An after-income tax call by banking authorities has caught Lamb County bankers with their deposits down.

Deposits in the six county banks, the Citizens State Bank at Anton and Littlefield Federal Savings and Loan showed deposits down \$3,101,522.15 on the April 30 call date, compared to the same time last year.

Deposits at First National Bank of Littlefield were down \$686,753.85 with total deposits of \$4,803,909.13 on the call date.

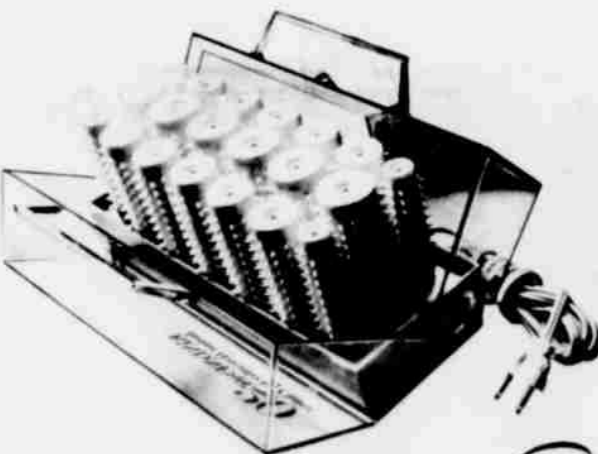

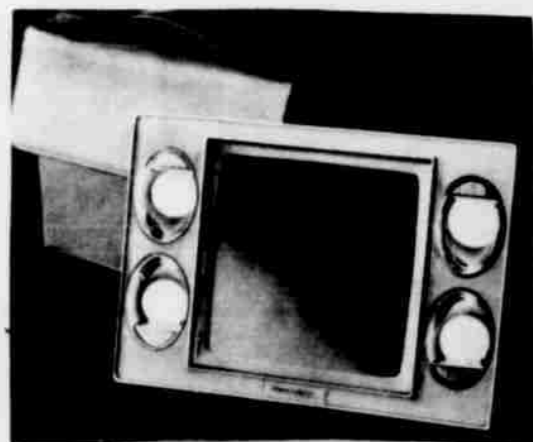

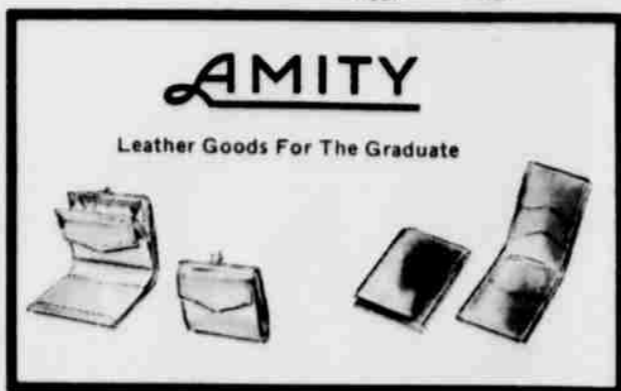

He is FFA secretary of the Littlefield District. Randy is junior representative on the Student Council, and president-elect of the Student Body for 1970-71.

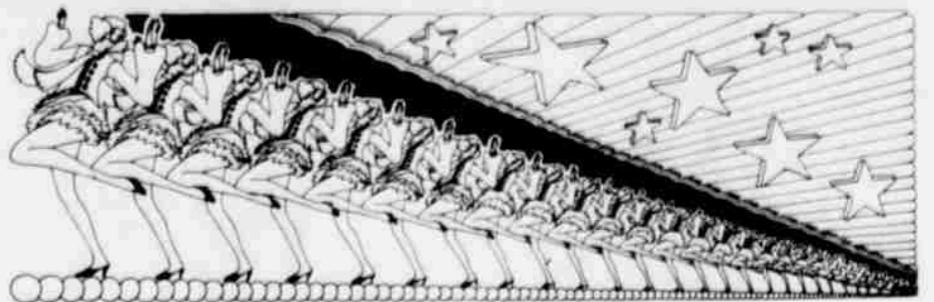
He will also serve as president of the South Plains Association of Student Councils. He attended the TASC summer workshop at Trinity University last summer.

Annual Flower Show Set Here Tuesday

"Much Ado About Flowers" is this year's topic for Littlefield Garden Club's flower show, slated Tuesday in the Willy Room of the Lamb County Electric.

Entries in several categories may be made by any amateur, male or female, who lives in Lamb County, and entries will be accepted from 8:30 a.m. to 11:30 a.m. on the day of the show, and must be picked up by 6:30 p.m. the same day.

Late entries will be displayed, but will not be judged.

The show will be open to the public at 2:30 for viewing.

All persons except the judges, flower show chairman, clerks and photographers will be excluded from the show during judging.

In emphasizing some of the rules, show committees have outlined some of the specifics.

1. All horticulture exhibits must be grown out of doors by the exhibitor, and must have been in his possession at least six weeks.

5. Mechanical aids for arrangements are permitted, but must not be visible.

6. Containers for specimens are to be provided by the exhibitor.

7. Awards will be presented according to the rules of the show handbook.

4. "Split Level"--A triangle arrangement of fresh plant material using two containers.

5. "Graceful Suspension"--A mobile arrangement. Material exhibitors choice. Some fresh plant material must be used.

6. "At The End Of The Rain-

bow"--A crescent arrangement using shades of yellow.

7. "Conversation Piece"--A hogarth curve using plant material.

8. "Vacation Memories"--An arrangement using material with weathered appearance.

9. "Soaring High"--A tall arrangement using plant material.

10. "Heralds Of Spring"--An arrangement using foliage.

11. "Lazy Days"--A horizontal arrangement using plant material.

In the "Novice Class" "Dare To Be Different" arrangement using fresh material.

Of course, our imperfections, our necessary differences, and our varied aims do create a climate for contention.

There will be some contention, but it can surely be kept to a minimum, if everybody involved puts forth a maximum effort.

CONTENTION IS HURTFUL to all people, and is often tragic. It is such a loss, because it is destructive always, and can be disastrous.

It is such a waste of time, energy and all other human resources. It is a source of many pernicious life-elements in human interaction.

It is not a self-contained pasture, but is the evil seed that produces more evil.

THE WIDESPREAD disruption in our land, with its senseless waste, and loss, and alienation is caused by contention without constructive action; and with ill-defined purposes.

Much of it is comparable to a man who destroys the only house he owns, or throws away the food he needs for survival, or worse; he wastes the only life he has.

CONTENTION is undermining every segment of our national life, and has in it the potential to destroy all we hold dear.

HOPE FOR US, individually and collectively, is not in more contention; not in feeding the fires of unnecessary and unprofitable strife.

It is in seeing and admitting our common need, and finding ways to work together; to help each other.

If we honestly desire a reasonable and satisfactory manner of living, it is mandatory that we replace contention with cooperation.

THE STRUCTURE of cooperation

can be strong enough, flexible enough and big enough to encompass all honest differences; if there be respect for all rightful authority.

Disregarding rightful authority; seeking change outside of established avenues for change; and assuming prerogatives of anarchy make cooperation impossible.

WE MUST RESPECT ALL rightful authority. Change, when justified, must be sought within the time-tested framework which contains the established and orderly means for change.

The lawlessness and disturbance of anarchy are attitudes and woe-filled conditions which create a hopeless social and political climate.

COOPERATION AMONG people, as the predominant guideline for social machinery, is absolutely essential to the well-being of all persons.

Just as all of the parts of a motor must function with minimum friction in order for the motor to give maximum service; all the parts of human social machinery must function with minimum friction, too.

WE MUST NOT be gullible enough to be misled by the professional troublemakers, or the maladjusted, or the neurotic, or the misinformed individuals and groups whose aims are disruption and destruction.

We must not permit anybody, or any organization to drive wedges among us which will wreck the framework of cooperation.

COOPERATION IS ESSENTIAL to individual and corporate well-being. This is true in the family, the church, the school, the community, the state and the nation.

"Every kingdom divided against itself is brought to desolation; and every city or house (family) divided against itself shall not stand." The Bible.

LET WISE COOPERATION be our theme in all things at all times.

AMERICANS HAVE PLENTY to worry about these days, but worry about "the Russians" is at least 10 years out of date.

There was a time when the most terrifying menace to our physical health was thought to be T. B. Tuberculosis is still deadly, but it's not our number-one killer.

THERE WAS A TIME when the most ominous threat to our national security was the Soviet. Russia remains a threat, but is no longer our major menace.

What professional and amateur anti-Communists must remember is that if a cure for that disease were discovered tonight, we'd still be sick.

WE'D STILL HAVE home-grown criminals spreading a reign of terror across our country, our cities and our campuses. We'd still suffer from debilitating immorality and malignant inflation.

We'd still be sucking grass and shooting dope and wrecking our lungs and rotting our livers.

DON'T BLAME the Communists for our own laziness, for mushrooming armies of welfare recipients, for misuse of our air and land and water.

Before we approve another top-heavy budget for fighting an imaginary enemy, let's do something about these real ones.

The generals and admirals are riding through every Middlesex village and town crying, "The Russians are coming; the Russians are coming!"

IT'S THAT TIME of year again when the Pentagon wants more money and the generals and admirals have discovered that the best way to boost their budget is to collar members of Congress and scare 'em a little.

Sen J. W. Fulbright says, "At appropriation time the Russians suddenly grow from two inches tall to a height of about 10 feet."

I'M NOT MAKING FUN of the Pentagon. Probably the military, generally, has had no more respectful civilian disciple than Paul Harvey.

I've wished that we might have unleashed our military men in Korea and Vietnam so that they could have resolved those confrontations promptly and decisively.

But it's too late for that now. A military decision now would cost more than it would be worth.

Even as it is too late for Americans to continue shadowboxing with Russians while more sinister enemies attack from the back.

IGNORE THE BIG, urgent, right-now problems and any outside menace won't matter because what's left they won't want.

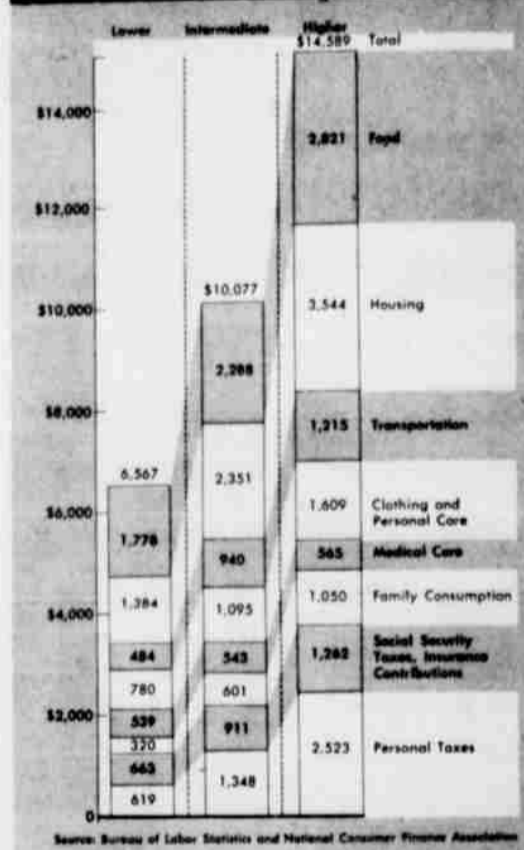

Rising Cost Of Living

Annual Budgets for Three Living Standards, Urban U.S. Spring 1969. Family of four--husband, wife, boy 13, and girl 8



It's true -- the cost of living is going up, up, up. According to "Finance Facts," a monthly newsletter on consumer behavior published by the National Consumer Finance Association, budget estimates for an urban family of four rose 11 to 12 per cent from spring 1967 to spring 1969.

And there has been a 5 per cent rise in the Consumer Price Index since then.

These budgets have been developed by the Bureau of Labor Statistics for a well-established family consisting of a 35-year old husband, a housewife and two school-age children.

In spring 1969 the low budget for this family was \$6,567; the intermediate budget was \$10,077; and the high budget was \$14,589.

The reason for the increased costs? The rise in taxes and retail prices. The greatest percentage increases have been in personal taxes--28 per cent for the higher budget and 31 per cent for the lower budget.

Social security taxes, insurance and contributions have risen by smaller percentages--13 to 15 per cent.

Medical care rose 14 per cent.

Clothing, housing, transportation and food all continued to climb but at a lesser rate.

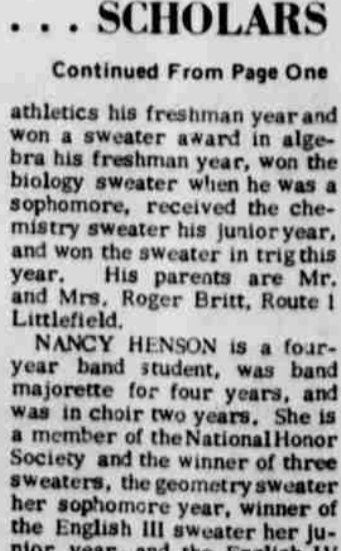

Boating Water Safety

For water safety recall, just plain horse shoes are not enough. Skiers must be prepared to take the skier on board at any time because of accident, sea conditions, skier fatigue, or other causes.

"Accordingly, water skiers shall be counted as 'persons on board' when determining the number of lifesaving devices required by motorboats towing skiers. At least one lifesaving device is required for each person on board.

"Lifesaving devices must have the Coast Guard approval number stamped on either the device itself or on a label sewn onto the device. Just having 'Coast Guard Approved' written on the device is not sufficient.

"Kapak or fibrous glass lifesaving devices are not considered serviceable unless they are encased in sealed plastic bags.

"Cork or balsa wood life preservers are no longer approved by the Coast Guard; however, those preservers having been manufactured and labeled before the effective date of the approval suspension are approved until such time as they become unserviceable.

"There are a lot of these life preservers in service at this time and if they are stamped with the Coast Guard approval number, they are acceptable.

"Kapak or fibrous glass life preservers can be checked for serviceability by applying pressure to the floatation part of the preserver. If they collapse under normal pressure, then apparently there is a hole in the plastic bag and they would not be considered serviceable.

"All life preservers are checked for serviceability by the condition of the floatation itself, the straps, and the condition of the fabric."

Storm Damaged Trees Should Get Attention

Trees damaged by violent weather during spring and early summer should get immediate attention.

Storm damaged limbs or branches should be removed immediately, advises Lamb County Agricultural Agent Buddy Logsdon.

When a limb or branch must be removed in its entirety, he says to make the cut flush with the tree trunk or limb from which it is growing. Also, he says paint all wounds with a good tree wound dressing to prevent the entrance of disease or insects into the freshly made cut.

The job of removing large limbs can be simplified and damage to the bark can be prevented if care is exercised, says Logsdon.

He suggests making a cut from the underside of the limb about eight inches from the main trunk. Make this cut at least one-third of the way through the limb or until the saw binds.

Then make the second cut from above and several inches farther out on the limb and continue cutting until it can be removed. Make the final cut, he says, flush and parallel to the main trunk. Then apply tree wound dressing to the exposed surface.

If trees around the home do not get immediate attention, warns Logsdon, they may fall victim to insects and diseases which can enter through the damaged areas.

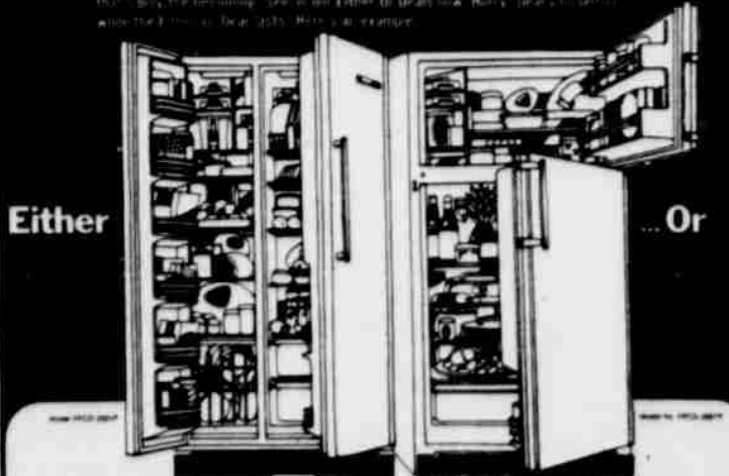

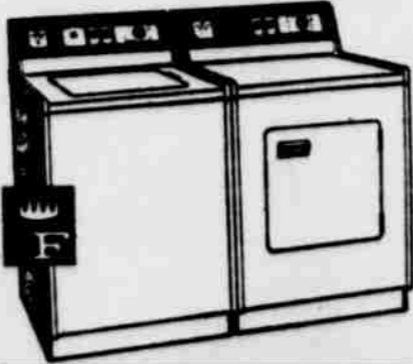

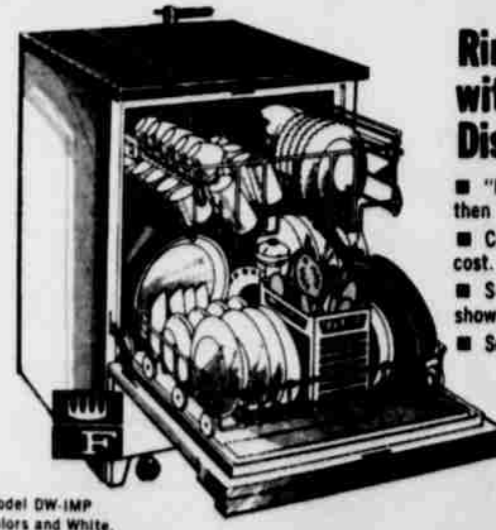
