Precinct conventions for the Republican Party will be held Saturday, same date as the primary election. A. S. Nafziger, county Republican chairman, announced the location of the various precinct conventions this week.

Voters In Choice Of Two Parties

Lamb County voters as well as voters throughout the state will go to the polls Saturday to select candidates for both the Republican and Democratic Parties. A large turnout is expected in the county as well as the state as the offices of most state offices are up for election.

There are only three contested races in county elections, both of these on the Democratic ballot. Two candidates, J. B. Davis and Truitt Sides are seeking the party's nomination as County Judge. Three men are running for the post of Justice of the Peace of Precinct 4. They are Lyle Brandon, L. M. Burnett and J. N. Bowen.

Two men have filed for Justice of the Peace of Precinct 5. They are J. M. Shuttlesworth and G. W. Davis. All other county races have but one candidate.

Only one race will be voted on in the District Saturday. Three candidates have filed for the spot as State Representative of the 91st District on the Democratic ticket. They are Bill Clayton, W. T. M. Lien and E. M. Nelson.

On the state level the Democrats have nine contested races and the Republicans have three. In addition, on both party ballots are two referendums. The first concerns legalizing parimutuel wagering on horse races and the second to abolish the poll tax as a prerequisite for voting.

In addition, the Republican ballot will carry a referendum calling for establishing a park on Padre Island.

Democratic Voting Boxes

Lamb County Democrats will be voting in 16 precinct boxes Saturday in an attempt to select a party ticket for the fall General Elections. Polls in most areas will be open from 8 a.m. until 7 p.m. Saturday.

One change has been announced in the location of a voting place, according to Pat Boone, Sr., county Democratic chairman. At Springlake, the Democratic polling place will be at the Fire Station instead of the Community Center as previously announced.

Absentee voting in the upcoming primary elections ended Tuesday afternoon with 121 persons casting ballots by this method. Charles Jones, county clerk, said there were still a few absentee ballots out that will probably be mailed in, but the total above is complete as of Wednesday morning.

Of this group 116 voted in the Democratic Primary and 5 in the Republican.

Although this does not set a record, it does show considerable interest in the elections.

Two Injured In Lubbock Accident

A local family was involved in a three-vehicle collision in Lubbock Sunday night. Alvis Collins, his wife Pansy and their two children, Shelly and Michael, were in a car that collided with a pickup which had been knocked into the path of their car.

Mrs. Collins received six broken ribs and broken breast bone as a result of the accident. Shelly, four-years-old, received a broken leg. Collins and Michael received only minor injuries. Mrs. Collins and Shelly are still in a Lubbock hospital.

Lubbock Police who investigated the accident said a car, driven by Casimiro Gonzales of Lubbock, struck the rear of a moving pickup, driven by Bud Reynolds, also of Lubbock, knocking the pickup into the path of an oncoming car, driven by Collins. The accident occurred at 8:22 p.m. Sunday near the intersection of E. 4th and Olive Ave.

In all, 11 persons were injured in the accident. Gonzales was the most seriously hurt.

Truck Hits Roller, Driver Escapes Harm

What could have been a fatal accident Monday morning resulted in only minor injuries to the driver of a concrete truck involved in an accident south-east of Littlefield.

Connie Browning of Littlefield was driving a loaded concrete truck owned by Roberts Lumber Company when the brakes apparently failed and the truck collided with a 35 ton roller being operated by Elvin Pruitt of Lubbock. Both vehicles were going southeast.

Parolman Bill Angel, who investigated the wreck, said the accident occurred seven miles east on Highway 84 at 9:15 a.m. Monday. On impact the cab of the truck "sandwiched" with the front portion of the truck being driven back and the weight of the concrete in the mixer causing the rear to "pinch" the truck cab.

Two Accidents Told By Police

The grader was purchased from Plains Machinery Company of Lubbock at a cost of \$8,676 difference between the new machine and a trade in grader.

West Texas Equipment Company of Lubbock also bid on the grader.

Car-Train Collision Injures Local Man

A car - train wreck on Houston street in Littlefield at noon Wednesday injured the driver, Alonzo McMillen of Littlefield, and destroyed his car.

McMillen, who works at the city dump grounds, was on his way home for lunch when the accident occurred. He received a broken hip and one of his teeth was knocked out.

He was taken to a local hospital and is in satisfactory condition.

City assistant chief James Cox, who investigated the accident said the train was pulling out from a siding on the west side of Martin - Marietta and McMillen was going west on Houston. The train's engineer, B. W. Johnson of Slaton, told Cox he had blown the whistle several times before crossing the road.

McMillen said he heard the whistle and looked back down the track, the opposite direction from the train.

The front of the car hit the right front grill of the train. After impact the train carried the car southeast across the road along side the train.

McMillen's 1953 model auto was destroyed in the accident. Only minor damage was done to the train engine.

Cox said the wreck was no worse because neither the train or the car were going very fast.

Most of the afternoon I followed Monty Furgol, Johnny Potts and Al Johnson, all three are just pretty darn good golfers. Furgol, an old-timer of the pro circuit, is a nice guy and added humor along with some fine golf. On the 17th green he approached short of the cup and just barely missed a birdie putt.

As he was walking up to his ball, he remarked that he was just a par golfer and the crowd seated around the green laughed. He tapped in the short putt for his par and said, "See, I got my par," and again the crowd laughed.

Palmer was nine strokes under par coming into the 17th and hit his ball into the woods leaving only a small opening and short distance to the green. He used a six or seven - iron to run the ball onto the green and the ball stopped about two feet from the cup and he ran it in for a birdie and went ten under par.

In a typical razzle - dazzle finish, Palmer teed off on the

18th, a three par hole, and his ball almost made a hole-in-one ending only about 8 inches from the cup. He sank the putt, the crowd roared, and the champion was crowned, but not until Campbell and Littler played the 18th.

Both of these men were ten under par coming into the last hole. Littler hooked his shot and Campbell ended up short of the green. Their approaches were off the mark and Palmer was then declared the winner and received the champion's check for \$4,300.

He was the pre-tournament favorite but was never in the lead until the final hole, but that was all that was necessary.

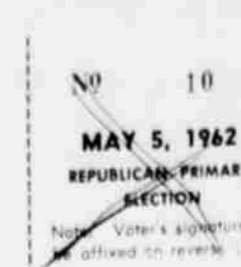

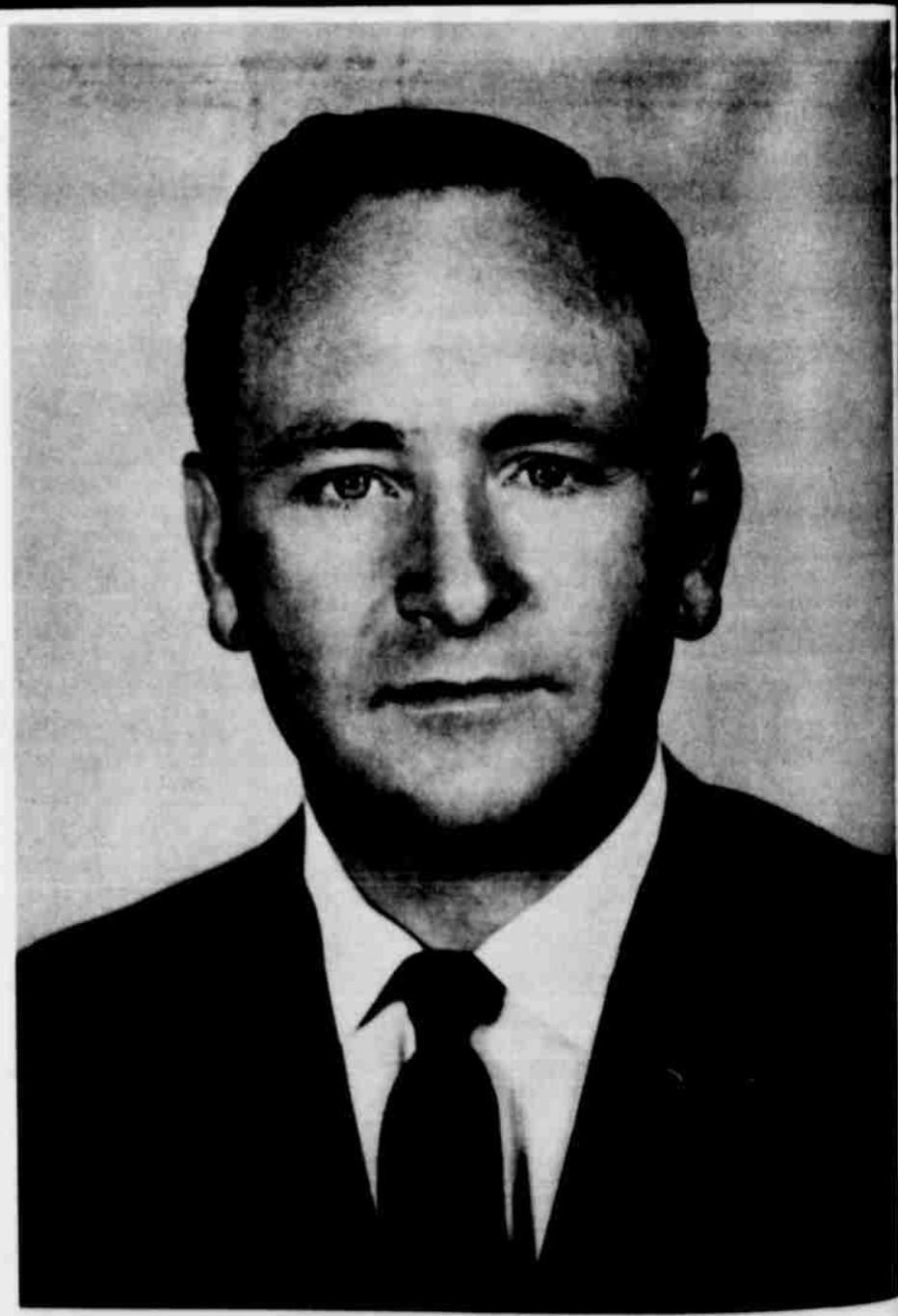
