find it worth the time and money to purchase a bulletin published by the U.S. Department of Agriculture on removing stains from fabrics using home methods. The charge is about 25 cents. The bulletin also gives warnings about treating stains on solvent sensitive fabrics.
