Ed Burrus First To Raise Cotton Here

Ed Burrus, of the Olton country, was a visitor in Littlefield Monday. Mr. Burrus is one of the real "old timers" of this section, and while in conversation with some of his old friends called their attention to the fact that he was the first cotton raiser in Lamb County.

Twenty-two years ago Mr. Burrus moved to Lamb county, at that time being the second man with a family in the county. He hauled the lumber for his buildings 125 miles overland from Estilene, in Hall county.

In the spring, after his arrival here, he decided to try a small patch of cotton, and planted six acres. A few days after planting a very heavy rain came, causing a poor stand, but in spite of this he gathered one bale from the plot, which he took 100 miles to Matidor to have ginned.

Mr. Burrus is one of the prominent men of the north part of the county, and has many friends in the Littlefield vicinity who are always glad to greet him.
