### Most Modern Gin Plant Completed By Lamb County Farmers Co-Op Here

V. S. Cassell, who has been in the ginning business for a half century, has just completed the erection of his "dream plant" on a 20 acre plot of land on the eastern outskirts of Littlefield.

The gin is one of the finest and most modern gins in the Southwest. It represents an investment of approximately \$75,000.

**Is Practically Fireproof**

With the exception of rafters in the three-story high roof, which is covered by aluminum sheeting, the gin is practically fireproof. It is equipped with Murray gin machinery and press with Mitchell super units.

The plant is powered by a 220 horsepower natural gas Waukesha engine.

Constructed of concrete and red brick, the front of the pressroom is built in a semi-circle and a panel of glass brick about midway of the circular wall provides plenty of light.

The gin is equipped with steel casement windows throughout. A three-story office on the west side of the gin will house the office, a storage room and an 8-bed dormi-

tory space for workers.

**Five Bales An Hour**

The gin is capable of turning out an average of five bales an hour and from the looks of the Lamb county crop, which is expected to total more than 100,000 bales, the plant is due for 24-hour operation within a short time.

Cassell, who as a boy in his teens, assisted his father in the operation of an old horse-powered gin in East Texas, formerly operated gins at Winnsboro, east of Dallas. He came to the South Plains in 1929 and operated gins at Tahoka and Lubbock before moving to Littlefield eleven years ago.

An old plant, which had become crowded nearer town, was torn down and some of the materials used in the new plant. Two large storage houses, one for cotton and the other for seed are at the rear of the new plant, which fronts on Highway 54 running into Littlefield. Highway 84 and 51 are easily accessible.

The Lamb County Farmers Coop had ginned up to Wednesday night close to one hundred bales this season.

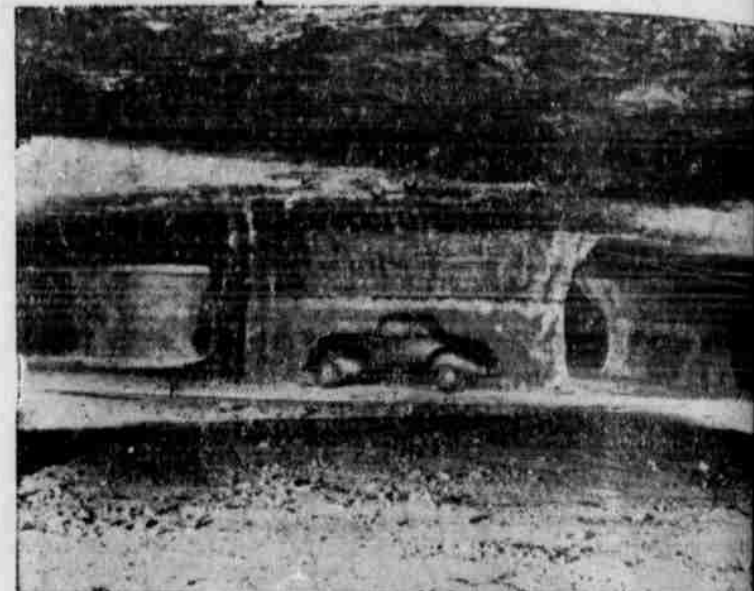

This would be the ideal time for every individual to eliminate fire hazards, observe rules for fire prevention and become thoroughly conscious of the danger of fire.

Most fires start in the home and in more than half of the cases the blaze is a direct result of carelessness. Oil and grease soaked rags thoughtlessly tossed into the closet offer an ideal opportunity for a spark to start a fire.

Carelessness with inflammable fluids is a very common practice. Servicing machinery while smoking is an open invitation to disaster. Burning trash in a high wind in an open incinerator often results in an uncontrollable blaze. An open flame from the cook stove or heater becomes doubly dangerous in a draft. 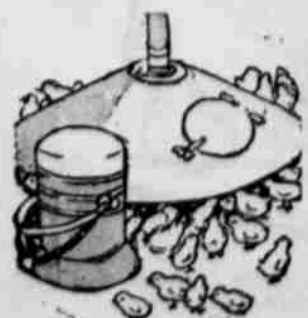

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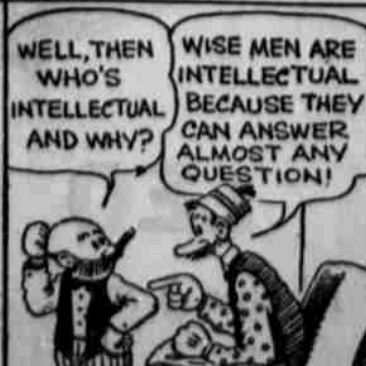

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### Sidelights From Germany

BY GEORGE MAHON

This is being written from the city of Trieste, a town of about 30,000 on shores of the Adriatic sea. I am here in Trieste with a Congressional sub-Committee charged with making a study of our foreign aid program. I had hardly heard of this city prior to the war and that is probably true of most Americans. It is now one of the danger spots of the world.

The place belongs to Austria before World War 1 and to Italy after World War 1. The city and a small bit of land surrounding the city have now been set up as a free state which is to have a governor appointed by the United Nations. The city of Trieste is only five miles from Yugoslavia.

At the conclusion of the war, Yugoslavia and Russia demanded that the city be made a part of Yugoslavia. America and British refused to agree as most of the people in the city are Italians, and the Free State was finally agreed upon.

A force of 5,000 American troops and a similar number of British troops occupy the city of Trieste. The city is the dividing line which separates Russia and Yugoslavia from the western world. It may be our first line of defense against Russian aggression. In addition to maintaining our troops here, we are spending about \$800,000 per month to help feed the people of the area. A ship load of American wheat arrived recently and there are no signs of starvation here. The Port was heavily bombed during the war. Our government is supporting a program to make the place self-sustaining.

During the stay of our Committee in Trieste, Treaty provisions have gone into effect setting up the new state, and Ratification Day has been celebrated. It has been a very precarious time for American and British military forces.

The Commanding General of the Yugoslav Army served notice upon our military headquarters that his army contrary to the provisions of the peace treaty was marching into the city of Trieste at 10 o'clock at night on Ratification Day. Our forces manned the roads to the city with instructions to prevent the entry of the Yugoslav army. The Yugoslavs engaged in some military maneuvers and threats, but when it became apparent that the Americans and British had called their bluff, they withdrew their forces.

There has been an air of uneasiness throughout the city during our stay here. There have been numerous riots and demonstrations by the Communists. Bombs have been exploded in the streets and a few people have been killed. The Yugoslav army outnumbers the Anglo-American forces in this area, but the presence of American war ships in the harbor and the flight over the city of our four-engine bombers have had

a stabilizing influence on the situation.

One of the most spectacular demonstrations was a Communist funeral procession through the streets of the city. The Communists claimed that the anti-Communists were responsible for the killing of a child who belonged to a Communist family. The child's casket was carried down the street on the shoulders of six young men, preceded by four huge red flags. The bands played and hundreds of flowers were carried in the procession. The marching crowd extended for several blocks and was estimated at 15,000 people.

In Trieste we have conferred at length with American and British military officials, where we have found considerable pessimism as to the chances for peace and stability. Trieste is headed for trouble unless the United Nations is able to pursue a firm policy and establish a strong civilian government. We have conferred also with local citizens and officials. The majority of the people in the city of Trieste are Italian, but there are also many Yugoslavs in the area.

Among the 5,000 American troops in Trieste are 137 enlisted men from Texas. I had a pleasant visit with two of them from West Texas, Max Carpenter of Sundown, and Cecil Drake of Big Spring, Texas. All our troops seemed to be in fine shape and morale appeared to be high.

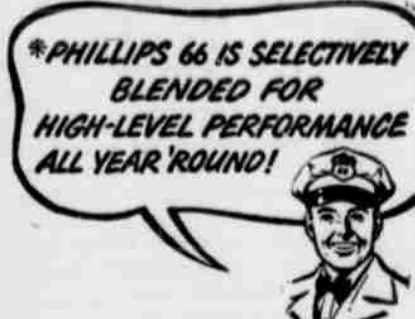
