
Because bread is a basic item in our diet, its price is an frem of some concern in the average family's grocery budget. Consumers, therefore, are likely to be irritated and perplexed when the price of bread rises while surpluses of wheat are being publicized widely. Sometimes they blame

Actually, the farmer's share of the money spent for a loaf of bread is less than it was back in the late forties.

According to a House Agri-culture Committee report, the farm value of wheat in a loaf of bread in the 1947-49 period amounted to 2.7 cents as com-pared with 2.4 cents in 1958. Yet the average retail price of a pound loaf of bread rose from 13.5 to 19.3 cents in the

over-all, the average worker's family paid 13 per cent more and farmers got 8 per cent less in 1958 for the same kinds and quantities of food purchased in 1947-49.


On Water, Soil **And Fertilizers**
