weeks later. I noticed the cow for the first time Monday evening on my way home from work. was grazing in the bar ditch Tuesday morning and was still there that evening, and I started worrying about it not having any water, and thinking what would happen if the cow got on the pavement and someone hit it at a

high speed. worried aloud and R. L. Heard remarked that this must be the same cow that was over in his field three days. "It must have come out of the tornado," he said, "because it was limping."

That was a long time to be without water, and somebody had to do something about that poor old thing before it died.

I phoned my neighbor Prissy Throckmorton, who is versed in cow ways, and told her I'd thought about putting a rope around its neck and leading it over to our house, but that we didn't have a place to put it. She said she thought it would take a stock trailer and they had one and an empty lot and she'd tell her husband.

She told him but he was on his way to a board meeting and he told her to call Carl Jones. who could go over and get the

CONTENTION is undermining every segment of our national life, and has in it the potential to desstroy all we hold dear.

The almost endless confrontation of antagonist groups of people is a type of contention that can explode into hopeless chaos and loss,

HOPE FOR US, individually and collectively, is not in more contention; not in feeding the fires of unnecessary and unprofitable strife.

It is in seeing and admitting our common need, and finding ways to work together; to help each other. if we honestly desire a reason-

able and satisfactory manner of living, it is mandatory that we replace contention with cooperation.



The reason for the increase costs? The rise in taxes at retail prices. The greaten percentage increases haveled in personal taxes—28 percent for the higher budget and in per cent for the lower budget.

Texas water have claimed 47 lives since the first of the year, and the outdoor recreation season has just barely begun, according to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

The Department says the warm weather during the past month has brought a flood of drowning reports.

Most of the recent drownings occurred while the victims were engaging in some form of outdoor recreation such as swimming, boating or fishing,

Seventeen of the drownings were the result of boating accidents, and three of these victims were in violation of the law which requires that a Coast Guard approved life jacket be on board for each person in

Swimming accidents accounted for eight drownings.

Perhaps the most tragic of the drownings were those young children who wandered away from their parents just long enough to drown in some innocent looking body of water. Several children under six years old have died this year near their home in swimming pools or canals.

Department officials say most of the drownings could have been prevented by following some simple rules: keep a tight rein on small children around water: obey the Water Safety Act which was designed to save lives of boasters; and when swimming, know your abilities and your limitations.
