WASHINGTON, October 25 (A)-Texas' eighth congressional district, consisting of Harris county and represented in Congress by Albert Thomas, is the largest in the nation -in population.

Final 1950 census figures by congressional districts, just released by the Census Bureau, show a population of 806,701 in the Houston district.

The smallest district of any is the second district of South Dakota, with 159,099.

The Texas district with the few Congressman is Rep. Omar Burlepopulation of 226,739. It embraces 12 counties, with Abilene the

The second smallest district is channels 7, 18 and 24; one in Am- the fourth, represented by Speaker Sam Rayburn of Bonham. It has a population of 227,735.

While most congressional districts in the nation have between 300,000 and 400,000 persons, two others in Texas besides the eighth exceeded 500,000. The fifth, Dallas county, has 614,799. Its Congressman is J. Frank Wilson. The 20th, Bexar county, has a count of 500, 460. It is represented by Paul Kilday of San Antonio.

Ten congressional districts in Texas have populations ranging between 200,000 and 300,000 and five have populations between 400,000 and 500,000. Only three have populations in the 300,000 to 400,000

New Flowers In U. S. Gardens

A top horticulturist recently returned from England with 300 varities of plants, all strangers to America, most of which will eventually find their way into U.S. gardens.

T. H. Everett of the New York Botanical Garden said that most of the plants are quite rare although he was primarily concerned in importing plants that would thrive in America and be of interest to gar-

Among the more unusual plants are a yellow-flowered lilac, a double flowered sweet rocket, five new

varieties of goldenrod. Everett said the British Isles are the treasure house of the world for cultivated flowers. "For centuries-ever since the Crusadesthe British people have been gathering different varities of flowers from all over the world.

The flowers will be kept in the New York Botanical Garden until it is certain they are bearing no alien blight. Then they will be distributed throughout the country. Various garden clubs sponsored the varieties of geraniums and even some specially bred flower-hunting expedition.

"He's so nearsighted he can't see his hand in front of his face!"

A mistaken tendency is to separate all who don't have normal eyesight into two great classes: the nearsighted and farsighted. Yet, even the child who is farsighted may have vision so bad he can't see in the distance without his glasses, or a man who has progressive nearsightedness can reach the point at which it is impossible for him to read.

More accurate names for these conditions are "myopia" for nearsightedness and "hyperopia" for farsightedness.

There is no such thing as an optically perfect eye. Those which have normal or almost normal vision, however, have a couple of qualities in common. In the first place, all of the substances through which light must travel to reach the back of the eye, the retina, are clear. Next, the rays of light are focused in such a way that they fall exactly on the retina. An eye meeting this latter requirement is called "emmetropic," which means "an eye within measure."







Mobile Power Meets Emergencies

Emergency power is provided by a truck-mounted generator which has been developed by a tractor company (Caterpillar). The pilot model seen in this picture already has been used to meet a power emergency when the main generator of a New Jersey town broke down. It is designed to produce 315 kilowatts of electricity, burning furnace oil in its engine. It is planned to sell the units to government and business organizations for use in providing power where regular sources are out of operation. Kill The Rats And Save Foods In Short Supply

Rats are mighty expensive rodents to have around the farm. It is estimated that each will actually eat \$2 worth of food but the big loss comes in what is wasted and destroyed-about \$20 worth. In addition, says J. E. Poore, assistant district leader, U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, rats are known to be carriers of some 27 different diseases including typhus fever and bubonic plague.

With the coming of cooler weather, Poore says these undesirable tenants will be moving into their winter quarters especially into grain bins, feed stacks and buildings where the winter's feed supplies are stored. The first step in a successful rat control program is a farm clean-up.

Pile posts and lumber on supports at least two feet above the ground and scrap lumber, not worth saving, and junk should be destroyed or removed from the farm. Stack bottoms, other feed waste and manure piles should be scattered in the field so they will not provide hiding places for rats. Tall weeds also make fine rat hideouts if left standing.

A strip of galvanized metal, three feet high, placed around the build ing will keep rats out, says Poore, provided they can't get in through the floor, If a new granary is being built, set it in piers at least two feet above the ground, and then construct it so rats can't get in.

Poore recommends following the farm clean up with a poisoning program. Last year, in a campaign which he supervised, 11,898 rats were killed at a cost of about four cents per rat. Warfarin bait was used and the amount needed to kill a rat averaged a little less than one quarter of a pound.

In some cases, other types of able but many must be used with extreme caution, he adds, because they are deadly poisons. He suggests before using these poisons that a rodent control service fieldman or the local county agent be contacted for advice.

After a complete program has been carried out on a farm, don't let re-infestation occur, says Poore. Watching for signs and getting new arrivals before they have a chance to become established will keep the farm relatively clear of rats.
