Thursday meeting. Meanwhile, the Underground Water Conservation Law is getting attention this week from another source, the Texas Water Code Committee. An announcement from John Bliss, New Mexico state engineer said the Texas group would visit Santa Fe Monday (May 1) to study the New Mexico law regulating use of irrigation water. The committee also was to visit the Roswell artesian basin for a survey there, press reports said. In New Mexico, the state controls and regulates underground water uses.

Another group, the High Plains Water Conservation and Users Association, of which the Lamb County group is an associate member, announced that a meeting is called for Thursday, May 4, in Plainview to discuss recent developments towards organizing water districts and to map plans for a strong campaign to keep the present "local-control" water law. The main criticism of the present law is that no districts have been formed.

Muleshoe Doctor Robbed And Beaten

Dr. L. T. Green, jr., 42-year old Muleshoe doctor and hospital owner was treated in St. Anthony's hospital in Amarillo Friday and later released after he had been found dazed, robbed and beaten Thursday night east of Amarillo.

Dr. Green, the son of Mr. and Mrs. L. T. Green of 402 East Seventh St., was found by state highway patrolmen wandering, bleeding and incoherent, on a country road three miles east of Amarillo. Police issued a stolen report on Dr. Green's 1950 model Pontiac sedan. They said his wallet was missing and it is believed he was robbed of \$150 in cash.

Sgt. A. L. Chilcote of the Amarillo office of the Texas Highway patrol said two of his patrolmen found Dr. Green in the bar ditch of a country road after they had been notified by passing motorists that a man was apparently in distress.

He had left Wednesday noon for Fort Sumner, N. M. before proceeding to Amarillo but his whereabouts until the time he was found are not known. Speculation was that he had been robbed and beaten by a hitchhiker.

Dr. Green is married and has two sons and two daughters. He has practiced medicine in Muleshoe since 1939.

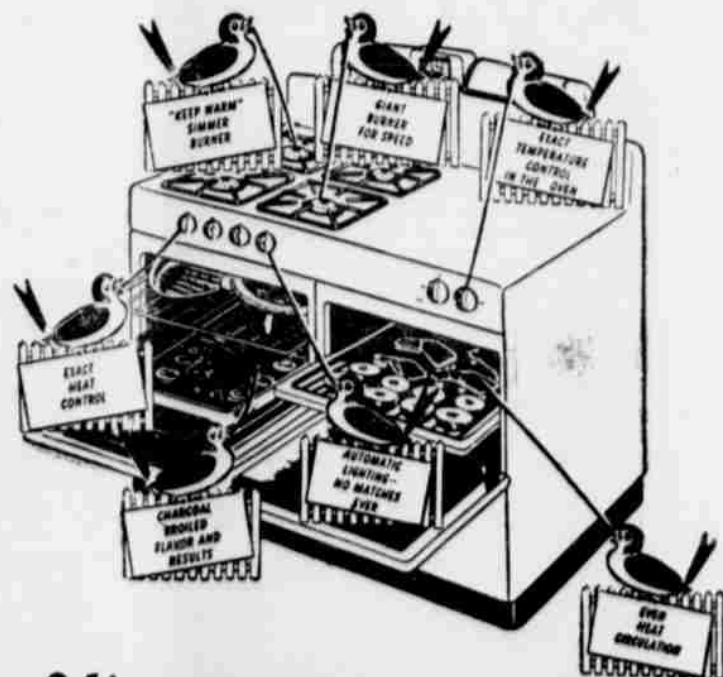

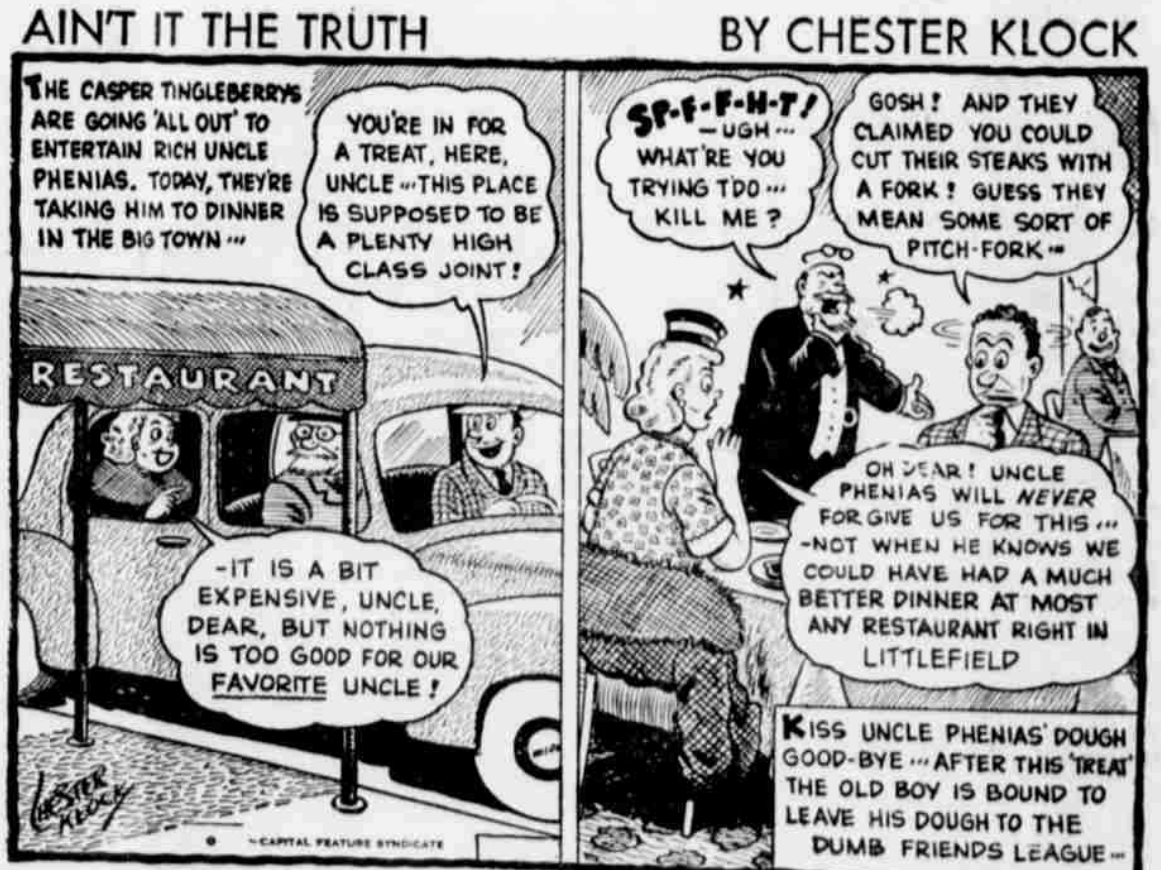

INFORMATION For VETERANS

Q - My grandfather, whose father served in the World War I is living with me instead of with her widowed mother. May payments of benefits from VA be made for this child?
 A - Yes. Payments may be made to the legal custodian of the child if it is not in the custody of the widow.
 Q - While in the Army during World War I, I had to have some

teeth extracted. Am I entitled to dental treatment by VA?
 A - If there is a record of teeth extractions while you were in the service, you may be entitled dental treatment. Go to your nearest Veterans Administration office for a check on your case.
 Q - My husband, a World War I veteran, was receiving compensation for a service-connected disability at the time of his death. I was married to him 11 years and am now 33 years of age. Will age bar

me from receiving compensation as his widow?
 A - Your age has no bearing on your right to compensation if you meet eligibility requirements.
 Q - I am a World War I veteran and hope to be admitted to Masonic Home in the near future. Will the fact that I am the resident of such a home affect my pension?
 A - Admission to the Masonic Home will not affect your pension.

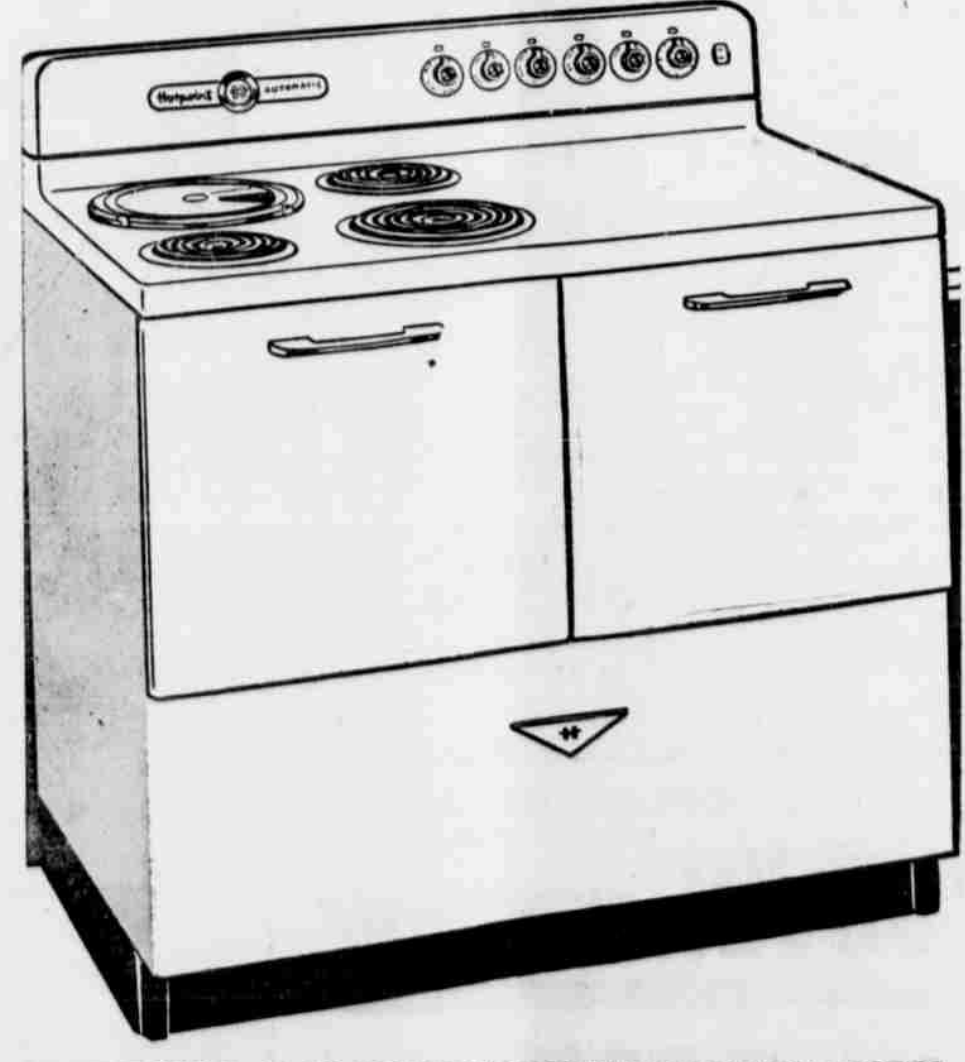
